Hwy 84 Overpass Due for Complete Reconstruction

Work will begin soon on the complete reconstruction of a railroad overpass south of Post on U.S. 84, following a preconstruction meeting Monday, February 26, according to State Department of Highways and Public Transportation officials.

The project will cost \$1,328,698.45 and will be handled by Strickland & Knight, Inc.

Frank Phillips will be the resident engineer for the year-long project which is scheduled for completion in May or June of 1991.

DPS Cautions Motorists Buckle Up or Face Fine

Department of Public Safety troopers, in an effort to enforce the seat belt ordinance, are advising Garza County citizens to "buckle up" or face a citation for driving without a seat belt.

Sgt. Glenn Fant of Crosbyton said that troopers in the Lubbock district, which includes Garza, Crosbyton, Floyd, Dickens, Kent, King and Stonewall counties, will be more aggressive in the future about enforcing seat belt violations.

Figures from the DPS show there were five fatalities in the area in 1989 and none of the accident victims were wearing safety restraints. Other figures show that safety restraint arrests per man per month averaged 10.5 per month in the district and safety restraint warnings per man per month totaled 5.3.

When the seat belt ordinance went into effect safety restraint violations were usually ticketed only when the vehicle had been stopped for another violation. But, according to Fant, troopers will now stop vehicles on the strength of the seat belt violation alone.

According to Justices of the Peace Shelia Melton and Dee Justice, fines for seat belt violations range from \$44 in Melton's court to a minimum of \$43 and a maximum of \$67.50 in Justice's court.

Museum Finds Way to Solve Bat Problem in Historic Building

The Garza County Historical Museum is well on the way to solving the bat problem which has plagued the museum and the citizens of Post for a number of years, thanks to the Garza County Commissioners' Court's approval of a museum request for \$5,489 at a Monday, February 26 regular meeting.

The museum funds allocated by the county will go to Quality Service & Supply, Inc. of Amarillo for all labor, material and insurance to install spray-on urethane foam at all eaves and gables of the old Post Sanitarium.

Work is scheduled to begin in the next two weeks to spray the foam which will work to eliminate all entries and exits now used by the bats. The museum is anxious to begin work as soon as possible, as those bats that migrated to Mexico for the winter will soon be returning with the warmer weather.

The bats had become such a major problem that the museum was closed for several months until something could be done about the unwelcome mammals.

In other business the court received an update from Beverly Rector of South Plains Emergency Medical Service on SPEMS' new techniques and continuing education classes. Rector also commended local EMTs for the excellent job they are doing in supplying the city and county emergency services.

The court also heard from Dean Bartley, a representative of the

Dispute Center Needs Volunteer Mediators

More volunteer mediators are needed by the Dispute Resolution Center (DRC), a division of South Plains Association of Governments.

Individuals interested in applying should call the DRC at 762-8721 or 1-800-858-1809 to request an application. Each applicant will be required to complete an interview prior to being admitted the 48-hour training session. Only 30 individuals will be selected for the class.

The training will be April 6, 7 and 8 and continue on April 20, 21 and 22. All selected applicants must complete the training and other requirements before mediating disputes.

After completing the basic 40-hour training, individuals may be provided an additional 24-hours of training as required by state law. This specialized training will enable individuals to mediate family disputes referred by the court system.

An orientation session will be held March 14 at 7 p.m., 1323-58th Street, Lubbock, for individuals interested in learning more about the requirements and duties of a volunteer mediator with the DRC.

NOTICE OF TARIFF CHANGE TO CENTRANET® SERVICE

GTE Southwest Incorporated gives notice of its proposed tariff changes to CentraNet® service, which is a Central Office-based service that provides PBX-type features to multi-line business customers and is currently being offered in all company wire centers where such facilities exist to provide the service.

The Public Utility Commission of Texas approved a generic tariff for CentraNet® service up to 100 lines in Docket No. 7652. The proposed tariff revision would establish specific rates for CentraNet® service involving 101 to 400 lines. Other proposed revisions involve the rate applicable to changes, additions, or deletions to the data bases and a new rate is proposed for additional trunks.

The names of the three CentraNet® packages have changed from Standard, Premium, and Deluxe to CentraNet® 1000, CentraNet® 2000, and CentraNet® 3000, respectively. Direct Call Pickup has been added to the three CentraNet® packages while Multiple Call Park and Shared Speed Call 30 have been added to CentraNet® 2000, and Speed Call 30 and Call Forward Busy/No Answer Split have been added to CentraNet® 3000. Flexible Night Answer and Automatic Route Selection also have been added as new optional features.

The proposed changes and new service offerings have been assigned Docket No. 9251, and pursuant to Section 43(d) of the Public Utility Regulatory Act will become effective June 23, 1990. Rates for service will be applicable to customers who subscribe to the service as well as existing customers. Therefore, there will be no effect on any other rates of the company. The company's gross annual revenues will increase by approximately \$399,600, or less than one percent annually.

The proposed rates are on file with the Public Utility Commission of Texas, and are available for public inspection at the offices of GTE Southwest Incorporated. Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission. The deadline to intervene in this docket is 3:00 p.m., March 19, 1990.

'Buckle Up' Program at Middle School

The Post Middle School student council sponsored a "Buckle Up Texas" program at the middle school Friday, February 23.

\$3.2 Million Loan For Dickens Co-op

Ned Ward, president of Dickens Electric Cooperative has announced that the Rural Electrification Administration has approved the Co-operative's request for a \$3.2 million loan. "The funds will be used to upgrade existing power lines and to build new lines to serve growing loads in the Cooperative's service area," Ward said.

The loan funds are earmarked for construction projects that are detailed in the Cooperative's two-year work plan. In this plan, a Rural Electric Cooperative must analyze its power system and plan construction of new lines and upgrades of existing power lines so that the energy needs of their members are met.

"The loan has been approved by REA, but we have to build the lines before any loan proceeds can be drawn down," stated Bailey Reece, general manager of Dickens Electric Cooperative. "After the projects are completed and inspected, the money can be received by the Co-operative to reimburse our general funds for the construction costs," he said. Reece further stated that the loans are then paid back to REA over a period of 35 years.

Dickens Electric Cooperative, Inc., headquartered in Spur, serves electric power to all or part of the rural areas in Crosby, Dickens, Garza, Kent, King, Motley and Stonewall Counties.

The eighth grade students passed out stickers, brochures, bumper stickers and bookmarks to promote wearing seat belts.

Posters were posted throughout the building and students were asked to remember that safety belts

are our best connection. We can depend on them when the stopping is tough.

from Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. Agricultural interests from all across the nation are seeking a position on the inside rail in the race to get an acceptable 1990 farm bill on the President's desk before November elections. And Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. is no exception.

One PCG officer, board chairman Myrl D. Mitchell of Lenora, February 22 and 23 was in Tucson, Arizona for input on the drafting of legislative language for an improved federal crop insurance program. And two others, president Steve Verett of Ralls and executive vice president Donald Johnson, are scheduled to work in Washington the week of February 26 on the more basic provisions of the law.

Mitchell is the cotton spokesman on the Federal Crop Insurance Commission, created by Congress in 1988 to recommend changes needed in the multi-peril crop insurance policies offered by the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC). After a half-dozen meetings and numerous field hearings, the Commission has suggested yield and price guarantee and other producer options to make FCIC policies a much more effective way for farmers to protect against natural disasters. The Tucson meeting grew out of a request from House Agriculture Committee Chairman Kika de la Garza (D-TX) that the Commission put its suggestions into legislative form.

Mitchell is one of 10 producers on the Commission, serving with 10 insurance industry representatives and FCIC representatives and FCIC general manager John Marshall. The FCIC program has been roundly criticized and the Administration has recommended it be replaced by a "standing disaster program." But surveys by Texas A&M and others have indicated strong producer support for retaining all-risk insurance, especially if it can be improved as recommended by the Commission.
