

With this in mind, here are a few words about the mayor and his problems:

It's been a matter of civic pride with Mr. Herd the past two or three years to object to our deplorable sidewalks and lack of them. Of course, it's nothing out of the City's pocket if someone breaks his neck on a sidewalk full of holes because the sidewalks do not belong to the city. They belong to the individual property owners.

And the above situation is the very reason I am loathe to accomodate the civic-minded mayor by commenting on the bad condition of the sidewalks. I don't suppose there are any sidewalks in worse condition anywhere in this city than the one right in frent of my house.

The mayor, whose salary is \$20 a month, probably takes more cussing and listens to more petty fussing than anybody in town . . . and so he is entitled to fuss back once in awhile. Therefore I will forgive him for complaining about my sidewalk . . . and just hope no-body breaks his neck in front of my house until I can afford to repair it.

Mr. Herd's constant plea for people like me to fix up their premises for the good of the community, makes plenty of sense. It makes a lot mere sense than many of the things that the public asks the city to do without giving a thought as to where the money is coming from.

Talking about all these re quests one day, the mayor said he answers the most impossi-ble ones with this question ones with this question: "Did you ever try to shop for a winter wardrobe with a \$5 bill?" The answer to the mayor's question is the reason the city can': accomplish more things. The people don't want to spend any more money than they're spend ing now, and the money they are spending now will not stretch as far as all of the people would like to see it stretch.

> "The state will save millions when we start making annual budgets. It is humanly imposible for the legislatire to foresee what conditions and needs will be 30 months in advance. Yet that is the task set before us in January-to prepare a budget and make appropriations for the biennium beginning the following September.

"For example the 50th legislature, in 1947 missed the rural aid needs by \$4,000,000; Highway Patrol ran \$250,000 short because of unpredictable increases in the cost of gasoline, oil and tires; other state depart ments had to ask for emergency appropriations for similar reasons-and yet state revenues over that period ran some \$50. 000,000 more than had been estimated.

"We pass laws requiring counties, school districts, cities and other political subdivisions of the state to make annual budgets, and then we try to play superman and guess what the state will need two and a half years

"Under the Crosthwait plan, he regular 'odd-year' session would not be changed except as to the length. In the added 'evenyear' session, only appropriations, emergency subjects submitted by the Governor and other matters brought up by fourfifths vote of the members could be considered.

"Another section of the proposed amendment would put legislators on a yeararound salary of \$3,000, in stead of the present \$10 a day during the first 120 days of the session and \$5 a day thereafter. Although I considered this phase less important than the annual session plan, I believe that more pay for members is 'long overdue.'

"A legislator is required to represent his district in Austin for many things, such as high way matters, school matters, individual problems of his constituents and so on. Even while he is drawing \$10 a day, he finds it well-nigh impossible to live in Austin on his pay. Meanwhile he must maintain a residence at home.





San Angelo Paper Recalls Founding Of Garza County

Garza County was the subject of a regular "This Day in Texas" feature on the editorial page of the San Angelo Standard-Times June 15. The clipping, which was sent to the Post Dispatch by Mrs. Roy Green of San Saba, the for mer Miss Mable D. Cox, gave a brief history of the beginning of Garza County, as follows:

"Organized on this day in 1907 was Garza County, created by an act of the legislature in 1876 and named for one of the oldest families in Texas.

"The Garzas trace their Lone Star history back to 1731, when Madam Rabina Betancourt came to San Antonio. Shortly afterward, she married Geronimo Garza, whose land grant is one of the oldest recorded at the General Land Office.

"It seems reasonable to assume that the Garza family treis the most venerable of any Texas strain.

"The settlement of Garzi County did not come until 31 years after its creation. Post, the county seat, was built by the eccentric cereal king, who purch ased thousands of acres of land in Garza and neighboring counties and attempted to found a colony. The town of Post was carefully planned by its creator and many of the brown stone buildings erected under his supervision are still standing.

"In Garza County occurred many of Post's experiments to bring on rain by discharging explosives.






