He also said addition of a home economics teaching station would be an asset to the junior high, as well as a wood shop and said it might be necessary to construct a small building adjacent to junior high to meet these needs.

Dr. Barron said trustees and the school administration "is to be commended for their judicious efforts in overcoming a deficit of \$148,000 in the short time it is being accomplished."

Three factors in auditorium election

Post voters will have the opportunity next Tuesday, Dec. 5, to express their choice by ballor as to whether or not this community should take. another progressive step beward by acquiring a City Auditorium for a total price of only \$13,000.

Three factors are important in this election.

First, every citizen survey to recent years has constantly given too billing to a community center as Post's No. I need Not as long ago, a fact-finding committee spent a whole year on the project and came up with a \$290,000 price tag for building a community center in city-county park. Now, through amount circumstances. Post has the opportunity to convert the former bowling alley building into a city auditorium-and fulfill our community center need-for \$13,000 (\$7,500 for the building, \$3,500 for repair, and \$2,000 for the purchase of adequate parking lot facilities adjacent to the bowling alley.)

Instead of building a much more expensive community center. Post can acquire a city auditorium and develop it through the coming years to fill the needs of the community.

The second important factor is that the actual cost is so small it will require no tax levy change and can be paid for a few thousand at a time from budget surpluses in city funds. Local

improve the building once acquired. In essence, the City Auditorium project can be compared to the Post Public Library as a very beneficial development which no taxpayer will really feel in his pocketbook.

To sum it up, the city will get a tremendous amount of public facilities for a very small cost.

The third important factor is a combination of public apathy and the ever present opposition in every community to any improvement that costs

1970 census might be a little nosey

Garza countians will remember reading just the other day where this nation's population went nast the 200 million mark for the first time in its history. That's a lot of people and there won't be any official count of them made until the next federal census in 1970.

Not only will the 1970 census he the biggest nose-count in American history, but it will also be different from any other census we've had since the first one way back in 1790.

The census takers will use two forms in 1979. -DX2, the long form, and DX1, the short form The short form will go to three of every four household heads. The fourth will get the long

There has already been a "trial run" of the 1970 census, with about 80 per cent of the population in New Haven, Conn., getting a tasts of it. Don't ask us why they chose New Haven. Conn., for this dress rehearsal of the 1970 census.

About 20 per cent of those in New Haven failed to return the forms, apparently because they did not receive them, didn't understand them or waited too long to fill them out

The New Haven test was the first of several to be taken between now and the actual census on April L. 1970. Other "dress rehearsals" are scheduled in Madison, Wis., and Sumpter and Chesterfield counties in South Carolina.

They are being used to test a citizen's ability to cope with the wording of certain questions necensary to update population and housing statis-

The short form, for example, requires about 30 minutes and the long form about 50 minutes. Too, time depends on the size of a family and

The 150 questions in the 20-page long form might be considered just a little nosey.

For example, it asks the value of a householder's property, his annual income, whether he has a flush toiler, whether he has a telephone. where he works, how he gets there, why he wasn't there last week (if he wasn't), who stayed at his home the night before the survey and who his first wife was (and succeeding ones, if applicable) among other things.

Census Bureau officials admit that some of the questions, particularly those about toilet facilities, have stirred up a small furor among certain critics who misconstrue the purpose of the ques-

There also is a pretty safe guarantee that information will remain confidential. Penalties are stiffer for bureau employes who disclose unauthorized information than they are for citizens who fail to complete the form, according to bureau

Most questions, in fact, even ones about foilet facilities, have been on census forms since about

Rights Commission announced to day that it has begun distribution of reporting forms required by the Water Rights Adjudication Act of

Persons using public surface water in Texas for any purpose other ed by recent legislative action to court file a sworn statement with the Texas Water Rights Commission for recognition of their claim. This must be done no later than Sept.

The Water Rights Adjudication must be valid under existing law and will be limited to actual use. All water rights are to be adjudicated and administered by the Commission "to the end that the surface water resources of the State may be put to their greatest beneficial use," to quote the new law.

This act will not affect users of ter for domestic or livestock purposes only also will not be affected. 


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
