Also, it will be necessary to give information regarding how many end of livestock and poultry there were on the farm on January 1943, and how many head the perator expects to have on the arm January 1, 1944.

The Farm Plan Work Sheet will so contain information regardllowance, and the operator should ensider what production practices re needed on the farm in 1943, and discuss this with the Comnitteemen.

e asked to fill in questions rearding the condition of housing, vestock shelter, fencing, machinry, etc., and to give a report of he farm manpower, listing each person on the farm, whether u member of his own family, or a aired hand or share cropper, or their family, who live on the farm. giving their names, ages, and whether they work on the farm, or are available for work off the

All of these questions should be given considerable thought, connued Boyd, since it is vitally necessary to have this information and should be answered as compictely and carefully as possible.

Agriculture is as essential to vinning the war as is industry. John L. Wallace, chairman, Garza County USDA War Board, said

Citing President Roosevelt's reent proclamation in which he laid "food is no less as weapon than tanks, guns and planes," the chairman pointed out that meeting 1943 production goals in Garza county would be dependent upon each farmer doing his part.

## Personal Exemptions

Every individual is allowed a redit against his net income which varies with his domestic tatus, that is whether he is (a) single person, (b) a married person living with husband or wife, or (c) a head of family. This FOR SALE- Good Burning credit is known as personal ex- Distillate, 5c gallon, at S. Caprito emption, and is shown on line 21 of the return Form 1040. The amount of the personal exemption also varies depending upon the period during which the taxpayer ecupied the particular exemption

## Planned Poultry Program Needed To Reach 1943 Goal

THE POST DISPATCH

Uncle Sam wants Texas farmers to produce 11 per cent more eggs this year than last, and also to increase poultry substantially meats. Translated into totals, 11 per cent means nearly 27,000,000 foren more eggs than Texas hens and in 1942. To reach this goal and at the same time furnish more poultry for the pots and ovens, locks will have to be enlarged by starting more chicks, and their egg laying activity stepped up. This is the opinion of George P

McCarthy suggests planning the 1943 program to start at least two groups of chicks, one to come off in February or early March, and another as soon as the first group can be removed from the brooder house. Moreover, he adds: it will be an advantage to raise straight run chicks this year. The cockerels could be fed out as heavy fryers and sold at a good price next

Moderation, however, should be least one square foot for two chicks in a brooder house and at hick. At least one quart of water should be provided for each 25 eye dropper, and scissors. chicks. For best results, allow at ] provide approximately five gal-100 birds in the house.

# First Aid Cabinet Is Farm Necessity

A program to safeguard the avallable manpower of the farm is being sponsored by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Safety first now means better farm production and fuller participation in war activities. In addition to preventing farm accidents, farm people should prepare for emergency treatment in case of in accident. Proper first aid measures reduce suffering and save humon lives, as many rural Texans have learned since the Texas Home Demonstration Association promoted first aid training more than two years ago.

It has been suggested that a first aid kit or cabinet include;

A Red Cross first aid text book, three-inch squares of sterile gauze and assorted sterile bandage compresses in individual packages, one and one-half-inch and threeinch roller bandages, triangular bandages, rell of adhesive tape pieric acid for burns, absorbent cotton, two per cent jodine, tincture of merthiolate for scratches and cuts, and as swab for the bserved. Overcrowding, lack of throat, castor oil or mineral oil feed hopper space, and lack of for use in the eyes, calamine lowater fountains should be guarded tion for skin irritations, burn minst.
