State Approves \$500,000 Loan for New Plant Here

The dream of Wright Fibers locating a plant in Post took another step toward becoming a reality Monday when Giles Dalby of the Post Economic Development Corporation announced that approval had been received on a \$500,000 loan for the company from the Texas Capitol Fund.

The City of Post was notified of the loan approval by Jerry Bailey, deputy director of the Texas Department of Commerce in Austin.

Wright Fibers has been negotiating with PEDC for some time for the location of a plant in the Postex building for the cost-efficient manufacture of coverings for cotton bales using natural products.

Further encouraging news for the Wright Fibers project was the report that Wright had purchased 21 machines from a company in the southeast and that a request had been made for space in the Postex building to move the machines within the next two weeks.

Commissioners Approve Office Move

Garza County Extension office facilities will move to the first floor of the courthouse into the spaces formerly occupied by the Tax Appraisal office, after receiving approval for the move at a regular meeting of the Garza County Commissioners' Court, Monday, February 12.

The vote to move the Extension office was three to one, with Herbert Walls voting against the move.

In other business, the commissioners agreed to share one-third of the cost for a new roof for the Post Community Center after Larry Mills, representing the Post City Council, told the court that the bid for the roofing job had been awarded to West Texas Roofing and that the cost of the roofing to the county would be \$5,625. The cost of the roofing job is to be shared equally by the city, the cen-

ter and the county.

Karl Bednarz of the Texas Highway Department presented new right-of-way maps for the Lake Alan Henry Road to the commissioners. As requested in an earlier meeting, the maps were redrawn with all the property needed for the new road taken from one side. The county will now start a title search and supply the highway department with the names of the owners of the property needed. The highway department will supply field notes on the construction to County Attorney Preston Poole.

The commissioners approved an administrative leave of absence for Charla Miller of the County Treasurer's office and agreed to hire Shelia Gregory to work part-time in that office until Charla returns. Shelia will also continue to work part-time in Justice of the Peace Dee Justice's office.

County Judge E.A. Howard, Jr. and Commissioner Sammy Ellis will be in Washington, D.C., February 22 when the Texas Coalition of Counties meets with Senator Lloyd Bentsen, Senator Phil Gramm and EPA representatives concerning the new landfill regulations and their affect on sparsely populated areas.

With the retirement of Dr. Harry A. Tubbs, Dr. William C. Wilson has accepted the commissioners' request that he serve as County Health Authority.

Post ISD Renews Teacher Contracts

The renewal of teacher contracts for the 1990-91 school year, in the light of the State Supreme Court's finding that Texas' state-local school finance system is unconstitutional, was the main topic of discussion at the Post ISD Board of Trustees' meeting, Tuesday, February 6.

Despite the discussion of alternative recommendations, the board's decision was to renew the contracts of all personnel at the current level. Voting for the renewal were Jack Kirkpatrick, Ronnie Gradine and Dan Hodges. Jerry Hays and Royce Hart did not vote.

The board voted to call a trustee election, May 5, 1990 for two positions open on the board - Royce Hart - Place 6 and Jack Kirkpatrick - Place 7. Candidates can begin filing February 19. Filing deadline for the election is April 5.

With the resignation of trustee Don Payne on February 5, three places will now be open in the May 5 election.

In other business the trustees voted to omit all tobacco in the school gymnasium.

Search Reveals No Drugs...

An undercover narcotics agent of Lubbock enlisted the help of Garza County Sheriff Freddy Cockrell and his staff Friday afternoon to stop a New Mexico vehicle, traveling on U.S. 84N, suspected of containing a large supply of drugs.

The van, and its four passengers, had been trailed from Portales by agents of the New Mexico Narcotics Service, who notified the South Plains Regional Task Force when the van crossed the New Mexico-Texas border.

The New Mexico and Task Force agents were on hand when local law officials stopped the vehicle on North Broadway in Post, but no drugs were found when the van was searched.

No arrests were made and the four men were released, but the van, a rental out of New Mexico, was confiscated by the New Mexico officials because the rental agreement had been violated.

GMH Employees Voted Pay Raise by Directors

The Garza Memorial Hospital Board of Directors approved a 25-cents an hour across-the-board raise for all hospital employees after directors Zoe Kirkpatrick and David Tyler presented a two-part recommendation regarding raises to the board. The recommendation called for (1) the 25-cents raise, and (2) the authority for the hospital administrator to grant salary increases to non-professional employees after one-year required training, according to performance level acquired.

Ronny Ammons was the only board member voting against the pay raise and stated that while he did agree with Part 2 of the recommendation, he could not vote for Part 1.

In other business the directors voted to continue the non-business personal property tax.

The directors also voted to call an election for the hospital board May 5, 1990 at the Post Community Center. Cherry Echols has been appointed election judge.

Absentee voting will start April 13 and will continue through May 1. Delinquent accounts in the amount of \$525.90 were turned over to HRS for collection and delinquent accounts in the amount of \$2,273.56 were turned over to Retail Merchants.

Letters to the Editor:

(The following letter from the Brazos River Authority, regarding Lake Alan Henry, was received by Garza County Judge E.A. Howard, Jr. and is reprinted to keep our readers current on the lake construction.)
Dear Judge Howard:

As you may know, the Brazos River Authority, through an agreement with the City of Lubbock, has assumed responsibility for additional planning, construction and operation of Lake Alan Henry (formerly Justiceburg) in Garza and Kent Counties. The Authority operates other facilities in a multitude of counties within the Brazos River Basin in cooperation with and for the benefit of various entities. Our goal is to be of service if we can to those who seek our assistance and to be a good neighbor as we construct and operate facilities which make available and protect the resources of the Brazos Basin.

Construction of the road which is necessary for access to the Lake Alan Henry dam construction site has just begun and it should be completed by September of this year. Dam construction is expected to begin in November 1990 and continue for approximately 27 months.

One task we intend to accomplish before water impoundment begins is a water quality study for the Lake Alan Henry watershed area. The attached map defines the watershed boundary which includes a part of five counties. The purpose of the study will be to consider alternate methods of preventing pollution, particularly from petroleum related activities, of the water to be supplied from the project.

Application has been made to the Texas Water Development

Board for planning assistance in the form of a grant to help pay for the cost of this study. One requirement of the application is that political subdivisions such as cities, counties and water districts in the planning area be notified that an application for planning assistance has been made. Comments with regard to the application are not necessary but may be filed with the Texas Water Development Board and the Brazos River Authority. They must be filed within 30 days of the date of this letter (2-2-90). Comments should be sent to the following addresses:

In addition to fulfilling the notification requirement of the Texas Water Development Board grant application process, the purpose of this letter is to make you more aware of our schedule for the Lake Alan Henry Project and to assure you of our intent to develop and operate this project in a responsible manner. Important IRS changes affecting agricultural workers...

Effective January 1, 1990, you were required to begin withholding income tax from your employees' pay checks.

A meeting will be held to discuss this topic along with questions relating to contract labor and the Texas Employment Commission reporting requirements.

The club went to Jerry Osborn's shop where he showed the members how to work with wood and saws. He made a sign for the club and also put the names of members on pieces of wood.

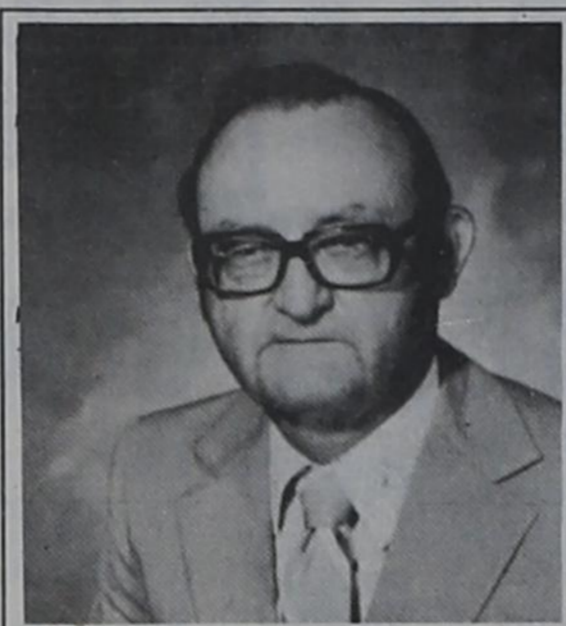
