





#### Voter registration never closes

There is some confusion in Garza County and throughout Texas relating to vater registration deadlines under the new registration system imposed by S. B. 51. And that isn't good.

It is a hard enough job to get a good voter registration turnout when there is no confusion and when the procedure is as clear as a whistle to everyone. So, throw in a little confusion, and it's harder than ever to get a respectable percentage of the potential voters

Despite some newspaper articles and radio bulletins to the confrary, vater registration did NOT end on Jan. 31

Those persons who had registered by Jan. 31 will appear on the initial list of registered voters. Those persons registering after Jan. 31 will appear on supplemental lists, which will be prepared 20 days prior to an

Every person who submits an application to the tax assessor-collector or a duly appointed deputy at least 30 days prior to an election will appear on either the original or supplemental lists which will be sent to the

Every person who registers as of March 1, 1972, and who is otherwise qualified, will be eligible to vote in the April elections for the city council and the school board—and in all subsequent elections this year, including the May and June primaries and the General Election in November,

With the redistricting and filing fee hassles, there is enough confusion in Texas without adding voter registration to the turmoil. So. The Dispatch hopes the above information helps clear up any confusion there might be over registering to vote in this year's elec-

Joe's opposition is going to be more geographical than physical. Vernon Adcock, the present district attorney by appointment, who has not yet announced for the office but is expected to make the race, is from Lamesa.

Lats of lawyers who live in other district towns have tried to beat this "geographical opponent' and failed.

He is going to have to make a well organized, vigorous campaign if he is to have a chance at "beating Lamesa."

What's more he can certainly use all the local support he can get. It's going to take a lot of time and a certain amount of money to put himself before the voters in a four county area.

It may take us a little longer but we'll still get the job done.







## Growing Older . . . But Never "Getting" Old

By Bernard S. Ramsey

(Pastoral Prayer, Morning Worship at First Christian Church, Jan. 16, 1972)

Dear Father in Heaven:

You know better than I know myself that I am growing older and will some day be old; a "some day" that persists in running head-long toward me daily. Keep me from getting talkalive; particularly from the presumptive habit of thinking I must say something on every subject and every occasion.

Release me, Father, from craving to try to straighten out everybody's affairs; oftimes rushing in where the most skilled psychiatrist would fear to tread. And I ask for Grace, Father, grace enough to listen to the tales of others' pains: save me from offusive sympathy-give me instead as much empathy as I can gracefully express.

But seal my lips on my own aches and pains and you know my love of rehearsing them audibly is becoming sweeter as the years go by

Teach me the glorious lesson that occasionally it is possible that I may be mistaken; that no matter how right I may think I am, I can still be totally wrong. Father, grant me the bigness of nature in all things that stands out so superbly in the personality of Jesus.

Irrespective of my physical infirmities, help me to despise "littleness" of effort-even satisfaction in mediocrity of achievement. Plant deep within me a divine discontent with things as they are and deliver me from hindering human progress by always opposing change. Grant me the wisdom, Father, and retrospective insight to perceive that the "good old days" are not necessarily "good" at all.




