TEXAS JUSTICE SWIFT

Soldier sentenced on rape attempt charge

Texas justice proved mighty swift for a 17-year-old army private from Idaho here Monday.

After being indicted by a Garza County grand jury on counts of assault with intent to commit rape and attempted rape on a Garza County girl south of Post April 11, Richard Allen Jordan pleaded guilty a few hours later before District Judge George Hansard to the first charge of the two-count indictment.

Pat N. Walker was appointed as defense attorney for the youth.

Judge Hansard found Jordan guilty and sentenced him to not less than two years nor more than 10 years in the Texas state penitentiary.

Jordan is being held in the Lubbock County jail for safe keeping, and apparently he faces some more Texas justice before being transported to the penitentiary to begin serving sentence.

He is also reported to be wanted in Fort Worth for car theft.

Six men also were indicted by the grand jury Monday. They were: Curtis Haynes, indicted for the Jan. 28 burglary of the Dick Wood residence.

Billy Joe Fritts, Paul J. Reese and John H. Duplants, all indicted for the burglary with intent to commit theft Jan. 20 of Cecil Bland's rural home.

Ben Benitez and Alford Silva Aleman, indicted for the burglary of an automobile belonging to James McWhorter March 8.

**ASTRONOMICAL EXPEDITION SCHEDULED FOR EARLY MAY**

AUSTIN — An astronomical expedition requiring the international cooperation of countries on three continents will originate from the University of Texas in early May. UT Austin scientists will travel to Africa, Australia and India to observe the occultation (obscuring) by the planet Jupiter of the star Beta Scorpii on May 13. The astronomers hope to document the composition of Jupiter's atmosphere in an effort to provide a key to the origin of the planets of our solar system. The project is funded by grants from the National Geographic Society and the National Research Corporation.

**GOVERNOR WRITES ON AMENDMENT NO. 4**

Dear Jim:

All of us are aware of the need for better methods of financing sewage treatment facilities by our cities and towns in Texas. Our population is growing, adding new burdens to sewage treatment plants which are not able to properly eliminate wastes in many areas, further polluting streams, rivers, lakes and land areas.

At present, each local community or city must bear 67 per cent of the high cost of improved sewage treatment facilities. Amendment 4, to

be voted May 18, would make \$100 million in state low interest rate loans, which would reduce the city's primary outlay to only 20 per cent, we could gain \$200 million in federal funds to help the cities reduce their initial expense for additional or completely new sewage treatment facilities.

It's strange to me that our opponents say Amendment 4 is in some way connected with the "Texas Water Plan," which is not true. They object to the raising of the limit of bond interest to a ceiling of 8 per cent. But this is absolutely necessary or Texas will not be able to sell its bonds at competitive rates, regardless of how many bonds we vote.

The fact is that passage of amendment 4 will reduce the local tax burden for sewage treatment. It will help bring back \$200 million in federal tax money to help us solve sewage treatment problems. It will benefit our health and environment by cleaning up streams, rivers, lakes, and land areas now becoming dangerous. It will save water. There are many other reasons our state cannot afford to lose this election. I am enclosing some additional information to answer any questions you may have, and I am personally asking your help and your influence to get this very important amendment passed.

Remember if your city does not now need this sewage treatment improvement, population growth and continued depreciation of present facilities will make this amendment 4 very attractive in the future, when you do need it.

Thank you for all the help you can give us. We think this issue is very important and we are concerned that several organizations have grossly misled the public in regard to Amendment 4.

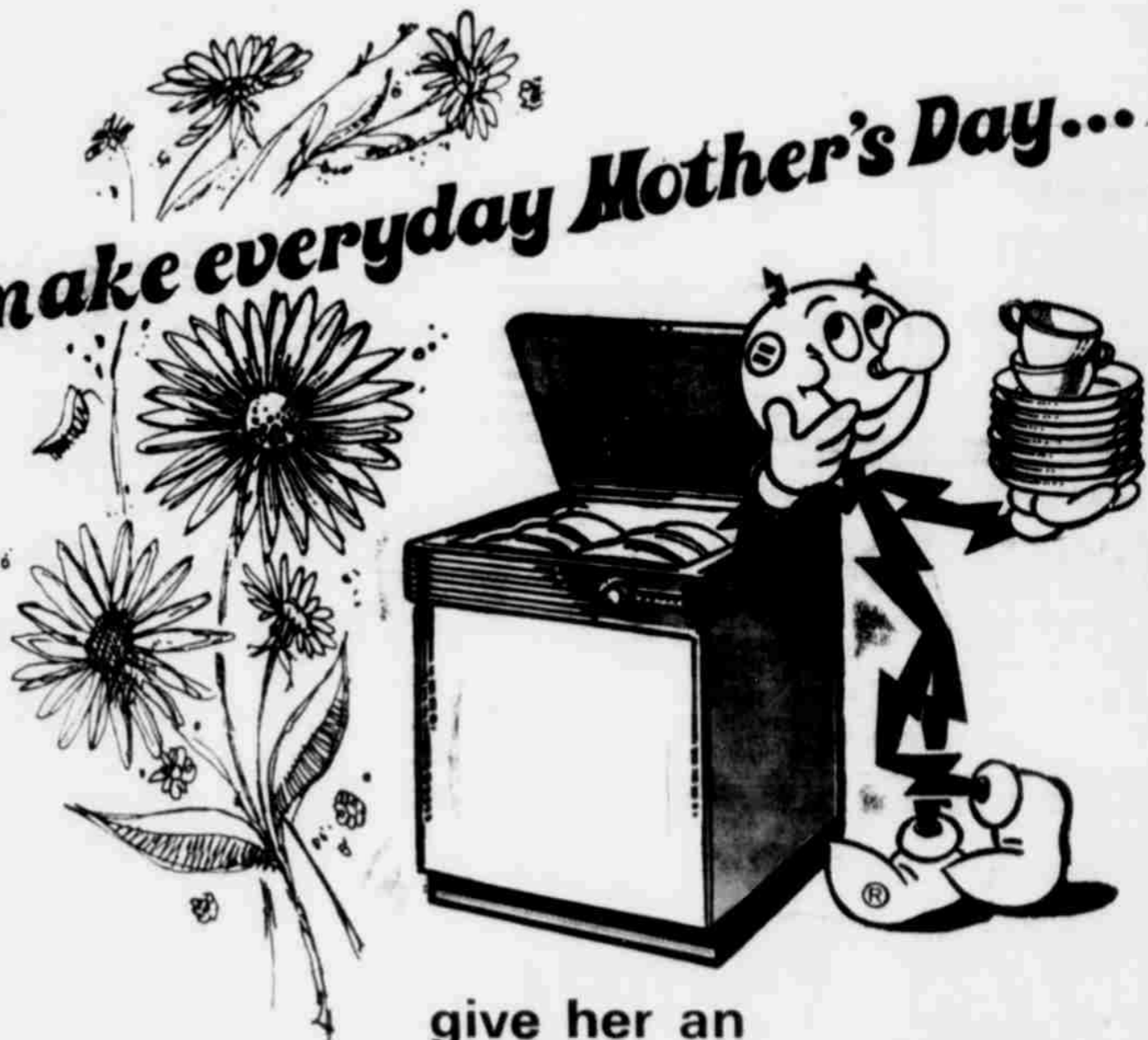

## Why Go To Church?

I would like to share with you, in part, an article in one of our church magazines written by Rev. C. William Fisher.

Now that the Lenten season and Easter Sunday are over for another year, many will feel that it isn't so important or urgent for them to attend church.

And the reasons they will give for not attending will be many and varied.

"I just didn't find what I was looking for," said a young graduate student explaining why he quit attending church.

But what should one look for in church?

Beautiful music? Perhaps—but one can find that at home on his stereo. Lovely surroundings? Could be—but one can find those at the lake or in the mountains or on the golf course. Interesting speaker? Maybe—but one can hear just as good (or even the same one) at Kiwanis.

Then too, some attend church looking only for some-

thing to criticize. The Pharisees were like that. They were in church one Sabbath when Jesus was there. "And they watched him," the Bible says, "that they might accuse him."

The Pharisees didn't go to church that day to get help or to commune with God, or to give and get comfort. They went to criticize; to find fault; to find something, in some body, that could be used to discredit, to belittle, or to expose their own hypocrisies.

The services in the synagogues of Jesus' day left much to be desired. They were formal, dead, unattractive. But the Scriptures were read, the psalms were sung, and it was a specific time set aside for the worship of God—and Jesus was there, "as was his custom."

And in addition to example and influence, there were still good reasons for going to church.

Go to church this Lord's day—won't you?—and experience again the rich cadences of deep speaking unto one and being assured once again that, in spite of all that pharisees or evil men can do, "the Lord God omnipotent reigneth."

WHAT'S IN IT?

**STEWART**  
James VI, King of Scotland, once made the remark that not everyone named Stewart is kin to the king. The king was in a position to know, since his own surname was Stewart.

John Stewart, Lord of Kyle, ascended the throne of Scotland in 1306 as the first of the Stewarts to become king of the country. Later, the royal line changed the spelling of the name to Stuart through some of them having lived in France where the alphabet has no "w." The Stuart spelling was adopted there also by Mary Queen of Scots and it became fashionable when she continued using it on her return to Scotland.

The Scottish royal family of Stewart descended from Walter fitz Alan, the Norman noble, who was appointed by David I of Scotland. The final "d" of Stewart became "t" in Scottish pronunciation to give us the surname Stewart.

The steward was not only the chief of the royal household, but his power extended to the collection and management of the crown revenues, to the administration of justice, and in time of war he took first place in the army next to the king.

Not only the king, but every court-holding earl and bishop had his steward, which accounts for the fact that all Stewarts and Stuarts are not of royal descent. To the Gaels, the Stewarts are known as "The race of kings and tinkers."

Stewarts began emigrating to the New World early and by the time of the first census in 1790 there were 3,600 of them in this country, where the name ranked 36th in frequency. Approximately 1,000 Stewarts served in the Revolutionary War.

Today, Stewart is the 50th commonest surname in the United States with an estimated 273,000 persons by the name. Stuart ranks 742nd and is the family name of an estimated 36,000 persons.
