### On consolidating voting boxes

question of financing the May and June primary elections, a hard and realistic look is going to have to be taken at financing primany elections in the future, as well as at the necessity of economizing on the costs of general elections.

Legislation was enacted several years ago authorizing commissioners' courts in all Texas counties to eliminate small voting boxes by consolidating them with larger ones, but very few counties have done so.

Here in Garza County, the consolidation of the four or five small voting boxes with larger ones never got past the "falking stage. There was opposition in the smaller communities against taking their voting boxes away from them. These communities, many of which had alreay fost their schools through consolidation, saw the elimination of their voting boxes as another step toward wiping them out" as a community.

It isn't at all hard to see the point of our friends in the smaller communities in not wanting to lose their voting boxes, but it is something that must be faced realistically.

Whatever the outcome of the complex Reduction of the number of voting boxes through consolidation of the smaller boxes with larger ones is something that is going to have to be done for the sake of economy.

In both the primary and the general elections, the costs could be cut nearly in half through consolidation of the voting places. Fewer workers and fewer supplies would be required. The election laws provide for a minimum of four workers at each box regardless of the number of voters casting ballots there.

In the case of primary elections, Texas has come to a showdown, with a federal court order virtually wiping out candidate filling fees as a means of financing the elections. The general elections, of course, will continue to be paid for with appropriated funds, but even in their case there would be a big saving through the consolidation of vot-

It is something that commissioners courts are going to have to face up to sconer or later, and in the face of the present squabble over financing the primary elections, the soon-





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

WHAT'S IN IT? By CHARLES DIDWAY

### KIRKPATRICK

The Vikings, or Norsemen, invaded England over a thousand years ago and for some two hundred years stubbornly resisted all efforts to drive them back to their homeland. When the warlike men from the North finally were forced to leave, they left behind them traces of their language, some of which still remain, "Kirk," which by the end of the 12th century was the generally accepted word for a church in England and Scotland, came from the Norse "kirkja" for church.

There are several places in Scotland named Kirkpatrick, which means "church of St. Patrick". The earliest of these places was a farm in the parish of Closeburn which got the name from a chapel formerly dedicated to St. Patrick.

The lands of Colquboun, (pronounced "Cohoon"), by Loch Lomond, were granted by a 13th-century Earl of Lennox to Humphrey de Kirkpatrick, from whom the Colquhoun clan takes descent. Many of the Kirkpatricks took the surname Colquhoun from the lands granted them, and those who did not remained affiliated with the clan. Most of the Colquhouns who have emigrated to Rmerica have shortened their name to Calhoun

The empress Marie Eugenie, whose husband was Emperor Napoleon III of France, was descended from a Kirkpatrick. Her maternal grandfather was a William Kirkpatrick who, after becoming a wine merchant in Malaga, married Dona Francesca, daughter of Baron de Grivegnee. One of their daughters, Maria Manuela, married the Count del Montijo and it was their daughter. Marie Eugenie, who married the French emperor.

In Ireland, the name Kirkpatrick is found mainly in Ulster (Northern Ireland), where was introduced from Scot-

Kirkpatricks were among the earliest Scottish settlers in America and many of the name fought in the Revolutionary War. Today, Kirkpatrick is the 1,016th commonest surname in the United States, with an estimated 27,000 persons by the
