## Swimming Pool Repairs Okayed

The Post City Council Monday night rejected the recommendation of the City-County Park Board, approving four of the seven park renovation proposals.

The council authorized construction of the three base-bid items at the swimming pool, including alternative one for underwater pool lights.

Other work at the park which was postponed for future consideration bid items on a restroom and concession facility at the baseball field, a hike and bike path at the park and a roof at the announcer's booth.

Park board members Jack Alexander and David Newby presented the board's recommendations. Also attending the meeting were county commissioners Ted Aten, Herb Wall and Tommy Young.

The total bid for the four approved swimming pool repair and renovation items of \$94,967 went to Murray and Givens of Lubbock as low bidder.

The park improvements are funded jointly by the city and county and a matching \$109,000 grant from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Dept.

The council also accepted the low bid of Ronnie Zuhn Paving Inc., of Lubbock for this year's planned street paving project, which includes the continuation of the drainage and street improvements for East Post through a \$145,000 Texas Community Development Block Grant.

The total bid for the projects was \$552,822.20, of which \$145,000 is funded by the state grant.

The council authorized advertising for bids to complete priority one and three of the water line improvement plan.

Priority one is the replacement of the water line on West 15th and Ave. P to Live Oak, connecting back to Ave. O and West 10th from Ave. R to Ave. S, south on N. Ave. S to the alley north of West 10th and West 6th St., from S. Ave. P to S. Ave. R.

Priority three is the installation of a new water line on West 4th St., from S. Ave. L to S. Ave. R.

**Theater Buildings**  
Jack King, chairman of the Post Economic Development Corp. (PEDC), presented a proposal to the council, suggesting the recently deeded theater buildings to be transferred to the PEDC for development purposes.

City attorney Harvey Morton cautioned that any disposal of the property would have to follow state guidelines, which he felt requires advertising for bids.

The council expressed its appreciation to the PEDC for offering to help, and requested Morton to research the restrictions of transferring the property to the PEDC.

Mayor pro-tem Maxine Earl pointed out that the two buildings, when under private ownership, provided the city only \$28.92 a year in taxes.

In response to council member Weaver McKamie's question about the validity of accepting the deed, Earl read minutes of the January council meeting, which instructed Morton to prepare a letter to Commonwealth Theatres.

The January minutes showed that the council

refused to accept the deed as written, due to a restrictive clause.

Morton repeated his comments from the last meeting, emphasizing that the city had entered a contractual agreement with Commonwealth and that Commonwealth had met the city's

requirements, therefore the city has properly accepted the title to the property.

**Law Enforcement**  
An item on the agenda about law enforcement opened up a brief discussion, which included a comment by McKamie that "the

## PEDC Is a Non-Government Unit

The Post Economic Development Corporation is a publicly owned, non-profit organization which is independent of any government agency.

Recently there have been citizens reading about the PEDC and confusing it as either the city of Post or an arm of the city of Post.

City council member Weaver McKamie called me late last week to explain that

several folks quizzed her about the property being managed by the PEDC, thinking that it was the city council.

"For some reason there are people who think that PEDC is a part of the city," McKamie explained, "and somehow we need to get people to realize that the PEDC is not an official part of the city government."

I was surprised that there would be any confusion

about the PEDC, especially since we have frequently outlined the organization and purposes of this group.

Let's restate it one more time...the Post Economic Development Corporation is an organization established by private individuals, open to the public, designed to promote industrial expansion and economic development for Post.

PEDC is in no way

Born November 1, 1905 in Bowie, she died March 2 at the South Park Medical Center following a lengthy illness.

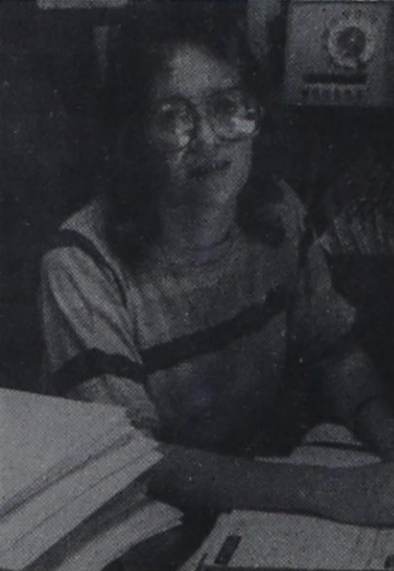

**The Way I See It . . . . .**

Storm clouds, lightning and thunder returned to our area last week...reminding me of the impending tornado season, sure to arrive in a month or so.

And it also reminded me of the inadequate civil defense alert in our city.

One lone siren at the courthouse is supposed to sound the alarm to warn citizens of an approaching tornado.

That's great if you happen to live downwind from the siren...or within a few blocks of the courthouse.

It is obviously not strong enough to alert the whole town.

Two years ago, former city manager Rebecca King introduced a proposed plan

for updating the civil defense system...which has received little or no attention from the city council.

During budget hearings last summer, I requested at a city council meeting, as a citizen, that the proposed budget include the installation of sirens to be placed at strategic spots throughout the city.

There is some money in the current budget for civil defense, but as far as I've been able to determine, there still is no definite plan for where and how many sirens to install.

Surely there is no higher priority for the citizens of a town in this part of Texas than to have adequate warning during the dange-

**Garza County Gross Sales Receipts Show 4.9% Increase**

The fourth quarter 1984 gross sales in Garza County showed a 4.9 percent increase over the same period in 1983, according to a recent announcement by State Comptroller Bob Bullock.

The comptroller showed 122 outlets in Garza County reporting sales with a total of \$9,773,999, compared to \$9,313,082 in the fourth

quarter of 1983. The amount subject to tax was \$3,981,125.

Lynn County showed a total of \$12,509,772 compared to \$13,501,134 with 107 reporting outlets.

Crosby County reported \$10,838,281, down from 1983's \$12,706,794 with 143 reporting outlets.

While bodies do change, emotions do not.

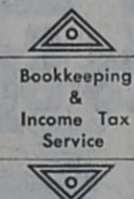

### Judge Nutrition Advice Before Following

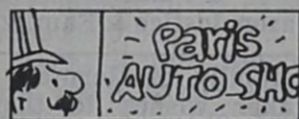
Advice on nutrition has become almost as common as advice to the lovelorn in many popular magazines. Most people wouldn't think of experimenting with their health, yet that's just what happens when they indis-

criminate follow the advice given in many of these stories.

A recent study by the American Council on Science and Health (ACSH) indicates the accuracy of information in magazine nutrition stories ranges from 20 to 95 percent. Unfortunately, the ACSH study also shows that some magazines with the most nutrition coverage are often the least reliable. So readers need to make their own judgements about the accuracy and usefulness of this nutrition advice.

First consider whether the article makes inaccurate claims that certain foods or nutrients have special benefits. Particular foods or nutrients may have special features, but eating any one food in excess will lead only to an imbalanced diet.

A variety of foods from the four basic food groups of protein foods, breads and cereals, dairy products and fruits and vegetables is the only known way to achieve a healthful diet.
