

One school race goes to runoff

Discipline was the key issue here Saturday in three contested school board races as Charles McCook and Mike Flanigan who stressed it were elected as new trustees and Mrs. Juanelia Hays with a similar view led incumbent Wanda Mitchell into a runoff four weeks hence.

McCook defeated Charles Morris, incumbent, 267 to 157 for position one, and Flanigan downed Jay Polard, 255 to 165, for position 6.

Mrs. Hays led Mrs. Mitchell into a Saturday, May 5, runoff for position two, 170 votes to 145. Mrs. Mary Ann Gordon, also a discipline advocate, received 71 votes in the three-woman race.

DeWayne Capps also polled 20 write-in cast for this position. Mrs. Hays needed 214 votes to win outright with a majority.

Jack Lott, incumbent and current president of the board, was unopposed for a second term in position three. He polled 331 votes with eight persons receiving write-in votes for the position.

A total of 439 votes were cast, more than 100 votes under the 540 cast last year when a record-tying field of 11 candidates were on the ballot for three board positions and all three races went into runoffs.

The 1978 campaign followed a record-size community turnout to discuss the teenage drug problem and then a confrontation on discipline with school trustees.

Spacing four weeks between the spring election and the runoff was necessary, the board concluded, to meet state election requirements for absentee voting, etc.

Trustees, after swearing in new board members Mike Flanigan and Charles McCook and board president Jack Lott for a second term, decided to delay electing board officers for the new year until the May meeting which the runoff winner will attend.

In other actions, trustees authorized the sale of 1965 and 1966 pickups via bidding, postponed decision on the school calendar for the 1979-80 school year, and set July 12 for the district's equalization board session.

Equalization board members were selected but will not be announced until acceptance of the assignments.

It was a frustrating evening for the council — and a long one too, as the session didn't break up until after midnight.

Last year 514 votes also were cast in the triple runoff.

Most votes cast in a school election here came in 1976 when 847 voters went to the

polls to replace three school trustees to express their displeasure at the board's authorization of a full-time tennis coach over the opposition of then Athletic Director Bobby Davis.

Only a third of the voters who participated in the school district election Saturday participated in the municipal and hospital district elections neither of (See Elections, Page 12)

Hospital agrees to settle TV court suit for \$5,250

Garza Memorial Hospital directors last Thursday morning agreed unanimously to settle Continental Television's \$11,000 plus suit against the hospital out of court for \$5,250 with Continental TV paying all federal court costs.

The settlement was arranged by an attorney employed by the hospital board to recommend action

in the case. The suit grew out of the hospital breaking a 1975 contract in which the television firm leased rental TV sets to the hospital for patient's use. The hospital's action was taken after it found the television's firm repair procedure on the sets very unsatisfactory.

In another major action at the April breakfast meeting

at the hospital, directors tabled for study the request of Health Sciences Center Hospital in Lubbock for the Garza County hospital district to pay a \$1,400 bill to the Lubbock hospital because the patient involved was a "Garza indigent."

While the special state law creating the Garza hospital district provides that the (See Hospital, Page 12)

None of the reasons given in that law is "to cool down an angry sheriff."

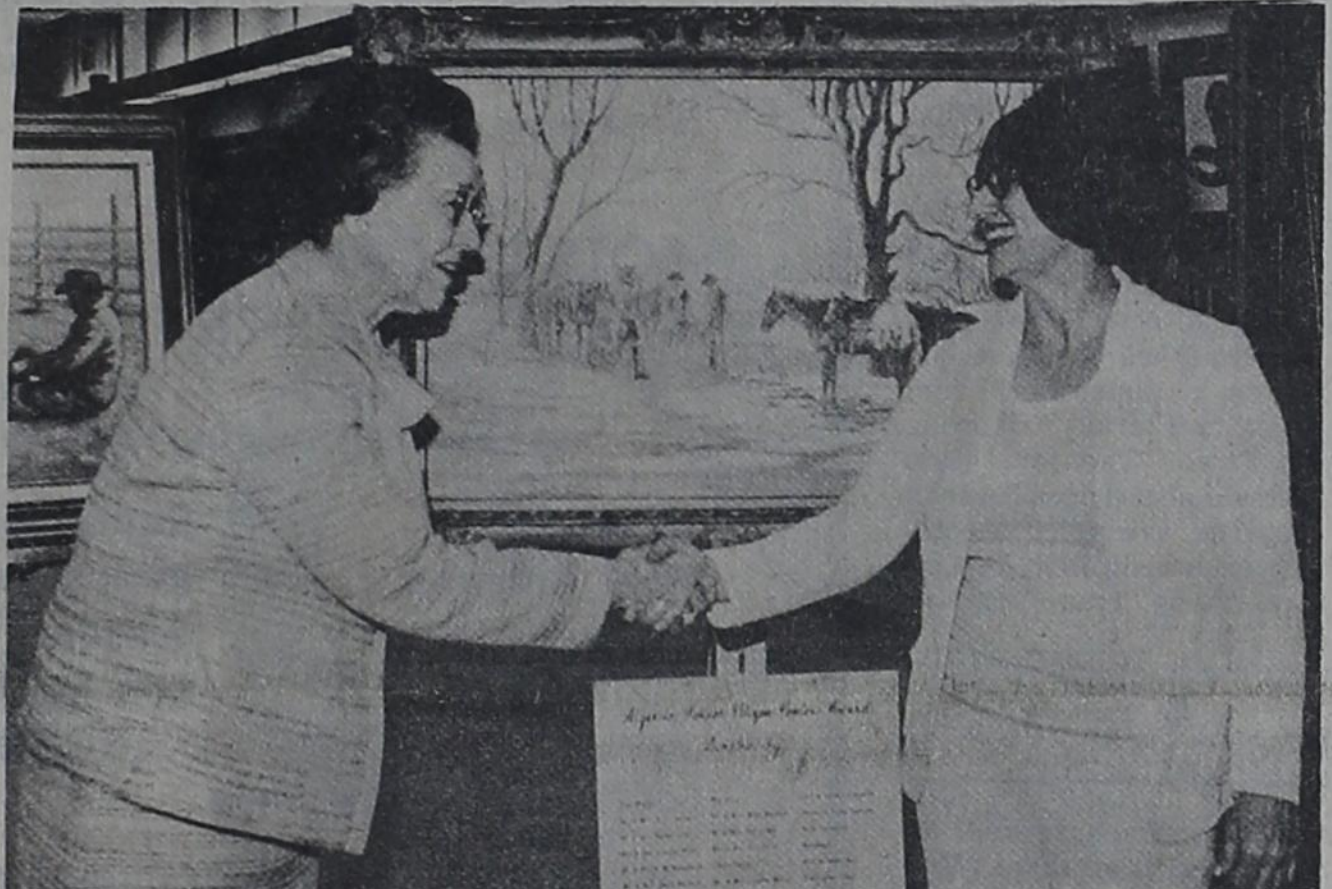
Certainly there was nothing to gain except maybe the saving of some embarrassment in closing the doors while the council and the sheriff "talked it out."

Sheriff, council in another hassle

Sheriff Jim Pippin jolted the city council Monday night at a joint meeting of the city council and the county commissioners court in the Post Public Library when he proposed the city take over its own law enforcement again.

The sheriff, obviously angry but speaking so low he was hard to understand, said he would be defeated for reelection if he enforced unpopular city ordinances and that anyway the state jail commission was going to require him to put a recreation room in the county jail and he wouldn't have room to handle city prisoners.

Mayor Giles McCrary immediately declared "an executive session on personnel matters" and the court and council discussed the matter with Pippin for 45 minutes after The Dispatch reporter and eight to ten onlookers were required to leave the library.

Sheriff Pippin told The Dispatch when he left that the joint law enforcement committee of city and county, comprised of two councilmen and two commissioners, were scheduled to meet with him Monday morning to "thrash out a few things."

When the doors to the library were opened again Mayor McCrary said "no action had been taken."

It was a frustrating evening for the council — and a long one too, as the session didn't break up until after midnight.

J. R. Johnson, director of the county affairs division, reported the financial outlook bleak for operation of the city-county park and swimming pool this summer. The county proposed both city and county contribute equally in funds to the park board after the two sides got in a friendly argument as to whether present contributions were equal.

There was bad news too about the cost of resealing the city-county airport runways. An engineer's estimate showed \$40,050 would be needed. Contact will be made with the Texas Aeronautics Commission to see if state aid would be available for the project matter in 1979 or 1980.

After County Judge Giles Dalby and Commissioner Ted Aten departed, the city council had quite a discussion on enforcement of its livestock ordinance.

Seven persons who kept a variety of animals in the city were present to inquire as to any violations. They were told they must abide by keeping the animals up and keeping larger animals over 300 feet from the nearest dwelling because of the fly and smell problems.

The council was asked why it planned to enforce the livestock ordinance while permitting dogs to roam loose in violation of the dog ordinance.

Council members commented the city dog catcher is still behind but had caught 41 stray dogs and 21 stray cats in March. The council said it might consider returning to a dog bounty again.

City Manager Pete Maddox was asked to check points of complaints and write up citations to be served on violators. The council also discussed employing an inspector to enforce city ordinances and write up citations on those not in compliance. The council was advised by its attorney that an inspector would have no arrest rights without regular law training, but could prepare the citations.

The livestock ordinance currently provides up to a \$200 fine for violations. The council was advised (See City Council, Page 12)

Not a bad idea

Before Saturday's spring elections, the proposal was made that the city, school board and hospital district elections all be held at one location to especially help the older voters.

County Judge Giles Dalby advised that approval from the U.S. attorney general would be required because Texas is still one of the states which can't do anything which concerns voting without a federal okay. Known as the voting rights law, it was one of the last civil rights laws adopted to be sure that minorities would get a fair shake.

Sponsors of the idea checked the three units of government and only heard back from one of them, so the plan died there, an election egg never hatched.

The plan isn't a bad idea at all providing the combined election would be held at the community center which has ample facilities to handle it. Of course, we couldn't hold an Easter Art Show and an election in the center at the same time.

There are two good arguments in favor of the plan.

First, it would help the senior citizens as there would be only one trip to make instead of three.

Second, and just as important, it would encourage voters to participate in all three elections.

Obviously, they didn't do that Saturday when 443 cast ballots in a contested election at the high school library and something like only 157 of them bothered to go downtown and vote for hospital directors and city officials, which did not involve contests but did attract small write-in campaigns in the city races.

The city council, hospital directors, and school trustees ought to take a look at the plan in the weeks ahead. If they all agree to give it a try, ample time would be available to secure approval from the Great White Father in Washington.

Unsatisfactory ending

There is an unsatisfactory ending to the death of Johnnie Carter — who recently was found fatally shot in his jail cell in Crosbyton during his murder trial — which all area newspaper editors should give their attention.

The unsatisfactory ending to which we refer is that if any conclusion is reached on whether Johnnie shot himself or somebody else killed him and-or how that gun got in his cell, it's going to be kept as far from the public as possible.

The Texas Rangers recently told the Ralls Banner that no written report would be made on this unusual death. The Ralls editor was told that any information the Rangers had would be given the district attorney and the justice of the peace. That would be as far as it goes.

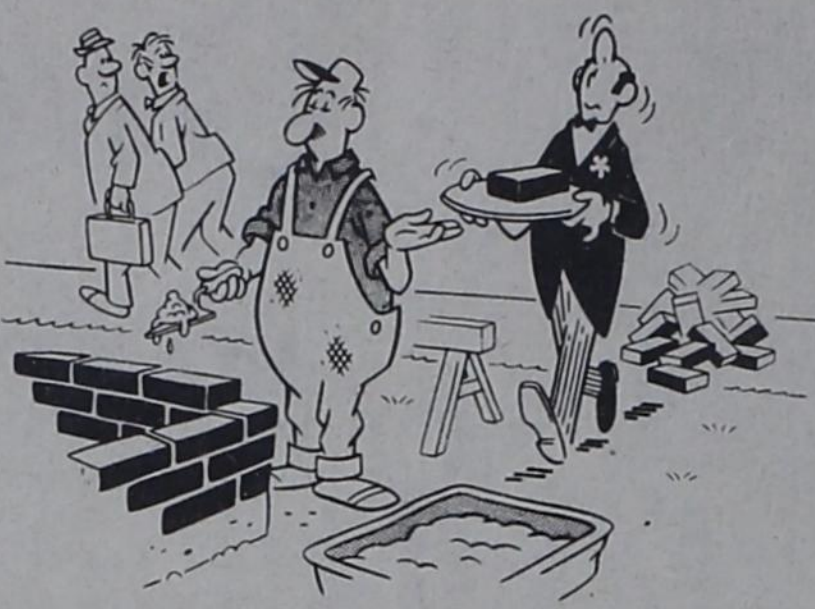
It seems to us a Crosby County grand jury ought to look into the matter so the public would at least be informed as to what happened. Obviously, somebody was at fault

and unless a proper investigation is made the fault is going to be "hushed up."

According to what the Texas Rangers told The Banner as of Tuesday last week, the DPS lab still hadn't reported on what had been sent to them for examination in the case.

Now we wonder this: Maybe somebody thinks as a matter of policy the best way to cool off a disagreeable investigation is to sit still three or four weeks "waiting on lab reports from Austin" while the clamor from newspapers and public dies down as interest turns to something else and the unfinished investigation is left to be shoved deep into the file.

If this is the tactical approach, the newspapers must shoot it down hard by being persistent and staying with "followup stories" just as the Ralls Banner is doing now.

Water bill now sought

Preston Lewis of Lubbock public relations director of Water Incorporated, told Post Rotarians Tuesday noon he is hopeful the current Texas Legislature will pass a new law to create a national water district and thus a legal importing authority.

"We're not ready yet to activate such a district," he said. He reported Arkansas has 43 million acre feet of surplus water annually and the high plains of West Texas and New Mexico need to move only six to eight million acre feet in annually to maintain the current level of irrigated agricultural production in this region.

He said all western states are looking "with skepticism and animosity" on President Carter's water policies. Lewis said the current energy shortage is one of the serious difficulties now facing any water importation plan.

In answer to a question, he said no one has a current estimate on the cost of imported water per acre foot. But he then said the cost of a canal network to do so would be between \$12 and \$15 billion.

The \$1,400 payment request from Health Sciences Center hospital involves a 24-year-old Post man who has been receiving treatment for cancer at the Lubbock facility and also was referred back to that hospital for treatment after being examined at the state's M.D. Anderson cancer hospital in Houston.

Unable to work, the man who has a wife and child is now drawing social security checks but must wait for a year to become eligible for Medicare as hospital officials understand it.

Hospital directors also took note of the fact that an application was not made to the Garza Hospital for indigent care prior to treatment but now is being made after the treatment.

The board instructed Administrator Ed Zintgraff to look into the matter of indigent guidelines for adoption by the board and to present them at the May board meeting.

Action then will be taken on the Health Sciences Center bill after guidelines have been adopted.

Alexander pointed out that as he understand the definition of indigent, the person must be totally without income and this applies neither to those on social security or welfare.

He emphasized though that the hospital wants to accept its fair indigent responsibilities.

In a third action, the board approved a few changes in the bylaws of the medical staff as required by Medicare. The changes already had been approved by the medical staff.

Administrator Zintgraff reported the hospital had had a good operational month in March with a total of 78 patients admitted for an average hospital stay of four days with 10.2 patients per day the average for the month, well above the 6.8 patients per day average for the fiscal year to date.

Eleven babies were born in the hospital in March to bring to 40 the number born in the first six months of the fiscal year.

A total of 190 outpatients were treated. The hospital collected \$28,075.28 on its accounts receivable for the month with March expenses totaling \$53,878.49.






