New special service fees will go into effect at all post offices Saturday, March 26, Postmaster A. J. McAlister announced.

The new special service fees inregistered mail, insured mail, certified mail and money or-

On registered mail, the new fee cents for articles valued up to \$100, and goes up proportion-ately to \$4.25 for articles valued at from \$9,000.01 to \$10,000.

On insured mail, the fee is 20 cents for liability up to \$15 and goes up to 60 cents for liability up to \$200, which is the liability limit.

The money order fee will be 25 cents from one cent to \$10; 35 cents for \$10.01 to \$50, and 40 cents for \$50.01 to \$100.







This special benefit is a flat \$35 month, Mr. Hutton said. Wife's benefits of \$17.50 a month are payable at age 72 to a woman whose husband is entitled under this provision, if she reaches 72

birthday, March 25 and Elizabeth Mr. Hutton advised these persons to get in touch with the Lub-bock social security office as soon as possible. They can apply for payments and enroll for Medicare at the same time.


