First National Pays Dividend

as a means of catching up with their behind-schedule activities. Other than causing a couple to four days' delay in gathering activities, the 1-inch wet snow had little effect on farming operations and on cotton production in particular.

One farm expert said the 'teen weather which accompanied the snow aided in ripening of a crop which had been especially slow this year to mature. He said the green bell problem should disappear.

Meantime, a check by the Journals and by the Bailey County Electric Cooperative revealed that 58,044 bales of cotton had been pushed through Bailey county's 21 gins as of mid-week, the customary checking time for operations.

The 16 gins served by the electric cooperative tallied 44,707, the balance coming from the five gins in the county not served by BECC.

One ginner said Saturday he believed farmers could return to harvesting operations by Wednesday if more snow or rain did not fall during the weekend.

Meantime, grain sorghum crop, a "very fine one this year," as one expert put it, is in the bins at the elevators and most of the soil has been prepared for preliminary operations of the 1966 crop year. All vegetables have been harvested, and one of the features of that phase of agriculture here was the splendid carrot crop just winding up. A turnout of \$175 per acre was not uncommon.

The entire South Plains cotton harvest was at its peak until halted by rains in some areas a week ago, and the general snow, first for the season, at midweek.

Volume of cotton classed at the three South Plains USDA classing offices was the highest for any week this season, the three classing 354,600 samples during the week ended Dec. 10, bringing the season's total to 975,600. At this date last year, the three classing offices had classed 875,100 samples of the 1964 crop.

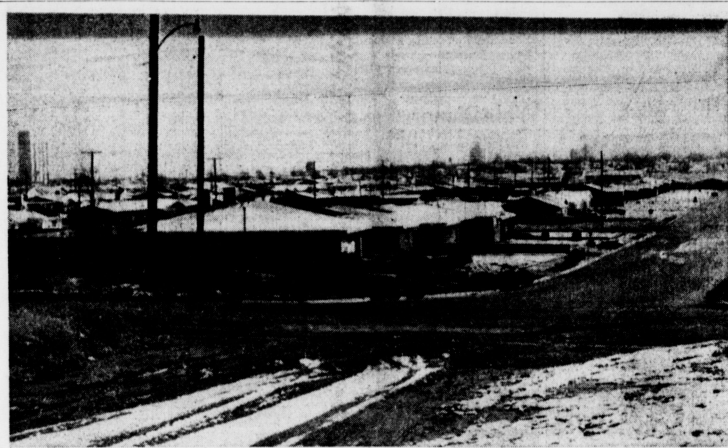

Transfers Bring 20 to 30 Cents

If Bailey county plants, has many acres as usual next spring to its principal money crop — cotton — it will do so only because Bailey county farmers "buy" released acreages from other counties.

And if they buy other counties' allotments, they will pay clearly for the privilege, from all indications.

Reports here are that Bailey county farmers who buy paying from 20 to 30 cents per pound of lint for the transfer privilege.

Already, a number of farmers in this county have "bought" outside counties' acreages, says Charles Daniel, ASCS county manager. "We already have on record a number of such sales."

he said, "but the price is not revealed; we have no way of knowing how much Bailey county cotton growers are paying for these transferred allotments."

He explained that the acreage bought only from counties that voted in a statewide referendum earlier this winter to "release" cotton acreages if farmers so desire. Daniel said such a county was Limestone county; already farmers have bought acreages from that county, records at the ASCS office will show.

Daniel said the county's allotment of 95,200 acres is down sharply from 1965, and farmers are getting from 12 1/2 percent to as much as 35 percent less for 1966. Thus the intense interest in the "bought" allotments from other counties.

Daniel said that the farmer who buys out-of-county allotments does so on the basis of the yield history of the county from which the land is transferred. (See TRANSFERS, Page 5)

No Fatal Crash In County, DPS Report Shows

With the year heading into its final two weeks, Bailey county may wind up 1965 with no traffic deaths if caution is observed for the balance of the year, said St. Thurman Keffer.

The sergeant reviewed the year and came up with a crash record of 35. Thirty-one persons have been injured so far, and property damage has run to the staggering figure of \$43,870, the sergeant said. Fortunately, none of the 55 accidents resulted in a highway death.

During November, only one rural accident was investigated, resulting in one person injured and a property damage of \$800. Other area reports for November showed these figures: Cochran county, three accidents, three injured and \$1415 in damage. Hale county, 29 accidents, three deaths, 31 injured and property damage of \$22,756. Hockley county, 10 accidents, nine persons injured and \$13,400 in property damage. (See REPORT, Page 5)

Elizabeth Watson, curriculum director of the Muleshoe Schools, attended a "Seminar of Learning Difficulties" at St. Christopher's School in Lubbock last Friday and Saturday.

Dr. Dale Bryant, PHD Executive Director and Psychologist of the Albany Study Center for Learning Difficulties, was the principal lecturer. Dr. Bryant gave several principles of remedial instruction for dyslexia severe disability in word recognition.

Principle 1. Remediation should initially focus on the simplest most basic elements in reading; perception of de-

tails within words and association of sound with the perceiver word elements.

Principle 2. Perceptual and associational responses should be overlearned until they are automatic.

Principle 3. The remedial teacher should plan the learning experience and modify the presentation of the task and material on the basis of the child's performance so that the child is correct in nearly half of all his responses.

Principle 4. The teacher should work in small steps until the child can recognize quickly the words you have introduced, and can integrate new learning with what he has previously

learned. (Blending). Principle 5. There should be frequent reviews of basic perception, associational, and lending skills, and as rapidly as possible these reviews should involve actual reading.

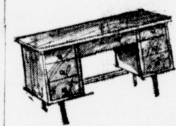

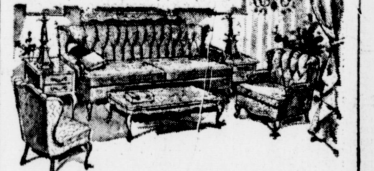

Mrs. Joe Costen Attends State TSTA Confab

Joyline Costen, District 13 chairman of Teachers Education and Professional Standards of Texas State Teachers Association, participated in the Seventh Annual Teacher Education and Professional Standards Conference sponsored by TSTA at the Gunter Hotel, San Antonio, December 10-11.

Some 300 Texas educators opened the conference Friday to consider whether Texas teachers should enforce their own code of ethics in the same manner as doctors and lawyers.

Texas teachers have adopted a code of ethics but do not enforce it in a systematic procedure. Physicians and attorneys, unlike teachers, discipline themselves through professional boards.

Dr. J. B. Woolley of Hammond, La., dean of Southeast Louisiana College, told the group Friday night the first and best way to improve the teaching profession would come through teachers assuming a greater responsibility for enforcing their own code of ethics. John Lovelady, a TSTA official from Austin, reminded the banquet audience when "doctors violate their code of ethics they are ostracized by medical profession and when attorneys violate legal ethics they are ostracized by other lawyers.

"But when a teacher violat-

es his code of ethics," Lovelady declared, "someone outside the of the teaching profession."

Control over certification of Texas teachers is in the hands of the State Board of Education. Saturday, F. E. Wilingham, associate secretary of the Oklahoma Education Association, urged the Texas educator to establish by state legislation a professional practices commission to judge competence of teachers.

Wilingham commented on the recently enacted Oklahoma Professional Practices Commission. He said the commission is still being formulated and its duty will be to investigate charges of incompetence of a teacher at the request of the local education body, and then make recommendations concerning certification power.

Wilingham noted seven states now have legislature — enacted professional practices commissions. The conference goes, representing all segments of teaching in both schools and colleges, took no action but will report back to their own organizations where recommendations for a state professional practices commission for teachers would have to originate.

Under the proposed plan being (local educational organization, a state could set up a commission composed of teachers and recognized by the state legislature. The commission would review cases of ethics violations and make recommendations for action to the state board.

One-half of this season's crop is now out of the fields. Quality has plagued some sections. However, USDA said that the quality classed at the Lubbock office last week remained about the same as the previous week.

During the week ending Feb. 10, 72 percent of the cotton classed was in the White grades and 27 percent in the Little Spotted grades.

Middling cotton made up 17 percent of the total. Strict Low Middling 31 percent, Middling Light Spotted 19 per cent and Strict Low Middling Light Spotted 7 per cent.

Staple length remained about the same last week and continued to average approximately 15-16 of an inch. Eighty-three per cent of all cotton classed at Lubbock last week was 15-16 of an inch and shorter and 64 per cent was 15-16.

Micronaire also remained about the same as the previous week. Thirty-three per cent of all cotton "miked" in the Lubbock office was in the desirable category of 3.5 and better. Fifteen per cent "miked" 3.3 and 3.4, 30 per cent was 3.0 through 3.2, 18 per cent 2.7 through 2.9 and 4 per cent was in the 2.6 and below, or Wasty, category.

The Consumer and Marketing Service of the U.S. D.A. reported increased trading in the new crop cotton and prices remained steady. Average prices paid for the most predominant qualities were: Middling 15-16 — 27.65, Middling 31-32 — 28.25, Strict Low Middling 15-16 — 27.65, Middling 31-32 — 28.25, Strict Low Middling 15-16 — 26.95, Middling Light Spotted 15-16 — 26.50, Middling Light Spotted 31-32 — 27.00, Strict Low Middling Light Spotted 15-16 — 25.85 and Strict Low Middling Light Spotted 31-32 — 26.25.

Prices paid farmers for cottonseed ranged from 145 to 155 per ton.

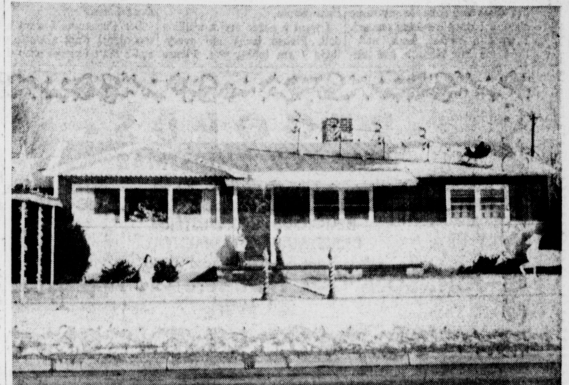
