No-Accident Plea For Dec. 15 S-Day Issued Here By Garza County Judge

Issuing an appeal to all residents of Garza County to prevent traffic accidents on S-D Day (Safe Driving Day) Dec. 15, County Judge Oscar Graham said today that the challenge of highway safety is one that must be met on rural roads as well as urban streets.

Roads outside the incorporated limits of cities and towns may be the proving ground where the success of S-D Day is decided, Judge Graham said. He reminded: "More than twice as many deaths in traffic occur in the country as in the city. That has been the national experience for several years. In 1953, for example, there were 27,200 deaths on rural roads compared to 11,100 on urban streets, according to statistics compiled by the National Safety Council.

"Traffic safety is particularly important to persons who live on farms and in rural areas. That's because no other segment of the population is more directly dependent on highway transportation.

"The support of farm people is urgently needed to assure the success of S-D Day and the whole

continuing program of highway safety. Last year more farm people died in traffic accidents than from any other cause. This fact points up the farmer's personal stake."

City drivers venturing on the open road were urged by Judge Graham to be particularly attentive because driving on the rural highway differs from driving on the urban street in many important respects.

With more than 3,000 pedestrian deaths on rural roads last year it behooves drivers to remember that there are walkers in the country as well as in town, Judge Graham said.

S-D Day, which is being sponsored by President Eisenhower's Action Committee for Traffic Safety in cooperation with public officials and numerous national organizations, has as its objective the elimination of all traffic accidents for Dec. 15. Its purpose is to demonstrate that the solution to the traffic accident problem is within the grasp of any community when its citizens are willing to accept their responsibilities as drivers and pedestrians.

Motorists and pedestrians in Garza County can assure the success of S-D Day locally, Judge Graham said, if they will do these three things:

First, observe the letter and the spirit of all traffic regulations;

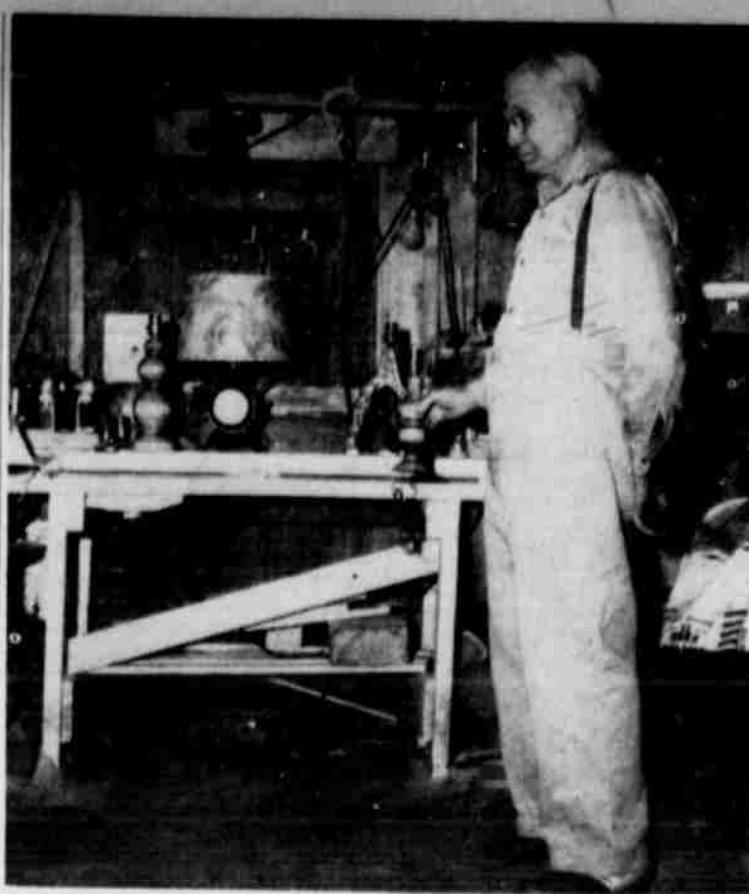
Second, be courteous to every driver and pedestrian—practice sportsmanship;

Third, give full attention to driving and walking;

In other words, drive and walk as they would have all others drive and walk.

The record so far this year, Judge Graham pointed out, shows that people can cut down accidents if they want to and will work at it. For the first nine months of this year accidents are below the same months of last year. Such barometer periods as the Fourth of July and Labor Day weekends show that the trend is down and can be further reduced.

Hobby Will Keep Post Blacksmith Occupied Long After He Retires

After fifty years of blacksmithing—37 of them in Post—W. M. (Bill) Zetzman says he's going to retire after this season.

"But I won't be idle," says Zetzman. "I'm already making plans to enlarge my home workshop where I'll continue to make lamps, coffee tables, gun racks, spurs, bits, and other articles."

Zetzman, who is 68 years old, didn't start on his present hobby until last August, but since that time has turned out dozens of articles at his downtown blacksmith shop and his workshop at his home at 119 North Avenue L.

A number of the articles made by Zetzman are on display at McCrary Appliance Co. One of the table lamps on display there was made out of wood from a dead elm tree in his front yard. Another of his unique lamps was made from cactus, which he had to heat in an oven before he could use.

"It's better to let cactus season, but I didn't have time so I

just heated it in an oven until it became usable," he said.

Zetzman uses five-eighths inch oil field sucker rods to make spurs and bits and finishes them up on a home-made sander in his workshop. Not only his sander, but also his coping saw and lathe are home-made tools.

"I sold more than \$100 worth of spurs last winter and can do better than that on spurs and other things when I get more time to put in on them," he said.

Zetzman says he has an order in for some bois d'arc wood from which he plans to construct a set of dominoes. "I feel that I'm letting myself in for a real job, but I believe I can do it," he said.

Zetzman, a native Texan, began his blacksmith trade at Roscoe when he was 18. His father was a carpenter, but the son learned his blacksmith trade on equipment made by the elder Zetzman in 1902.

After 13 years in Roscoe, Zetzman moved to Post. He has been in the same location here—one block off Main Street on South Avenue L.

Blacksmithing isn't what it used to be, Zetzman says. "It's been a long time since I've shod a horse. Plow sharpening and other farm equipment work is just about it nowadays."

Zetzman operated a welding shop in connection with his blacksmith shop until 1947 when he sold out because his health wouldn't permit him to operate both businesses.

He and Mrs. Zetzman have one child, Mrs. I. U. Parker, who lives in Dallas.

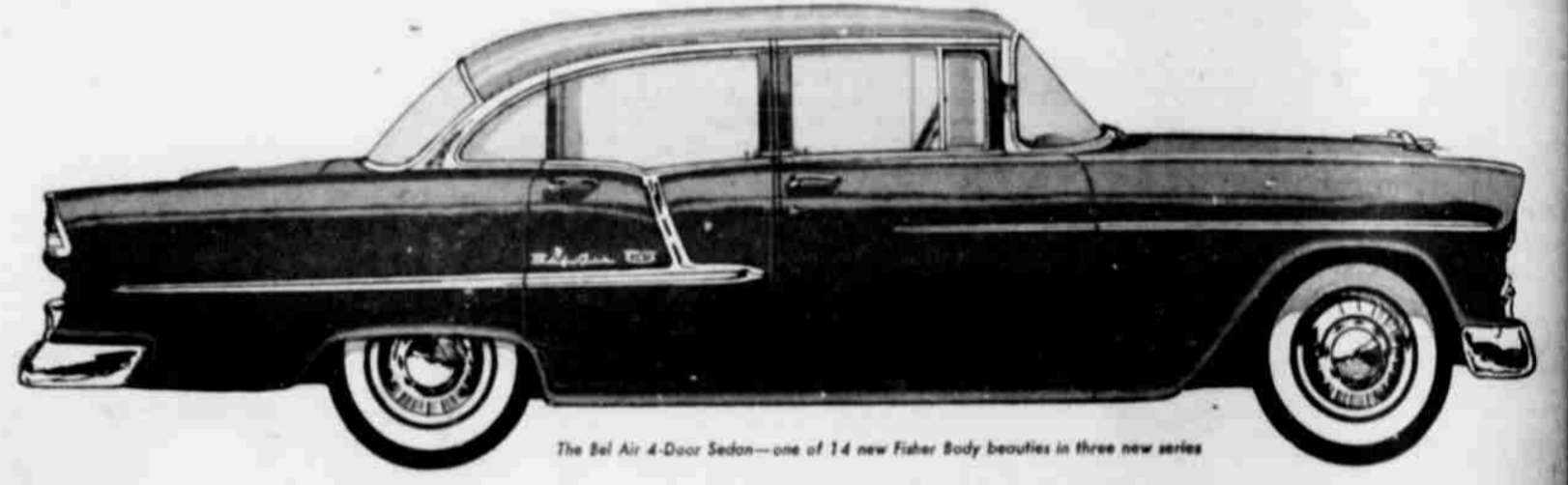

To Miss First Yuletide Mail Rush In More Than 30 Years

Mail is the most important thing in a man's life, next to his family, believes W. O. Holly, who retired here last week after 30 years as a postal employee.

Except for five months of the 30 years he put in as a postal employee, Holly was a rural route carrier. He estimates that he was mailman for anywhere from 1,500 to 2,000 families during that time.

The first two and a half years, he was a rural route carrier out of the Potosi post office, near Abilene. In 1927, he began serving a 35-mile route out of the Abilene post office, and it was not until 18 years later that he came to Post.

In July, 1945, he began serving Post's 80-mile Route 2, over half of which is in Lynn County. It takes in the communities of Close City, Hackberry, Gordon and Garnolia, and lies between the Tahoka Highway and a straight line west from South-

land.

Although his mail route at Abilene was 45 miles shorter than the one here, it served approximately 900 families as compared with the 200 or so on the Post route.

"I came along several years late for the horse and buggy days of the rural route carrier, but I've worn out lots of automobiles," Holly said. On his first route at Potosi, he drove a Dodge. Last June, when he was transferred from Route 2 to a clerk's job in the post office here, he was serving his mail patrons in a De Soto.

"In between," Holly said, "I've driven about 13 other cars, including Fords, Chevrolets, Nashes, Willys, Hudsons and Studebakers."

"I've always believed," he said, "that the man hasn't lived who doesn't make a mistake now and then, but the ones I've made on my mail routes seem to have been overlooked by the patrons. I never heard any complaints, but then maybe it was just because they were all a good bunch of people. I've never had a serious run-in with anybody."

Holly said he'd often opened mail boxes to find gifts of fruits

and vegetables and other tokens. "I'd even get them from people who never got much mail," he said.

Mr. and Mrs. Holly moved last week to Austin, where he will assist his son, W. O. (Bill) Holly, Jr., in the management of the Perpetual Care Cemetery, which his son owns.

Holly has two other children, L. B., who is a petroleum engineer in Abilene, and Mrs. Daisy Nell Martin, who is a teacher in the Lubbock Public Schools.

"This will be the first Christmas mail rush I've missed in more than thirty years," Holly mused.

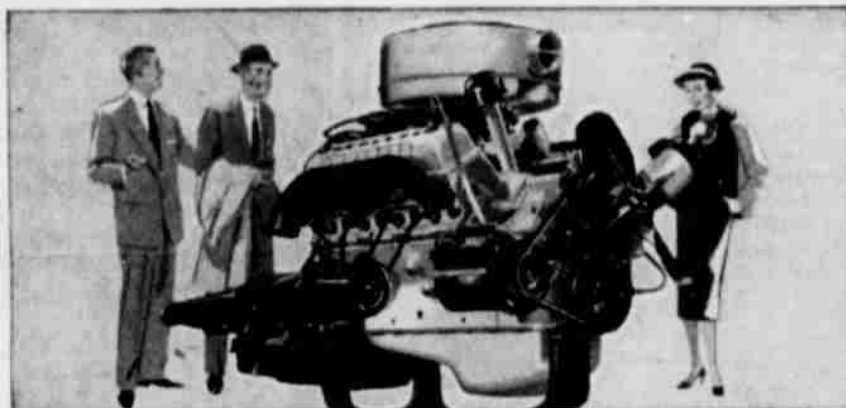

1/4 cup marshmallows
1/4 cup butter or margarine
1/4 cup Peet's evaporated milk
1 cup hot milk
1 cup marshmallows
1/2 cup cream
6 oz. package milk
1/2 cup chocolate chips (1 oz)

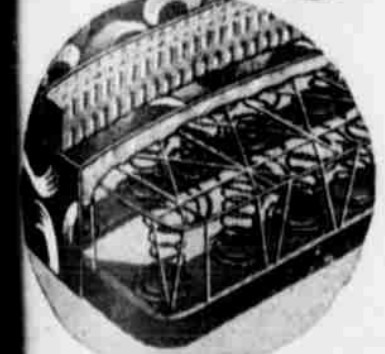
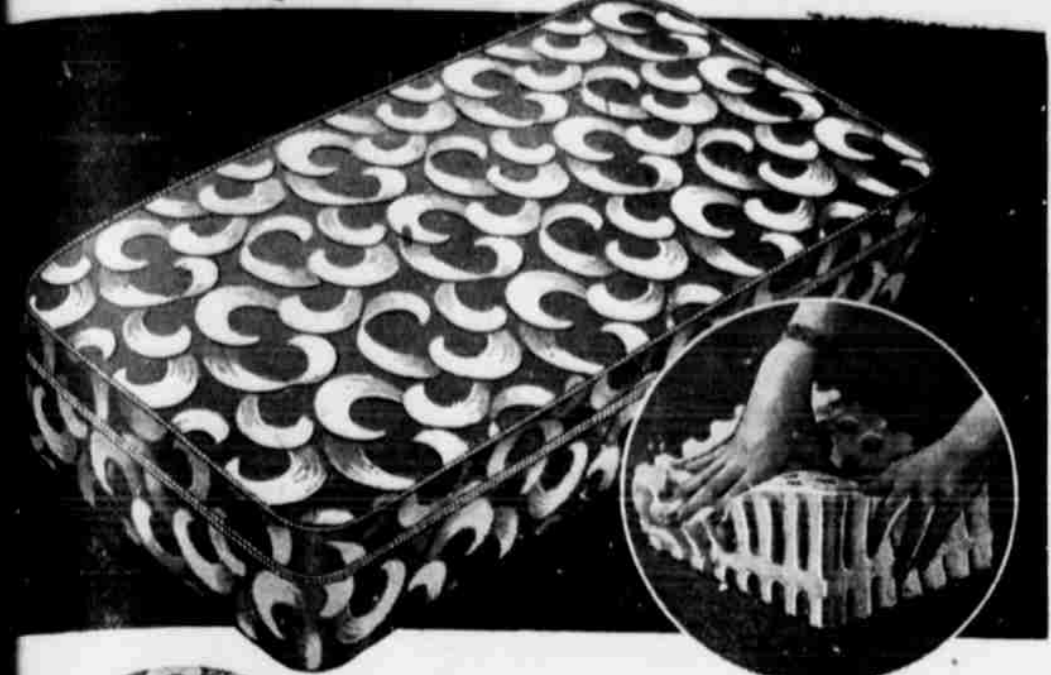
