And the 1989 Winner is...

A full house of appreciative theatregoers were on hand for Henry's speech, the awards ceremonies, a Tex-Mex buffet catered by Jackson's Cafe, musical entertainment, a silent auction featuring items donated by Garza County artists and dancing until midnight to the music of Tommy Reed and The Texas Class.

Representative David Counts presented the 1989 Best Play award for "The Rainmaker" to stage manager of the production, Lino DeLeon, and assistant stage manager Jeffrey Redman.

Representative Counts also read

a commendation from the state legislature honoring the Garza Theatre for its promotion of the arts. The commendation was accepted by theatre board member Jack Alexander.

Linda Ellis was named 1989's Best Actress for her portrayal of the strong willed Scottish school teacher in "The Prime of Miss Jean Brodie."

For a Willy Awards "first," the Best Actor award was a tie between James Bell, as the devoted father in "The Rainmaker," and Jon Steele, as the much mistaken guest in "See How They Run."

Christy Morris received Best Supporting Actress honors for her role as Ida, the maid, in "See How They Run."

The Best Supporting Actor award went to Charles Somerville for his role as the Rev. Lionel Toop, the confused vicar/husband in "See How They Run."

Nelda Dalby received the Best Cameo Actress award for her portrayal of the elegant Archduchess in "The Sleeping Prince."

The Best Cameo Actor award went to Mike Toombs, the befuddled Humphrey in "See How They Run."

Marie Neff announced Donna Ammons Jones as winner of the Best Program Design award for her program cover "The Tempest," and

also presented the Best Set Design award to Will McCrary for "See How They Run."

Mayor Giles McCrary presented the Garza Theatre Board Award to Linda Ellis for her outstanding work in promoting the Garza Theatre.

Director's Awards for 1989 included the Distinguished Service award to Eva Lou Page; the Youth Achievement award to Jeffrey Redman; and the Cultural Awareness award to Hudman Furniture.

Award presenters included former Willy Award winners Anne Leake, Lonnie Welborn, Christy Morris, Steve Sever, Cheryl Thompson and Wesley Burnett.

Intendent will be Rusty McDonald and junior superintendent Brent McDonald.

Irvin Ensor, Scurry County Extension Agent, will judge the Hog and Steer Show scheduled from 8 a.m. Saturday, January 27. Scooper will be superintendent and John Beatty, junior superintendent.

Conner will be the stock announcer and Rafe Foreman and Bob Cook will serve as auctioneers.

The first time two showman-shuckles will be awarded in division, with a Junior award (11 under) and a Senior award

(14 and over) given. All the awards, including overall showmanship and rate of gain (beef) will be presented at 1 a.m. Saturday.

City Sales Tax Rebates Up by 20.77 Percent

A 20.77 percent increase in the January tax rebate indicates that the City of Post and its merchants are starting New Year off right with a steady rise in the amount of retail sales.

State Comptroller Bob Bullock's office week mailed a check to the City of Post in the amount of \$11,366 a 20.77 percent increase over January 1989's payment of \$9,411.84.

January payments for area cities include: Slaton - January 1990's payment of \$12,797 was an 18.83 percent increase over 1989's \$10,555.09.

Tahoka - Payment decreased 13.95 percent from \$3,480.98 in January 1989 to \$2,995.29 in January 1990.

Spur - Net payment for January, \$2,312, an increase of 47.90 percent over 1989's \$1,563.22.

Crosbyton - 1990 payment of \$3,911.82 an increase of 35.94 percent over 1989's \$2,877.57.

February 11 Deadline for Voter Registration

Garza County voters who are not registered to vote are urged to do so before February 11, the last day to submit an application for voter registration before the March 13 primary. Mailed-in registrations must be postmarked no later than February 12.

February 11 is also the last day for a voter to notify the Tax Assessor-Collector's office of a change in residence from one precinct to another in the county. Any changes in voter registration must be made in person.

Chita Hataway, Garza County Tax Assessor-Collector, reports that almost 300 voter registration cards were returned in the recent mailout. If you have moved recently and did not receive a voter registration card, please check with the tax office to make sure your registration is in order.

The year 1990 is an important election year in Garza County, as well as state-wide. Locally, voters will elect a county judge, two commissioners, clerk, treasurer, and two justices of the peace. Texas voters will elect a governor, a U.S. Senator, and lieutenant governor, as well as other state-wide offices.

It is important that you are a part of this year's election process. If you are not sure about your voter registration, check with the Tax office at 495-3002.

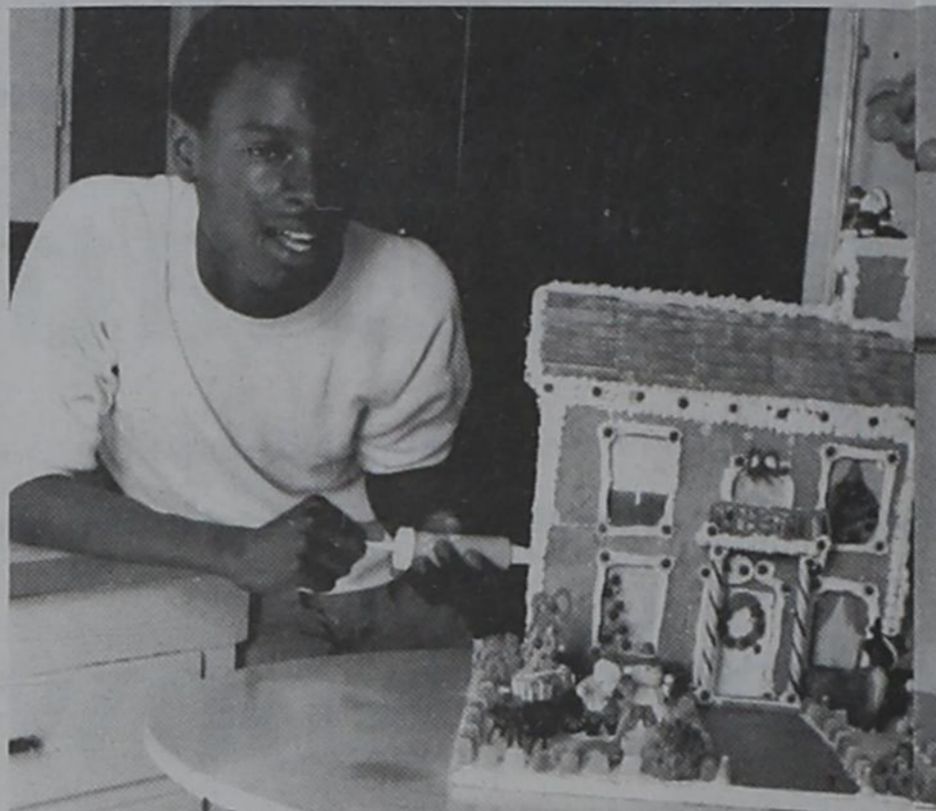
1989 Taxes Due by January 31



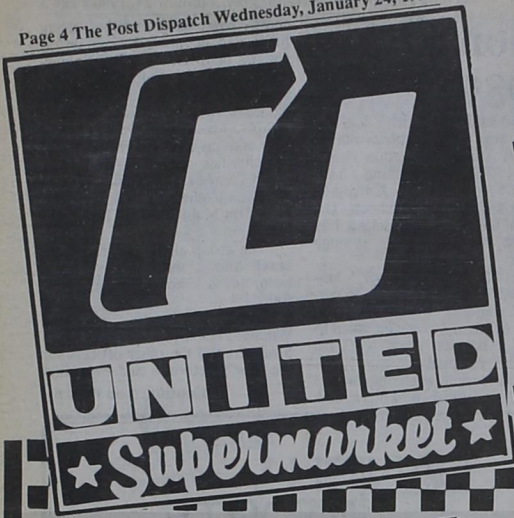

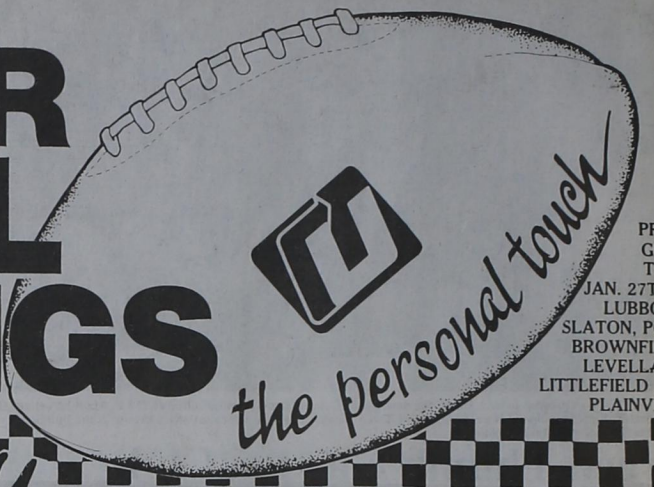
