## Future Plans Difficult for Post ISD

"I really am concerned about the future," Post ISD board of trustee member Tom Middleton emphasized during last week's regular board meeting, "we're going to have a terrible collision." Middleton, along with the other board members, discussed at length the financial problems facing the school district, not this year, but next year. The budget for this coming year will still reflect oil revenue based on a per barrel evaluation of approximately \$22-23, but the following year, the per barrel evaluation is expected to be as low as \$13.

"Really, no one knows what the price of oil will be on January 1," board member Royce Hart said. "We may have to do a lot of things we don't want to do," board president Jack Kirkpatrick added.

The board agreed to place an item on the agenda next month to begin plans for cutting expenses for the budget year of 1987-88.

With continued uncertainty about oil revenue as well as state funding, board members emphasized that the funds now retained in certificates of deposit may be critical to the operation of the school system in the next two to three years.

Superintendent Bill Shiver suggested that the board might consider retaining only three months operating capital in CDs, instead of the auditor recommended one year.

"We need to make sure the taxpayers understand that the money we have in CDs is not a surplus," Middleton added.

Board members also authorized a special recognition to Jiggs King, who has retired after more than 40 years of service, serving

the past 40 years with the Post ISD.

Engineer Bill Stracener reviewed the bids received on constructing a new press box at the stadium.

The old structure has been determined to be minimally safe, and the contract with the low bidder will require negotiating to have the project finished before the first home game September 5.

Stracener was authorized by the board to negotiate with the two low bidders

for a "substantially completed" date of September 1.

Murray and Givens of Lubbock submitted the low bid of \$33,300 followed by A & S Steel Builders of Amarillo at \$33,308.

The Amarillo contractor quoted a completion time of 75 days and Murray and Givens listed 120 days for completion.

Others bidding on the contract included Brown-McKee Inc at \$47,219, Elliott & Elliott at \$40,019,

Hallmark Builders at \$36,800, Lubbock Development Co. with a bid of \$37,755 and Plains Builders with a bid of \$42,539.

The board accepted the resignation of Travis Ellis and hired new teachers Mrs Jayne Titsworth to replace Mrs Billie Osborne;

Lester Titsworth as a coach and high school history teacher;

Jim Burks as coach and middle school teacher, to replace Fred Postell;

## Planning and Zoning Ordinance Near Completion, Budget Reviewed

The first reading to approve a planning and zoning ordinance was passed at the Post City Council meeting held Monday evening, July 7, but need for some revising was noted by members of the planning and zoning commission.

"The portion on the mobile home parks need to be re-worked to make it more reasonable," noted Patty Kirkpatrick.

The council agreed but councilman Jack Alexander also noted, "but we need to make it strict enough to have an investor come in and do it right."

The council was pleased with the commission's work and scheduled the ordinance for the August agenda.

The council also appointed Don Glidewell and Don Payne to be on the planning and zoning commission along with Kirkpatrick, Robert Cox, Ray Bagby, Marion Cruse,

Jr., and James Mitchell, Jr.

Pat Soto and Sonny Mason approached the council about the establishing of two automotive repair shops in residential areas.

Mayor Giles McCrary informed them that the city would send out letters to every resident within 300 yards of their prospective business.

A time limit would be designated for the residents to respond and then the council would review the reports.

James Dawson was present asking the city what they wanted him to do with some automobiles that the city had written him about.

Dawson informed the city that he would have one moved but needed the other vehicle to have for work when the oil business picked back up.

Bill Pool, the city manager, was asked to meet

with Dawson and work something out.

City Attorney Harvey Morton was asked about the procedures of the city annexing some land.

Morton informed them that they would need a majority consent from the land owners of the section they wanted to annex for that land to be a part of the city.

Morton requested a map of the city limits and names of land owners in the specific area that the city was thinking of annexing.

The budget was the next thing on the agenda with the water and sewage departments getting most of the attention.

"We need to make these (water and sewage) departments self supporting," declared mayor pro-tem Maxine Earl.

The council agreed that something had to be done to help stop the city from

subsidizing these departments.

But it was also discussed that if rates were increased that services would have to follow those increases.

The budget was postponed to another meeting so that the council will have time to review the whole budget.

Earl also brought up the complaints that she has had concerning the streets and the lighting situation at the baseball park.

"Who is responsible in seeing that these projects that we paid for are done properly," she asked.

Pool said that the engineers were which followed with a discussion on the oversight of the city engineers.

Present at the meeting along with McCrary, Pool, Alexander and Earl were councilmen Charles Wallace, Larry Waldrip and Larry Mills; city attorney Morton and city secretary Wanda Wilkerson,

## Calcium-Fortified Foods Can't Replace Dairy Products

The food industry is now marketing a number of calcium-fortified foods to nutrition-conscious women who believe they may be at risk for developing osteoporosis.

Osteoporosis is a disease of brittle and porous bones that affects millions of middle-aged to elderly women, making them more prone to fractures.

Calcium-fortified foods currently on the market include some brands of diet carbonated soft drinks and non-carbonated soft drink mixes, bread and flour. Most are prominently labeled and advertised as having added calcium.

Eating calcium fortified products in a balanced diet that still includes dairy products, may be helpful, especially since the Recommended Daily Allowance of 800 milligrams of calcium per day is thought by many medical experts to be too low.

But be cautious because when dairy products are replaced with calcium fortified foods, other important nutrients from dairy products such as protein, vitamin D, riboflavin, B-6 and B-12 are lost.

It's especially important that teenagers and children eat dairy products both for the calcium and the other nutrients they provide.

Some of the powdered drink mixes supply 100 percent of the RDA for calcium, but other fortified foods provide a smaller percentage.

For example, 2 slices of bread made with calcium fortified flour supplies only 10 percent of the RDA for calcium.

Adults can be sure of getting sufficient calcium by drinking the equivalent of 2½ cups of milk each day.

Children under 9 need 2-3 cups, 9-12 year olds should have 3 cups, and teenagers need 4 cups of milk a day.

A cup of yogurt, 1 and one-third ounces of cheese, 1½ cups of ice cream or 2 cups of cottage cheese all supply the same amount of calcium as a cup of milk.

Consumers should also realize that eating calcium-fortified foods will not necessarily prevent osteoporosis, since general nutrition, hormone balance and exercise—in addition to calcium intake—have all been found to affect the condition.

While calcium rich dairy products are a necessary part of a balanced diet at any age, when it comes to preventing osteoporosis, they may have their most critical effect early in life.

A study conducted recently at the University of Pittsburgh measured the density of certain bones in middle-aged women and found that those who drank milk with every meal up until the age of 35 had significantly more minerals in their bones than those who rarely drank it.

The study emphasizes the fact that bones reach their lifetime peak for mineral density during early adulthood and then start to deteriorate.

The peak mineral density is determined partly by genetics but the amount of milk a person drinks during the first 2-30 years is believed to determine whether a person's bones attain optimum density.

Whether or not a woman chooses to buy special calcium-fortified foods, probably the best thing she can do for herself and her children is to make sure they get plenty of milk and other dairy products.

**Sodium Label Regulations Take Effect in July**  
Consumers should find it a little easier to cut back on sodium in their diets, thanks to a new Food and Drug Administration (FDA) regulation.

Beginning July 1, 1986, the FDA will require that the sodium content be shown on any food that provides nutrition information on the label.

The regulation should be of real help to people who

are concerned about the hidden sources of sodium in processed foods.

Sodium content will be listed in milligrams per serving.

Consumers can use that information to see if they are staying within the recommended sodium intake of 1,100 to 3,300 milligrams a day.

In addition, the FDA has defined the various terms that manufacturers may use to describe the sodium content of their products.

These terms include:  
- "Sodium Free" -- less than 5 milligrams of sodium in each serving.

- "Very Low Sodium" -- 35 milligrams or less in a serving.

- "Low Sodium" -- 140 milligrams or less per serving.

- "Reduced Sodium" -- the usual level of sodium for this product has been reduced by at least 75 percent.

Sodium conscious consumers should keep in mind that a product with little or no salt is not necessarily sodium free since at least 70 sodium compounds, such as monosodium glutamate or sodium bicarbonate, are used in processed foods.

An FDA survey shows about half the food products available would already qualify as being "low-sodium" products.

Among these foods are hot and cold cereals, fresh meats and poultry, some fish, frozen vegetables, and some desserts and snacks.

## How to Be Sure That Your House Plants, Garden & Landscape Will Survive Your Vacation

No one can entirely take your place when it comes to giving tender loving care to your beloved and precious plants.

However, by making proper arrangements with someone who has your best interests at heart, well in advance of the day you leave on your vacation, the deprivation suffered by your plants in your absence can be minimized.

There is no questioning the wisdom of having a very responsible person take over the chores of irrigating the gardens and lawn and watering individual house plants.

Some people are lucky enough to have an attentive neighbor who is both a good friend and a competent plant care person.

However, do not assume that your neighbor will apply the right amount of water at the correct time.

If you are so fortunate as to have a friend who is willing to care for all your indoor and outdoor plants, but refuses to accept payment for services, then it would be considerate of you to offer to carry the potted plants that can be easily moved over to your friend's house.

You may decide to have someone who is familiar with your plants and how you care for them take the responsibility of their care in your absence.

It is also probably a good idea to hire a competent lawn care service to mow the grass while you are gone and pay to have it done properly.

You might find a young person in your neighborhood, who you know to be considerate of others, reasonably bright and capable of following closely your clearly written and spoken directions.

This person would be a good choice for tending to your plants.

At least a week in advance of your departure on vacation, write carefully worded instructions on the exact procedures that you wish to have carried out while you are gone.

A day or two before you leave have the person who will care for your plants come to your home and go through the procedures that

you have written down in detail.

This way the person will feel confident that he or she is doing what you want to be done and exactly how you want it to be done while you are away.

Specify how much water should be applied or how long the hose should be allowed to run on special plants that are in containers, any special plants that take more water than

others, and trees that you want to have receive an extra quantity of water.

If it does not rain, your garden will require two to three inches of water per week applied in at least two irrigations.

One inch of water is equivalent to 62 gallons per 100 square feet.

Before you leave your landscape be sure that all the weeds are pulled, that the beds are mulched and

all spent flowers and declining foliage are removed.

Apply controls for insects and disease before you leave town.

This will keep your plants in better health by reducing competition from weeds, keeping the plants' vegetation healthy and conserving soil moisture.

The time and effort that you have spent in planning for the care of your garden landscape while you are gone will make your homecoming much more pleasant and gardening for the rest of the season much more rewarding.

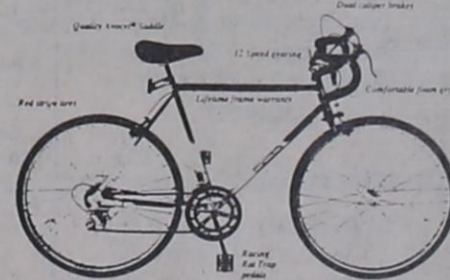

## Acraege Reports Now Being Accepted

The Garza County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service is currently accepting acreage reports for 1986 planted, diverted, idled and other farm program acres.

The final reporting date is July 15, according to ASCS official Victor Ashley.

Farmers who meet this deadline will avoid paying a late reporting fee. To date, very few farms are certified and only two weeks remain to certify.

"Before program participants can receive the benefits of price support, deficiency payments and other benefits, the entire farm must be certified correctly," Ashley said.

Program participants are required to report crops and acreages planted and the uses to be made of these crops, acreage conservation reserve or idled cropland, and acres diverted for payment.

He said that producers not participating in the 1986 programs should report their crops to insure future benefits and to protect acreage bases.

After farmers report their acres, the ASCS County Office will select farms at random to verify that acreage reports are accurate.

"Certification is particularly important to producers of quota crops such as peanuts. In addition to these crops, however, all other crop acreages must

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## Fire Ant Battle Continues

The battle against the imported fire ant rages on--and it's an uphill battle.

With earlier visions of eradication fading, the battle seems to be one of containment.

The pest, brought in from South America, now infests some 115 Texas counties.

Its sting has a burning sensation and can be serious to hypersensitive people.

Control products are abundant, says an entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, and include mound treatments, baits and, of course, home remedies.

All work differently and vary in cost, so an individual planning to do battle with fire ants should first evaluate the situation.

To eliminate the pests, control must be intensive and will be costly. If a reduction of mounds is the objective, a broadcast bait likely will do the job.

Products containing carbaryl, chlorpyrifos, diazinon, isofenfos, propoxur or resmethrin can be used for spot treatments in and around the home as well as to establish a barrier around areas such as gardens and patios.

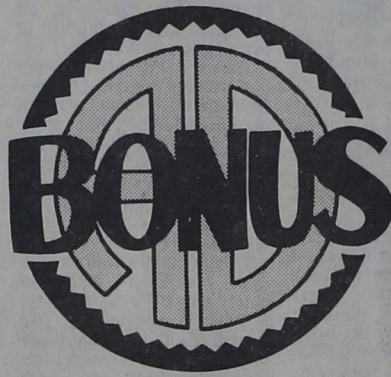
