Council Supports 'Main Street' Project

The Post City Council showed their support for the "Main Street" program by passing a resolution on its behalf at their regular meeting last Monday night, June 9.

The Post Merchants Association presented the "Main Street" project to the council members.

Jan Crawford, Don Glidewell, Curtis Hudman and Robert Wall showed that the project was not just a "down town" project but a city project.

Hudman emphasized that it represents a "quality of life."

Wall, president of the PMA, said that barriers will come along and must be handled "and this is the first."

The resolution committed the council to employ a Main Street Project Manager for three years and provide the manager with travel funds for training.

Mayor Giles McCrary

complimented the PMA members for their enthusiasm and encouraged them to keep up the good work and their support of the council.

In other matters, Pattie Kirkpatrick expressed a problem that is occurring with the Air Show that is slated for July 4.

"The cost of liability insurance for the spectators is unbelievable," Kirkpatrick stated as she showed an increase from \$700 for last year to \$2700 for insurance this year.

Kirkpatrick brought out that all of the flyers have insurance and that the tricks are performed a safe distance from the spectators.

City Attorney Harvey Morton advised the council purchase the insurance if an air show was to go on.

It was decided that information would be sought from Tom Drake and Bryan Williams, III to

see if flyers insurance might cover the spectators watching the show.

Lewis Earl talked to the council asking for help in finding an industry or warehouse to come to Post. "We need some capital investments such as work on water and drainage to show people that we are moving ahead," Earl pointed out.

McCrary stated, "Sometimes we don't see the problem in front of us." He then referred the council to some city maps that has been brought up that show problem areas within the city then will need to be addressed soon if improvements are to be made.

George Hensley, representing the firm of Parkhill, Smith & Cooper received permission to advertise for bids for a hiking and biking area to be built at the City Park.

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Merchants Reminded of Activities

The Post Merchants Association was reminded of many coming activities that will be coming to Post in its meeting last Thursday evening, June 5.

Plans to sell watermelon at the Air Show and the Park on Friday, July 4.

Pattie Kirkpatrick informed the merchants of the Olympic Torch coming

down from Colorado. It will be carried by different runners along the route and is expected to arrive in Post on Saturday, June 28.

The merchants agreed to purchase a sound system to use for different functions. The cost of the system, a PV 400, will be shared by the Chamber of Commerce.

Charles Wallace reported

to the group that around \$2,700 was raised during the "Saturday Shindig" that was held May 24 for the Garza County Theater.

The association was reminded of the Post Stampede Rodeo that will be coming August 7, 8 & 9 and of a Sesquicentennial Wagon Train that will be

"It seems to me," the crusty ole feller said, leaning back in his chair, "that after every drought there usually is a good rain."

Travis Ellis slipped me a little comment from the Minneapolis Tribune which I'd like to share with you:

Charles W. Bailey says "A country-editor friend once noted that a small town is a place where people know all the news before the newspaper comes out, but they take the paper anyway to see whether the editor got the stories the way they heard them."

That sounds mighty familiar.

I was pleased to see the careful attention our TEXCEL water committee is giving to the current and future needs of water and water distribution for our city.

The meeting that committee conducted last week with two professionals from the city of Lubbock staff pointed out the urgent need for planning now.

The meeting also brought to my attention the fact that Lubbock is progressing on a targeted schedule for work on the Justiceburg lake site, which is encouraging news.

The construction will bring an immediate economic boom for our area and when similar work begins on the Post lake we will benefit in two ways.

My concern is the apparent lack of current activity by the White River Municipal Water District in getting things started on building the dam just east of town.

It is my hope that the WRMWD will begin to take aggressive and active steps in the near future to get the project started.

Now that Lubbock has already begun its planning for Justiceburg, it seems to me that WRMWD should be pushing forward so that the Post lake development will be on line and ready when Lubbock is ready to buy the water.

It is no secret that funding to build the Post lake will come from the purchase of water by Lubbock from WRMWD.

Since Lubbock has already made it clear that they will buy the water, the permit to build the dam has

been approved by the Texas Water Commission, and all litigation against WRMWD has been dropped, there should be no further delay in getting started.

The urgency for develop-

ing the Post lake is so obvious...and the economic impact to Post is so important, we must insist that action be taken now by the WRMWD.

The citizens of Post have but three voting representa-

tives on the WRMWD board, with Spur, Ralls and Crosbyton also getting three votes each.

Our board members, Bo Jackson, Jack King and "Heavy" Windham of

Linda Goen, sister of the groom of Friona, was maid of honor. She wore a floor length burgandy dress of lace with full length sleeves.

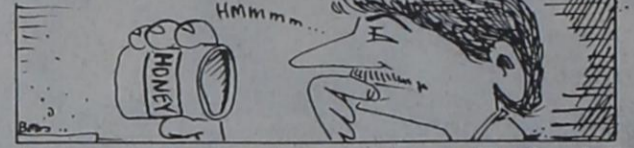

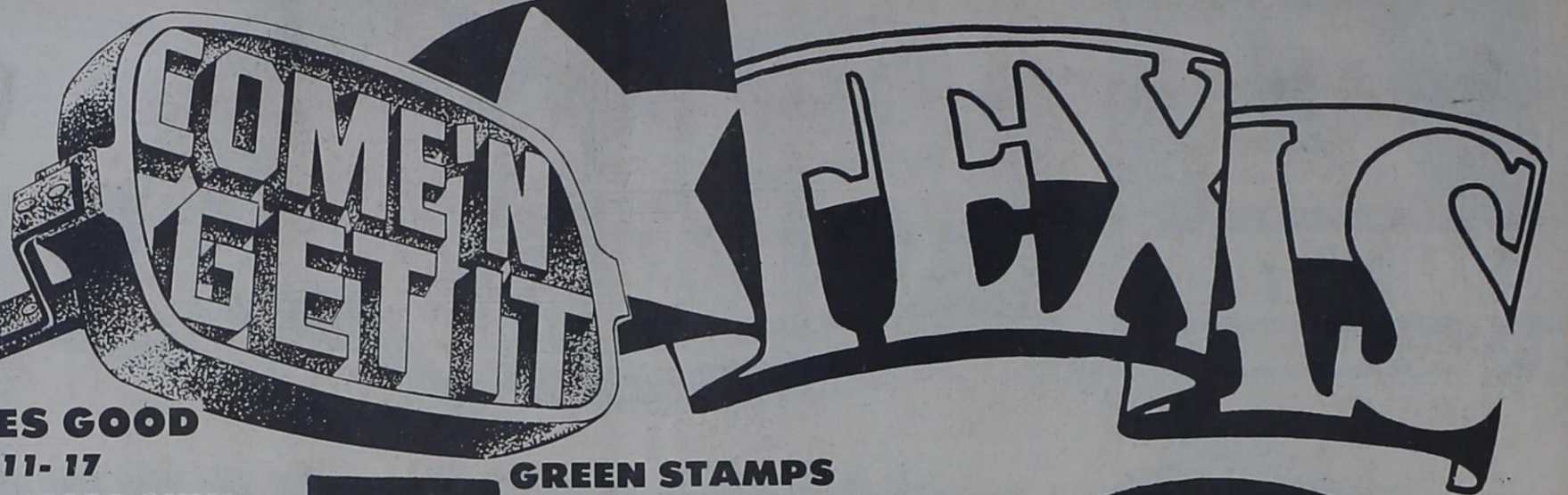

years from now unable to provide the services for such a population base.

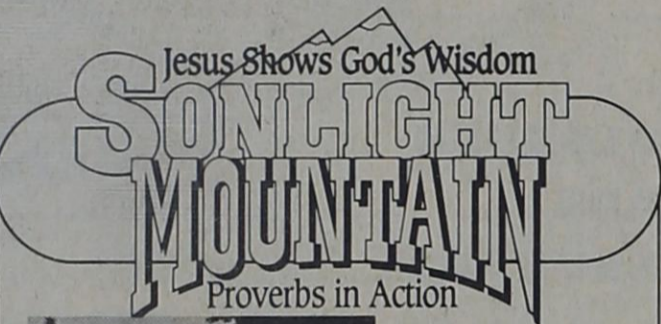
We need to look at the big picture...streets, water, sanitation, sewer, housing, law enforcement, parks and zoning.

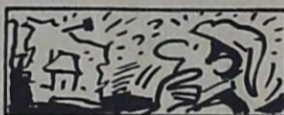

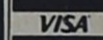

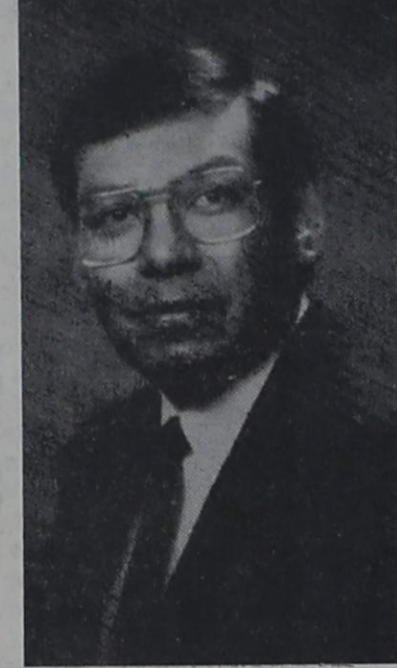

Oil & Gas Report

post oil and gas Exxon Corp. has filed first production figures on a new oil well in the Dorward Field, Garza County.

The No. 9 J.C. Dorward "D" showed potential to pump 21 barrels of oil per day, plus 180 barrels of water.

The operator has 314 acres leased, with drillsite in Garza County's H&GN Survey.

Drillsite is four miles southeast of Justiceburg.

The well will produce from a perforated interval in the San Andres Formation, 1,893 to 2,366 feet into the wellbore.

Total drilling depth was 2,390 feet.

Campbell Oil of Denver, Colo., has revealed plans to drill two 8,350-ft developmental wells in Garza County.

They are designated at the No. 4 P.L.K. "41" and the No. 33-1 J.K. "1/2".

Drillsites are 12 miles south and 11 miles southwest of Post, respectively.

The P.L.K. well will be drilled in a 646-acre lease in the T&NO Survey, while the J.K. well will be drilled in a 426-acre lease in the G.E. Lockhart Survey.

The wells are aimed at production in the Ellenburger Formation.

Drilling is nearing projected total depth at the No. 304 Kirkpatrick, a Garza County wildcat located five miles southeast of Post.

Kirby Exploration is the operator.

The well was spudded on April

26 of this year, carrying permit for 8,600 feet of hole making.

Bert Fields, Jr., independent operator from Dallas, is preparing to perforate an undisclosed interval at his No. 6 I.N. McCrary "H" in Garza County's Post Field.

Drilling was concluded early in May at total depth of 2,889 feet.

The well is located about 10 miles northeast of Post and is aimed at pay in the Gorieta Formation.

Exxon is concluding completion testing at the No. 51 Exxon Fee "G" in Garza County's Dorward Field, four miles southeast of Justiceburg.

The well has recorded shows of commercial oil production.

It has been perforated for production in the San Angelo-San Andres Formation at depths ranging from 1,972 to 2,577 feet into the wellbore.

Bottomhole is at 2,667 feet with plugback to 2,620.

Colleen's Comments

Texans enjoy backyard barbecuing and eating as much as anybody in the U.S., and chicken barbecue is an all-time favorite.

A few simple steps will enable you to enjoy mouth-watering chicken barbecue to your heart's content.

Chicken barbecuing involves four basic steps.

First, split the birds in half and sprinkle each half generously with salt and black pepper before placing on the pit. To shorten barbecuing time, cut halves into parts.

Second, make sure coals are white hot before putting the chicken on the grill. Any type of cooker can be used, but keep the coals 8 to 12 inches from the cooking rack for best results.

Another basic step for top-notch chicken barbecue is to use a basting sauce during the cooking process which contains no tomato product or sugar because such sauces burn easily.

A basting sauce will keep meat moist and juicy and add a desired flavor.

Apply basting sauce and turn chicken halves frequently.

Try these ingredients for a basting sauce: 1 tablespoon salt, 1 teaspoon black pepper, 1 stick butter or margarine, 2 tablespoons Worcestershire Sauce and a few drops of hot sauce or red pepper. Heat the mix over a low flame until the butter or oleo melts; then add the juice of one lemon (vinegar may be substituted).

Next fill the pan with water and heat but do not boil.

Spices such as garlic salt or lemon pepper can be added to suit personal preference.

To top off the barbecuing process, apply a finishing

sauce to the chicken about the last 20 to 30 minutes before cooking is complete.

This is the most critical time during the entire cooking process.

Check the meat carefully and turn it frequently to avoid burning the finishing sauce.

Several types of finishing sauce are available and vary from mild to hot.

To prepare your own sauce (for 10 chicken halves), use the following:

1 cup cooking oil, 1 cup vinegar, 1 cup catsup, ¼ cup sugar and ½ cup water. Add salt, Worcestershire Sauce, hot sauce, garlic and other seasonings to taste.

Chicken barbecue should be complete in about 1½ to 2 hours.

Cooking longer with less heat usually results in the most flavorful, juicy and tender barbecue.

Placing the cooking rack closer than 8 inches to the coals will reduce barbecuing time, but the meat will be drier and less tender.

A test for doneness is to twist the drumstick which is connected to the thigh. If the joint between the thigh and drumstick is loose, the chicken is ready to eat.

Another test is to cut into the meat at this joint. The moisture in the joint will run clear if the meat is done.

The fun part of chicken barbecuing is to develop your own secret recipe and cooking style.

The four basic steps outlined can be varied to suit your style and taste.

One variation is to debone the breast and thigh meat and marinate it overnight in the refrigerator in a mixture of 16 oz herb-seasoned Italian-style dressing and 8 oz picante sauce. Cook in the same manner as before while basting with the marinating sauce.

For another type of marinated chicken barbecue, try using a soy-teriyaki (or Worcestershire) sauce marination for two-to-four hours before cooking.

Most of all, let your imagination be your guide and have fun.

Who knows?

The world's greatest barbecue chef may be in your own backyard.

NAVAJO FRIED BREAD
by Korren Payton

2 cups white flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon shortening
About ¾ cup lukewarm water
3 cups lard, shortening or oil for frying

In a medium-size bowl mix the dry ingredients, stirring thoroughly.

With the tips of your fingers or with a pastry blender cut in lard or shortening until mixture has the texture of corn meal.

Slowly add the water, stirring with a fork, using just enough liquid for the dough to hold together.

Turn the dough out onto a floured surface and knead gently for about 3 minutes.

Cover it with a piece of plastic wrap or towel and let it rest 10-15 minutes.

Divide the dough into six round balls and let these rest, lightly covered, while you start heating the fat in a frying kettle or electric fryer or skillet.

Roll out the first ball of dough to a round 6-7 inches in diameter.

Make a 3-inch cut down the center of the circle with a sharp knife.

By now the fat should be hot, if you have a deep-frying fat thermometer test its temperature, it should be about 380 degrees. If you don't, test with a small pinch of the dough, it should sizzle and float to the top but not darken too quickly.

When ready, slip the first round of dough into the hot

fat. It will puff up immediately; cook it on one side for a minute or so, then turn it with a slotted spatula and cook on the other.

Remove and drain on paper towels and prepare the next round of dough.

Watch the fat to make sure it stays hot enough to but doesn't start to smoke.

The fried bread may be kept warm in a low oven, but it should be eaten as soon as possible.

NOTE: The dough can be rolled out to any size you may wish and can be cut into 2" squares, cooked and served warm with honey which makes a delicious snack or dessert.

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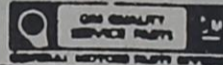

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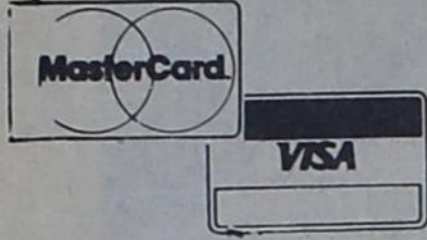
