

U.I.L. Alignment

Post Enters Class AA Division

Last Thursday morning the University Interscholastic League (U.I.L.) office in Austin released the 1990-92 school alignments, placing Post as had been expected in Class AA, joining Crosbyton, Idalou, New Deal, Ralls, Seagraves, Sundown and Tahoka in District 5-AA. Sundown moved from Class A to the new district.

The two-year average enrollment

at Post High School, one of the ingredients for the complicated formula to determine classification, was 245 students. The minimum number for Class AAA status was set at 284.

"It'll be different, that's for sure," Post ISD athletic director Dewayne Osborn comments, "after being one of the smallest AAA schools, it'll take a little adjustment to competing as one of the bigger AAs."

Details of the 1990 football schedules have not been finalized, due to the U.I.L. rules allowing for appeal. Osborn said that District 5-AA administrators will meet February 21 to establish schedules for the next two years.

Although preliminary discussions have been held with schools for non-district competition, Osborn said that he is not able to release those details

until after February 21.

Wanda Mitchell Named as Main Street Manager

Post's new Main Street Project manager, Wanda Mitchell, brings with her to that office a wealth of business and planning experience gained through her work with civic, social and community projects - including her years spent as a major contributor to the success of the OS Art Show and Roping.

Mitchell began her duties as Main Street manager, Monday and, in an attempt to cover work ordinarily done in January, plans are underway for a trip to Austin this month for a three-day intensive training session with the Main Street Office.

Settling into her new office, Mitchell said that Main Street would be working hand-in-hand with the Chamber of Commerce, PEDC, PMA and the City of Post to carry out the office's various projects. "I want the work we do and the things we accomplish to be pleasant, enjoyable and a lot of fun for everybody," she added.

Mitchell was chosen for the Main Street position by a selection contrary to most positions with the city, according to City Manager Bob Turner. Out of the 28 applica-

tions received, Turner weeded out the 22 out-of-town applications and the remaining six local applications were reviewed, and Mitchell selected, by representatives of the Post Chamber of Commerce, PEDC, PMA and the City of Post.

The local Main Street office will continue under the leadership of the Main Street Program in Austin, receiving technical assistance and day-to-day programs recommended by Austin.

However, funding for the project comes from local sources, including the City of Post and private funds. The office will remain in city hall and the Main Street manager will report to the Post city manager.

Will McCrary and Linda Ellis (Willy Award winning "Best Actress" for 1989) will round out the evening with a performance of "Something for the Ducks."

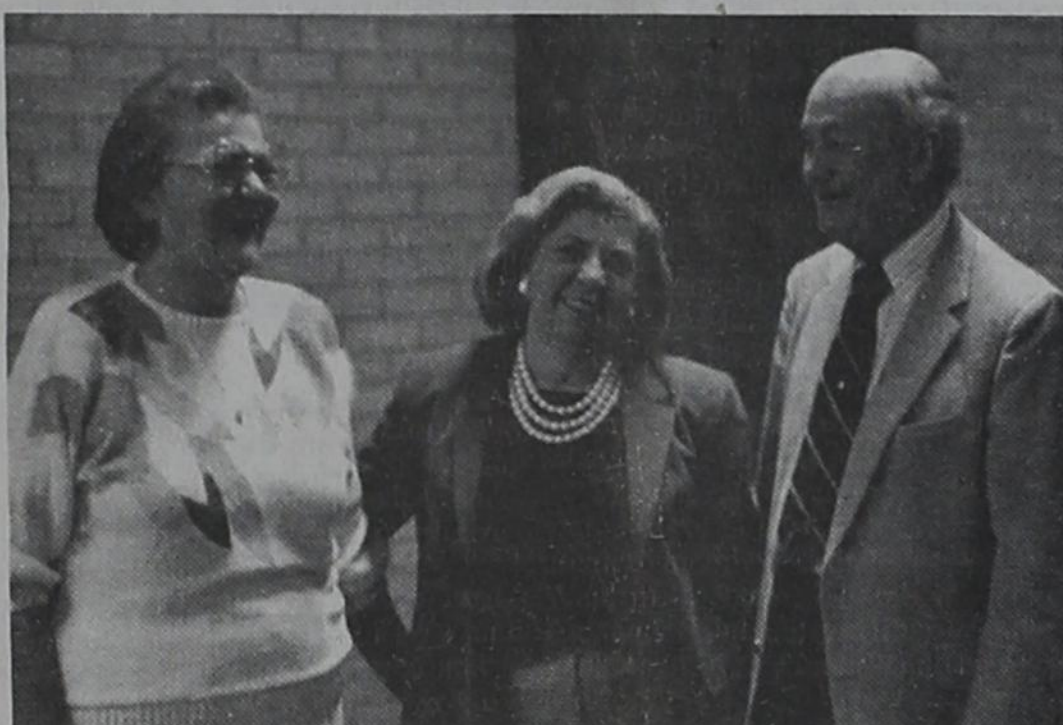
Tickets for the evening's entertainment are \$8 and advance reservations must be in by Monday, February 12.

Lake Alan Henry Road Extension is Approved

Development of a new reservoir in Garza County, Lake Alan Henry, to provide water for Lubbock, received a boost from the highway commission at its January meeting when the commission approved reconstructing Farm-to-Market Road 2458 in Garza County and extending the road to the reservoir site.

Reconstructing and extending the road for 6.1 miles east of U.S. 84 is expected to cost \$3.1 million. The city of Lubbock and Garza County will provide all right-of-way and utility adjustments.

City Council Calls for Election Saturday May 5

Members of the Post City Council, in a regular meeting Monday, February 5, approved a motion to call an election for Saturday, May 5, 1990 to fill three seats on the council.

City council members whose terms are expiring are Jack Alexander, Larry Waldrip and Irene Fry. Filing will open Monday, February 19 for the three positions.

In a citizen's audience with the council, Arnold Fry gave an update on the remote control car track now under construction at David Nichols Park. Fry said that the dirt work at the site was 90 percent completed and that work should begin soon on fencing the area, using a special fencing material that will ensure the safety of the cars as well as the spectators.

Fry asked the council's help with \$972.15 needed for materials to complete the track, but no vote on the request was taken at Monday's meeting.

Fry is to appear before the council again with a copy of the car club's updated bylaws, and a decision will be made then on the request for funds.

The Community Center cost-match between the City of Post and Garza County was discussed and a motion approved to authorize City

Manager Bob Turner to employ a CPA, in conjunction with the county, to audit the Community Center's financial records to date.

In other business concerning the Community Center, Larry Mills was authorized to meet with Garza County Commissioners with the recommendation that the bid for repairs to the center's roof go to West Texas Roofing.

Acting on a request made previously by Garza County Sheriff Freddy Cockrell, the council voted to approve \$500 as the city's contribution toward purchase of a "drug-sniffing" dog to be used in city and county drug enforcement.

Mayor Giles McCrary stressed that the animal was not trained as an attack dog; the \$3,500 golden Labrador is trained only for sniffing out drugs and locating missing persons.

In a report on the street department, City Manager Bob Turner reported that the city will begin work soon, weather and time allowing, patching and fixing downtown sidewalks using city staff.

Present at Monday's meeting were Mayor Giles C. McCrary; city council members Irene Fry, Larry Waldrip, Dan Lamb, Jack Alexander and Larry Mills; Wanda Wilkerson; Bob Turner; and Harvey Morton.

Garza County Officials Attend Annual Meeting

Garza County Commissioners Sammy Ellis, Herbert Walls and John Valdez were among the officials attending the 32nd annual County Judges and Commissioners Conference, sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service's V.G. Young Institute of County Government, January 23-25 in College Station.

Some issues addressed during the three-day meeting were rural roads, with sessions on maintenance and legislation, for county commissioners and discussions on multiple arraignments, protective orders, commitment procedures and juvenile offenders, for judges.

In general sessions, participants heard an address by Kay Baker, president of Kay Baker Associates in Austin, on "Winning the Race for Leadership Through Education." Other topics included county purchasing laws, the Open Meetings Act, ethics for elected officials, risk management and tort liability, the new criminal justice reform law and highlights from the 71st Legislature.

Also on the agenda were sessions on handling county money, federal redistricting requirements, sanitary landfills and rural addressing for 911.

Judges and commissioners participating earned up to four credit hours or 0.4 continuing education units.

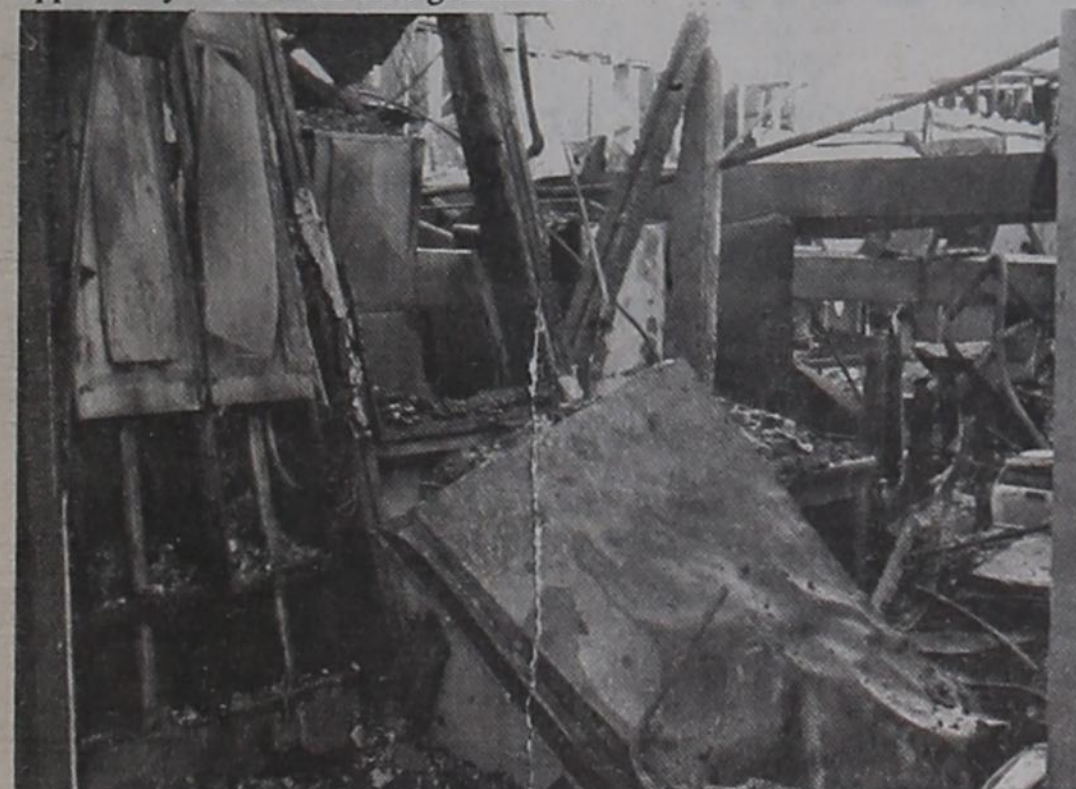

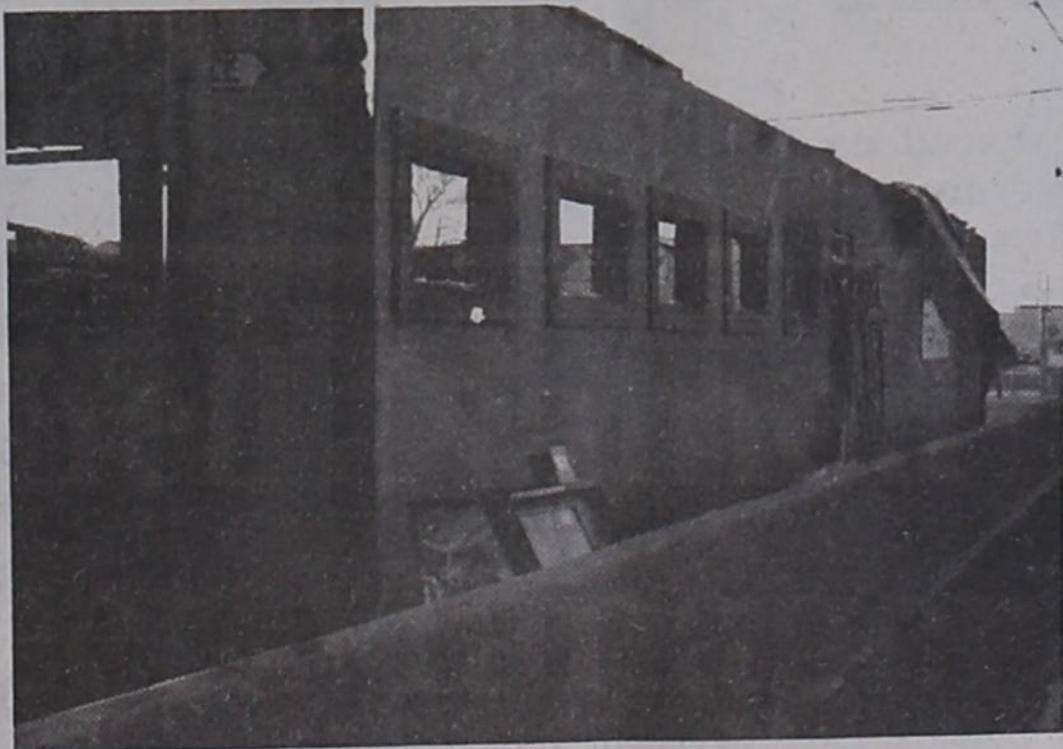

An Open Letter to The Citizens of Garza County

Since I announced my candidacy for the office of County Judge of Garza County, I have had a number of people ask me, "Why are you running for judge again?" "What about your health?" As I am asking for your vote, you deserve an answer.

When I resigned the county judge's office in December of 1988, I had undergone a triple coronary by-pass operation only months before, and during the recuperation period, I did not feel I could give you the physical energy and time necessary to maintain the office properly. So I resigned in what I felt was then in the best interest of Garza County.

However, since that time, I have regained my health, and in fact, in October of 1989, I received an excellent report from an extensive medical check-up. So health is no longer a factor and I can devote whatever time and energies necessary to operate the county judge's office in a business manner and to represent you, the people of Garza County.

My purpose for running is, quite simply, that there is some unfinished business that I would like to complete. A priority would be to work toward securing the Post Lake Project, which could be a valuable asset in securing industry in our community.

I would also want to work toward strengthening the joint efforts with the County and City of Post, which provides valuable services at minimum tax dollars. While I do support a conservative government, I feel a responsibility to our senior citizens and those in need and would review such programs that could offer services in our community.

When I ran for office the first time, I felt you shared my feeling that the proper operation of county government was vital to the welfare of the community. I knew you felt the county judge was a full time job, around the clock, not just behind the desk, and for that reason I gave the office my full time, placing county problems first. I pledge myself to continue to treat the office of county judge as the business it is...yours and mine.

The Rev. Dr. Thomas E. Pass has been nominated to serve a two-year term as chairman of the Division of Education of the Texas Conference of Churches.
