Joe C. Hunter, 73, a pioneer oilman who helped form the Threeway Drilling Co., which operates here, died last Friday morning at his home in Midland.

**Eric Smylie, 21, enters race for state treasurer**

CORPUS CHRISTI — A Corpus Christi student who voted for the first time less than a month ago is the first 21-year-old candidate in Texas history to seek a major statewide office.

Eric Smylie, a third-year student majoring in speech and history at Texas Christian University, Fort Worth, filed in Austin to oppose incumbent Jesse James, 68, for the Democratic nomination for state treasurer.

James, seeking a sixteenth two-year term, became state treasurer by appointment Oct. 24, 1941 — nearly 10 years before Smylie was born.

"I am making this race because I believe that young people should be represented in public office as well as in the voting booth," Smylie said.

"Certainly my presence in this race draws that line clearly," Smylie added that there is "a real need for new enthusiasm, new energy, an a new outlook in the state treasurer's office."

We bet he went home chuckling to find us bare-footed (he didn't know we had earlier soaked two pairs of old shoes) sweeping away at 10 p.m. after an 8 p.m. washing mishap.

What worries us is that an old washing machine like that jammed us so we didn't shut off the hot water at the start. We've got a heck of a lot of learning yet to do about being a "houseman", we have ruefully concluded. But we figured we might as well tell this on ourselves so Ed won't have the pleasure.

The other press meeting story is about a hustling publisher and his town's drug problem. All of us have them you know. Well, the town was Andrews and the publisher was a very good friend of ours, James Roberts, who rates as about the best newspaper columnist writer in West Texas (he has the trophies to prove it.)

James kept hearing all the rumors about so many kids in his town being on drugs — with the names being named. The law had its hands tied with out-of-town attorneys getting the kids they caught off the hook because of something done or not done in the arresting process.

So James went into action with a pair of binoculars and his column. He "staked out" the super market parking lot where the kids gathered at night and kept noticing one particular car coming and going every few minutes. That got him started on identifying the pusher.

He wrote a column urging parents to sit down with their kids that night and find out if they were on drugs because the drug pot would soon boil over. Worried parents called him tips. Others volunteered money for the fight.

Enough was raised to hire an "undercover teenage agent" to get the evidence which brought indictments to five and which caused five more to "move away."

"We think we're on top of our drug problem for the moment," James told us. But he says it was the ability of newspaper readers in his town to identify themselves with the column which got the job

done with tips and cash and concern. Now for this Ben Barnes "snub." His backers laid out the dough for a whistle-stop campaign train from Amarillo to Houston this week in Ben's bid for the governorship. But at 1:25 p.m. Tuesday "his train" zipped right through Post without even slowing down, thus not even — evidently — recognizing Post as a whistle stop. He stopped at Slaton and then went on to Snyder.

We would guess that will cost him at least 100 Garza votes in the May primary.

At the press meet, a majority of the publishers in an opinion poll voted Gov. Smith to win the area over Ben Barnes and Dolph Briscoe, but they saw it as a tight three-man race. Voting their own preferences, however, it was Briscoe by a landslide, Dolph being the only one of the trio untouched by the stock fraud scandals. But Dolph doesn't have the backing or the power the other two do. One

publisher thinks Briscoe has a real chance if he "takes off the gloves" and really goes after Smith and Barnes. So far, he has been "too nice a guy" for that.

And last but not least, The Dispatch is only an eight-pager because we couldn't find many ads this week right after the annual George Washington Birthday Sale. A newspaper is not "as big as the news" it contains. Its size is determined by advertising volume.

There's another reason for the eight-pager too. Our linotype machine got to acting up. Don (Corky) Ammons, who can fix just about anything with or without an instruction book, spent a lot of hours Monday and Tuesday getting it "perking" again. Cutting down to eight kept The Dispatch on its production schedule and "us Dispatchers" home at night instead of trying to catch up down here.

? Your Name? WHAT'S IN IT? By CHARLES DIDWAY

KIRKPATRICK The Vikings, or Norsemen, invaded England over a thousand years ago and for some two hundred years stubbornly resisted all efforts to drive them back to their homeland.

When the warlike men from the North finally were forced to leave, they left behind them traces of their language, some of which still remain. "Kirk," which by the end of the 12th century was the generally accepted word for a church in England and Scotland, came from the Norse "kirka" for church.

There are several places in Scotland named Kirkpatrick, which means "church of St. Patrick". The earliest of these places was a farm in the parish of Closeburn which got the name from a chapel formerly dedicated to St. Patrick.

The lands of Colquhoun, (pronounced "Cohoon"), by Loch Lomond, were granted by a 13th-century Earl of Lennox to Humphrey de Kirkpatrick, from whom the Colquhoun clan takes descent. Many of the Kirkpatricks took the surname Colquhoun from the lands granted them, and those who did not remained affiliated with the clan. Most of the Colquhouns who have emigrated to America have shortened their name to Calhoun.

The empress Marie Eugenie, whose husband was Emperor Napoleon III of France, was descended from a Kirkpatrick. Her maternal grandfather was a William Kirkpatrick who, after becoming a wine merchant in Malaga, married Dona Francesca, daughter of Baron de Grivegnnee. One of their daughters, Maria Manuela, married the Count del Montijo and it was their daughter, Marie Eugenie, who married the French emperor.

In Ireland, the name Kirkpatrick is found mainly in Ulster (Northern Ireland), where it was introduced from Scotland.

Kirkpatricks were among the earliest Scottish settlers in America and many of the name fought in the Revolutionary War. Today, Kirkpatrick is the 1,016th commonest surname in the United States, with an estimated 27,000 persons by the name.

CORRECTION TO THOSE 18 Years of Age AMENDMENT No. 26 to the Constitution of the United States reads as follows: Section 1. The right of citizens of the United States, who are eighteen years of age or older, to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or any other state on account of age. Section 2. The Congress shall have power to enforce this Article by appropriate legislation. The effect of the above constitutional amendment is to reduce the voting age in Texas to eighteen years. T. H.
