# Brownd resigns, interviews are set for three applicants

School trustees Tuesday night accepted the resignation of Jackie Brownd as athletic director and head football coach effective March 25 and immediately agreed on plans to interview three applicants from out-

side the Post school system next week for the vacancy. The board tabled consideration of 1979-80 teacher contracts until a special meeting March 27 and called another special session for interviewing the three ath-

letic director applicants next Tuesday night. Coach Brownd in three seasons at the Antelopes football helm has had two winning football teams including the 1976 district co-champs who went on to

thump Stamford 42 to 12 to grab bi-district honors before losing to Ozona in the regional round of the post-season playoffs. His overall three year record was 19 victories and 11 defeats with most of the

losses coming in the 1978 campaign when the Lopes won twice against district foes and lost the other eight. Brownd's 1977 team finished 8-2 just behind Slaton and Tahoka which tied for district honors.

Brownd's letter of resignation to the board gave no hint of his future plans. "Please accept this letter as my resignation of the position of athletic director of Post Independent School district effective March 25, 1979," Brownd wrote.

"I would like to thank the faculty, administration and school board for the support given to the athletic program the past three years.

"It has been a real pleasure working with the youth in Post. I sincerely wish them every success in the future."

Brownd had told high school athletes here of his resignation late last week. His letter was dated March 6. The March 25 date of the resignation coincides with the completion of the third year of his contract.

Brownd will remain in the Post system the remainder of the school year as trustees authorized his employment to fill the teaching vacancy which will be left by the accepted resignation of Coach Mickey Long effective April 1. Long is entering private business.

School trustees cleared their agenda and then went into executive session of over 90 minutes for what board president, Jack Lott, said was "a discussion of teacher contracts."

In answer to The Dispatch's questions after trustees reopened the meeting to The Dispatch and observers Mike Flanigan, Mary Ann Gordon and Royce Hart, Lott announced the board's plans for the interviewing of three applicants for the athletic directorship and head football coach March 20.

He said the board might at that meeting hire Brownd's replacement depending upon board thinking after the interviews.

After the executive session, trustees voted unanimously to accept the resignation of Warren Hart, an elementary teacher who is completing his first year here. Hart is leaving Post to move to Austin, a board member said.

The board also accepted the resignation of Mrs. Renee Long, Coach Long's wife, effective April 20 and named Mrs. Kathleen Fluit to fill that vacancy for the remainder of the school year.

In the only other major items of business, trustees decided to send the two Pritchard and Abbott contracts to their attorney for his recommended changes, See Coach resigns, Page 12

The breakfast will be catered by Jackson's Cafeteria.

Frank (Chief) Runkles, who is in charge of the Taba'na Yuan'e ceremony has also told The Dispatch the program is being enlarged this year.

Runkles said two members of the nationally known Quahadi Indian Dancers from Amarillo will appear on the program and perform some of their authentic Indian dances.

Assisting Runkles too will be Frank Chaves and Joe Hays, two young people who are students of Indian dances and culture and Frank's two grandchildren.

### 3 contests on school ballot

Post dentist Charles McCook has filed for position 1 on the Post Independent School District's board of trustees to make the third contest in the April 7 school election.

McCook filed Wednesday afternoon shortly before the filing deadline. He opposes

incumbent Charles Morris.

Mrs. Maxine Marks filed for city council last Wednesday to provide one candidate for each of the three positions on the ballot. She is seeking a second term.

Mayor Giles McCrary and Councilman Bill Pool are the other two in the uncontested races.

Of course, a write-in campaign is possible, but not logical unless something unusual happens.

As for the hospital board elections, at press time Wednesday noon, Jack Alexander, board chairman, was the only candidate for the three open board positions.

Hospital Administrator Ed Zintgraff said at least two other persons have taken out filing papers. The deadline for filing in this race is today (Thursday).

The lineup for the four school board positions are as follows:

Position 1: Charles Morris, incumbent, and McCook.

Position 2: Mrs. Mary Ann Gordon, incumbent Wanda Mitchell and Mrs. Juanelle Hays.

Position 3: Jack Lott, incumbent.

Position 6: Mike Flanigan and Jay Pollard.

### County changes election rules

The Garza County Commissioners Court Monday changed its rules on the upcoming senior advocate election after agreeing with C.K. (Pee Wee) Pierce the first rules would replace her constitutional rights.

Some 24 senior citizens appeared at the commissioners court session which was moved into the district courtroom so everybody could sit down.

Mrs. Pierce, who is librarian of the Post Public Library, explained she

would lose her vote March 21 for the scheduled "one hour election" because she would be out of town at the time attending a library workshop.

The court then voted to change the election hours from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. and to

allow absentee voting in advance of next Wednesday. They set absentee voting to begin March 14 and end next Tuesday, March 20.

Mrs. Ruby Kirkpatrick, who heads the Algerita Senior Citizens Center board, left a statement with the court reporting the center's advisory board recommends the reappointment of Mrs. Maxine Marks as senior advocate.

She did not read the statement because she said she wanted to avoid controversy and hard feelings.

In keeping with the changes, the court authorized a new election notice to be published in today's Dispatch.

The election is under the control of the county which will provide both a judge and a clerk.

Members of the court said they originally set the single hour of voting with the idea that as soon as the senior citizens luncheon was over in the center, those attending could vote before leaving.

Mrs. Marks, who was the first senior advocate and got the aged program rolling here, announced Wednesday she has withdrawn her name from the nominees. She said (See Sr. advocate, Page 12)

FOR NEW AMBULANCE—

### EMTs will give pay

The emergency medical technicians who operate the city-county ambulance service are going to make a good case a few months from now when they ask the city and county to buy a new ambulance.

They voted unanimously recently to donate all the part-time pay they receive for making ambulance runs until they have accumulated \$3,000 to apply on the

purchase of a new vehicle.

Hospital Administrator Ed Zintgraff, who heads the EMT program and administers the ambulance service, told hospital directors about it last Thursday at the directors March breakfast meeting at the hospital.

EMT personnel receive \$10 each per call for an in-county ambulance run and \$15 for a run to Lubbock.

Zintgraff told directors that city and county will be asked to pay the difference on an up-to-the-minute emergency vehicle between the estimated \$18,000 purchase price and the trade-in of the service's 1974 model green ambulance which they acquired from the Hudman Funeral Home plus the \$3,000 in donated EMT pay.

The ambulance to be traded in is not large enough for all the necessary equipment now required, directors were told.

The four-wheel drive, 1974 model ambulance purchased at the time the city-county began would be kept as a backup ambulance.

Zintgraff said EMTs voted unanimously to donate their own pay for the cause.

The hospital administrator also reported that Medicare inspectors had recently conducted a re-evaluation to check on deficien-

cies found in the 1978 inspection and gave the hospital a clean bill. The only deficiency yet to be taken off is the rewriting of hospital bylaws and the initiative already has begun on this.

"Medicare won't be back to see us until December," Zintgraff told the board.

During February, the hospital admitted 57 patients for a total of 217 patient days, average patient stay of 3.8 days, to give the hospital an occupancy rate for the month of 7.1 patients per day.

Eight babies were born during February and 187 outpatients were treated, according to the hospital (See Hospital, Page 12)

NO LAND IN SIGHT FOR POST MEN AS—

### Engine 'explodes' on flight home

By NORMA BAUMANN Ten local men from the First Baptist Church have quite a tale to tell besides their spiritual experience in St. Kitts Island.

When the group was returning home Sunday, their four-engine plane had one engine to "literally explode," with oil flying

everywhere and no land in sight. After making an emergency landing at St. Croix, they were divided into two groups and were reunited in San Juan for their flight back to Lubbock.

Rev. Glenn Reece, Tom Lewis, Bo Jackson, Dwayne Capps, Joe E. Basinger, Homer Cawthon, Don Smith,

Bobby Waters, Steve McMeans and Jimmy Stringer, accompanied by Rev. Joe Stansel of Snyder and Owen Leach of Lubbock left Post Sunday, March 4 following a send off service and lunch at the church, for the Lubbock airport. They departed for San Juan via Dallas and Atlanta and then by small

plane to Basseterre St. Kitts Island, a small British Island in the Caribbean.

The island's population is made up of 50,000 with 20,000 living in Basseterre. The city is made up of all black people who speak British English.

The group was met at St. Kitts airport by local

pastors and then divided into three groups and sent to three different locations on the island.

The men conducted street services, revival services in churches and did house to house evangelism as well as hand out tracts and talked to people in the streets.

### 2 more Garza sites on National Register

Cooper's Canyon, five miles south of Post, and the Post-Montgomery site, west of Post, have both been officially listed in the National Register of Historic Places as of Nov. 7, 1978. The Dispatch was notified Wednesday by the Texas Historical Commission.

Both had been nominated for the listing by the Texas Historical Commission.

The two are among approximately 575 Texas sites of archeological, historical or architectural significance which have been included in the National Register under the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966.

Two others in Post are the Algerita hotel building downtown and the old Post Sanitarium which now is undergoing exterior renovation and preservation under direction of the Garza Museum Association.

The Texas Historical Commission noted in its release to The Dispatch that Cooper's Canyon saw a long and relatively continuous occupation from prehistoric times to the 1920s. Archeologists believe the site will reveal valuable data about early man as well as details of the Anglo-American settlement of Garza County in the 19th century.

(Continued From Page One) and heard a Justiceburg delegation ask for a long term lease on the former Justiceburg school.

Weldon Reed, spokesman for the Justiceburg group of ten, told the board that he was "unaware until recently that we didn't have a community center."

He said he did not understand why the school district had not deeded the school building to the Justiceburg community for such a center after the Justiceburg school district consolidated with the Post district several years ago as had been agreed.

Trustee John Boren explained the board's attorney had discovered that the state law had been changed between the time Post had consolidated with Graham and when it consolidated with Justiceburg.

The change required the school district to hold a public auction for the sale of any such surplus property and prevented the Post district from giving the

building to Justiceburg.

The Justiceburg community was given a lease on the building for "a dollar a year."

Boards change as new trustees are elected, Reed pointed out, and Justiceburg is afraid some day it might find it could no longer use the building.

He asked if a long term lease could be agreed upon. Post trustees said they would get an answer from their attorney on the legality of the request and certainly would like to work it out with the Justiceburg community.

In other actions the board approved the 1979 textbook committee report, authorized, approved two short-term school district investments totaling \$475,000, received a note of appreciation from Mrs. Anita Tidwell on behalf of the Post Satellite School for their newly remodeled quarters in the former Teen Town building on West 10th, and decided to ask for a list of all tax delinquent taxpayers for the last two years to check over.

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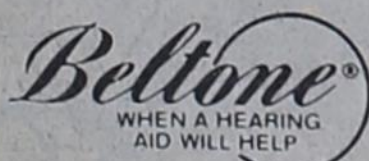

Site, west of Post, according to the Texas Historical Commission contains archaeological evidence of two very different environments. The location offered early occupants access to two distinct regions, the Llano Estacado and the Rolling Plains.

Further investigation of the site could reveal valuable data about Post-Archaic and Paleo-Indian occupation and their respective adaptations to changing environments, the Commission story said.

The National Register is a nationwide inventory of historic properties considered to be worthy of preservation for their cultural and historical values.

This designation does not infringe upon the private property's rights of the site owners. It does offer a measure of protection from disturbance in any federally-funded or licensed project such as highway or reservoir construction.

National Register properties also are eligible for financial assistance through the grant-in-aid program. Such funds can be used for acquisition, preservation, or restoration of the sites.
