Hospital . Board Reviews Plans

The Garza County Hospital Board of Directors came to an agreement with the Center for Organ Retrieval and Transplantation at their regular meeting Thursday, July 10.

The purpose of this agreement is to facilitate the referral of potential organ donors to The Center for Organ Retrieval and Transplantation (CORT) which is operating from Lubbock General Hospital and Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center.

CORT will provide professional education about organ donation and transplantation without charge to the hospital at their request.

This education will include, but not be limited to a comprehensive written manuel explaning the policies and procedures of CORT and in-service programs to professional staff members.

CORT will provide 24 hour consultation and technical support to the hospital for questions and referrals per-

taining to organ donation.
Garza County Hospital
agrees to provide documentation requested by CORT, including copies of some sections of the patient's medical record and a detailed itemized bill for the costs of organ acquisition.

Revenues Pinch City Budget

Sixtieth Year, Number 7

The Post City Council reviewed, studied, discussed and struggled over the fiscal year 1987 budget during a work session Monday night, finally turning off the lights at city hall at 12:45 a.m.

Working with a projected drop in revenues from oil trend. and sales tax rebates, the council scrutinized the budget worksheets from top to bottom, suggesting spending cuts as well as adjustments in fees and water rates.

A major change proposed by the council would be to raise sanitation fees so that the service would be self supporting. The new fees would be increased for residential customers from \$4.25 to \$5.30 per month, commerical from \$12.75 to \$16 and similar increases for industrial as well as residential and commerical users outside of the city limits.

City manager Bill Pool told the council that the appraisal district has listed the uncertified appraised value for tax purposes at \$99,906,622.

The council did not get into a tax rate increase during the session, opting to look at raising revenue from other sources as well as trimming the expenses.

The projected loss in revenue from the oil occupation tax is listed as \$64,000 and loss in oil royalties to the city is expected to be down from \$60,000 this year to \$36,000.

An extensive discussion was held concerning water rates, but no decisions were made.

Council members agreed that the water rates have historically been too low, and that the water department would have to "pay its own way."

"For too many years we have relied on oil revenue to offset the costs of our services, including water," council member Larry Mills "and now emphasized, we're just going to have to pay the price."

In previous years water and sewer service have been subsidized by the general revenue fund by as much as 50 percent.

Pool told the council that the working budget was prepared with a 40 percent decline in sales tax rebate estimated.

He based the estimate on the recent sales tax rebate

The budget includes a proposed 3.5 percent increase in pay for city

employees. Other spending categories are either projected flat, decreased or slight in-

creases. The council decided to raise the motel occupancy tax rate to the state allowable seven percent, after hearing from an interested group of citizens attending the meeting.

The motel occupancy tax revenue may only be used to promote tourism.

The discussion on water prompted council member Maxine Earl to repeat her call for a revenue bond to repair and replace water mains and "get our water distribution problems taken care of at one time."

She also called for the





Why a Texas Main Street Project?

In most of our smaller Texas cities downtowns are in a serious state of decline. The automobile, suburban housing and the growth of local and regional shopping centers and malls have greatly reduced the traditional role of the small town as the principal center of economic activity.

Post is a prime example of this trend. Sales tax rebates are declining and something has to be done to stop the deterioration.

Many government programs, such as urban renewal and various city beautification programs, have failed to half the decline.

In the last five years, a new philosophy for revitalizing central business districts has evolved. The concept is simple: rehabilitate existing structures, capitalize on the unique character of the buildings, and couple that with developing progressive marketing and management techniques.

Preservation and rehabilitation of the historic commercial buildings in the central business district provide the necessary image for the downtown area and serve as a unifying factor to encourage area merchants and building owners to reinvest in the downtown.

While this historic image

establish the tone for the revitalization effort, a commitment to a full time project manager and utilizing progressive marketing and management techniques are critical elements in the Texas Main Street concept.

The Texas Main Street Project of the Texas Historical Commission works to bring this proven downtown revitalization approach to towns across the state. Each year the project accepts applications for official designation to the program from cities with populations under 50,000.

Five cities are selected annually. The Post Chamber of Commerce and Post Merchants' Association, through the Main Street Committee, is committed to securing official designation this year. The application will be submitted in August.

The selected cities are required to fund for three years a full time project manager, who is employed by the city and reports to the city manager. In turn, the Texas Main Street Project is pledged to work with each of these communities for three years, providing start-up assistance and developing more local initiative and expertise in the second and third years.

Training and supervision of the local project manager is provided, along with professional assistance and supervision in design, restoration, marketing, display, parking and other areas where the community does not have local expertise.

Historical Commission has developed a cooperative effort with 12 other state agencies to work with the Main Street cities. The Texas Tourist Development Commission, the Governor's Budget and Planning Office and the Texas Department of Community Affairs play ongoing and vital parts in the training of the project managers and in providing technical assistance to the cities.

In the first four years of the Texas Main Street Project, more than \$74 million in private money was reinvested in the downtowns of the official and self-initiated Main Street cities, none of this money was from tax revenue.

The strictly private reinvestment in the central business districts also saw 721 new businesses coming to these cities' downtowns.

These figures indicate that the Main Street concept of economic development within the context of historic preservation works.

It is the aim of the Texas Main Street Project to have many Texas towns follow the successful model in the Main Street network and take a renewed interest in the revitalization of their downtowns.


