# Commissioners Study Joint Agreement Audit

The Garza County Commissioners' Court, meeting in regular session Monday morning, breezed through a light agenda, which included plans to provide an audit of the county's portion of the Community Center funding.

Commissioners requested treasurer Voda Beth Gradine to ask accountant Steve Sawyers for an estimate of the audit cost before reviewing the expenditures to determine the status of the county's participation in the joint operating agreement between the city and county, which began in December 1975.

Commissioners also approved the opening of bids to sell an old copying machine and to accept bids for the purchase of a new copier for the clerk's office. The bids will be opened at the March 26 meeting.

County agents Katie Wolf and Lee Howard presented monthly reports, including the Results of the 1989 Agricultural Demonstrations. Howard informed the court that a private applicators' school will be held April 3 to provide the required training for those farmers and ranchers intending to apply chemicals. Howard also gave a brief outline of the cow and calf clinic to be held in May.

Judge E.A. Howard asked commissioners to consider the hiring of a firm to research county-owned land through an extensive title search to provide an inventory of county-owned property and mineral rights. After a short discussion, commissioners accepted clerk Sonny Gossett's offer to inquire with the appraisal district and other county offices to see if a complete inventory of county property might be available.

Judge Howard also informed commissioners that 12 employees responded positively to joining the Lynn Co Federal Credit Union, while four respondents were opposed. The court delayed action until the March 26 meeting on authorizing participation in the plan.

Commissioners were informed by Judge Howard of the April 5 inspection by the Texas Commission on Jail Standards. Commissioners authorized Howard to represent the county at the review following the inspection.

Precinct 2 and 4 Justice of the Peace Dee Justice reported to the court that the departure of DPS trooper Jerry Cannon would put a serious negative impact on collections, "and it looks like it'll be 1991 before we get another trooper," Justice added.

Attending the meeting were Judge Howard, commissioners Herbert Walls, John Valdez, Ted Aten and Sammy Ellis, treasurer Gradine and clerk Gossett.

### Post Gets \$8,757.40 in Sales Tax Rebate Check

The City of Post received \$8,757.40 from the State Comptroller, representing the City Sales and Use Tax for the month of January, reported in February.

The rebate check is a decrease of 6.71% from the same period last year of \$9,386.92 and shows a .95% decrease for the year to date payment total of \$40,141.12.

Crosbyton showed a 19.38% increase in its check of \$3,902.36, still down 3.18% from last year's total to date of \$13,641.46.

Slaton received \$10,782.50, a 4.04% decrease from last year, but remains above the year-to-date total by 13.33% at \$54,563.85.

Tahoka's rebate check was a dramatic 68.47% increase over the same period last at \$6,312.75, compared to \$3,749.40 in 1989. Tahoka's year-to-date total is 7.85% down from last year at \$15,408.36.

State wide, the rebate checks totaled \$69 million, an increase of almost 13 percent.

Merchants collect the sales tax and send them to the Comptroller's office with their tax returns. The state keeps its six percent share and each month sends cities and counties their portion of the sales tax.

All local sales taxes must be approved by local voters and may be used for any legal city or county expenses.

Most areas put the money in the general fund and use for operations such as fire fighting, maintaining roads and law enforcement.

### Somehow, it just doesn't seem right...

You know when the phone rings at 3:15 a.m. that the news is probably not going to be good.

And last Saturday morning the message from a friend about a friend was enough to put us all in a state of shock.

Of course, I am talking about the heart attack and death of our friend and co-worker, Lonnie Welborn.

It just didn't seem right...and all through the weekend as we met with friends in and about town, we were faced with the same feeling from everyone...it just didn't seem right.

Perhaps it's the way we look at life that is in question. Because those of us who worked, laughed and shared life with Lonnie all know that he lived to the fullest, right up until God called him to another life.

Just a few hours before he died, Lonnie told one of his best friends, "I am so content, and life is so great. I love living in Post and I love the people around me."

It was like him to say that...just as he would say to us frequently, "I really like working here."

It showed. His enthusiasm, wit, charm and humor shined a bright light all around.

A bright light that shone for what seems like a very brief time...yet in its time illuminated so many of us who shared this spot with him.

One of my first reactions to Lonnie's death was the realization of how much he appreciated what was happening in our town Saturday and Sunday as one after another heard and responded. Lonnie just absolutely loved the way the people in Post "network". One of his favorite tidbits was sharing another "you know you're in a small town when..." story with us.

No better illustration of this "small town" life than how so many of you drew together to help each other come to grips with the reality of losing such a friend.

Lonnie was the kind of person who would stop in the middle of whatever he was doing, to listen to whoever needed his attention. He was a good listener. Those who served with him on community projects also knew that you could count on him to get the job done.

Our lives around here have been turned upside down...but we wouldn't trade one moment of this grief for the option of not having known Lonnie Welborn. He was a person worth knowing and sharing a little bit of this old world with.

I am struck by the idea, I guess I've known all along but didn't ever really comprehend, that when we say "I'll see you tomorrow," you just don't really know. As Dr. James Bell so well stated in his message at the service, "tomorrow is in God's hands."

Lonnie knew that, and was quite satisfied to accept it.

It still doesn't seem just right. But then, saying good bye to a friend is like that.

# Obituary

## (William) Lonnie Welborn Jr.

Funeral services were held Monday, March 12, 1990 for (William) Lonnie Welborn Jr., who died early Saturday morning, March 10 at his home in Post.

Services were conducted by Dr. James Bell, pastor of the First United Methodist Church of Post, at the

church, with interment at Terrace Cemetery under the direction of Hudman Funeral Home.

Welborn was the editor of The Post Dispatch and served in a variety of community and civic organizations. He was active on stage at the Garza Theatre, almost from the very beginning with "Dracula" in 1986 and was named "Best Actor" for his role as "Renfield." In December 1986 he shared the stage in "My Three Angels", which officially opened the Garza Theatre in its present location. Welborn was also in the 1987 productions of "The Mouse Trap," "Don't Drink The Water," "Light Up The Sky," and in 1988 productions "Room Service," "The Glass Menagerie" and "The Sunshine Boys." He was awarded Best Actor for his role in "The Glass Menagerie."

He was chairman of the Garza County Historical Museum board of directors and chairman of the Post Public Library board of directors and served on the Post Main Street Advisory Board as well as the Founder's Day committee.

Welborn was born July 18, 1937 in Laurel, Miss. and moved to Post with his father, mother and sister in 1948. He was a 1955 graduate of Post High School and had worked at the Lubbock Avalanche Journal before returning to Post. He had served as editor of The Post Dispatch since September 1987.

He was preceded in death by his father, William Lonnie Welborn Sr. Nov. 16, 1975.

He is survived by his mother, Mary Welborn, of Post; sister Margaret McBee of Odessa and nephews Mark McBee of Los Angeles, Calif. and Wes McBee of Carrollton, Tx.

Pallbearers were Ronald Joe Babb, Wesley W. Burnett, Don Ammons, Bryan Williams III, Will McCrary and Mike Toombs.

## 3rd Quarter '89 Gross Sales Up in Garza County

Garza County's total gross sales for the third quarter of 1989 were \$8,781,104 according to a State Sales and Use Tax Analysis recently released by the research division of the State Comptroller's office.

With 108 outlets reporting for all industries, the 1989 third quarter figure is an increase of 10.4 percent over 1988's third quarter total of \$7,953,694.

\$4,272,992 of the 1989 third quarter gross sales were subject to state sales and use tax.

In the retail sales division, with 65 outlets reporting, gross sales were \$5,277,737, a 7.9 percent increase over 1988's \$4,891,134. The amount subject to state sales and use tax was \$2,700,521.

## HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN—Capitol halls more than murmured last week after four liberal lawmakers walked out in protest of a joint session address by U.S. Secretary of Education Lauro Cavazos.

Cavazos, a native of Corpus Christi and former president of Texas Tech University, told legislators gathered to equalize public school funding that more money is not the solution to education woes — and that basic changes in the system are needed.

The majority of lawmakers, Democrats ready to follow Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby's massive new tax and spending plan, found themselves squeezed between their leadership and Texas Republicans in the White House.

## Protest Walkout

Incensed, state Sen. Carl Parker, D-Port Arthur, led the protest walkout and had plenty to say outside.

Parker will quarterback Hobby's bill through the Senate, and if Secretary Cavazos shot his new spending plan full of holes in his speech, Parker more than paid him back in media barbs.

Parker thinks Cavazos has back-shot every public school kid in the state.

## Party Crasher

Sen. Carlos Truan, D-Corpus Christi, did more than that: he crashed the secretary's post-speech press conference to say:

"I feel betrayed and I feel embarrassed that the secretary of education — a minority from Texas — would not take a more aggressive position regarding the needs of education."

Others, including Sen. Hector Uribe, D-Brownsville, and Rep. Eddie Cavazos, D-Corpus Christi, echoed Truan's jabs, and Parker summed his anger: "That wasn't a speech for education; that was an apology for Republican policy."

Secretary Cavazos, who said he had given the speech dozens of times, including congressional committee meetings, commented that "no one has been angry with me until this came up the other day."

"It saddens me — not because it was a personal attack — but because people I have so much respect for take that kind of tactic, in front of television cameras and reporters."

## Bump The Lid

Some Democratic members privately agreed with Cavazos, but few will openly oppose Hobby and Speaker Gib Lewis.

"If money were the answer, then why are we in this jam so soon after we passed two billion plus dollars for the H.B. 72 reforms?", questioned one.

Besides the pressure lawmakers feel to raise taxes during an election, some also resent the futility of the situation. Gov. Bill Clements has promised to slam-dunk into the trash basket any new tax bills.

Clements put a \$200 million lid on new spending for schools because they can take the money from other agencies.

All they're going to get for bumping the lid is a sore head, and

some political careers could die in the ballot box.

## Velvet Gloves Off

They finally made Ann Richards angry enough to take off the velvet gloves, but she replaced them with the boxing variety and zinged her tormentors with a couple of well-placed shots.

For weeks, her gubernatorial opponents, Mark White and Jim Mattox, thrashed her for dodging the issue of past drug abuse.

Turning the guns on them, Richards questioned how White could afford a \$1.3 million mansion in Houston so soon after stints as attorney general and governor.

As for Mattox, she said he should make public whether he received \$200,000 in profit from a real estate investment with Danny Faulkner, a Garland developer whose racketeering trial ended in mistrial.

## Appointments For Sale

Mattox mainly went about his campaign business, but an angry White, answering the charges that "he lined his pockets" while governor, released his income tax filings for the past 16 years.

White is now fighting charges that he enriched himself as governor by appointing individuals to key boards who steered millions of dollars in business to companies that hired White's former Houston law firm.

White and Mattox have been saying that Richards cannot win in November, but she found an

unlikely ally last week, who all but defused the drug issue.

Clayton Williams, at this point the GOP frontrunner, said he thinks Richards has answered the question and that they ought to lay off her on that. He said he won't use it as an issue. Of course, someone else may bring it up.

## Other Highlights

■ If elected attorney general, Sen. Buster Brown, R-Lake Jackson, said he would try to remove U.S. District Judge William Wayne Justice from the federal case involving Texas' crowded prisons.

■ Three of every four Texans believe abortion is a private issue, according to a poll by the Texas Abortion Rights Action League.

■ State Rep. Doyle Willis, D-Fort Worth, filed a bill to bar counties from hiring members of hate groups.

## NOTICE OF TARIFF CHANGE TO CENTRANET® SERVICE

GTE Southwest Incorporated gives notice of its proposed tariff changes to CentraNet® service, which is a Central Office-based service that provides PBX-type features to multi-line business customers and is currently being offered in all company wire centers where such facilities exist to provide the service.

The Public Utility Commission of Texas approved a generic tariff for CentraNet® service up to 100 lines in Docket No. 7652. The proposed tariff revision would establish specific rates for CentraNet® service involving 101 to 400 lines. Other proposed revisions involve the rate applicable to changes, additions, or deletions to the data bases and a new rate is proposed for additional trunks.

The names of the three CentraNet® packages have changed from Standard, Premium, and Deluxe to CentraNet® 1000, CentraNet® 2000, and CentraNet® 3000, respectively. Direct Call Pickup has been added to the three CentraNet® packages while Multiple Call Park and Shared Speed Call 30 have been added to CentraNet® 2000, and Speed Call 30 and Call Forward Busy/No Answer Split have been added to CentraNet® 3000. Flexible Night Answer and Automatic Route Selection also have been added as new optional features.

The proposed changes and new service offerings have been assigned Docket No. 9251, and pursuant to Section 43(d) of the Public Utility Regulatory Act will become effective June 23, 1990. Rates for service will be applicable to customers who subscribe to the service as well as existing customers. Therefore, there will be no effect on any other rates of the company. The company's gross annual revenues will increase by approximately \$399,600, or less than one percent annually.

The proposed rates are on file with the Public Utility Commission of Texas, and are available for public inspection at the offices of GTE Southwest Incorporated. Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission. The deadline to intervene in this docket is 3:00 p.m., April 9, 1990.

## Eating Nutritiously in Restaurants

If you're trying to eat nutritiously, you don't have to give control over your diet to a restaurant when you decide to eat out. Try some of these ideas from the Society for Nutrition Education to eat well without abandoning a good diet.

Unless you're restricting calories, you don't have to stick with plain fish and a green salad when you eat in a restaurant. It's best, of course, to choose lean foods, but you can eat almost anything as long as you remember portion control.

Tell the waiter you want a smaller than normal-size portion. Some restaurants will give half-portioned and charge less, but many won't. Tell the waiter to bring you half the regular serving anyway. If you can't bring yourself to ask for a smaller amount, eat only half of a full entree and ask the waiter to take the rest away.

Other ways to reduce the amount you eat is to choose one or two appetizers rather than a regular meal, order items a la carte for less total food and when you have a dessert, share it with a friend.

If you have trouble avoiding the high-calorie, high-fat temptations at the salad bar, ask the waitress to get a bowl of fresh greens and vegetables for you.

Read the menu with an eye toward cooking terms that mean "fat-added." For example, "saute" also means added butter, "tempura" is batter-fried, "au gratin" means cheese sauce. If the entree you want is fried, ask if it can be broiled instead.

Since butter is 100 calories per tablespoon, switch to sour cream at 26 calories per tablespoon. Or even better, ask the waiter for a small dish of cottage cheese or yogurt for your baked potato.

Ask for all toppings -- salad dressings, sauces and gravies -- to be served "on the side." Then you control how much will be added to the dish.

And if you can't resist the french fries, order the thicker "steak" fries instead of the thin type. They soak up less fat. Good luck with your healthy eating!

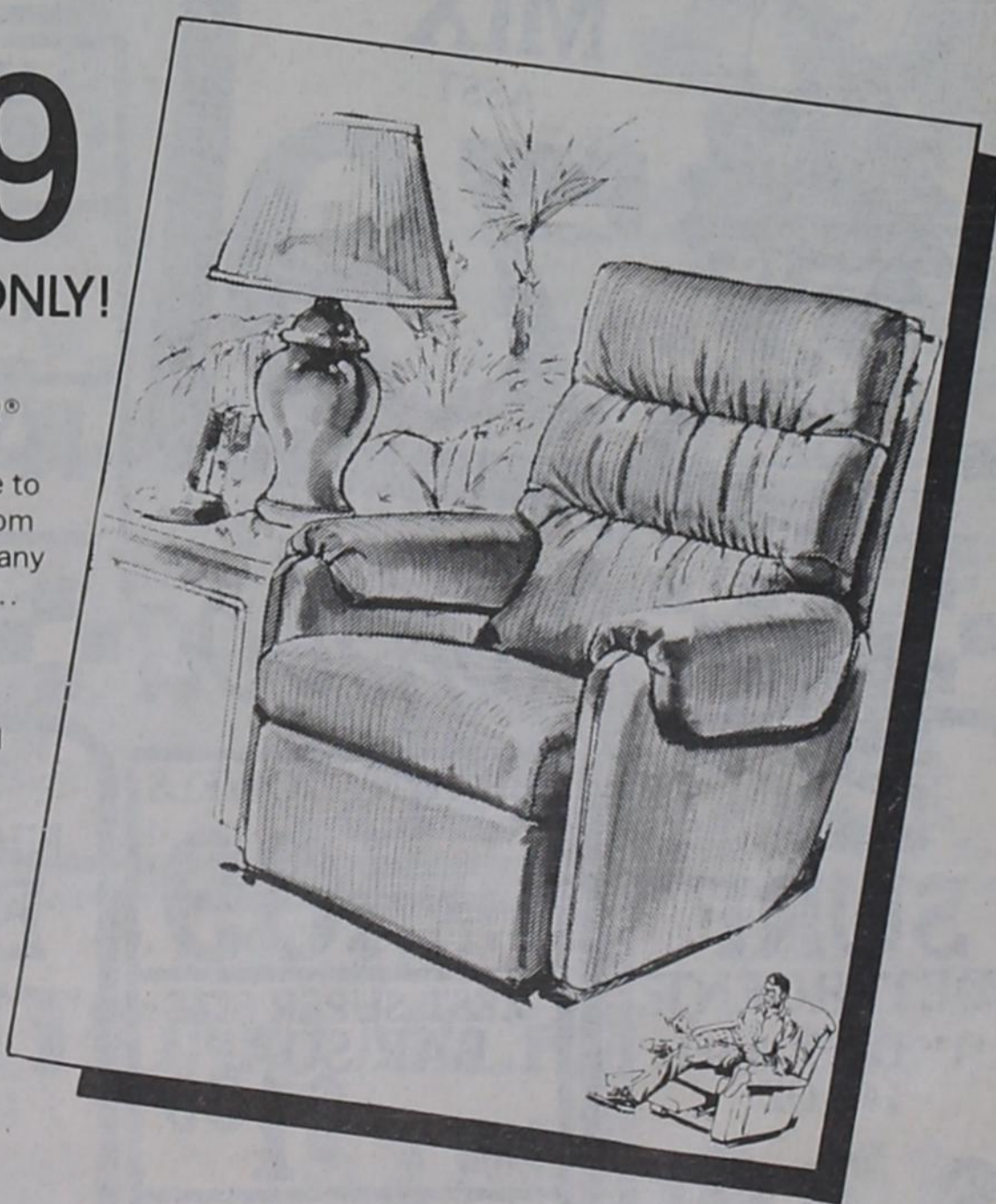

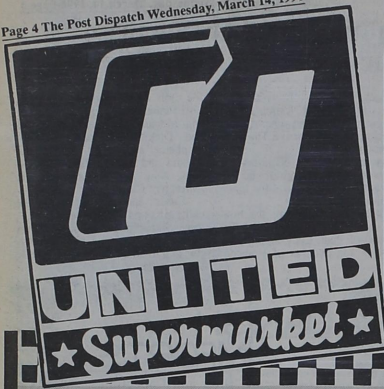

## Edgewood ISD Will Lose Funds Under Supreme Court Ruling

Edgewood ISD, the plaintiff in the lawsuit that led the Texas Supreme Court to declare the state's school finance system unconstitutional, will lose as much as \$18 million in state funds under the Supreme Court's guidelines for reform.

This is the conclusion of a study produced by Kathy Hayes and Daniel Slottje, two economists at Southern Methodist University. The study was published by the National Center for Policy Analysis, a Dallas-based research institute.

In Edgewood vs Kirby, 67 school districts challenged the constitutionality of the Texas school finance system on the grounds that property-poor school districts have access to too little money. In ruling for the plaintiffs, the Texas Supreme Court said that school districts must have access to substantially equal resources if they tax at the same rates.

"Many people assume that the Supreme Court decision requires more equality in school revenues. In fact, the court ruled that there must be equal revenue for equal tax effort," said Hayes. "Because many of the plaintiff school districts in the lawsuit have below average tax rates, this will cause them to have below average revenues."

Using a strict interpretation of the Supreme Court ruling, the NCPA study predicted a number of surprises:

\* Of the 67 plaintiff school districts that "won" the case, at least 27 (more than a third) will lose revenue because of the Supreme Court decision.

\* Of the 49 defendant school districts that "lost" the case, at least 10 will gain revenue under the ruling.

\* Of the 30 districts most affected by the ruling, 19 districts (including Houston, Dallas and Austin) did not enter the case on either side.

"The Supreme Court ruled that tax rates should be the main determinant of school revenues," said Hayes. "In effect, the Court said 'from each according to his ability,

to each according to his effort.' The ruling will lead to even more inequality than we now have." According to the study:

\* If inequality is measured on a scale of 0 to 1 (where 0 is perfect equality), school revenues in Texas currently have an inequality measure of 1.5.

\* A strict interpretation of the Supreme Court ruling will lead to an inequality measure of .20.

According to the study, if the state were to try to meet the Court's mandate by spending enough additional money so that no school district would lose revenue, the additional annual spending would have to equal at least \$450 billion. On the other hand, if the state meets the mandate by redistributing existing education dollars:

\* The State of Texas will have to redistribute \$1.07 billion of current spending.

\* The school districts facing the biggest losses will be the large cities, including Houston (\$219 million), Dallas (\$105 million), Austin (51 million) and San Antonio (\$28 million).

\* The school districts realizing the largest gains include districts on the Texas/Mexico border with large Hispanic populations, as well as some large city suburbs.

## Drilling Permits Decreased in February

A total of 1,155 drilling permits were issued by the Railroad Commission in February, according to RRC Chairman Kent Hance. In January, the total was 1,313. February 1989's total was 867.

The February total included 697 permits to drill new oil and gas tests, 47 to reenter existing well bores, 29 to deepen existing holes, 158 to plugback existing holes, and 74 for other wells. Operators were also issued 150 amended drilling permits.

Hance said permits issued for new oil and gas holes in February included 35 in the San Antonio area (District 1), 31 in the Refugio area (District 2), 41 in Southeast Texas (District 3), 72 in deep South Texas (District 4), 16 in East Central Texas (District 5), 50 in East Texas (District 6), 87 in West Central Texas (District 7B), 67 in the San Angelo area (District 7C), 139 in the Midland area (District 8), 40 in the Lubbock area (District 8A), 89 in North Texas (District 9), and 30 in the Panhandle (District 10).

In the first two months of 1990, the Commission has issued 2,468 drilling permits, a 25 percent increase from the 1,861 issued during the same period of 1989.

## Bentson Urges EPA to Relax Landfill Rules

Senator Lloyd Bentson asked Thursday for assurances that the federal government will consider the impact of proposed landfill regulations on rural communities in Texas.

Bentson wrote Environmental Protection Agency Administrator William Reilly and urged that EPA thoroughly analyze the effect new regulations for garbage disposal will have on sparsely populated areas and small towns. The regulations are scheduled to be released later this year.

"More than 100 local officials have asked for my assistance to ensure they can comply with planned new regulations on municipal landfills. They are concerned that the particular situations in their areas may make it difficult, if not impossible, to comply with regulations that are being discussed," Bentson said.

"The diverse geology and low population in many counties of my state are sound reasons why Texas officials must have flexibility to structure effective, realistic landfill programs that meet the unique needs of our state. What makes sense in New Jersey does not necessarily make sense in West Texas."

"Forty-eight counties and thirty-five cities in Texas have formed a coalition to highlight their situation. For example, garbage disposal needs are largely dependent on the amount of garbage an area has. In Upton County, less than four people
