CATTLE GRUBS

By Wallace Kimbrough, County Agent of Texas A & M College Extension Service
 The following are three methods of control. Since there are few dipping vats and pressure sprayers in the county the sulphur rotenone dust method is recommended.
Sulphur-Roteneone Dust— Mix equal parts of sulphur and either derris or cube containing 5% rotenone. Apply with a quart fruit jar having about 10 to 12 quarter-

inch holes in the lid. The holes should be punched from the inside so that the dust mixture will flow freely without shaking. Shaking creates a dust cloud that is irritating to the eyes and nose of the operator. One pound of the mixture will treat about 15 head of cattle. The first treatment should be made when the oldest grubs are about to mature and are dark brown in color. Applications should be repeated every 30 days as long as the grubs are present. Three treatments are usually necessary. This method is practical for any size herd.

Wash— Mix three-fourths of a pound of derris with one-half pound of wettable sulphur. Add one gallon of water and mix thoroughly. Apply with sprinkler jar and scrub thoroughly with a stiff bristled brush. Repeat applications as for dust. Practical for 100 animals or less.
Spray— Mix 5 pounds of derris with 10 pounds of wettable sulphur. Add to 100 gallons of water and mix thoroughly. Apply with a power sprayer at 250 to 300 pounds of pressure. Repeat applications as for dust method. Practical for any number of animals.

Kill this maggot and you help cripple the other three.

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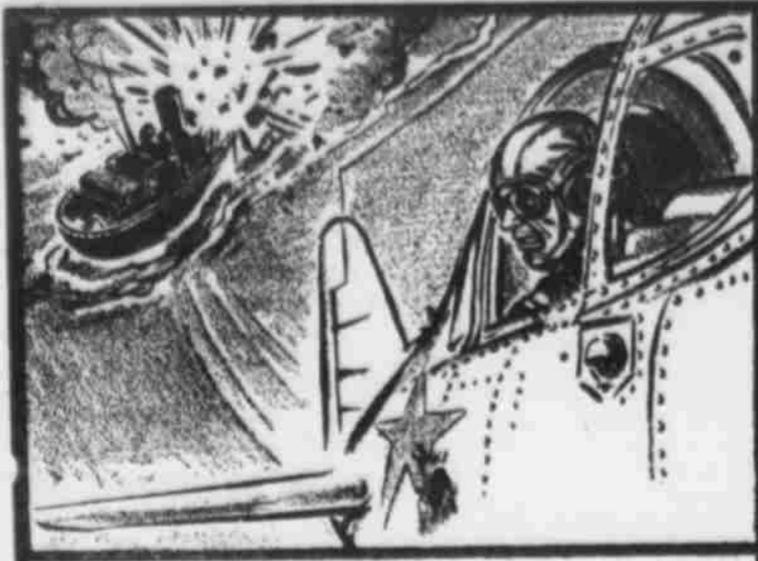

FADS OR FREEDOM

Each "ism" claims to be the "dear people's" savior from toil, and promises to take those who "have" for those who "haven't." All the "isms" claim to be the cure for war, but they all teach class hatred—hatred of the man who has "saved."

We in this country must not allow ourselves to be fooled by "isms." We can not make adjustments without upsetting a nation of contentment. We have a constitutional government that has survived depression and obstacles before, and it certainly can pull out of its present problems, if "isms" do not undermine its foundation.

Blaming war on capitalistic abuses and trying to incite our people against capital (private savings), doesn't make sense. The countries that claim to be non-capitalistic are the most war aggressive. And anyway, where there is a wheel turning there is investment, which is capital. No matter whether the people do the investing, or the government does it, the people in the end are the investors.

In the progress of America, the people have put up their own capital and the government has remained their servant as our Constitution intended it to be.

Views of Neighboring Editors:

Petersburg Journal— Yes, our brave Marines died like the heroes they are in taking a couple of little islands in the Gilbert group in the Pacific. One of the islands is about the size of a section of land, and the other one about a section and a half. Our Marines were slaughtered by the Japanese in their effort to take these islands that are just as bare as a billiard table. But take them they did. They had no protection other than from the Navy guns and planes over head. The Japs were well entrenched in fox holes and craters made by our heavy Navy guns and by bombs dropped by medium bombers. Every Jap had to be routed out and killed. Our losses were terrific, because we were taking the fight to them. They were waiting and ready for us, or thought they were, but as yet they had not found out our Marines take what they start out to take—but they know now, if there are any of them left to tell the story. Marines were piled upon Marines as they fell in battle, but they kept pushing ahead, and after three days and nights they took over these two little spots of ground in the middle of the Pacific—it had to be that way, we had to have the Japs off those islands. When the smoke of the battle cleared dead Japs and Marines were laying on almost every yard of the ground. Yes, war is hell, in its worst form.

You'll see its pictures a whole lot from now, leering at you from billboards, posters, cartoons and what not, telling you to "starve the Squander Bug" by not spending any money for useless things—particularly Christmas presents and buy War Bonds instead.

This is what he press release says:

"The Squander Bug is particularly active around Christmas time when he gobbles up quantities of money in shoppers' wild scrambles to buy useless gifts the recipients don't need or want. Anti-Squander bug publicity will emphasize that bonds are the "present with a future" and the recipe that starves the Squander Bug to extinction."

And how about that Squander Bug?

Medical Profession Hard Hit By War; Shortage Foreseen

Austin, Dec. 14— With the tremendous drain on the medical profession in response to the needs of the armed forces, there is a greater necessity now than ever before for maintaining good health and avoiding any risks which might result in needless calls on the services of doctors.

The shortage in medical attention which is now available to the public will be even greater before the end of the coming year, since more and more doctors are being taken into the service and many of those remaining are not in active practice due to advanced age, teaching, or public health activities, or full-time employment in industry.

There is no desire to imply that the family physician, now or later, not be summoned except in dire need, Dr. Cox said. "In fact, there is a greater reason than ever before to seek his advice on living habits, to have him give a thorough periodic check-up, and to have him treat conditions promptly, which, if disregarded, are apt to cause more serious trouble later on. should not attempt thoughtlessly to consume the doctor's valuable time and energy by insisting that he make a home call when an office visit or suggestions over the telephone might suffice.

"While in cities, lack of medical service has not as yet reached an acute state, there are already rural sections feeling the pinch. It follows that everyone, both for his own and his country's sake should live sensibly to the end that maximum health may be attained, and avoidable home medical service be eliminated.

"In this connection, the following rules, among others, may be suggested: Eat nutritious foods. Obtain sufficient rest at night. Shun debilitating and exhausting habits. Keep the use of stimulants of all kinds within sensible bounds. Exercise daily. Detour worry as much as possible."

Jap Jungle Tricks Shown To Camp Hood Men

A veteran of the South Pacific battlefronts is showing Tank Destroyer Replacement Training Center trainees at Camp Hood just what they might be up against if they face the cunning Japs. An interesting account of the veteran's lecture was clipped from the Camp Hood paper that comes to the Dispatch each week through the courtesy of Jack Samson. The article is as follows:

"Jap ingenuity in blind night machinegun firing was demonstrated to men of his command last week by Lt. Col. Harry D. Bishop, who has recently taken command of the 128th TDTB after 18 months on the fighting fronts in the South Pacific. Lt. John R. Smith of Co. B staged the impressive show for the colonel with the aid of Lt. Joseph Basile and Alcee Hummel.

"Trainees who were studying the 30 caliber machinegun were shown how the Japs mark their firing positions with sticks and erect notched crossbars for the barrels of the weapons to rest on, with exact aim down jungle paths and on other places where our troops might be expected to pass at night. Colonel Bishop says that many such positions are thus prepared by the enemy days in advance so they can simply place their guns in advance and fire whenever the Yanks approach."

"Co. B officers also demonstrated that the American method of night firing by predetermined elevation and traversing bar readings is equally effective, except in certain jungle fighting where we have shown the Japs that two can play at the same game."

Hold Down Fatalities With Portable Laundry

A three-section portable laundry which can turn out more than 7,000 pounds of clean and sterile bedclothing weekly is helping navy doctors at advanced bases overseas to maintain a low fatality rate among hospitalized men.

Navy designed, the units are particularly suited to hospital use or for construction battalions and other organizations not setting up permanent headquarters.

A battery of these units recently installed at Camp Peary, Va., demonstrates how a 200-bed, advanced base hospital could be supplied each 24 hours with a 35-pound per bed allowance weekly.

To keep all sections—washer, extractor, and drier—in precise alignment when assembled, each of the three units is permanently mounted on a treated wooden platform resting on heavy timber runners or skids. Prepared for the possibility of termite damage in tropic regions, the foundation is pressure-treated with a salts preservative which gives protection against decay as well as insects.
