Three factors in auditorium election

Post voters will have the opportunity next Tuesday, Dec. 5, to express their choice by ballot as to whether or not this community should take another progressive step forward by acquiring a City Auditorium for a total price of only \$13,000.

Three factors are important in this election. First, every citizen survey in recent years has consistently given top billing to a community center as Post's No. 1 need. Not so long ago, a fact-finding committee spent a whole year on the project and came up with a \$200,000 price tag for building a community center in city-county park. Now, through unusual circumstances, Post has the opportunity to convert the former bowling alley building into a city auditorium—and fulfill our community center need—for \$13,000 (\$7,500 for the building, \$3,500 for repair, and \$2,000 for the purchase of adequate parking lot facilities adjacent to the bowling alley).

Instead of building a much more expensive community center, Post can acquire a city auditorium and develop it through the coming years to fill the needs of the community.

The second important factor is that the actual cost is so small it will require no tax levy change and can be paid for a few thousand at a time from budget surpluses in city funds. Local

organizations will be able to join in and help improve the building once acquired. In essence, the City Auditorium project can be compared to the Post Public Library as a very beneficial development which no taxpayer will really feel in his pocketbook.

To sum it up, the city will get a tremendous amount of public facilities for a very small cost.

The third important factor is a combination of public apathy and the ever present opposition in every community to any improvement that costs anything.

If the people who favor the City Auditorium—and they should total into a big majority—don't shoulder their citizen responsibility to vote Tuesday, a minority who always votes will carry the day.

It's happened before in almost every town and city—and it has happened in Post.

The Dispatch urges every qualified voter to go to the polls in City Hall Tuesday and vote.

This newspaper solidly supports this Chamber of Commerce-backed community project. We believe it to be a tremendous bargain. We have no fear of its defeat if every citizen would vote. But we are afraid that too few citizens will participate in Tuesday's decision at the polls. If this happens, the proposal will be beaten.—JC

FROM CHRISTMAS card headquarters, the word is that not only are there going to be more Christmas cards this year, but they will be bigger, brighter and more colorful.

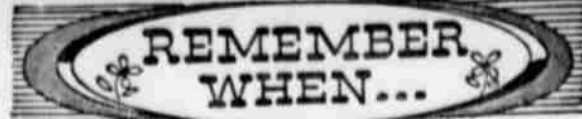

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Cotton marketing quota vote set

Cotton growers of Garza County will join others across the "belt" in voting by mail Dec. 4-8 on marketing quotas for the 1968 crop year.

The sign-up period for the cotton program, assuming passage of the referendum, is set for Feb. 5 through March 15, 1968.

Marketing quotas were approved by growers for the 1967 crop by 91.6 per cent of those voting in the referendum of 1966, and there is little doubt that quotas will be approved for 1968.

If, however, they should be approved by farmers, the ment program would still be in effect, but there would be no age diversion or price support payments. Price supports would be available at 50 per cent of the price to cooperators who stay within their allotment.

1970 census might be a little nosey

Garza counties will remember reading just the other day where this nation's population went past the 200 million mark for the first time in its history. That's a lot of people and there won't be any official count of them made until the next federal census in 1970.

Not only will the 1970 census be the biggest nose-count in American history, but it will also be different from any other census we've had since the first one way back in 1790.

The census takers will use two forms in 1970 —DX2, the long form, and DX1, the short form. The short form will go to three of every four household heads. The fourth will get the long form.

There has already been a "trial run" of the 1970 census, with about 80 per cent of the population in New Haven, Conn., getting a taste of it. Don't ask us why they chose New Haven, Conn., for this dress rehearsal of the 1970 census.

About 20 per cent of those in New Haven failed to return the forms, apparently because they did not receive them, didn't understand them or waited too long to fill them out.

The New Haven test was the first of several to be taken between now and the actual census on April 1, 1970. Other "dress rehearsals" are scheduled in Madison, Wis., and Sumpter and Chesterfield counties in South Carolina.

They are being used to test a citizen's ability to cope with the wording of certain questions necessary to update population and housing statistics.

There will be less room for procrastination—as in the New Haven test—when the actual survey is made. Failure to respond in 1970 can get a citizen a \$100 fine or 90 days in jail!

After test areas have finished the survey, there likely will be considerable rewording of certain questions, Census Bureau officials say. The survey probably will take just as long to complete.

PUBLIC NOTICE OF THE REQUIREMENT FOR RECORDATION AND LIMITATION OF CERTAIN CLAIMS OF WATER RIGHTS.

Notice is here given as required by Section 4 of the Water Rights Adjudication Act of 1967 (Article 7542a, Vernon's Civil Statutes) that all claims of riparian water rights, all claims under Article 7500a, Revised Civil Statute of Texas, 1925, to impound, divert or use public waters for other than domestic and livestock purposes for which no permit has been issued, all claims of water rights under the Irrigation Acts of 1889 and 1895 which were not filed with the State Board of Water Engineers in accordance with the Irrigation Act of 1913, as amended, and all other claims of water rights other than claims under permits and certified filings, must be recorded with the Texas Water Rights Commission. Section 4 does not apply to use of water for domestic and livestock purposes as the same is defined by Commission Rules.

On or before September 1, 1969, every person claiming any water right to which Section 4 applies shall file with Commission a sworn statement setting forth the nature of the claim of water right. Claims to which the Section applies shall be recognized only if valid under existing law and only to the extent of actual application of water to beneficial use without waste during calendar year from 1963 to 1967, inclusive. However, in any case where any claimant of a riparian right has prior to August 28, 1967, commenced or completed the construction of works designed to apply a greater quantity of water to beneficial use, such right shall be recognized to the extent of the maximum amount of water actually applied to beneficial use without waste during any calendar year from 1963 to 1967, inclusive; provided an additional sworn statement is filed on or before July 1, 1971. Failure to file the sworn statement or statements in substantial compliance with Section 4 shall extinguish and bar any claim of water right to which the Section applies.

Instructions and forms for recording claims may be obtained without cost from the Texas Water Rights Commission, P. O. Box 13396 Capitol Station, Austin, Texas 78711.

PRESIDENT TELLS PHILADELPHIA GROUP

Pioneer Gas Company service area continues to grow and diversify

PHILADELPHIA — With gas reserves considered to be among the best in the industry, and a service area that continues to grow and diversify, Pioneer Natural Gas Company's progress is assured, according to C. I. Wall, company president, speaking recently before the Philadelphia Securities Association.

Add to the promising industrial future of the area the fact that Pioneer, an Amarillo, Texas, based company, serves a territory that includes one-fifth of the nation's irrigated land, and you have the perfect combination for the continued growth of a balanced demand for natural gas, according to Wall.

DURING THE past year, Pioneer Transmission Corporation, a Pioneer Natural Gas Company subsidiary, completed the construction of a 70-mile, 20-inch pipe line from the prolific Delaware Basin to connect with an existing company transmission line near Odessa, Texas. Wall pointed out that this is a joint venture line, 50 per cent of which is owned by Pioneer Transmission.

Wall went on to say that in 1967 Pioneer's gross property additions are estimated at \$12,900,000, with

\$14,100,000 contemplated for 1968. It is estimated that construction expenditures for the five-year period, 1968 through 1972, will be in the range of \$50 million.

WHILE EMPHASIZING that weather conditions can have a definite effect on income, Wall estimated that earnings per share for 1967 will range between \$1 and \$1.05. Earnings for the first nine months of 1967 were 83 cents per share compared to 76 cents for the same period in 1966.

"As with most other businesses, Pioneer's operating costs have been climbing, despite our best efforts to improve efficiency wherever possible," Wall told the analysts. To offset this increase in costs, the company has obtained rate increases during the past year. He pointed out that these changes in rates should increase the company's total gas revenues by about 5.4 percent a year commencing with the year 1968.

OF CONSIDERABLE interest during 1967 has been the activity of a subsidiary of Pioneer in the exploration for uranium. Exploratory drilling operations on 46,000 acres of land in South Texas are currently being conducted through a subsidiary, Amarillo Minerals, Inc. This company was formed in September to own the leases and conduct the exploration. Wall went on to point out that a subsidiary has also made statutory filing for uranium exploration permits on more than 100,000 acres of land in McMullen, Duval, Webb, Jim Hogg and Starr counties. This filing will give the subsidiary the first rights to uranium leases from the State of Texas, and the subsidiary has an agreement with a major oil company which will do exploratory work to earn an interest in any state leases acquired.

Wall concluded his talk to the analysts by saying "With the continuing development of its resources and people, plus the help of natural gas energy, we look forward to the achievement of increasing economic gains for our area in the immediate years ahead."

Six new patches on Constitution

AUSTIN — Texas' 91-year-old Constitution, as a result of the Nov. 11 elections, has six more amendments.

Also, as a result of the general election, Texas has a new Republican senator, 35-year-old Dallas lawyer Ike Harris.

Republicans are in run-off races with Democrats next month in all six districts which have House vacancies. Two of the districts are in Houston, one in Austin, one in the Rio Grande Valley, one in Wharton and Matagorda counties and the other in Bailey, Cochran, Hockley, Terry and Yoakum counties of West Texas.

GOP candidates led November voting in all but the Valley district.

Arts and Crafts Club to meet Wednesdays

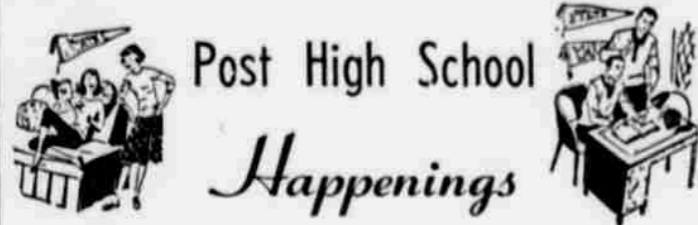

Marble Falls, Tex., is subject of study by Business Research Bureau

AUSTIN — The small Burnet County city of Marble Falls, pop. 2,660, is expected to increase its population to 7,260 within the next 25 years.

That projection is part of a new area economic analysis published by the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research.

"Marble Falls: A Future Built on Natural Resources" was prepared by Associate Prof. Charles T. Clark and Assistant Prof. James E. Willis, business statistics specialists in the UT General Business Department.

The bureau's 99-page study is one in a series designed "to aid Texas cities in planning municipal facilities and in making optimum use of their resources."

Noting that "the mining and processing of granite and limestone" is the largest single factor in Marble Falls' present economy, the authors point out that large deposits of dolomite ore containing calcium and magnesium carbonates in the vicinity of Marble Falls "offer unusual opportunities for a substantial increase in the extraction industry."

"The forecasted increase in mining and processing is based largely on the assumption that the depletion of shell deposits on the Texas coast will bring about extensive exploitation of the dolomite deposits," Drs. Clark and Willis state.

In addition to projections for the future, the UT study is replete with current data on Marble Falls population, employment, housing, utilities, education, government and taxes, and community environment.

Reporting forms for water rights are distributed

AUSTIN — The Texas Water Rights Commission announced today that it has begun distribution of reporting forms required by the Water Rights Adjudication Act of 1967.

Persons using public surface water in Texas for any purpose other than for domestic or livestock uses without a permit are required by recent legislative action to file a sworn statement with the Texas Water Rights Commission for recognition of their claim. This must be done no later than Sept. 1, 1969.

The Water Rights Adjudication Act, effective Aug. 28, 1967, provides that all claims of water rights must be recorded with the Water Rights Commission. These claims must be valid under existing law and will be limited to actual use. All water rights are to be adjudicated and administered by the Commission "to the end that the surface water resources of the State may be put to their greatest beneficial use."

This act will not affect users of ground water. Users of surface water for domestic or livestock purposes only also will not be affected. The new law applies to and may limit claims to riparian waters, waters diverted or impounded for use other than for domestic and livestock purposes. "It claims to water rights under the Irrigation Acts of 1889 and 1895 which were not filed with the State Board of Water Engineers in accordance with the Irrigation Act of 1912, as amended," and all other claims to water rights for which permits or certified filings have not been granted.

Official personnel for Rodeo finals selected

DENVER, Colo. — The Rodeo Cowboys Association today announced the official personnel selected for the National Finals Rodeo, to be held Dec. 1-9 at Oklahoma City, Okla.

Clem McSpadden, chairman of the NFA commission, said the Finals climax the 1967 rodeo season—\$37 R.C.A.-approved rodeos paid \$3.8 million in prize money this year—and cowboys will make final bids for championship titles and shares of \$71,250 in prize money.

Eighty-three American and Canadian cowboys are eligible for the Finals. Their rankings are determined by money won during the year.

The original list of Finals judging candidates was first reduced to a workable size by the R.C.A. board of directors, and was then submitted to the NFR commission. The commission in turn further narrowed the list, and contesting finalists selected the riding and timed event judges in close balloting.

Voted to judge saddle and bareback bronc riding were Duane Howard, 34, Minnewauken, N. D., and Bob Sheppard, 33, Tucson, Ariz.

Howard has been one of rodeo's top bull and saddle bronc riders, but a serious head injury received in saddle bronc riding sidelined him more than three years. He was runnerup for the 1960 bull riding

title.
Sheppard has also suffered injuries which kept him from closer shots at bull riding championships; he finished fifth for the 1965 crown.
Steer wrestling flag judge will be Phil Hatcher, 33, Okemah, Okla. A calf roper and steer wrestler, he finished 16th nationally last year in the latter event.
Calf roping flag judge will be Everett Shaw, 59, Stonewall, Okla. One of the sport's great steer ropers, he has won six national titles and has been out of the event's top five money winners only seven times in the last 22 years.
