EMTs, Firemen Rescue Explorer Scout Off Cliff Ledge

A joint effort by the Post EMT and Post Volunteer Fire Department resulted in the rescue of a Lubbock Explorer Scout last Saturday afternoon at the Post Boy Scout Camp.

Roxie Anna Williams of Lubbock fell approximately 20 feet off a ledge near Indian Point off the caprock and suffered a concussion, severe swollen right eye, puncture wound

to her upper lip and lower back pain.

Post EMT paramedic Ronny Ammons reported that the young lady hit her head when she fell, but landed in a particularly

soft area of deep sand, which cushioned the fall.

She was lifted from the ledge up to the caprock with the teamwork of EMTs and firemen, who used ropes and manpower

to bring the youngster to safety.

The accident was reported at 12:43 p.m. and by 2 p.m. the scout was on her way to the hospital.

She was admitted to Garza Memorial Hospital, then transferred at the family's request to South Park Hospital in Lubbock and from there to St Mary's Hospital.

"As far as anyone can remember, this is the first time in our history that we have rescued someone in this sort of situation," Ammons reported.

If you aren't going to be in town Saturday and for some reason you forgot to vote absentee by now... you'll be one of those people who will miss the chance to pick candidates for this year's municipal, school and hospital elections.

Polls open Saturday at 7 a.m. at the Post Community Center for all three elections and close at 7 p.m.

Continuing a long-standing tradition, The Post

Dispatch will answer telephone calls Saturday night as the votes are counted following the closing of the balloting.

An important election, with challenges in all three government units, this Saturday's voting will set the stage for the future in education, medical and city services.

Candidates by now have expressed their stands on the issues and now it's just a matter of the voters deciding who they feel will do the best job of represent-

ing their interests.

Let's take a look at the election:

City of Post

Charles Wallace is unopposed in the one-year vacated term of former council member Jack Ault.

Incumbent Maxine Earl and Larry Mills will be challenged by Mike Barber for the two other city council seats.

Incumbent Mayor Giles McCrary faces challenger Harold Lucas.

Post ISD Board of Trustees Tom Drake, Deljuan Wilson and Jimmy Bartlett are contesting for the vacated Place One position.

Incumbent Don Payne is challenged by Bill Terpening in Place Two.

Incumbent John Boren faces challenger Jerry Osborn in Place Three.

Garza Memorial Hospital Board of Directors

Incumbents Jack Alexander, Zoe Kirkpatrick and David Nichols are challenged by Ronnie Ammons as three of the top four vote getters will serve on the board.

Southland ISD

In Southland Jerry W. Farquhar, Lupe C. Aguilar, J.W. Basinger and V.C. Wheeler will be contesting for positions.

Post Notes

We really have some neat people living in Post... and whenever I run into Tom Bouchier or Eddie Warren, I am reminded of that fact.

Last week at the Post Office, Mr Tom told a fascinating story to Lewis Earl and I about the early days of doctoring in Post.

It seems that Mr Tom was working at a ranch in Borden County when one of the ranch hands decided to take an unbroken pony out of the corral.

"That's the way I break 'em," Mr Tom quotes the cowboy.

Paying no heed to Bouchier's warning...the cowboy went bouncing out of the corral on top of the wild horse, and down a slope...all the while the animal is pitching and rearing and bucking.

Down the slope a ways, the horse stumbled, fell over on the cowboy and Bouchier went running to the scene.

"We were the only ones there," Mr Tom remembers, "so I got on my horse and raced over to the nearest ranch house and borrowed a buggy.

"I got the cowboy into the buggy and we started off to Post, which was the only place with medical facilities in a hundred

miles," Bouchier continued. "We left about three in the afternoon and got into town pretty late...way up in the early morning," he added.

He took the buggy to the stable, and someone there directed him to the sanitarium, which is now the Garza County Museum.

"The young doctor there was single and he lived in the hospital," Bouchier recalls.

"He took a look at that cowboy and said something like, 'there's not much wrong with you...just a broken rib, here I'll fix you up.' And he did."

Mr Tom says the young doctor wrapped the cowboy up real tight, and sent the two on their way.

"I asked him when we should come back, he said, 'if he'll do what I say, you don't have to come back.'"

"You know," Bouchier mused, "that doctor didn't charge us a single dime..."

The conversation at the Post Office got started as Mr Tom made a comment about Dr. A.C. Surman's health.

The young doctor in the story was our very own Dr. Surman.

Lewis invited Mr Tom to stop by his office and talk into a tape recorder...and anyone who knows Mr

Jimmy Bird Gets S&WCD Rancher Award

Jimmy Bird was named Rancher of the Year during last Thursday evening's annual Garza Soil and Water Conservation District banquet.

Chairman of the S&WCD, Sam Ellis, presented the award to Bird, who ranches in Eastern Garza County.

Also getting special recognition was Ellis, who received a plaque for his years of dedication and personal contributions to the district.

Soil Conservation poster winners receiving awards were Doug Flannigan, Shannon Owen and Reitha Smithy of Post.

Essay Contest winners were Debbie Ethridge, Nancy Wilson and Ron Graves of Post.

In the award to Bird, Ellis cited the rancher's "outstanding example in conservation ranching near the Verbena community.

"He has applied needed conservation measures and range improvement practices on all of his land on a regular basis for many years.

"A Great Plains contract was completed on the ranch several years ago and since that time Jimmy has continued on to apply conservation measures such

as proper grazing use, deferred grazing and brush management each year as needed.

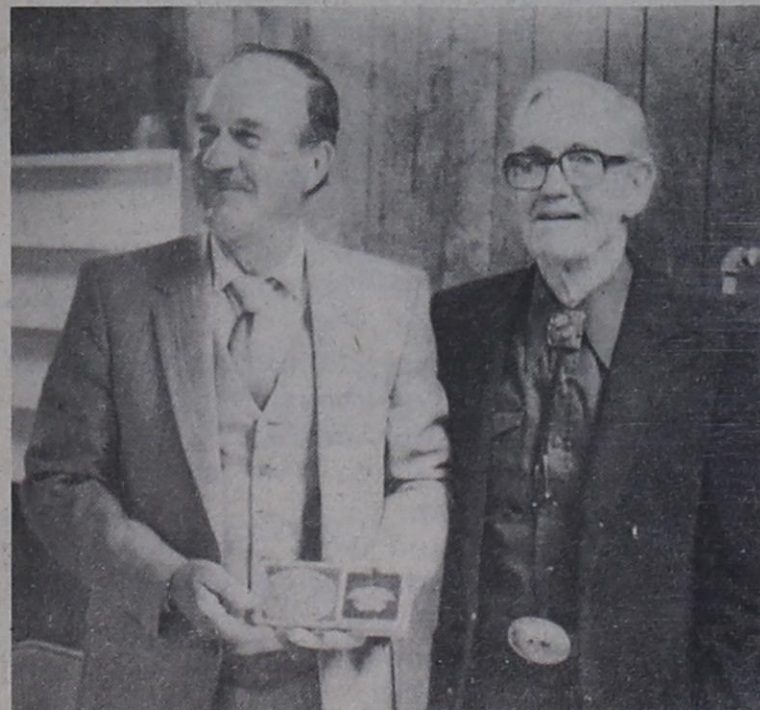
"Cross fencing, livestock water, pipelines and stock-water ponds have been installed and nearly 350 acres of old cropland has been established to improved grasses.

"All applied conservation practices are being carried

out in a timely manner and through his conservation program, Jimmy has set an example for his neighbors.

"His range is improving each year, and his cattle are in excellent shape.

"He is making conservation pay in an arid part of the state where a rancher either manages his resources or goes under," Ellis added.

Eddie told us about the time he bought the old Linotype machine, which Corky Ammons still has "fired up" in the commercial printing shop.

"I had to have a better machine," Warren explained, "and they had a deal on those machines at the time for only \$14,000," he remembered.

"Now, I guess it'd probably go for whatever the price on its weight is," he added.

Eddie enjoyed telling about the five percent loan he got at the bank, then turned around and paid cash on the machine and

earned a three percent discount.

"That banker really was hot at me after he found out," Warren smiled.

I asked Eddie how he came to name the newspaper the Dispatch..."I guess it sounded sorta official," he replied candidly.

The name has stuck and we appreciate it.

We welcome his visits.

Chamber of Commerce Breakfast

Approximately 25 members of the Post Chamber of Commerce gathered for breakfast at Jackson's Cafeteria last Monday morning for the first general membership meeting of this type in two years.

Reports on current status and plans were presented by Post ISD superintendent Bill Shiver, Maritta Reed for the Garza Memorial Hospital, city manager Bill Pool for the city of Post, Jack King for the Post Economic Development Corp. and Lewis Earl, manager of the Post Chamber of Commerce.

A planning questionnaire circulated by the Chamber to members and prospective members was discussed as the basis for the Chamber program for the year.

Chamber president Charles Wallace urged those who have not turned in suggestions or reports to do so this week.

Master of ceremonies Jack King reported that two different warehousing organizations were expect-

ed to lease substantial space at the Postex building this week.

Earl reported on the possibility of obtaining the old Santa Fe depot for public purposes.

In drawing for the \$25 cash award, the recipient was not present, leaving the money to be added to the door prize of the next meeting.

Winners of the drawings were Gladys Blair of a certificate for five to 10 minute session at Caprock Tanning Salon, Victor Ashley of a man's shirt from La Posta and Jack King of a cheese tray from Danish Imports.

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Saturday, April 6th, we, the citizens of Garza County, will have the privilege and right to go to the polls and vote for the candidates of our choice for several positions on different boards-of-trustees.

This give us, the taxpayers, an opportunity to express ourselves for a job well done, or show our disapproval.

My personal opinion is, that we, in Garza County, are very fortunate to have the caliber of people that we now have, that are serving (without pay) on the various boards of trustees.

Through their foresight and good business management, they have observed their responsibilities to us, the taxpayers, and have retired ALL bonded indebtedness, and have not incurred any other debts that cannot be paid off when due.

Some of you may know, that Garza County has one of the lowest property tax rates in the State of Texas.

These same trustees that YOU elected, have managed to oversee their responsibilities and have hired the best managers they could, that has resulted in a working relationship that has put all of the tax supported entities on sound financial footing.

To my knowledge, EACH of these boards has established financial surplusses, and have invested those surplusses in a manner to receive the maximum interest available, thus accumulating more savings to be used where necessary, thus removing the need for an increase in our tax rate.

These surplusses are a cushion for a "rainy day." There is absolutely nothing wrong with our school system, our hospital, our city having a surplus large enough to operate for one full year, without having to curtail any services, if the economy of Garza County dropped off and we, as taxpayers could not pay our taxes.

Some people have savings accounts, while others do not. Those that do not are the people that will be caught short, if "times" become worse.

I have been asked why I am running for election to the Post Independent School board of trustees.

PLEASE UNDERSTAND THIS: I am NOT "running against" anybody. I believe that our school board members have done a good job.

I entered my name as a candidate, because, I feel that due to my experience in energy conservation and building maintenance, that I would be an asset to the schools.

I had an idea, and with the approval of the hospital board, we spent \$5,900 on energy conversions, that has saved you, the taxpayers, nearly \$32,000 as of the first of March 1985.

This is nearly a \$2 per square foot net savings on utilities.

I believe that with the experience and knowledge that I have, that I can save the school system and you, the taxpayers, some money too.

My wife, Mary, is employed by Stelzer Drilling Company. We are members of the Post Church of Christ. I am presently serving my second term on the board of directors of the Post Rotary Club, my fourth term on the board of directors of White River Youth Camp, my third year on the board of directors of the Post Chamber of Commerce.

In July, I will begin my third term on the board of directors of the Post Rotary Club.

We have two sons who graduated from Post High School. We have lived here for five years, and Mary and I both believe that Post and Garza County has great potential, BUT only if you and I as citizens, elect those people that have the interest of the entire county at heart and do not have "axes to grind" or are "against" someone or some particular program, or have a pet project of their own to promote.

I would like to take this opportunity to express my thanks to the present school board, the hospital board and the city council for a job well done.

I do not believe that any of the projects or services that you have provided were done without the best interest of the entire city and county in mind.

I would appreciate your vote for Place Two on the ballot for Post ISD trustee on April 6th.

I urge you to go to the polls and vote Saturday, regardless of your choice of candidates, BUT DO GO VOTE.
