## 18 individuals purchase sheriff's sale property

The second big sheriff's sale Tuesday to dispose of tax delinquent properties so they could be returned to the taxpaying rolls was a whole lot more successful than the first one last November. Of the 33 properties offered for sale, individual buyers purchased 18 of them for a total of \$1,927.50.

West 12th Street, brought a high bid of \$600 from Howard Freeman for the biggest single purchase of the sale. Luther Harper, who has been keeping a vacant lot clean for years next to his own property, paid the lowest price—only \$5—for lot 3, Block 63, on North Avenue I.

## Rites conducted in Post Tuesday for C. R. Thaxton

Funeral services for C. R. "Si" Thaxton, 64, Post businessman and former city councilman, who died about midnight Sunday in Lubbock's West Texas Hospital, were held at 2 p.m. Tuesday at the First Baptist Church.

Thaxton, a resident of Post since 1914, had been a patient in the hospital for about 10 days. He had owned and operated Thaxton's Cleaners at 128 East Main for more than 20 years.

He was born Aug. 11, 1907, in Hillsboro, Tex., and moved to Post with his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. William Orin Thaxton, in 1914. He was a graduate of Post High School, where he played quarterback on the school's football teams in the late 1920's.

Thaxton was employed by Jim Hundley in the latter's tailor shop at two different times for a total of about 20 years. After World War II, he purchased a cleaning and pressing shop in Slaton and after operating there for a short time he moved the shop to its present location here.

He served as a city councilman for six years and was a past worshipful master of the Post Masonic Lodge. Thaxton had been a member of the First Baptist for 42 years.

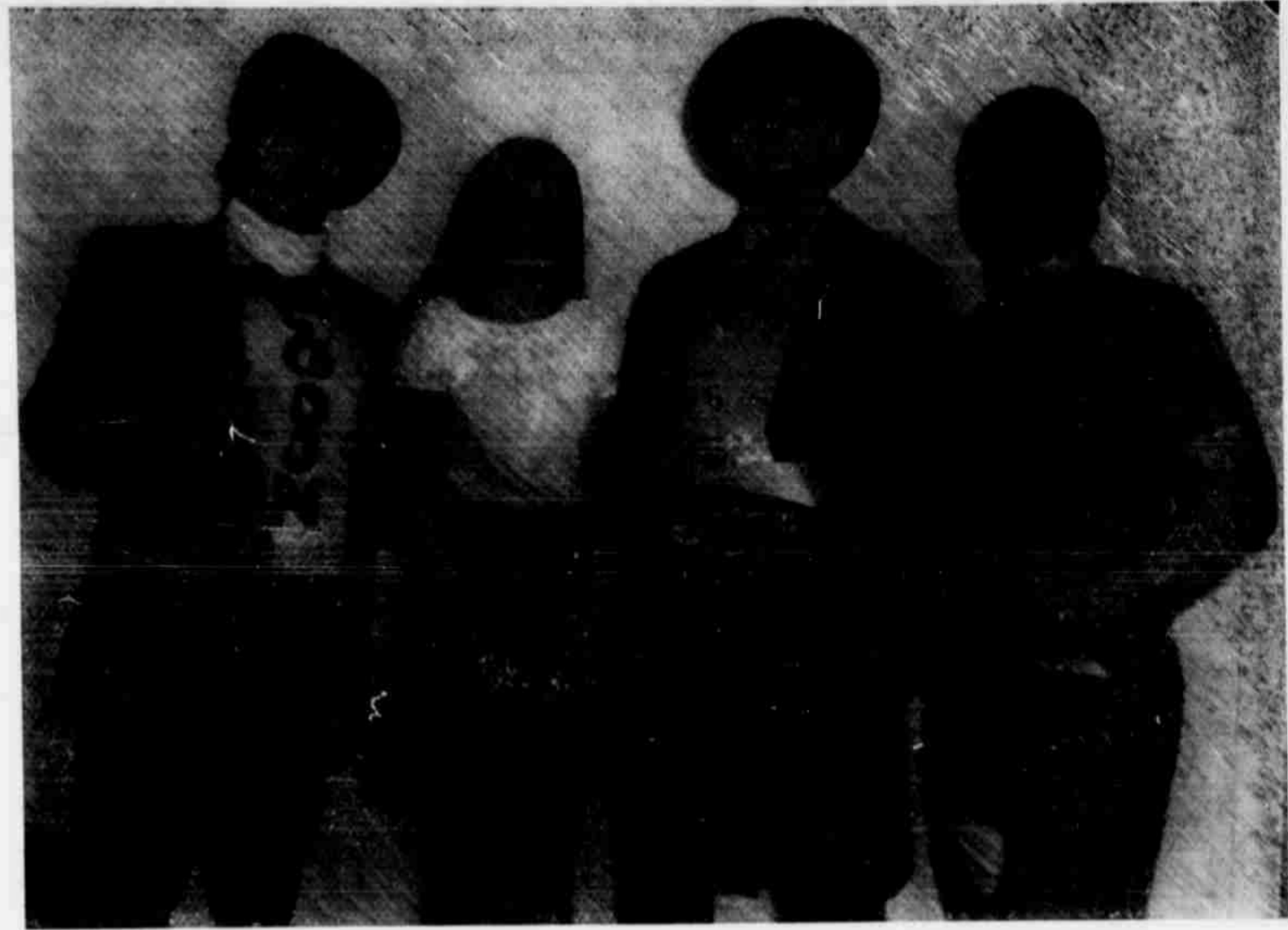

## Marijuana charges filed against trio

Three men arrested by highway patrolmen early Sunday morning after their car was stopped 10 miles northwest of Post on U. S. Hwy. 84 have been charged on two counts each — possession of marijuana and possession of narcotics paraphernalia.

One of the three, Dennis Michael Reifeis, 21, of Denver, Colo., was released from the county jail Wednesday after posting bond of \$3,000 on each of the two charges.

The other two, John Thomas Jackson, 23, of Beaumont, and Samuel T. Sheffield, 23, also of Beaumont, were still being held in jail yesterday afternoon in lieu of \$5,000 bonds on each of the two charges.

The trio was arrested after their car was stopped by Highway Patrolmen Gene Posey and Ken Gilbreath for a traffic violation. Narcotic paraphernalia was found in a search of the front seat of the car, and the men were brought to Post by the arresting officers.

Sheriff J. A. (Jimmy) Holleman obtained a search warrant and searched the car after it was brought to town. The sheriff said he found a paper sack containing 14 ounces of marijuana in a tubeless spare tire after the air was let out of the tire at a local service station.

The men were taken before Justice of the Peace Racy Robinson where they waived preliminary hearing and their bonds were set.

Coach Davis said he and Coach Don Black and an Idalou coach stopped the scuffle "before it amounted to anything," and that city police were called to break up the gathering in front of the gym. The police also escorted the Idalou team buses out of town, Coach Davis said.

Searchers agreed that Game Warden Bud Howell and Gary Joiner, local CAP president, did a good job in hiding the hunters.

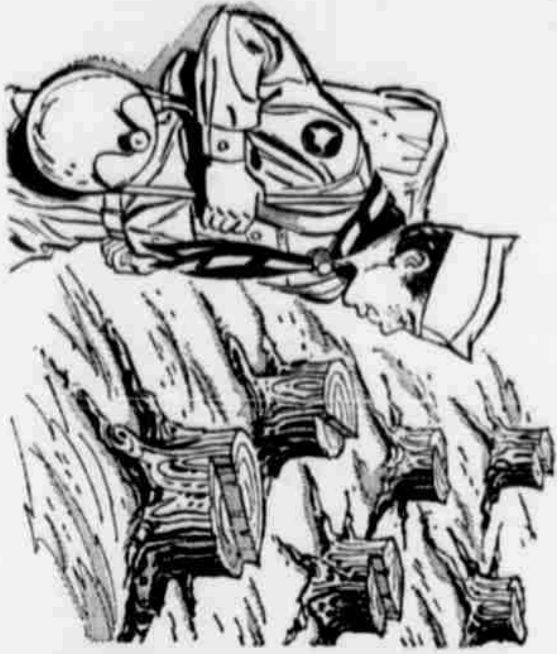

## Post to D. C., then Slaton here Tuesday

The Post Does ended their season here Friday night against Idalou, but the Antelopes, still in the thick of the battle for the second half District 4AA championship, have three more games to play.

The 'Lopes travel to Denver City Friday night, entertain the Slaton Tigers here Tuesday night and then close out their regular season at Frenship on Friday night, Feb. 11.

Following Tuesday night's games Post is tied with first half champion Ralls, Slaton and Idalou for the second half district lead, all with 3-1 marks.

Since Denver City is ineligible for a shot at the district championship because of a UIL infraction last season, all their district games are forfeited, according to a district ruling. So, regardless of the final score Friday night, Post will

go against Slaton here Tuesday night with a 4-1 mark.

Coach John Alexander's Antelopes no doubt will be going all out to even things up with Denver City Friday night after losing to the Mustangs by one point, 57-56, in their first meeting.

Tuesday night's Slaton game will be the big one. The Tigers whammed the 'Lopes by a comfortable margin at Slaton, but Post will be gunning for a revenge win here Tuesday.

Tuesday night, Slaton ran away from Roosevelt, 90-60. In other district games, Ralls topped Denver City, 92-85, and Frenship outscored Tahoka, 54-51.

Post's junior high teams will end their seasons Monday night, Feb. 7. The 7th, 8th and 9th grade boys play Roosevelt here, and the 7th, 8th and 9th grade girls play at Roosevelt.

## Idalou rally proves too much for Post

The Post Antelopes basketball team came apart at the seams in the final three and a half minutes here Tuesday night, blowing a seven-point lead and losing to the Idalou Wildcats, 67 to 61.

Trailing 61-54 with 3:31 showing on the scoreboard clock, the Wildcats made their move behind the hot shooting of Bryan Kendrick and scored the final 13 points of the game. About all the Antelopes had to show for those final three and a half minutes was a flock of turnovers.

It was almost unbelievable.

After nearly being blown off the court in the first two minutes of play when Idalou scored 12 points to their zero, the 'Lopes had made a valiant comeback to take an 18-16 lead in the second quarter. They were ahead by eight, 37-29, at the halftime buzzer, and from then on never trailed until the Wildcats staged their devastating comeback deep in the final period.

Idalou's win over the 'Lopes threw the second half of the District 4AA race into a four-way tie for the top rung, with Post, Idalou, Ralls and Slaton all deadlocked at 3-1.

Bryan Kendrick was the whole show for the Wildcats as far as scoring was concerned, hitting a total of 38 points. Reggie Moore led the Antelopes with 20.

In the girls' game, Idalou led 17-12 at the end of the first quarter, 34-20 at the half, and 54-29 at the end of the third quarter.

Jackie Moore scored 13 points for Post, with Cindy Bird hitting 11. Melanie King, six; Jenda Gilmore, six; Jodi Norman, three, and

Becky Dalby, two.

The "B" team boys' game was nip and tuck all the way, with Idalou leading 6-4 at the end of the first quarter, 20-14 at the halftime intermission, and 28-23 at the end of the third period.

Rusty Conner scored 11 points to lead the Post team, while Smith's 10 was tops for Idalou.

## Post snaps Jackrabbit victory string at 14

The Post Antelopes vaulted into the second half lead in District 4AA here last Friday night by upsetting the Ralls Jackrabbits, 64 to 57.

The Post win snapped a 14-game Ralls winning streak and dropped the Jackrabbits to 2-1 in the second half standings behind Post's 3-0.

The Ralls cagers were undefeated in winning the first half championship.

The Post Does downed the Ralls girls, 54 to 44, and the Doe "B" team won, 48 to 30, to give the Post poundballers a clean sweep in the three games.

The Jackrabbits led the 'Lopes by four points, 16-12, at the end of the first quarter, and were ahead by six, 32-26, at the halftime intermission. With Danny Lee coming off the bench to provide the spark, the 'Lopes put eight points on the boards in the third quarter before Ralls could score and went into the lead, 34-32.

The eight points that shot Coach John Alexander's team into the lead came on two quick field goals by Lee and one each by Randall Hays and Steve Hays.

With 6:22 to go in the final period, Post had built its lead up to 50-43, but the Jackrabbits pulled up to within three points, 54-51, with 4:10 remaining on the clock.

Ralls' top scorer, James Langston, fouled out with 3:25 remaining and the Jackrabbits trailing by two points, 57-55. With 30 seconds to go, Post led 60-57, and Lee hit two free throws to make it 62-47. The Antelopes' Reggie Moore was fouled in grabbing the rebound on a missed shot by the 'Rabbits, and hit both ends of a one-and-one to make the final score 64-57.

Moore, who has been coming on strong for Post since becoming

eligible at the start of the second semester, got in foul trouble early and sat out most of the game.

The victory was a team effort for the 'Lopes, with Steve Hays, Johnny Jefferson and Lee scoring in double figures, and David Woods, Randall Hays, Roger Pace, Ricky Shepherd and Moore contributing defensively. Steve Hays scored 19 points, Jefferson, 16, and Lee, 15. James Langston led the Ralls scoring, racking up 29 points before fouling out.

In the girls' game, the Does built up a 17-9 first quarter lead and were in complete charge the rest of the way.

Coach Jiggs King played freshmen Jenda Gilmore and Melanie King at two of the forward positions most of the second quarter and all of the third. King scored 10 points and Gilmore, seven. Cindy Bird was Post's top scorer with 17 points, Jackie Moore hitting 12 and Becky Dalby, eight.

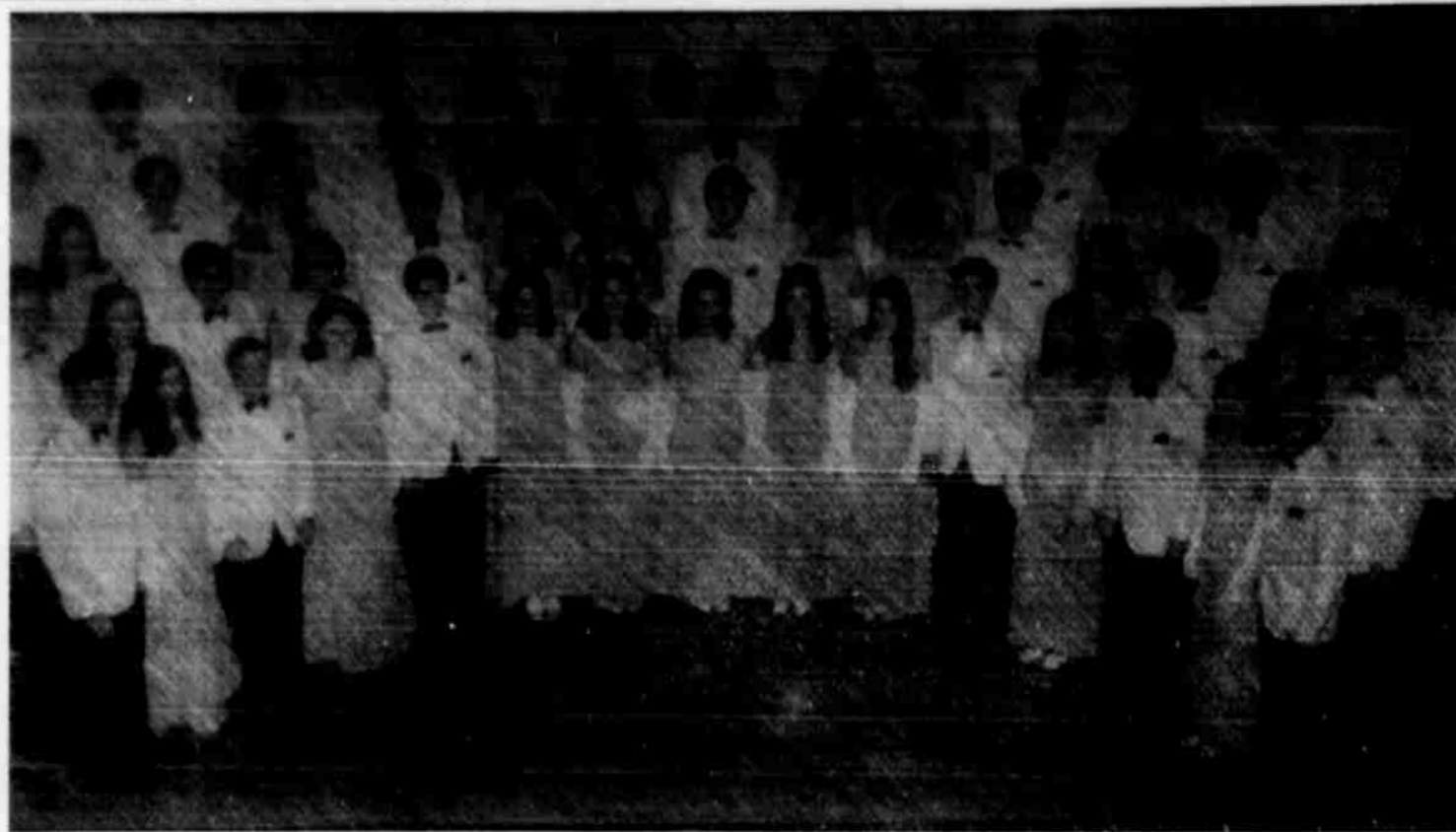
