Voter turnout seen as small

Election at all levels of government have been won or lost on the basis of a handful of votes. We hope this isn't the case Saturday when three important local races and one major statewide race-for Attorney General-are decided.

Several factors have prompted the prediction that the voter turnout could be one of the smallest in Texas history-with possibly as few as five per cent of Texas voters going to the poils.

First of all, it is a non-Presidential election year, and this always decreases voter interest. Second, there is not a contest for the Governor's race, and this has traditionally diminished inter-

est in the second primary. Garza County, with the Democratic nominees for County Judge, County Treasurer and Precinct 4 Commissioner to be decided, is likely to pull out a bigger percentage of voters than most of the other counties in this area, some of which do not have any locally contested races on the bal-

A final warning sign that Saturday's voter turnout statewide could be one of the smallest in history was the rumor immediately following the first primary on May 7 that some counties without locally contested races weren't even going to hold a second primary. The State Democratic Executive Committee responded with a resolution calling attention to the fact that every county is required by law to hold a runoff election, and the penalty for failure to do so can be a fine or imprisonment for party officials.

For the want of the vote of Texans who don't care enough to go to the polis Saturday, a very small minority of the citizens could elect some of its most important office holders. And the big battle to get the majority of Texas voters to exercise their responsibility as citizens would be lost!

Dogs should be licensed, too

Approximately 100 dogs were vaccinated against rables here recently in "Operation Vaccination," sponsored by radio station KPOS and Dr. E. S. Murray, veterinarian from Spur.

"Operation Vaccination" was a public service that will be a big help toward keeping down any rabies outbreaks here, such as have been reported in other sections of Texas. And the sponsors have indicated that they will "do it again" before the summer is over, if there is a demand for it.

Dog owners should not think, however, that just because they have had their pet vaccinated against rables their responsibility to the community ends there. The City of Post has an ordinance that calls for the licensing of dogs and for not letting them run at large

So, those owners who had their pets vaccinated but have not yet purchased a city license need to do so to fully comply with the law. Dog licenses are issued by the city at \$1 a dog, regardless of sex, and it's doubtful if any other town in Texas has a dog licensing fee any lower than

If you've had your dog vaccinated against rables and purchased a city license for it. you've complied with the law. If you've had your dog vaccinated, but not licensed, you haven't complied

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



> Mr. Callis took his two little girls to Jacksboro where they lived awhile with his brother and famlly. This brother owned some swift Walker hounds with which they ran coyotes and lobo wolves that were killing calves and colts on the re-cently fenced ranches. The Callis brothers met the challenge of the fences by carrying long, heavy slickers, which they tossed over the barbed-wire fences. The horses jumped over, the dogs ran under, the men relmounted, and the chase was on until the lobos could find a hole or cave. If it were nearly night the men would build a fire near the opening, but wait until morning to smoke them out and shoot them

In the fall of 1882, Henry Callis took his two small daughters, Frong sharp eyes saw a team of big le and Willie, to Henrietta for a visit with relatives.
