Community Center Commissioners Study Joint Agreement Audit

Monday morning, breezed through a light agenda, which included plans to provide an audit of the county's portion of the Community Center funding.

Somehow, it just doesn't seem right

You know when the phone rings at 3:15 a.m. that the news is probably not going to be good.

And last Saturday morning the message from a friend about a friend was enough to put us all in a state of shock.

Of course, I am talking about the heart attack and death of our friend and co-worker, Lonnie Welborn.

It just didn't seem right ... and all through the weekend as we met with friends in and about town, we were faced with the same feeling from everyone ... it just didn't seem right.

Perhaps it's the way we look at life that is in question. Because those of us who worked, laughed and shared life with Lonnie all know that he lived to the fullest, right up until God called him to another life.

Just a few hours before he died, Lonnie told one of his best friends, "I am so content, and life is so great. I love living in Post and I love the people around me."

It was like him to say that ... just as he would say to us frequently, "I really like working here."

It showed. His enthusiasm, wit, charm and humor shined a bright light all around.

A bright light that shone for what seems like a very brief time...yet in its time illuminated so many of us who shared this spot with him.

One of my first reactions to Lonnie's death was the realization of how much he appreciated what was happening in our town Saturday and Sunday as one after another heard and responded. Lonnie just absolutely

loved the way the people in Post "network". One of his favorite tidbits was sharing another "you know you're in a small town when ... " story with us.

No better illustration of this "small town" life than how so many of you drew together to help each other come to grips with the reality of losing such a friend.

Lonnie was the kind of person who would stop in the middle of whatever he was doing, to listen to whoever needed his attention. He was a good listener. Those who served with him on community projects also knew that you could count on him to get the job done.

Our lives around here have been turned upside down...but we wouldn't trade one moment of this grief for the option of not having known Lonnie Welborn. He was a person worth knowing and sharing a little bit of this old world with.

I am struck by the idea, I guess I've known all along but didn't ever really comprehend, that when we say "I'll see you tomorrow," you just don't really know. As Dr James Bell so well stated in his message at the service, 'tomorrow is in God's hands."

Lonnie knew that, and was quite satisfied to accept it.

It still doesn't seem just right. But then, saying good bye to a friend is like that.

The City of Post received \$8,757.40 from the State Comptroller, representing the City Sales and Use Tax for the month of January, reported in February. The rebate check is a decrease of 6.71% from the same period last year of \$9,386.92 and shows a .95% decrease for the year to date payment total of \$40,141.12.

Crosbyton showed a 19.38% increase in its check of \$3,902.36, still down 3.18% from last year's total to date of \$13,641.46.

Slaton received \$10,782.50, a 4.04% decrease from last year, but remains above the year-to-date total by 13.33% at \$54,563.85.

Tahoka's rebate check was a dramatic 68.47% increase over the same period last at \$6,312.75, compared to \$3,749.40 in 1989. Tahoka's year-to-date total is 7.85% down from last year at \$15,408.36.

State wide, the rebate checks totaled \$69 million, an increase of almost 13 percent.

Merchants collect the sales tax and send them to the Comptroller's office with their tax returns. The state keeps its six percent share and each month sends cities and counties their portion of the sales tax.

All local sales taxes must be approved by local voters and may be used for any legal city or county expenses.

Most areas put the money in the general fund and use for operations such as fire fighting, maintaining roads and law enforcement.

Welborn was the editor of The Post Dispatch and served in a variety of community and civic organizations. He was active on stage at the Garza Theatre, almost from the very beginning with "Dracula" in 1986 and was named "Best Actor" for his role as 'Renfield.' In December 1986 he shared the stage in "My Three Angels", which officially opened the Garza Theatre in its present location. Welborn was also in the 1987 productions of "The Mouse Trap," "Don't Drink The Water," "Light Up The Sky," and in 1988 productions "Room Service," "The Glass Menagerie" and "The Sunshine Boys." He was awarded Best Actor for his role in "The Glass Menagerie."

He was chairman of the Garza County Historical Museum board of directors and chairman of the Post Public Library board of directors and served on the Post Main Street Advisory Board as well as the Founder's Day committee.

Welborn was born July 18, 1937 in Laurel, Miss. and moved to Post with his father, mother and sister in 1948. He was a 1955 graduate of Post High School and had worked at the Lubbock Avalanche Journal before returning to Post. He had served as editor of The Post Dispatch since September 1987.

He was preceded in death by his father, William Lonnie Welborn Sr. Nov. 16, 1975.



Direct Call Pickup has been added to the three CentraNet® packages while Multiple Call Park and Shared Speed Call 30 have been added to CentraNet(R) 2000, and Speed Call 30 and Call Forward Busy/No Answer Split have been added to Centra Net® 3000. Flexible Night Answer and Automatic Route Selection also have been added as new optional features.

The proposed changes and new service offerings have been assigned Docket No. 9251, and pursuant to Section 43(d) of the Public Utility Regulatory Act will become effective June 23, 1990. Rates for service will be applicable to customers who subscribe to the service as well as existing customers. Therefore, there will be no effect on any other rates of the company. Edgewood ISD, the plaintiff in the lawsuit that led the Texas Supreme Court to declare the state's school finance system unconstitutional, will lose as much as \$18 million in state funds under the Supreme Court's guidelines for reform.

This is the conclusion of a study produced by Kathy Hayes and Daniel Slottje, two economists at Southern Methodist University. The study was published by the Na-Dallas-based research institute.

* Of the 30 districts most affected by the ruling, 19 districts (including Houston, Dallas and Austin) did not enter the case on either side.

"The Supreme Court ruled that tax rates should be the main determinant of school revenues," said Hayes. "In effect, the Court said

* If inequality is measured on a scale of 0 to 1 (where 0 is perfect equality), school revenues in Texas currently have an inequality measure of 1.5.

According to the study, if the tional Center for Policy Analysis, a state were to try to meet the Court's mandate by spending enough additional money so that no school district would lose revenue, the additional annual spending would have to equal at least \$450 billion. On the other hand, if the state meets the mandate by redistributing existing education dollars:

* The State of Texas will have to redistribute \$1.07 billion of current spending.

Bentson Urges EPA to Relax Landfill Rules

Senator Lloyd Bentsen asked Thursday for assurances that the federal government will consider the impact of proposed landfill regulations on rural communities in Texas.

Bentsen wrote Environmental Protection Agency Administrator William Reilly and urged that EPA thoroughly analyze the effect new regulations for garbage disposal will have on sparsely populated ar-eas and small towns. The regulations are scheduled to be released later this year.

"More than 100 local officials have asked for my assistance to ensure they can comply with planned new regulations on municipal landfills. They are concerned that the particular situations in their areas may make it difficult, if not impossible, to comply with regulations that are being discussed," Bentsen said.

"The diverse geology and low population in many counties of my state are sound reasons why Texas officials must have flexibility to structure effective, realistic landfill critical that you consider their imprograms that meet the unique needs of our state. What makes sense in New Jersey does not necessarily make sense in West


David Counts Named to **Comp Committee**

Owners' Rendition Forms Filing is April 2, 1990

The State Property Tax Board (SPTB), reminds business owners that they must file property rendition forms with local appraisal district offices by April 2, 1990.

The legal deadline for renditions, reports a business property owner files each year listing property owned or managed as of January 1, is actually March 31, which falls on Saturday this year. As a result, the 1990 deadline has been moved to the first working day after March 31. Property owners may receive a 30-day extension, but must file a written request with the appraisal district by April 2, 1990.

Anyone who owns or manages


income-producing business property on January 1 must file a rendition state with the local appraisal district. Businesses must report their inventories, furniture and fixtures, machinery and equipment, and other tangible business property on a rendition. The appraisers use the rendition report to establish the property's fair taxable value.

When business personal prop-erty isn't rendered, the appraiser is forced to estimate the value.





The legislature is required to redistrict after publication of the 1990 United States census. Districts drawn in 1991 are to be in effect for the next 10 years. The public hearings are to gather information about how new district lines should be drawn.

Redistricting in the past two decades has resulted in significant increases in legislative and congressional seats held by blacks, Hispanics and Republicans. The 1990 census is expected to reveal the continuation of population trends that have shown increases in the percentage of the state population that is black or Hispanic, as well as a shift in the state popula-tion away from rural East and West Texas and the metropolitan central next six months.

The public hearings will be conducted jointly by the House Redistricting Committee, chaired by Representative D.R. "Tom" Uher (D-Bay City) and the Senate Select Committee on Legislative redistricting, chaired by Senator Bob Glasgow (D-Stephenville). Representative Delwin Jones (R-Lubbock) is vice-chair of the house committee and Senator Gonzalo Barrientos (D-Austin) is vice-chair of the senate committee.

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The hearing in Lubbock will be at the Lubbock Civic Center Theater and will begin at 2 p.m. Friday, March 16. The committees will recess at the completion of afternoon testimony and reconvene at 7:30 p.m. for additional testimony. The committee chairs will be available to answer questions during the recess.
