Bridge Repair Slows Truck Traffic

Work began Monday on adding support to a bridge on U.S. Highway 380 over the Brazos River six miles east of Post.

The bridge has been posted to a limit of 38,000 pounds last week, resulting in a nightmare for oil-field related and heavy truck

users of the highway. The load-limit was imposed after the bridge was determined to be unsafe for the heavier loads.

A series of complaints from Garza County affected businesses and government leaders brought attention to the matter.

According to the Texas Department of Highways and Public Transportation, the extra support at the bridge is an effort to raise the load limit on the bridge.

Gary Bernethy, district administrative engineer with the SDHPT, commented, "The load limit on this bridge was reduced last month from 80,000 to 38,000 pounds as a safety measure."

"The bridge substructure has deteriorated badly due to age and heavy loads.

"By adding extra support, we hope to be able to raise the load limit back up to the legal limit of 80,000 pounds by the middle of next month," Bernethy added.

Plans are already under way for replacing the bridge.

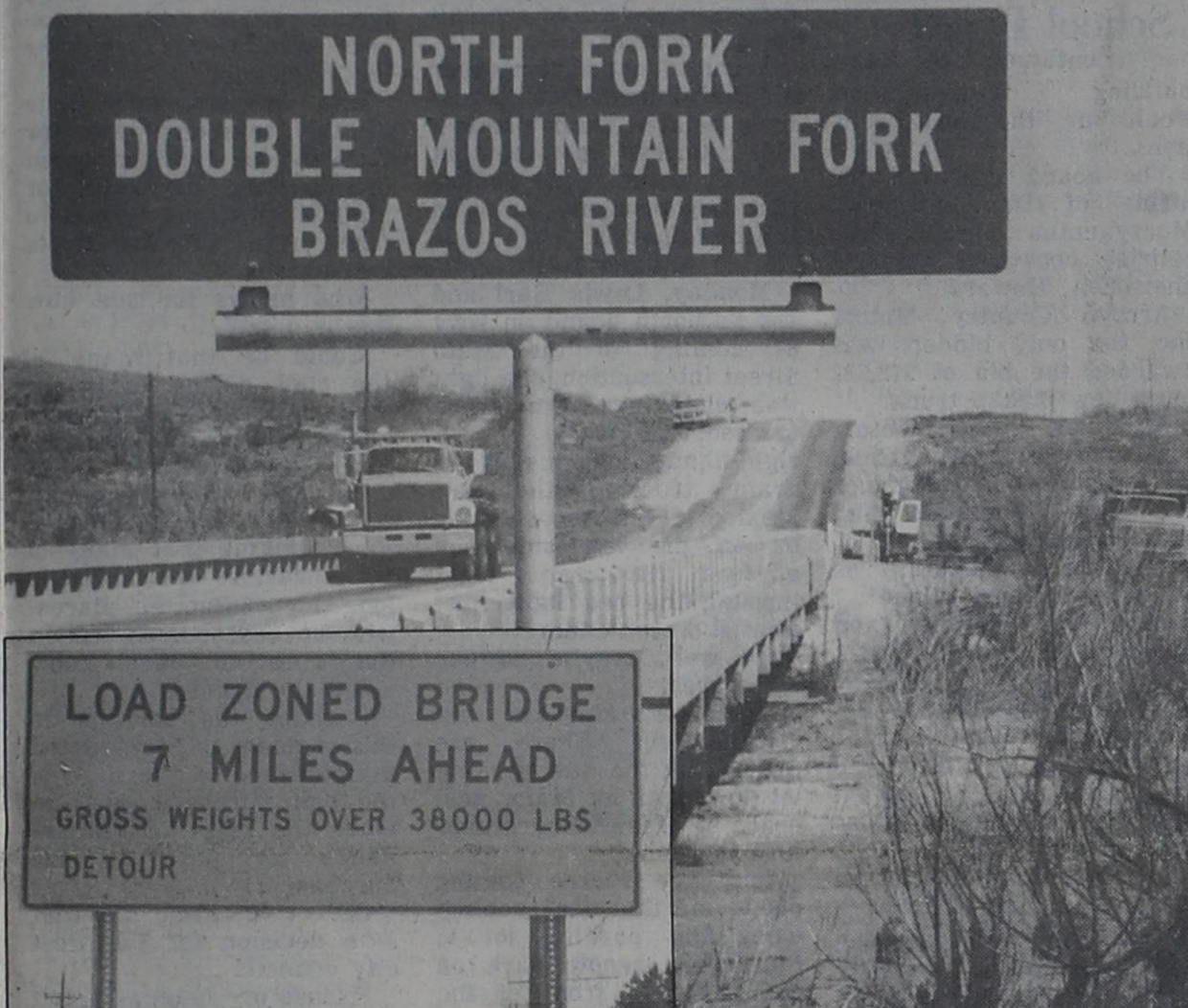
"We hope to let a contract in August for a new bridge, which would be built just to the south of the current structure," Bernethy commented.

A total of seven signs have been placed on the highway leading to the bridge, advising drivers of heavy trucks that an emergency load limit has been placed on the bridge.

Four of the signs are in Kent County and advise of an alternative route for heavy trucks.

One sign is in the city of Post at U.S. 380 and State Highway 207.

Two signs are at the bridge site.

Dyslexia Training for Post Discussed

The Post Independent School District board of trustees heard several reports during the regular meeting Tuesday, April 9, including a recommendation to provide special training in Post for learning language and serious reading problem children.

Post ISD superintendent Bill Shiver explained to the board members that five students with dyslexia have been going every school day to Lubbock for the past two years.

Implementing the training locally would save the system transportation costs, but more importantly, Shiver told the board, "we can help these and other children become productive citizens."

"It is an expensive program," he continued, "but it is well worth the money...how can we put a price on helping a child who needs this kind of attention?"

The program would use a local teacher, who would receive the specialized training. The specialized training would be paid for by a local benefactor.

"There are currently 40 students in high school involved in our special education program with reading problems," Shiver emphasized, "and that is a big percentage...a good program here would identify these children at younger ages when they can be helped and improve their skills before they get too old to be helped."

Board president Jack Kirkpatrick asked Shiver to put the item on the agenda for next month so that it

could be discussed and acted on.

In other action, the board approved the canvas of votes, and new board member Jerry Osborn took the oath of office.

The run-off election was set for May 4, with Place 1 candidates Jimmy Bartlett and Tom Drake on the ballot.

Absentee voting starting April 11 and will continue through April 30.

Voters are reminded that all registered voters in the Post ISD are eligible to vote. Those voters who did not vote April 6 are still eligible to vote in the run-off election.

The board heard from Jim Hickman of TUSHA-EUPER construction company concerning the construction of a field house, using a contractor-management agreement, which Hickman said would save the district 25-30 percent in costs.

After a detailed discussion the board tabled the matter.

Repair of the stadium seats was also tabled, pending a second opinion

by engineers on the structural safety of the old seating.

Shiver told the board that a recent notification from the state board of education shows that Post ISD will lose an additional \$211,000 in state funding next year.

"This decrease in state funding will have to be made up with local revenues," Shiver told the trustees.

He explained that the fund balance, which was \$2,268,622 at the end of the last fiscal year, was already trimmed by \$310,314.21 through the authorization by the board to use that revenue for operating expenses this year.

Shiver said that a four month reserve of \$1.25 million is important to maintain.

"If the tax rate goes too high, then the taxpayers could call for a roll-back and we would be in serious trouble," Shiver emphasized.

One of the main reasons why the tax rate increases have been held lower is due to the reserve.

The rate was increased six cents last year, but would have had to be increased by 12 cents had it not been for the availability of using reserves.

"The reserves are largely due to the interest we receive on our investments," Shiver continued.

Board member Royce Hart repeated a suggestion made last year that "perhaps a small bond issue to satisfy all the various

J.I. Case Leases Here

The board of directors of the Post Economic Development Corp. can breathe a little easier today as a result of a lease signed earlier this week with the J.I. Case marketing group for warehouse space at the Postex Plant building.

The one year lease, subject to a two year extension, will provide critically important revenue to the newly established

PEDC.

The lease, which sets aside 80,000 square feet of warehouse at the plant, will add \$8,000 a month to the PEDC.

Directors plan to use the revenue in improvements and operations at the plant site, to attract more industrial prospects.

J.I. Case, a division of Tenneco, recently purchased the agricultural implement division of

Problems at the Bridge
Last week when I was at the Corner Grocery, Ronnie Metsgar got on my case about not publicizing the problems at the bridge on Hwy 380 east.

"No, you have to read about this sort of thing in the Lubbock paper," Ronnie giped.

Well, that got me to looking at the problem which I hadn't heard about

until then...

But by the time I had made a call to Lubbock and got the information (which is in this issue of the Dispatch), enough local pressure had been applied that repairs at the bridge had already started.

The problem at the bridge caused quite a stir in the oil-field business, especially when the DPS started issuing tickets to trucks exceeding the newly posted 38,000 pound limit.

The alternate route, which wasn't very clearly marked and poorly if at all publicly announced, created an 82 mile detour around the bridge.

What had been an 80,000 pound load limit, was downgraded when the highway department discovered weakened structures under the bridge.

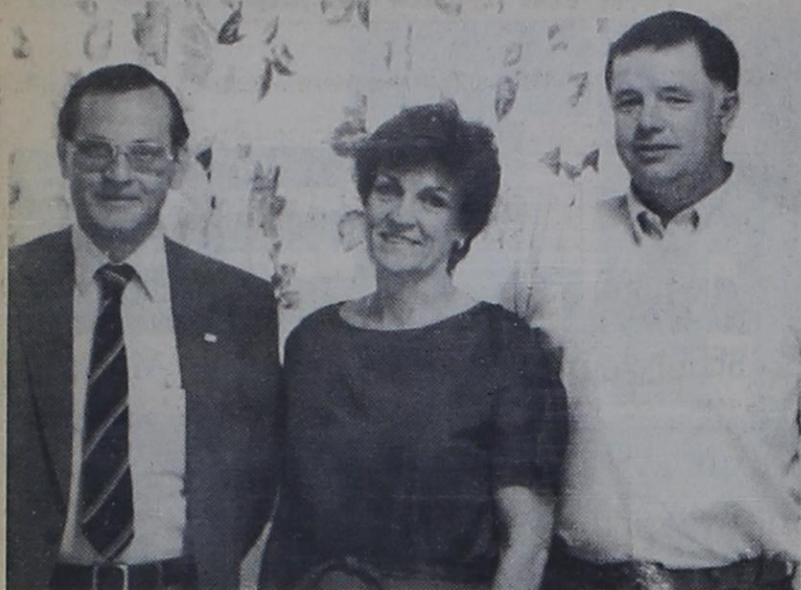

Hospital Board Approves Emergency Door Opener

Jack Alexander, Zoe Kirkpatrick and David Nichols took the oath of office last Thursday morning at the regular Garza Memorial Hospital board of directors' meeting.

The three were reelected to the board during the April 6 election.

The board reviewed the delinquent account list and instructed hospital administrator Maritta Reed to pursue collection of \$7,639.79 through the collec-

tion agency.

Alexander explained that many of the delinquent accounts result from people who think the insurance company is to pay the entire amount and that the delinquent accounts are only turned over to the attorney after all reasonable attempts have been made to arrange payment directly with the client.

Reed told the board that a recent change to a new central purchasing group

will save the hospital from 25-30 percent.

She also reported that the occupancy rate increased in March and at one time all beds were occupied, but that in April the rate has dropped.

The board continues to review various computer system proposals and tabled any decision pending further study.

Alexander was elected to continue serving as president of the board, along

with David Tyler as vice president and David Nichols as secretary.

The board approved the installation of an emergency door opener to be operated at the nurse's station.

The new system will allow the emergency door to be unlocked at the nurse's station, allowing for faster response to emergencies.

The improvement was recommended by Dr. Ricardo Rodriguez.

The over-production of IH farm equipment created a storage problem for J.I. Case, and the company will house 170-180 cotton shredders in the Postex building.

Although the warehousing arrangement is temporary, it is the first visible sign of movement at the plant and PEDC directors are smiling as a result of the lease agreement.

The farm equipment is due to begin arriving for storage by rail May 1.

The Postex Plant building has a total of 450,000 square feet.

Cocaine is a Serious Drug...

To understand the problem of cocaine drug abuse, we have to understand the drug, its physical and psychological effects on the user and the reason for its popularity today.

Cocaine is a drug extracted from leaves of the coca plant, which grows in South America.

Like amphetamines, it is a central nervous system stimulant.

Cocaine appears in several different forms.

Cocaine hydrochloride is the most available form of the drug and is used medically as a local anesthetic.

Cocaine is usually a fine white crystal-like powder, although at times it comes in larger pieces which on the street are called "rocks."

Cocaine is usually sniffed or snorted into the nose, although some users inject it or smoke a form of drug called "free-base."

The immediate effect of cocaine when snorted begins in a few minutes, peak within 15-20 minutes and disappear within an hour.

These effects include dilated pupils and increased blood pressure, breathing rate and body temperature.

The user may feel more energetic, or alert, and less hungry.

Free-base is a form of cocaine which is made by chemically converting "street" cocaine hydrochloride to a purified, altered substance that is

then more suitable for smoking.

Smoking free-base produces a shorter and more intense high because smoking is the most direct and rapid way to get the drug to the brain.

The dangers of cocaine use vary, depending on how the drug is taken, the dose and the individual.

Some regular users report feelings of restlessness, irritability, anxiety and sleeplessness.

In some people even low doses of cocaine may create psychological problems.

People who use high doses over a long period of time may become paranoid or experience what is called "cocaine psychosis."

This may include hallucinations of touch, sight, taste or smell.

Cocaine is a very dangerous, dependence-producing drug.

Smoking free-base increases the risk of dependence.

Occasional use can cause stuffy or runny nose, while chronic snorting can ulcerate the mucus membrane of the nose.

Overdose deaths can occur when the drug is injected, smoked or even snorted.

Deaths are a result of multiple seizures followed by respiratory and cardiac arrest.
