Loafing might become profitable

Unemployment is now at a nine-year low and there isn't as much doing as there has been at the state-Federal window that pays unemployment insurance benefits to those unable to find work. But, in the calm atmosphere of affluence the House Ways and Means Committee is being pressurized by Union bosses to approve a bill. H. R. 8282, that will "Federalize" state unemployment compensation systems.

This legislation that would drastically revise the unemployment system to reward the indolent is being quietly guided through Congess bearing the rather innocent title, "Amendments to the Unemployment Compensation Statutes." Actually, it would radically alter official policy toward the

This legislation to "Federalize" state unemployment compensation systems, which in some cases will double the employers tax, would, in effect, make vagrancy a full-time occupation if allowed to pass. It allows for 26 weeks of state benefits, followed by an additional 25 weeks of Federal benefits for only 20 weeks of work.

It would abolish individual employer experience rating systems, which presently encourage stable employment, and the employers' tax would be greatly increased.

Changes proposed in H. R. \$282 are so sweeping as well as numerous that no employer can afford to neglect an understanding of the bill's terms and to relate the provisions to his cost of doing business.

Unemployment compensation was established primarily to provide protection against involuntary employment for the regularly employed. H. R. 8282 would require unemployment compensa-

tion be paid those who quit their jobs without good cause or were fired for wilful misconduct on the job, and would require continuing benefits to those who chose to remain unemployed by refusing to take suitable jobs that are available.

If this Administration plan to federalize the states' unemployment compensation programs passes Congress, you will feel its far-reaching offects, no matter which state you operate in whether you employ one worker of hundreds of

One possible effect of the legislation is that a lot of people may soon find it more attractive to be unemployed than to have a job

According to a February Reader's Digest article the bill would wipe out the prudent standards that most states have established and substitute a gigantic federal giveaway program. Authors Earl and Anne Selby say that if the bill passes it will:

-Be an open invitation to flagrant cheating. -Open the floodgates for untold thousands of claims now outlawed.

-Cost billions of dollars more than present compensation programs.

In Texas alone, passage of the bill in its present form would increase the number of employers affected from the present 80,000 to 198 .-000, while covered workers would be increased by only 175,000 from the present two million. A Texas businessman sums up the view of

'If we have many more 'gimmles' crammed down our throats, there will not be enough queen bees to carry all the drones."

Let's hope, for the good of our country and the people, that Congress rejects this bill.-JC

Daylight Saving Time in Texas?

Texans in the U.S. House of Representatives have sided, 13 to 5, with the idea that the whole country ought to go on Daylight Saving Time. Thirteen voted for a bill applying it uniformly nationwide and five opposed it.

Texas does not now set its clocks one hour ahead the last Sunday in April for extra daylight in the summer and back one hour the last Sunday in October every year, but it will have to beginning in 1967 under the terms of the bill. Only an act of the legislature can exempt the state from the measure.

Time was when it didn't matter, but things have changed so in recent years that we are inclined to favor uniform application of Daylight Saving Time. Increased passenger travel on airplanes, television programming, and a number of other things make the time difference inconvenient to some people when Daylight Saving Time is applied in one part of the country and

As Rep. Walter Rogers of Pampa said, Daylight Saving Time ought to be uniform across the country, not a hodgepodge of local options. Anyway, we have another year to think it
