City Council Discusses Changes in Representation In other business, Butch Davis

The growing trend in city council representation by member districts or a combination of atlarge and single member districts was discussed at the regular meeting of the Post City Council, Monday, April 10, when Mayor Giles C. McCrary advised the council that it would do well to review and start studying the situation.

McCrary said Post was the only town left in this part of the country without a district, ward or position type council and that it would be wise to anticipate that trend by studying the changes that could be made, before we were told to make

The mayor added that the council could not make the change itself, but it could make recommendations which would be sent to the Justice Department for approval.

Monday night's decision was to authorize a study and review of the situation with the idea of redesigning the makeup of the council, using guidelines set up by the federal government.

Signup Date at ASCS Office is April 14

The Garza County ASCS Office reminds producers that April 14 is the last day to enroll farms in the 1989 wheat, feed grains and cotton programs.

It is the farm operator's responsibility to ensure that the farm is enrolled and all landowner signatures have been obtained. Landowners have until April 28 to sign the contract.

Advance payments must be requested by April 14. Before the advance payment may be made, the producer (this includes landowners) must be determined "actively engaged" and a "person" for the \$50,000 payment limitation. All members of an entity, such

as corporation, estate, trust, etc.,

must designate to receive their portion of the entity's payments or that portion will not be paid. It is the entity's responsibility to ensure that all members have

In addition to being a senior in high school, the student must maintain a "B" average or better and plan to continue studies at a school of journalism. Once the winners are selected they must be enrolled in at least three hours of journalism each semester he or she receives assistance.

She died Saturday, April 1, 1989 at the Retirement Ranch in Clovis, New Mexico, following a lengthy illness.


Interment was at 3:30 p.m., Saturday, April 1, 1989 in Post's Terrace Cemetery.





(Continued from Page 1) Throughout history, so-called civilized and politically developed nations have crumbled when the citizenry lost faith in its leaders and governmental system, usually seen first in the question of taxation.

And when fear of reprisal smothers the voices of criticism, the end can not be far behind.

Such fear includes your telephone being tapped, your mail being inspected, or worse, your taxes being

That, my friends, is the biggest fear of all. And we all know it, and hope

that if we keep quiet, maybe we

won't be the ones to get audited. It's not unlike the situation in Germany during the late 1920s and 1930s...when people watched as their neighbors were pulled out of their homes and sent to you know where...but most people shriveled up in fear, hoping that if they just could hide somewhere, they would be spared.

But, the truth of the matter is, that hiding will not save anyone from the bitter truth...the bully, no matter who or where he or she resides, will eventually consume evervone if left unchecked.

The bully facing Americans today is the uncontrolled and outrageously inconsistent tax collection system designed and maintained by our elected officials.

Only when our national leaders become victims of their own scam will they see what damage has been done...then it will be too late.

The politicians who put Hitler in power in Germany found that out. The senators in Rome who put Augustus on the throne as emperor discovered that too late and had to

live with the likes of Caligula. The history books are crammed with similar examples throughout




