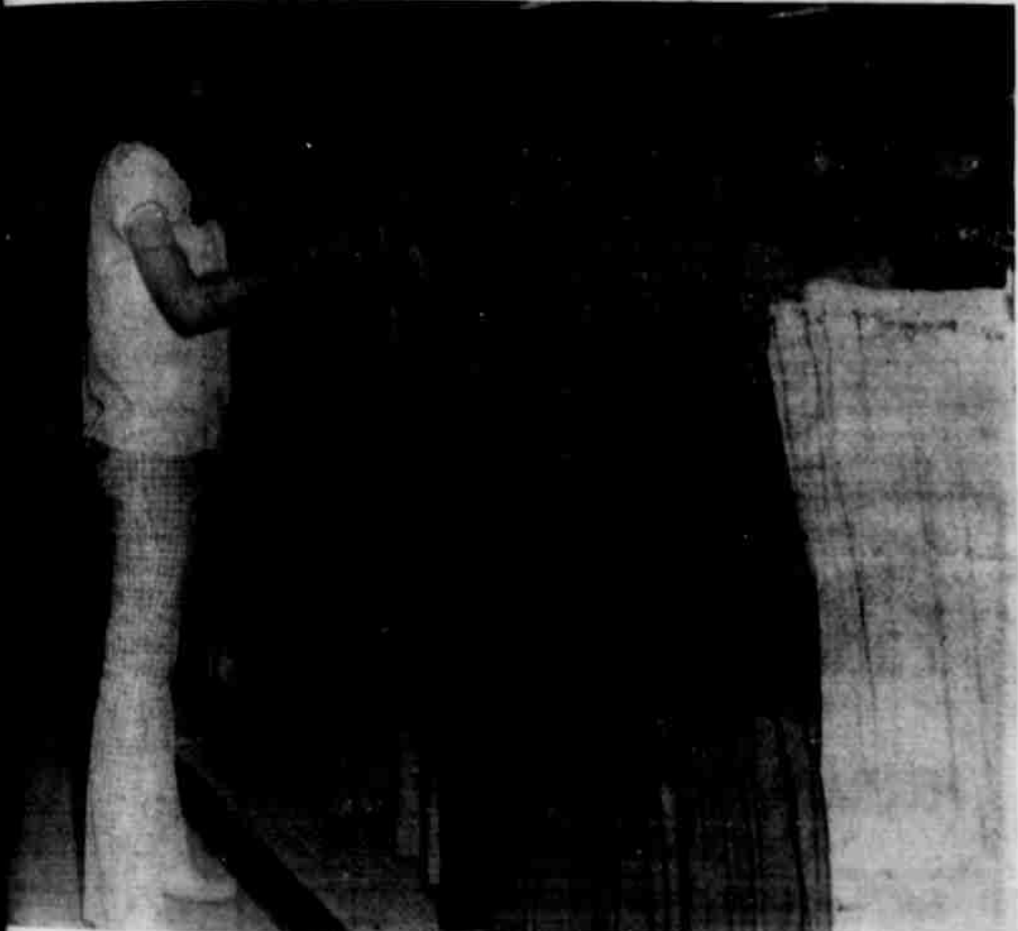

## Wacker's 'twice as big' store open for business

Wacker's "twice as big" new store opened at 9 a.m. today with a rush of shoppers piling in as soon as the doors were unlocked hopeful for one of the 25 door prizes to be given away after the first 45 minutes.

The store is built on the site of the one razed by the worst downtown fire in Post's history last fall, and on the site of another building destroyed next door by the same fire.

M. J. Ewert of Pauls Valley, Okla., president of Wacker's 80-store chain spread over Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico and Louisiana, and other company officials

were scheduled to be here today for the Grand Opening.

Other Wacker officials here include Earl Foster of Pauls Valley, personnel director, and Homer Gough of Altus, Okla., district supervisor.

"Wacker's is very pleased to be back in operation in Post with a new and much larger store than we've ever had in our more than 20 years in Post," Foster told The Dispatch yesterday.

"We'd like to thank our customers too for their patronage in too for their patronage in our small store," he added.

A large crew of Wacker employees brought in from other stores along with regular store personnel here completed the intensive stocking operations Monday.

Foster pointed out the store has added new departments in shoes, men's clothing, electronics (radios and stereos), cameras and records, but has concentrated mainly in greatly expanding the many departments it already has, including fabrics, and cosmetics and drugs.

The store has 10,000 square feet of floor space and has a paved parking area in the rear of the store for unloading of merchandise.

### Slaton radio man is new operator of station KPOS

Jim Boles, now acting manager of Slaton Radio Station KCAS, took over the operation of Post's radio station, KPOS, here Monday and plans to devote his full time to its management beginning June 1.

Boles told The Dispatch he has signed a purchase agreement to buy the station from Lantz G. Powell of Ponca City, Okla., its present owner, and is now awaiting approval of the sale by the FCC.

The station has been operated here since last October by the late Gary Joyner and his wife, Dorothy. Gary Joyner was in the process of purchasing the station when he was killed in a light plane crash at the Post airport Feb. 26. Mrs. Joyner has operated the station since that time.

Jim Boles has brought his brother, Chuck Boles, formerly of Radio Station KTRN in Wichita Falls and KRZY of Farmington, N.M., here to actively run the station until his own present contract with the Slaton station expires on May 31.

Chuck Boles will be sales manager of the station and Jim will be station manager.

"We want KPOS to continue to be an asset to the community of Post," the Boles brothers told The Dispatch.

Jim Boles' wife is Mona and they have two small daughters, Donna, 3, and Kathy, 2. Chuck Boles' wife is Patsy and they have one daughter, Ann Marie, 4.

Both families are members of the Presbyterian Church with the Boles brothers sons of a Presbyterian minister in Wichita Falls. Their uncle is Hoyt Boles, former executive of the Presbyterian synod of Texas, now retired, who gave great support to the Presbyterian Church here through its formative years.

### Top FFA degrees to be presented 3 local students

Three Post Future Farmers of America members — Sonny Bevers, Bobby Norman and John Johnson — will receive the Lone Star Farmer degree at the state FFA convention this summer in Dallas, E. A. Howard, vocational agriculture instructor here, has announced.

The Lone Star Farmer degree is the highest awarded by the Texas Association of Future Farmers. To be eligible for the degree, a member must have made a minimum of \$500 from his supervised farming project over a period of three years, and shown outstanding leadership.

John Johnson is currently president of the Post FFA chapter and was recently elected as Area II vice president for the coming year. He has been on several leadership and judging teams in the past.

Bobby Norman has been on the chapter's meat judging team for two years, and has shown outstanding leadership qualities as an FFA member.

### Council's action effective May 24

Chief of Police Otis G. Shepherd Jr. was relieved of his duties by the city council at a special meeting last night.

The motion dismissing Shepherd, which was unanimously approved by the five city councilmen, read as follows: "That Chief of Police Junior Shepherd be relieved of his duties effective May 24 and paid through June 30 as vacation and severance pay."

In answer to a Dispatch reporter's question, Mayor Giles C. McCrary described the council's action in dismissing Shepherd as "an attempt to create more effective law enforcement cooperation."

Shepherd's dismissal leaves the city police force staffed only by City Patrolman Jerry Jolly and Relief Patrolman Raymond F. Bagby Jr.

The police station was moved to the sheriff's office several weeks ago in what the city council termed a step toward more effective law enforcement.

Following the council's action in relieving Shepherd of his duties, the police chief was called to sit in on the meeting and was informed by the mayor of the council's action.

After Shepherd left the meeting, the council called Patrolman Jolly to sit in on the meeting and advised him of its action. The council recommended to Jolly that he work out a joint schedule with Sheriff J. A. (Jimmy) Holleman for working hours.

Jolly is now on night duty and the council recommended that his present work shift not be changed, at least temporarily, under the schedule he and the sheriff works out. Police Chief Shepherd's work shift was from 9 a. m. until 6 p. m.

Also in answer to a Dispatch reporter's question, Mayor McCrary said the council's plans are to look for a replacement in the police chief's position.

median on the Avenue F approaches to the intersection and by the erection of two new stop signs.

The work, which is being done by the local maintenance crew of the Texas Highway Department under the direction of Supt. Joe Williams, is scheduled to be completed today.

Each of the two medians is 50 feet in length and has a 45-degree slope as an additional safety measure, Williams said. The medians are marked with reflectors for night safety, and there are also "Keep Right" signs at the approaches to the medians.

The new stop signs are on Avenue F at the highway intersection. They extend seven feet above the medians, "plenty high enough to be seen," Williams said.

Williams said the medians were not made any longer than 50 feet so that "cross-overs" can be made to a filling station on South Avenue F and a cotton gin on North Avenue F.

"Calamity Corner" earned its Dispatch nickname because of the numerous traffic accidents that have occurred at the busy intersection in recent years. The Post city council especially has been active in recent years in asking the highway department for a reduction of traffic hazards at the corner.

### Cross H wagon to ranch headqtrrs.

Duncan Muckelroy, research historian for Ranch Headquarters of the Texas Tech Museum, told Post Rotarians at their Tuesday luncheon in City Hall that so much help is being given the development of this unique effort in Texas ranch history that the project probably will be completed by 1976 at a total cost of around \$400,000.

Any place else, the cost of such a development would be between \$1,500,000 and \$2,000,000, Muckelroy said.

He said County Judge Giles W. Dalby this week is giving a wagon from his Cross H Ranch here for the Ranch Headquarters.

Muckelroy said ranch headquarters is acquiring approximately 20 ranch structures and restoring them at ranch headquarters.

The state will pay for the operation of the Ranch Headquarters, once completed, he explained, but its development is completely financed by donations and represents the only such memorial of its size and scope to machine history (See Cross H Ranch, page 8)

## Water big issue in campaign

The future of West Texas could easily be riding on the state runoff Democratic primary June 3. West Texas Democrats in voting for governor and lieutenant-governor have a clear choice between candidates who support the water importation plan for West Texas—and those who don't.

The Dispatch long ago endorsed Dolph Briscoe for governor and we have spoken strong words of support for Wayne Connally for lieutenant governor.

Briscoe is a conservative, a farmer-rancher, and a former public official who served well in the Texas House of Representatives. Most importantly, Briscoe sees the value of importing water to the semi-arid areas of West Texas and he passes up no opportunity to state his beliefs in this regard.

That makes him quite a contrast to his opponent, "Sissy" Farenthold who makes no bones about her opposition to large-scale water importation projects, a view that if allowed to prevail, consigns this—the most produc-

ive part of the state—to oblivion.

At the lieutenant-governor's level, the choice of Wayne Connally over Bill Hobby, Houston publisher, on the issue is not difficult either.

Connally took a leading role in passage of legislation leading to a bond vote that would have provided financing for implementation of the Texas Water Plan. This done, he joined hands with other state leaders on the "Committee of 500" to work for approval of the bonds.

On the other hand, it was Hobby and his newspaper, The Houston Post, which triggered the measure's narrow defeat at the hands of the voters. When he is in West Texas, Hobby says he has seen the light and favors such a plan, but when campaigning in East Texas, he still brands the import of water to West Texas as folly.

Connally does not speak with a forked tongue. Throughout the state he supports water for West Texas—JC

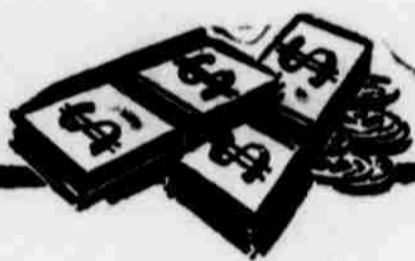

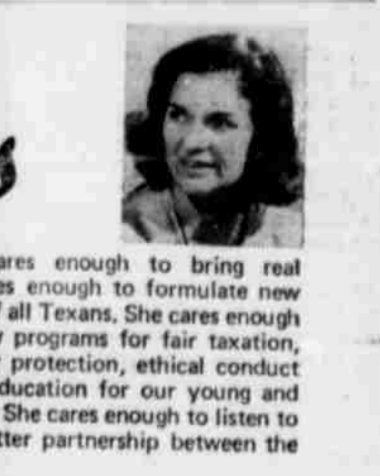

VI. Thou shalt not believe a stranger whom you do not know instead of Christian leaders whom you do know.

VII. Thou shalt not expect all Christians to agree on theology or politics or the church's action in society. Thou shalt expect all Christians to love in spite of disagreement.

VIII. Thou shalt not reject as un-Christian those whose viewpoint you reject. Remember, they are as sincere in their convictions as you are.

IX. Thou shalt put Christ first, ahead of your family, your nation, your political party, or your prejudices.

X. Thou shalt remember the Scriptures: "If this . . . be of men, it will come to naught; but if it be of God, you cannot overthrow it."

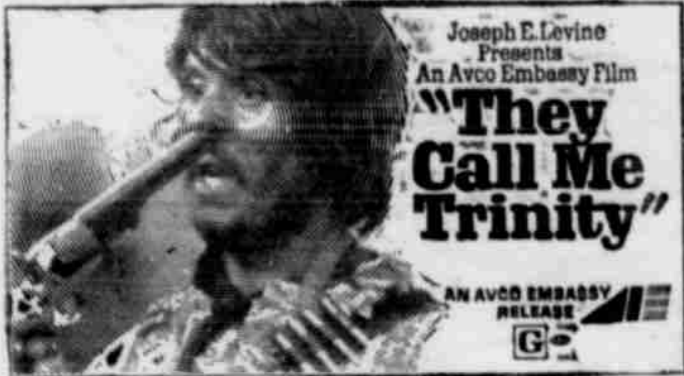

# Farmers need a friend in Austin



MRS. FARENTHOLD AND AGRICULTURE

I am deeply disturbed by the declining economic position of Texas's family farmers and ranchers. Our nation lost 123 farms per day last year. This includes many Texas farms.

When a man and his family cannot live on his land and make a decent living, something is wrong with our society. Due to big government and big business that controls our state government, the farmer and rancher has suffered along with other Texans, who foot the tax bill for big government.

To correct this situation I propose —

To institute a study of agri-business conglomerates to see how much control these urban corporations have over Texas agriculture. If the study shows a need for controls over these agri-business conglomerates, then such controls should be considered.

Institute a program of rural economic development to stop the drain of rural population to our over-crowded and polluted cities.

Stop raising the sales tax, never consider extending the tax to food and services, maintain agricultural exemptions, and if new revenues are needed, pass a corporate profits tax to balance taxes between big business and consumers.

Create a public utilities commission to make sure utility rates are fair. Texas is one of the few states without a commission. I favor territorial integrity for rural electric cooperatives to preserve their tradition of sound service.

Develop programs returning political power to local communities and areas instead of running everything from agencies in Austin.

Have a land use management program for Texas as recommended by the state farm and ranch organizations and other friends of agriculture.

Promote research to help rural areas.

Make sure that there is ample health services in rural areas.

Provide for better rural schools through a fairer tax system.

Continue to fight against over control of rural business as I did when I voted against the trailer brake bill.

# Timely Tips from CHDA

By DANA FEASTER

## REARING YOUR CHILD

"When I was your age..." "I remember when..." Statements such as these and other nostalgic glances into the past don't have a place in childrearing. Parents who apply solutions that originated in their childhood to present situations simply aren't in tune with today's world.

True, some things haven't changed. These are basic interpersonal relations, learning how to get along with people, ethical concepts, honesty and dishonesty and religious training. People also still need to acquire certain basic skills such as learning how to cook or fix a flat tire, sharing experiences and telling children about safety.

The same can be said for educational opportunities. They're still important. For the parents these were probably limited — even more so for the mother. So, many parents just don't feel comfortable with the thought that their child isn't going to college. In fact, they are horrified. Yet many young people today desire to enter a trade or become a craftsman. The child believes (and rightly so, according to many experts) that America has quickly become top heavy with intellectual brain machines and has a critical need for intellectually endowed craftsmen and people who operate in a practical world.

If a son or daughter goes off to college, many parents aren't comfortable on today's college campus — especially if either of them attended the same school. "I remember when this was a small quiet campus. Look at it now," they say.

Another aspect that parents can't solve with yesterday's solutions involves the appropriate amount of spending money for miscellaneous activities. Stop and consider what your teenager spends money for. Most of the activities weren't even thought to be possible 25 years ago.

Other areas of possible conflict include how youth feel about the draft, civil rights, styles of dress, personal appearance, authority, pressure to get good marks in the classroom, and the position of the female in society.

"I remember when" may work in some cases, but before applying it or using it as a solution to a problem today, consider if the problem you're trying to solve is really the same as it was when you were a child or whether anyone even thought this situation would ever occur.

And here's some extra thoughts on family living. Many of you might have seen this before. But it's always good to reinforce previously learned knowledge. Parents sometimes forget that the way they treat their child determines the kind of person he will be. Here's a list of qualities determined by the parents' actions. If a child lives with criticism, he learns to condemn. If a child lives with hostility, he learns to fight. If a child lives with ridicule, he learns to be shy. If a child lives with a blame, he learns to feel guilty. If a child lives with tolerance, he learns to be patient.

If a child lives with encouragement, he learns confidence. If a child lives with praise, he learns to appreciate. If a child lives with fairness, he learns justice. If a

child lives with security, he learns to have faith. If a child lives with approval, he learns to like himself. If a child lives with acceptance and friendship, he learns to find love in the world.

If this shows you that you need to improve the way you treat your child, why not do something about it now?
