WHAT'S IN IT?

MCDONALD

The song "Old McDonald Had a Farm" is an old one, but it is nowhere near as old as the name McDonald, which goes far back into Scotland's history.

The name means "son or descendant of Donald". Donald (dark or brown-haired stranger) being one of the very oldest of Gaelic personal names. The prefix "Mac," used in both Scotland and Ireland, means "son or descendant of."

The McDonalds are one of the oldest and most important of Scottish clans. The chiefs of the clan in the direct line are descended from Donald, eldest son of Reginald and grandson of Somerled, who emerges as the first clear-cut ancestor of the McDonalds. Somerled, in 1135, helped David I expel the Norse from parts of Scotland, and eventually fell at Renfrew in 1164 when himself invading against Malcolm IV.

In the Scotland of today, McDonald is the third commonest surname, outnumbered only by Smith and Brown. It is the 95th commonest surname in Ireland, where it is sometimes used as a synonym of the Irish MsDonnell.

In the United States, McDonald is the 97th commonest family name, numbering an estimated 174,000 persons. It is the most common of all the "Mac" names.

Flora Macdonald was the Scottish Jacobite heroine who saved the life of Prince Charles Edward, claimant of the Scottish crown, after the defeat at Culloden Moor in 1746.

There are towns named McDonald in three states and a McDonald County in Missouri. The McDonald Observatory, near Fort Davis, Tex., at 6,791 feet above sea level, is at the highest point reached by a Texas highway.

Timely Tips from CHDA

A well-chosen lamp can combat glare, extreme contrast, shadows and inadequate lighting. Glare can be eliminated by having a shade with white lining that covers the light bulb from any viewing angle. A good shade should also throw some light upward as well as down over the study area.

Placing the light source about 15 inches above the desktop can soften shadows. Put the lamp on the left side for a right-handed person and the other way around for left handers.

The Better Light Better Sight Bureau says increased wattage merely multiplies the problems of glare, shadows and contrast, so the most efficient lamp is not necessarily one with high wattage.

A reflecting cone or a prismatic bowl inside the lamp shade helps to gather light wasted around the base of the lamp and redirect it to the work surface. All Better Light Better Sight Bureau lamps will carry a certification tag which means the lamp has passed rigid tests and then been rechecked locally.

Suggestions for better lighting on the study desk include:

1. Have a flat work surface about 24 inches deep and 36 inches wide.
2. Put the desk against a light wall — never face a window.
3. Use a straight-back armless chair.

4. Choose a light-hue, non-glossy desk top — it reduces glare and contrast. A large ink blotter can do this if the desk top is dark.

Be sure to leave on the room light. This balances the lighting in the room and reduces contrasts.

Conner said the "cotton is a little late but fruiting like crazy now." He added that any blooms up to Sept. 15 will need an average or warmer and later fall to mature.

The county agent said Garza this year will have "one of the shortest milo crops we've had." He said this was due to both the drought and the government "turning the farmers loose on cotton."
