Agriculture, Oil, Tourism Lead Economy into 1990s

by Wesley W. Burnett

When you talk about business and industry in Post and Garza County, you have to include a wide variety of economic forces...including agriculture, petroleum, retail and tourism.

Any attempt the set dollar values of these four major industries here would be difficult, for we have traditionally been heavily dependent on agriculture and oil production for most of our livelihood. Until the closing of Burlington's textile facility here in 1983, we counted that operation as a mainstay of employment.

In the 1980s we saw a lot of changes...the biggest factors of course were Burlington's closing, with all the pain of losing 300 or more local jobs, and then the dramatic drop in oil prices, which only now is beginning to level off.

The good news is that in the process of living with these economic changes, we have found new sources of income...and discovered a growing industry related to highway travel.

For years we have known that Post is a "great watering hole," to quote a frequent traveller through here, and as we enter the 1990s we can see just how important our two U.S. Highways through here will mean to our economy.

U.S. Hwy 84 is one of the most travelled roadways connecting the northern plains and New Mexico to the metropolitan area south and east. Thousands of motorists cruise through out town every day...and hundreds of them stop here to buy fuel, food and other services.

They may not be sight-seeing, but they are tourists, and this is a tourism

industry.

Most of our new businesses which have opened in the past five years have been related to this highway traffic and the future continues to look bright for this part of our economy.

Another factor in our tourism is the continued growth of the Garza Theatre, drawing hundreds of out-of-town guests with every production. This year the theatre will offer six performances of each play, which will add to the impact locally.

It is estimated that every visitor to Post, whether stopping for 10 minutes or staying several hours, will spend approximately \$20. Multiply that times the thousands per year who stop and you can see how important this industry is to us.

I believe it will be even more important, especially with the potential of Lake Alan Henry just 15 miles southeast at Justiceburg and the possibility of the Post Lake just a few miles east of town.

Still, our friends working the "oil patch" continue to provide the backbone of our employment base. Although a lot has changed the past six years, the hard working and "never-say-quit" attitude of our petroleum related businesses are inspiration to anyone who wonders why we keep trying.

We are really fortunate to be the home of such enthusiastic and determined people. When the United States runs short of foreign oil to import during this decade, I am confident that our friends in the Garza County oil fields will still be producing fuel, even though the vast majority of consumers will probably never appreciate fully our contribution to a vibrant nation.

I also believe that farming and ranching will maintain its importance to our region, and for basically the same reasons, we provide essentials that are going to continue to be in demand...fiber and food. The weather will always be a nagging problem...but somehow our farmers and ranchers hold on to their faith...and as one of my "old-time" cotton farmer friends told me just before we got that good rain a couple weeks ago: "I remember it rained one year real good."

Actually, I think it's exciting to be alive and here at this time...we've been through some tough times together, and we may see more of the

same, but there is just enough gutsy people here reminding us that "we gotta keep on keeping on." That's really what it's all about.

Sharp Fuel Cost Increase Plagues Trucking Industry

The dramatic rise in the cost of diesel fuel nationwide since late December has placed a heavy financial burden on Texas trucking companies as they start the new year, according to the president of the state's largest trucking trade association.

"Texas trucking companies, for the most part, are in a survival mode as we start the new decade," said Robert Floyd, president of the Texas Motor Transportation Association (TMTA). "With diesel fuel cost increase of up to 40 percent over last year, some companies are going to go out of business unless some relief is given to them soon. The increase in diesel fuel costs is a serious threat to the health of the trucking industry."

Diesel fuel costs both in Texas and nationwide have increased from 35 to 40 percent in the past month due in part to a severe cold snap in December that dramatically increased usage of home heating oil. In addition, analysts say, a combination of events including an explosion at the nation's second largest oil refinery and events in Panama that have delayed ship traffic through the Panama Canal have contributed to the sharp rise in the price of diesel fuel.

The increase has hit Texas truckers particularly hard, Floyd said, because many transportation companies are still suffering from the effects of the downturn in the Texas economy that began in the mid 1980s. "Texas trucking companies, on the average, are barely breaking even as it is," Floyd said. "Any additional expense could be devastating for the industry, particularly smaller companies. Such a large and sudden increase in expenses might make some of the smaller companies give up and shut their doors."

Under that scenario, Floyd said, many communities in Texas might see a deterioration in transportation service until surviving trucking companies can fill the void. The Railroad Commission of Texas (RCT) which oversees the trucking industry and insures transportation service to all Texas communities, will soon consider interim rate increase proposals that will reflect the increase in the cost of diesel fuel.

"Many of the rate bureaus that represent the various segments of the trucking industry have already approached the Commission with proposals to increase the fuel surcharge that is built into transportation rates," Floyd said. "We have made sure that all three commissioners are aware of the seriousness of the problem, and we believe they will be looking into solutions to the problem as early as next week."

Based in Austin, TMTA represents the public and private sector of the truck and bus industry in Texas and has approximately 800 allied and carrier members.
