Garza County qualified its range and pasture grass identification team and two individuals for the State Roundup at the District 2 elimination contests for 4-H members held Saturday in Lubbock.



It would be a week 'watch dog'

From where we sit, it appears that the role to reelect a member to represent them of the proposed State Ethics Commission as a "watch dog" over state government would be a woefully weak one. And that is one of a number of reasans we are going to vote against Proposed Constitutional Amendment No. 1 on May 18.

The reason we think the proposed State Ethics Commission would be a weak watchman over state government is because with its recommendations subject to approval of the legislature. it could not make its decisions binding.

Ostensibly, the proposed amendment's major purpose is the creation of a State Ethics Commission, but isn't it possible that this is merely a subterfuge and the real purpose is to bring about a legislative pay raise without going through the procedure of obtaining voter approval which has failed to grant legislative pay hikes at least a couple of times in recent years?

As far as ethics are concerned. Texas voters themselves can best judge the conduct and ethics of members of the legislature and can so express their opinions at the polls by reelecting or failing Also, any increase in compensation which

the State Ethics Commission might recommend would furthe increase the costs of state government at a time when state finances are already overburdened in meeting the expanding needs of a growing population.

Since the proposed amendment provides for financial disclosure as privileged information, the people of Texas would still have no way of identifying sources of income of members of the legislature and could not make individual assessments on the all tionship of a legislator's incomeand its source in the interests of good government

The thin proposed in Amendmont No. 1 would not, in our opinion, have set well with the people of Texas at any time. And the proposals appear even worse following, as they do, the questionable financial dealings of some of the state's top officials that came to light a few months ago ---CD

Confiscatory postal rates?

Since they depend almost exclusively on the mail for distribution, small weekly newspapers such as The Post Dispatch would be particularly hard hit by the proposed second class mail rates set by the Postal Service.


No newspapers, however-not even the larger ones-would escape the effects of the mail rate increases, which more than likely would curtain newspaper distribution to thousands of readers.

If the rates are approved by the Postal Rate Commission, newspaper management could see subscription costs increase 142 per cent in the next five years.

Squeezed by higher costs on all sides, newspaper patrons may find the forced rate increases prohibitive. Newspapers and other publications, therefore, would become beyond the financial reach of many Americans.

The new rates are based on 199 per cent of attributable, or actual, costs of handling the mail. Postal officials say that the extra charge is necessary to cover overhead beyond actual handling costs.

We appreciate the fact that the Postal Service is attempting to operate on a business-like basis. But when rates clearly prohibit many Americans from access to varied publications, freedom of the press, guarded by the U.S. Constitution, is endangered. Reassessment of the proposed rate structure is in order.-CD

be voted May 18, would make \$100 million in state low interest rate as treasurer. loans, which would reduce the city's primary outlay to only 20 per cent, we could gain \$300 mil-lion in federal funds to help the cities reduce their initial expense for additional or completely new sewage treatment facilities.

It's strange to me that our opponents say Amendment 4 is in some way connected with the "Texas Water Plan," which is not true. necessary or Texas will not be able to sell its bonds at competitive rates, regardless of how many bonds we vote

The fact is that passage of amendment 4 will reduce the local tax burden for sewage treatment. It will help bring back \$200 million in federal tax money to help us solve sewage treatment problems. It will benefit our health and environment by cleaning up streams, rivers, lakes, and land areas now becoming dangerous. It will save water. There are many other reasons our state cannot afford to lose am ene additional information to answer any questions you may have, and am personally asking your help and your influence to get this very important amendment passed. Remember if your city does not now need this sewage treatment improvement, population growth and continued depreciation of present facilities will make this amendment 4 very attractive in the future, when you do need it. Thank you for all the help you can give us. We think this issue is very important and we are concerned that several organizations have grossly misled the public in regard to Amendment 4.

STEWART James VI, King of Scotland, once made the remark that not everyone named Stewart is kin to the king. The king was in a position to know, since his own surname was Stewart.

John Stewart, Lord of Kyle, ascended the throne of Scotland in 1306 as the first of the Stewarts to become king of the country. Later, the royal line changed the spelling of the name to Stuart through some of them having lived in France where the alphabet has no w." The Stuart spelling was adopted there also by Mary Queen of Scots and it became fashionable when she continued using it on her return to Scotland

The Scottish royal family of Stewart descended from Walter fitz Alan, the Norman noble. who was appointed by David I of Scotland. The final "d" of Steward became "t" in Scottish pronunciation to give us the surname Stewart.

The steward was not only the chief of the royal household, but his power extended to the collection and management of the crown revenues, to the administration of justice, and in time of war he took first place in the army next to the king. Not only the king, but every


court-holding earl and bishop had his steward, which accounts for the fact that all Stewarts and Stuarts are not of royal descent. To the Gaels, the Stewarts are known as 'The race of kings and tink-Stewarts began emigrating to

the New World early and by the time of the first census in 1790 there were 3,600 of them in this country, where the name ranked 36th in frequency. Approximately 1,000 Stewarts served in the Revolutionary War. Today, Stewart is the 50th commonest surname in the United States with an estimated 273,000 persons by the name. Stuart ranks 742nd and is the family name of an estimated 35,000 persons.




