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City dads 'back off' on teenage curfew request

Irate mother wants action

City dads backed off Monday night from the request of an irate mother that a "curfew" be imposed on Post young people because of a "window peeping" incident.

Two boys got away from the window without being identified. Councilmen took the position that there are "enough laws now in the books and adding another might hurt more than help."

The city dads have had the curfew brought up before, but don't believe it would work or is needed in a town the size of Post.

The council at its July meeting discussed a number of things, but took action only on the following: Voted \$600 again for volunteer firemen to attend the state firemen's school.

Decided to enforce the present ordinance of requiring 30 gallon garbage cans or smaller on business trash routes because heavy 50-gallon drums already have caused a rupture in lifting to one sanitation employee.

Authorized a two-inch water line to replace a one-inch and a sewer line to run down Henry Street from East 11th to May Street to serve seven houses and two businesses.

Condemned a house on Lot 26, Block 78, owned by John C. Boren, for tearing down, and the cleaning of debris from a vacant lot at 515 South Ave. G owned by Manuel Arroya.

Approved the hauling off of six abandoned cars.

Authorized City Superintendent Pete Maddox and City Secretary Wanda Wilkerson to select the best bid on a new city billing machine after a NCA machine is viewed in action at Brownfield. The NCA machine was bid at \$230 less than the \$460 bid for a new Burroughs machine.

Eight inches of rain in 7 days

How about eight inches of rain in just seven days? That was what was reported at Ronnie Graves' farm, four and a half miles northeast of Post.

The farm received a four-inch soaker Sunday atop four inches of which had fallen in a steady succession of showers all the previous week.

Farmers west of Post reported four inches of rain too Sunday, but the official measurement in Post was only .88 of an inch.

Added to .36 of an inch early Friday morning here, the town got 1.25 of added moisture for the week to bring the 1972 moisture total to date to 10.61 inches.

Temperature tops this week got stuck on 90 degrees, four different days.

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Gilbreath said the front of the truck was heavily damaged but that the driver, Jerry Dan Crowley of Sweetwater was uninjured. The truck-trailer did not overturn.

County Judge Giles W. Dalby will be in Austin Friday hoping to see the state criminal justice council approve the \$88,000 "law enforcement complex" building project for Garza County.

If the grant is approved, federal funds will provide half of the cost and the county will vote on a bond issue to provide the other \$44,000.

Dalby will meet at 9 a.m. Friday with the three-man recommendations committee of the council on the Garza project. That afternoon the council will meet to take final action on the recommendations.

Mustangs district grid pick again

The 1972 edition of Texas Football in its pre-season look at District 5-AA football says it was headline news in 1971 when Danvers City failed to win the district title, and it should be worth an "extra" this year if the Ponies aren't back in the throne room again, come November.

With five offensive and four defensive starters returning from a 7-3 Mustang team, Denver City is rated with all-star potential in center Lyndal Trout (6-2, 190) and fullback Steve Sparger (180). Others of championship caliber include runner Reggie Clifton, tackle Thomas Connolly, linebacker Brian Lambeth, Tackle Gary Free man, and Rodney Young and halfback Bruce Shores.

Post, with 16 returning lettermen, including six offensive and defensive starters, "is poised to do something" about improving their 1971 1-9 record, quotes the magazine.

"Quarterback Jerry Tyler and a Tailback Kenneth Price should agitate the scoreboard frequently, and linesmen Roger Pace, Jay Pollard and Tol Thomas are good trench leaders," the Texas Football magazine points out. "Fullback Robert Mindietta, Halfback David Conoly, ends Johnny Minor and Ricky Shepherd, and halfback Randy Kennedy are other quality-checked

people." Tahoka, tied for fifth a year ago, but with a winning 6-4 record, has a bumper crop of 20 lettermen, including six offensive and seven defensive starters.

Defending district champion Lubbock Roosevelt, the 1971 surprise, returns only quarterback Ricky Hightower on offense and but two defensive starters, but has a promising younger crew.

Frenship with 15 lettermen returning from a 5-5 team has passing ace Mike Wright, and a fine offensive line back as its standouts. Lubbock Cooper, moving up from Class A this season as a district newcomer, has seven regulars back from both offensive and defensive units from a 6-4 club.

Slaton, with a new coach, has but three offensive and one defensive starter back from a 5-5 log in 1971 but "good quickness and two fine individual talents in passing quarterback, Ron Bartley, and fullback Kenney Schuette (6-1, 205) should help."

Texas Football figures powerhouse Childress to repeat in District 2-AA and Littlefield to do it again in District 3-AA. Tulla, who is dropping down from AAA ball, and Floydada appeared prime to fight it out for playoff honors in District 4-AA, the district into which both Idalou and Ralls have been moved this year.

Garza group attending 4-H electric camp

Eight Garza County 4-H boys and girls and two 4-H leaders are among the 120 boys and girls plus leaders from 14 South Plains counties who are attending a fun-filled week of recreation and leadership training in electricity this week at Scott Able 4-H Camp, near Cloudercroft, N. M.

The group, which left Post on Monday for Cloudercroft, includes Sandra Bostick, Kelly Chaffin, Christie Conner, Maria Shelton, Mark Bevers, Ronald Case, John Chaffin, Curt Wheeler, Mrs. Ann Chaffin and J. W. Basinger.

The camp is sponsored annually by Southwestern Public Service Co., according to Billy C. Gunter and Mrs. Catherine B. Crawford, district agents with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service which conducts the 4-H Club program.

Company representatives will give instruction on lighting, house plan wiring, space age cooling and an electrical craft activity. Instructional material presented at these group sessions will be aimed toward developing method demonstrations on electricity and its use.

Organized recreation is scheduled throughout the week and a vesper service will conclude each day's activities.

This year the planning committee for the electric camp includes the 4-H Councils from Cochran, Hockley, Lamb and Bailey counties.

Cochran County Extension agents Roy McClung and Gail O'Neal are serving as agent advisors for the annual camp.

In addition to the district agents and agent advisors, others accompanying the group will include county Extension agents and adult 4-H Club leaders from each of the participating counties, which are Bailey, Crosby, Floyd, Hockley, Lubbock, Cochran, Garza, Gaines, Howard, Briscoe, Dawson, Hale, Lamb and Lynn.

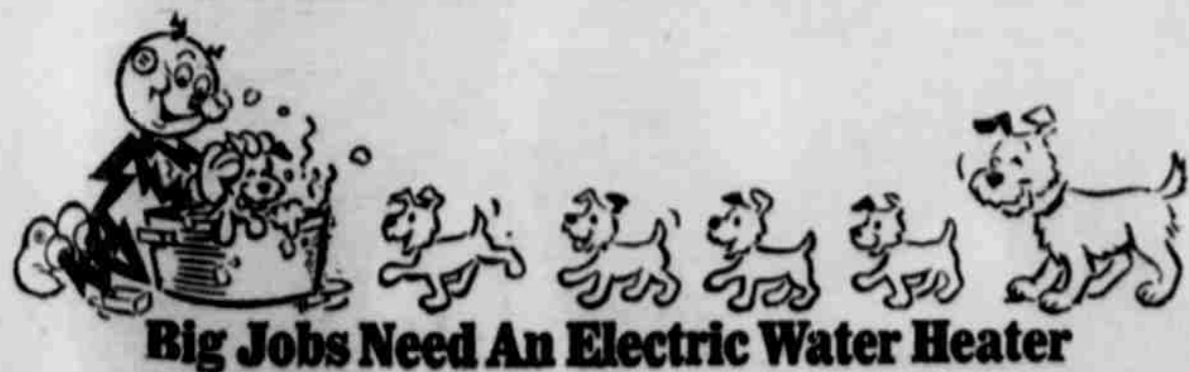
