Santa Fe Depot Renovation Serves as Point of Pride Here Home for Post Chamber of Commerce

Some of the visitors to Post make the Santa Fe Depot building their first stop, but not because they came to town on the train. They stop to get information about Post and the surrounding area from the local Chamber of Commerce.

The chamber office previously was housed in the city building, but a lack of storage space necessitated the search for a larger office.

In 1986 Lewis Earl, chamber manager at the time, contacted officials at the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe Railway Co. concerning buying or

leasing the depot which had been vacant for several years.

The railway company proposed that the Chamber of Commerce sign a 99 year, \$1 per year lease for the facility, Charles Wallace, former member of the renovation committee, recalled.

In accordance with the lease, the chamber would be responsible for renovating and maintaining the building. Another stipulation of the contract called for a fence to be built between the depot building and the railroad tracks as a safety precaution limiting access to the tracks.

Approximately \$30,000 was donated by individuals, the Post Economic Development Corporation (PEDC) and the Franklin Trust, committee member Patty Kirkpatrick said.

"The idea of taking an old building that was deteriorating and renovating it into an attractive structure benefiting the city was exciting," she added.

"The Art Deco architecture is unusual for this area, and we wanted to preserve it," Kirkpatrick continued.

Records from the Santa Fe Railway office in Amarillo indicate that the original depot was built in 1911. It was a one-story structure consisting of five rooms. In 1925, a reception area and indoor restroom facilities were added, and in 1944 the depot was remodeled. From that time until it was closed, only routine maintenance work had been done.

The masonry and terra cotta structure is one of four of this style built in

the region. The comparative depots in Sweetwater and Lubbock were torn down before the Post depot was closed in 1978. The other remaining one is in Snyder.

Passenger service was discontinued in 1969; however, the facility was used for signal switching, freight and Western Union offices until 1978.

Technological advances, reduced freight loads and changes in the transportation systems gradually reduced the need for the small town depots.

The Post depot was closed, and the windows boarded up in 1978. It was left to withstand the weather and occasional vandalism until the Post Chamber of Commerce began the clean up and renovation in 1986.

Dick Ryan, architect for the Main Street America project in Texas, studied the building and drew up the specifications for the renovation, Wallace said.

Don Collier, formerly of Post and a commercial interior design consultant in Dallas, worked with the committee to select the interior theme for the new office.

Area contractors were asked to bid on the work with Jerry Osborn being accepted for the exterior work and Dwayne Capps for the interior work, Wallace added.

The only major structural change, he said, was the addition of an interior wall to divide a large area into two separate offices.

The five-ply composition roof was replaced, and a loading dock on the east side of the depot was torn down because it was severely deteriorated.

Wallace explained that terra cotta was a popular building material at the time of construction, but is no longer used because it is so expensive. So, on the advice of the architect, the terra cotta siding was repaired using mortar and then painted.

One set of freight doors was replaced with a bay of windows, and some of the wooden window facings and doors were replaced with metal ones. Efforts were made to keep all the replacements and additions in the same style of the old fixtures.

The exterior was painted a light brown with dark brown trim and was landscaped with native materials and plants.

The interior was decorated with a Southwestern flair using mauve, beige and grey with black accents. Potted plants, paintings and photographs of the Post area provide a pleasant office atmosphere and demonstrate the pride the chamber has in the Post community.

Additional renovations will be made as funds become available, said Chamber of Commerce manager Kathryn Floyd. Plans include a conference room and a public meeting room in the south end of the building. That area was used as a warehouse for freight and is now being used for storage.

Plans also include carpeting the office area to serve as an acoustic buffer.

Even though the trains no longer stop at the depot, they still thunder by at a rate of 15 every 24 hours and are a noisy reminder of days gone by.

Housing Authority Approves Payment in Lieu Taxes Here

The Board of Commissioners of the Housing Authority of the City of Post has approved the payment of Payment in Lieu of Tax to the four taxing entities here.

At the end of the Housing Authority's fiscal year, the tax amount is determined by taking 10 percent of the rent collected, less utility cost.

This total is divided among the four tax bodies according to tax rates. This year the tax amount is \$4,734.18.

As long as there are funds available, the tax will be paid.

"It is also paid as a means of showing our appreciation for the services rendered by the community to the Post Housing Authority," manager DeLores Redman comments.

During this time the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe Railway Company will make adjustments to the tracks and install new signals.

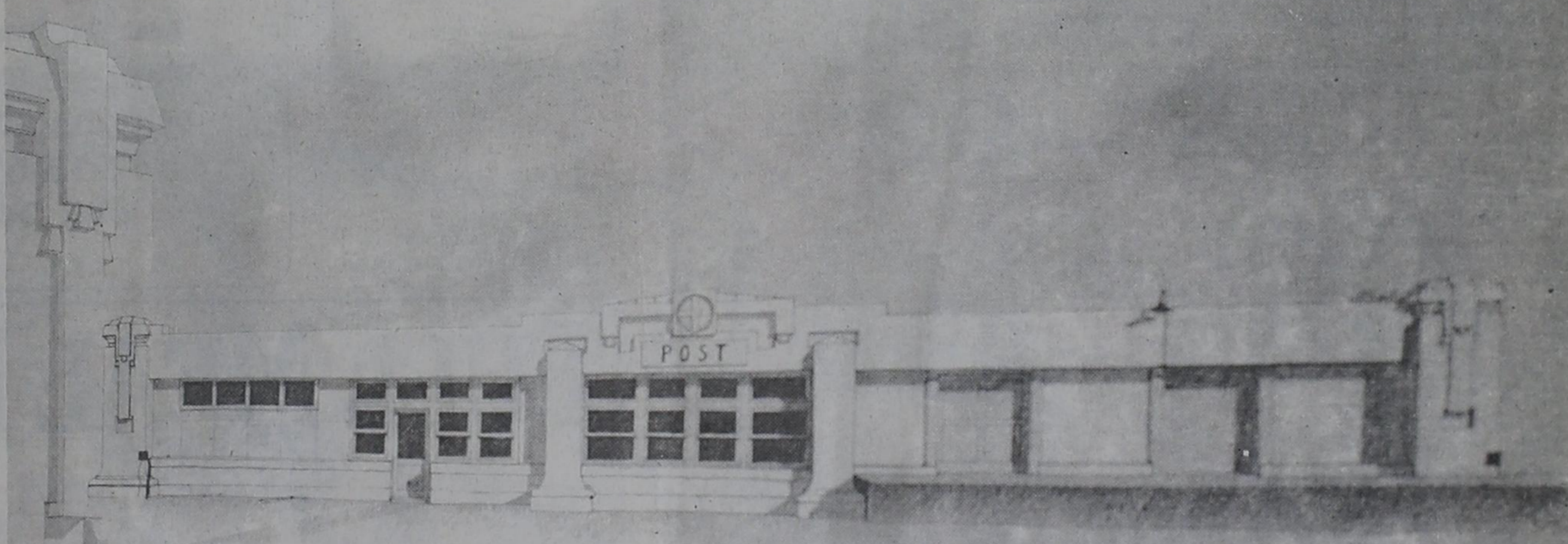
The public is urged to observe the warning signs and drive with care through this area.
