

Burlington plans waste unit for city operation

Facility and land to cost \$100,000

Burlington Industries will let contracts soon for a waste treatment facility southeast of Post which, when completed, will be turned over to the City of Post to operate for the entire community.

Cost of the new treatment facility, including necessary land purchase, will be approximately \$100,000.

This was revealed here Tuesday afternoon in remarks prepared for delivery by Charles F. Myers Jr., Burlington's chairman and chief executive officer, at a luncheon for Post community leaders in the bank's community room.

The complex text of Myers' prepared remarks were given. The Dispatch by Dick Byrd of Greensboro, N.C., Burlington's community relations manager who was one of the Burlington executives who accompanied Myers here for his visit of the Postex Plant.

The full text on the water treatment facility is as follows:

"Like everyone else, we're also involved with ecology and the environment these days," quoted Myers.

"A waste treatment facility for use by the manufacturing plant in treating municipal waste for the town of Post has been approved by the Texas Water Quality Board.

"We will let construction contracts soon; and the project should be completed in six to eight months.

"I might add that these projects move tediously slow. Our engineers have worked closely with the city and state to bring about this mutually beneficial project, which will cost some \$100,000, including land.

"When completed, the plant will

be turned over to the town to operate for the entire community."

Myers said company-wide research, design, construction and operation of pollution control facilities reached \$3,500,000 in 1971 — "and we anticipate an outlay of some \$4,000,000 in 1972."

"Our environmental concern is not limited to the outside of our plants but includes the plant interior itself. Reduction of noise levels and dust, and measures to improve occupational safety and contribute to employee comfort and well-being are among current programs."

Myers sees brighter future for industry

Charles F. Myers Jr., chairman of Burlington Industries, had a lot of nice things to say about Postex Plant and expressed optimism over the U. S. business outlook "in the next 12 to 15 months" here Tuesday at a special luncheon for Post community leaders in the bank's community room.

Myers' visit, postponed from earlier this year by bad weather, could be called some kind of a 60th anniversary celebration for the Postex Plant, which began its operations here in 1912 and which still has, as Myers said, "the distinction of being the only manufacturing plant west of the Mississippi that processes raw cotton into the finished product."

Myers and his party of Burlington officials flew into Lubbock in a Burlington jet from Greensboro, N.C., from where they departed after breakfast Tuesday.

They were brought to Post by Vic Slater, general manager of the Postex Plant, inspected the plant here and then met with plant supervisors prior to the luncheon, which also was attended by a number of Postex's key personnel.

They flew out of Lubbock in mid-afternoon and Myers was scheduled for a dinner Tuesday night in New York City.

Myers told the near-60 persons who completely filled the community room for the luncheon that Burlington, "in the 17 years it has been a part of your industrial community", has spent well over \$11 million here in Post for major expansions and modernizations, and that another million dollars has gone into major repair and expense-type improvements.

He said the Postex Plant, and

its satellite operation, the Hall Plant in Memphis, Tex., a sewing operation only, "are in better shape than ever, under good management, with excellent employees and are making a very salable, fine quality product."

He said the Postex operations employ some 500 local people and contribute approximately \$3,000,000

in payrolls annually to the Post and Memphis communities.

"I hope our role in Garza County will continue to grow and that you will see fit to continue your support," Myers told community leaders. He said the community's advice and suggestions on "how we can do a better job in the plant

Barricade set up after truck wreck

An overturned cyanide truck at the intersection of U. S. Hwy. 84 and the Fuvanna road resulted in a barricade of the roadway.

The time the truck overturned Thursday night until about 9 p.m. Friday.

The unit pulled by the truck was partially loaded with cyanide, which is about 60 percent nitroglycerin, and the load included blasting caps, flags, and other items. The truck was removed Monday morning after the owner had come from Midland, re-

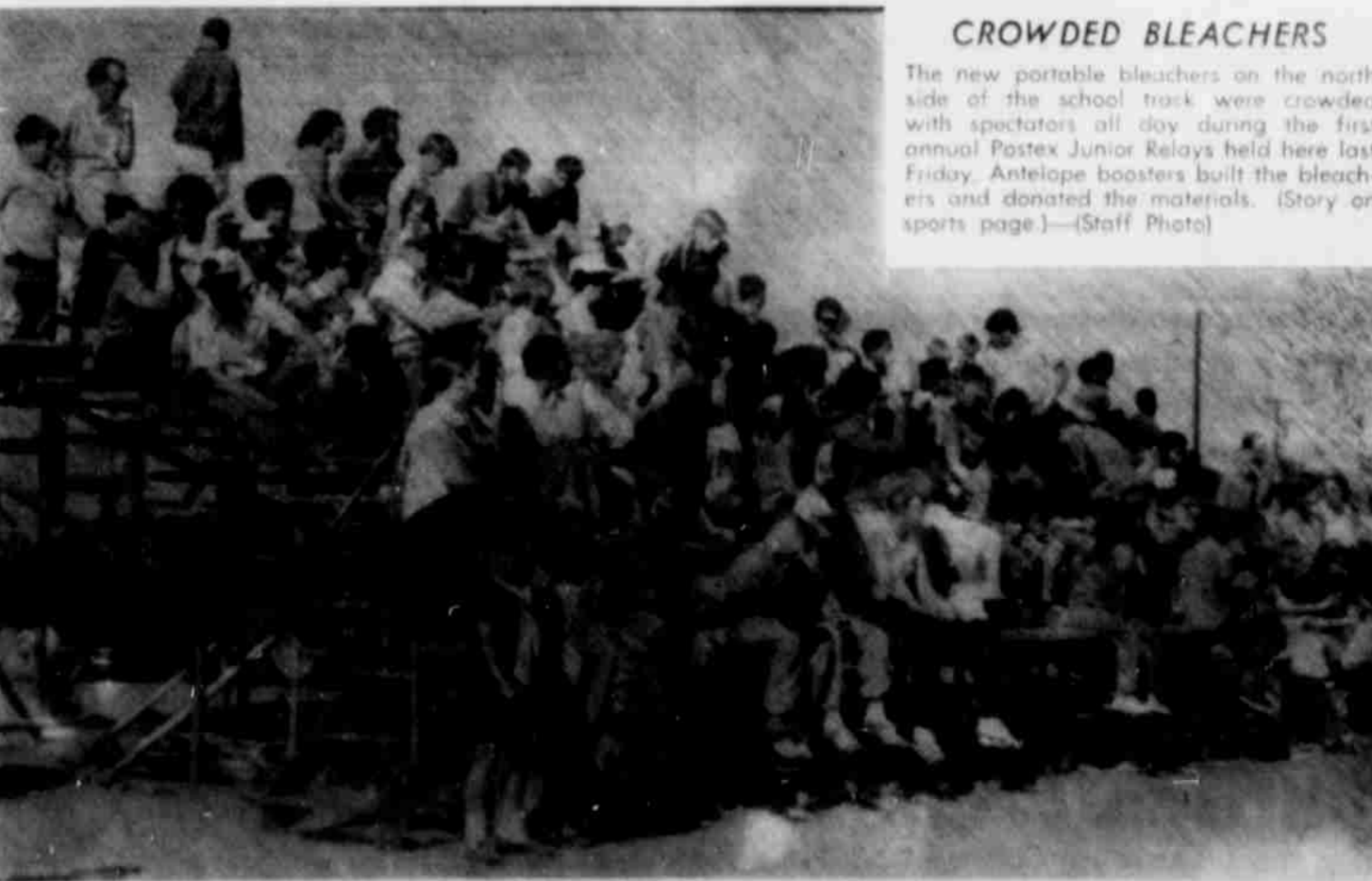

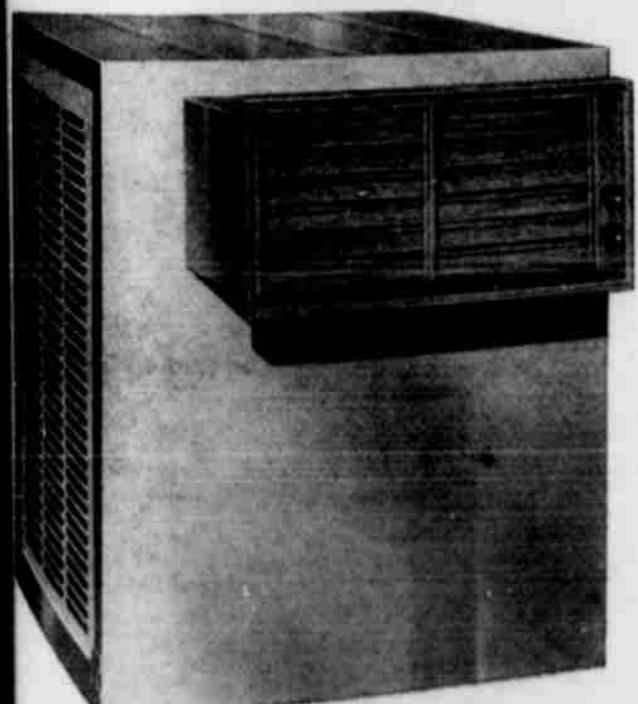

Myers pointed out that Burlington did a \$1,780,000,000 business volume last year and has grown quickly with changing public apparel tastes into the country's largest knit apparel fabrics producer.

"I've been seeing a little sounder basis for our economy from week to week," Myers said in departing from his prepared remarks to comment about U. S. business conditions. He said he could see a good, strong business outlook for the United States in the 12 to 15 months ahead.

John R. Williams, manufacturing executive vice president of the nine plant Burlington Domestic Division of which Postex is a part, outlined the total operations of the division and showed slides of the division's various plants in Texas, North and South Carolina and Virginia. He also displayed various products made by the division, including a new line of towels and other bath accessories manufactured at one of the division's Virginia plants.

Williams also saw better economic conditions ahead. "The Domestic Division has come out of two extremely bad years economically," Williams commented.

Williams said Postex is Burlington's only plant still manufacturing all white sheeting but hinted that color would be coming to Post in the future.

Other corporate and division executives of Burlington who flew out for the visit with Myers included Harvey Robbins, president and head of the Burlington Domestic merchandising operations at Burlington House in New York City, Claude Long, division vice president for planning, L. C. Davis, division personnel manager, Bob Hurd of New York City, division merchandising vice president; and Dick Byrd, community relations manager.

Myers, who last visited Post 11 or 12 years ago and commented Tuesday upon improvements in both town and plant in that period, has served as Burlington's chief executive officer for the past 10 years. He joined the company in 1947 and was elected president and chief executive in 1962 following the death of Burlington's founder, J. Spencer Love.

Mayor Giles C. McCrary concluded the catered luncheon by telling Myers and visiting Burlington officials how much Post appreciated Postex Plant and Postex people who work in all types of community endeavors.

Post teams win all 3 divisions in relays

Post won all three divisions of the first annual Postex Junior Relays held Friday at the school track before a large crowd in perfect track weather.

The smoothly-operated meet saw the Post 9th grade win its division with 180 points, the 8th grade with 129 points and the 7th grade with 123 points.
