Commissioners Delay Action on Center Audit

The Garza County Commissioners' Court postponed until the April 9 meeting a decision on contracting for a review of all county-owned property, as proposed by Mary Stewart and Associates of San Antonio.

Stewart presented the proposal during the regular meeting Monday morning. The inventory of county-owned property would include researching land and court records from the beginning of the county's establishment and would provide commissioners a comprehensive listing of all property owned by the county, including mineral rights and easements.

"If we found just 20 acres," Judge E.A. Howard commented, "that would be enough to pay for the job." Stewart's fee for the search is \$2,950 and would be completed within six to eight weeks after starting. Although commissioners expressed interest in the project, they voted to postpone a decision until April 9 to study the proposed contract further.

In other action, the court rejected the lone bid of \$65 from Bill Mueller for two used copying machines. "Seems to me we could get that much out of using them for spare parts," commissioner Herb Walls said.

"They're really not much use anymore," treasurer Voda Beth Gradine explained, "those type machines aren't being built."

"I use the old Xerox machine for a table top," county clerk Sonny Gossett added.

"Well, that saves us from having to buy another table," Walls said.

Judge Howard reported to the commissioners that field notes have been received by county attorney Preston Poole, for the right-of-way at Lake Alan Henry. Land appraisals and owner contact will be next in the process of building the highway at lake site near Justiceburg. Walls will work with Poole on land appraisals and owner contact.

V.O. Rasbury was appointed by the court to serve the unexpired term of Buddy Skinner on the Lake Alan Henry Regulatory Board, established by Garza County.

The commissioners' court voted to approve employee withholding for memberships in the Lynn County Credit Union, effective May 1.

Gradine informed the court that Steve Sawyers estimated his cost between \$600 and \$700 to audit the community center joint agreement with the City of Post. A decision to approve the audit was placed on the April 9 agenda.

A discussion concerning maintenance of the courthouse outside grounds concluded the meeting, with no decision made.

Extension Seminar at Ginners Convention Seeks To Boost Yield

Ways cotton producers can achieve their goals of the '90s to gain higher yields, premium quality and greater profits will be outlined in a seminar April 5 during the annual trade show and convention of the Texas Cotton Ginners' Association. The convention annually draws more than 6,000 ginners, producers, officials and others in the industry.

The seminar will be conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service from 1:15 to 4:30 p.m. in the banquet hall of the Memorial Civic Center, site of the convention. It will conclude the 33rd annual meeting of Plains Cotton Growers, which is open to all interested persons.

The significance of marketing fiber quality will be explained in the opening presentation by Dr. Don Ethridge, professor of agricultural economics at Texas Tech University, Lubbock.

Beginning in 1991, the system for grading cotton will change and this will impact on the way cotton is marketed. Ethridge will show how producers can use the new rules to do a better job of marketing their crop.

Dr. Robert Metzger, Extension Service cotton agronomist at College Station, will be moderator.

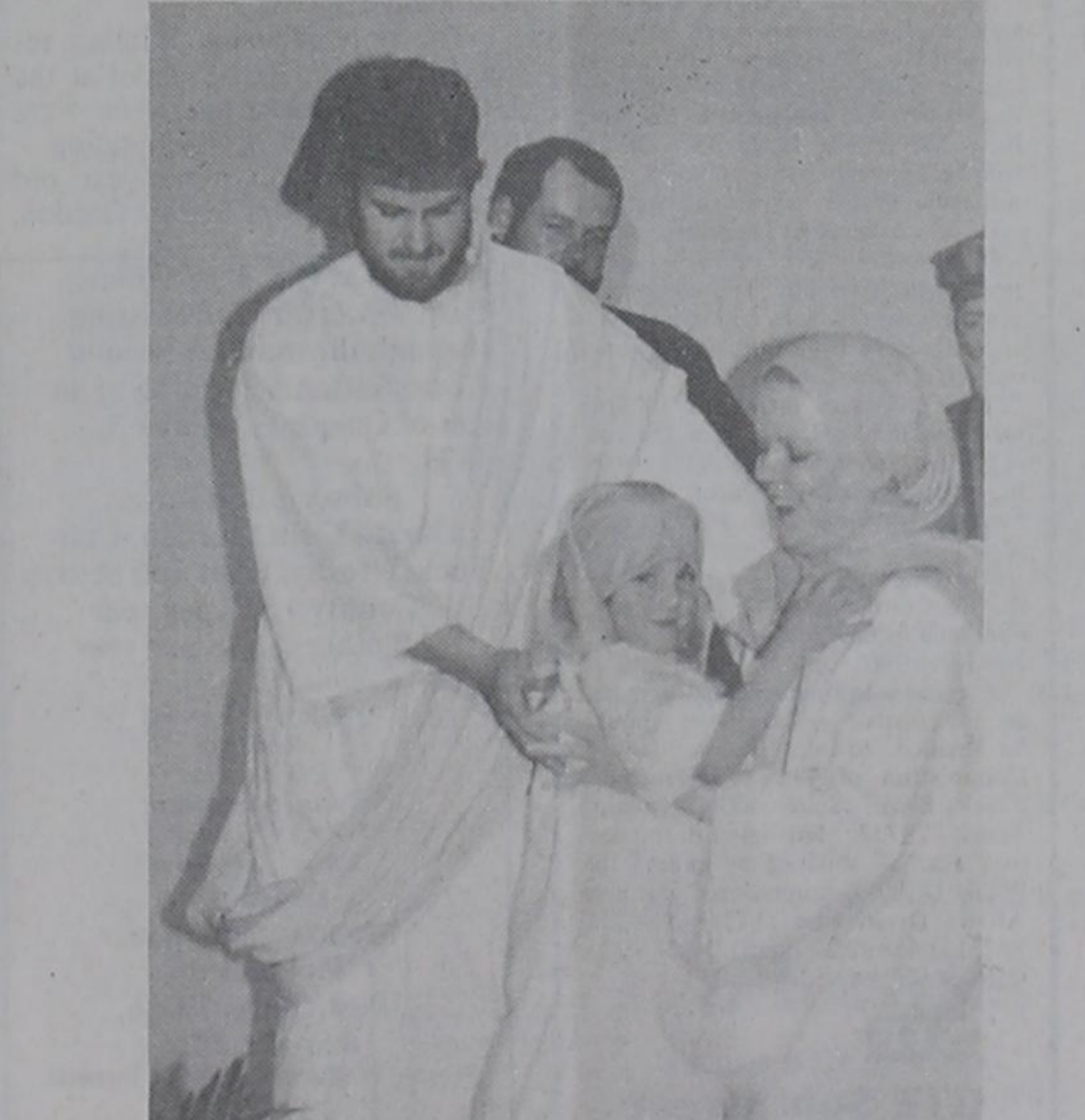
A 1987 graduate of Post High School, Graves is majoring in Agricultural Services and Development at the University. He is the son of Ronnie and Diane Graves of Post.

The U.S. Census Bureau has issued a call for county residents to apply for temporary jobs. The U.S. Census Bureau will be at the Community Action Center on Friday, April 6 at 9 a.m. and 1 p.m.

The Public Utility Commission of Texas approved a generic tariff for CentraNet® service up to 100 lines in Docket No. 7652. The proposed tariff revision would establish specific rates for CentraNet® service involving 101 to 400 lines. Other proposed revisions involve the rate applicable to changes, additions, or deletions to the data bases and a new rate is proposed for additional trunks.

The names of the three CentraNet® packages have changed from Standard, Premium, and Deluxe to CentraNet® 1000, CentraNet® 2000, and CentraNet® 3000, respectively. Direct Call Pickup has been added to the three CentraNet® packages while Multiple Call Park and Shared Speed Call 30 have been added to CentraNet® 2000, and Speed Call 30 and Call Forward Busy/No Answer Split have been added to CentraNet® 3000. Flexible Night Answer and Automatic Route Selection also have been added as new optional features.

The proposed changes and new service offerings have been assigned Docket No. 9251, and pursuant to Section 43(d) of the Public Utility Regulatory Act will become effective June 23, 1990. Rates for service will be applicable to customers who subscribe to the service as well as existing customers. Therefore, there will be no effect on any other rates of the company. The company's gross annual revenues will increase by approximately \$399,600, or less than one percent annually.

The proposed rates are on file with the Public Utility Commission of Texas, and are available for public inspection at the offices of GTE Southwest Incorporated. Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission. The deadline to intervene in this docket is 3:00 p.m., April 9, 1990.

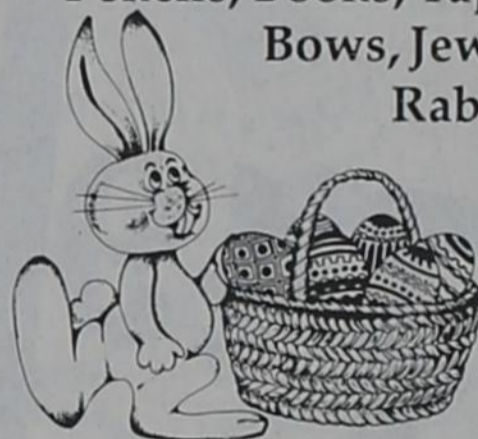

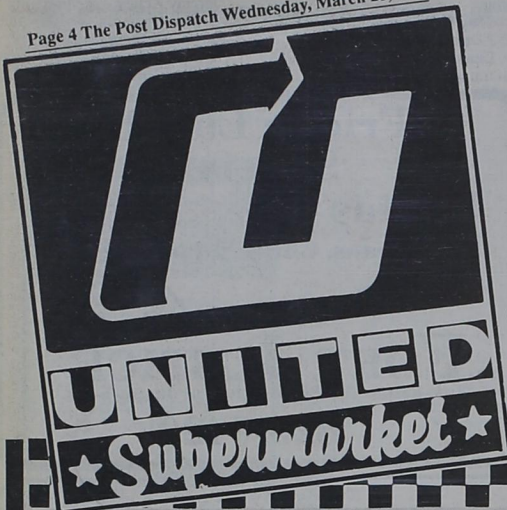



Call Control Options include six new services - Call Blocker, Call Cue, Call Return, Priority Call, Call Trace and Selective Call Forwarding. The features will be available to single-line residence and business customers.

Call Blocker - enables the customer to block incoming calls from a maximum of three specified telephone numbers and/or to block the last incoming call.

Call Cue - enables the customer to automatically redial the last outgoing telephone number dialed. If the recalled number is busy, equipment will monitor the line for a maximum of 30 minutes and will let the customer know when the call can go through.

Call Return - enables the customer to automatically redial the telephone number of the most recent incoming call. If the number is busy, Call Return will continue to dial the number for up to 30 minutes, or until it completes the call.

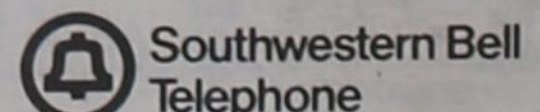

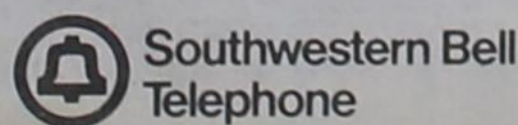

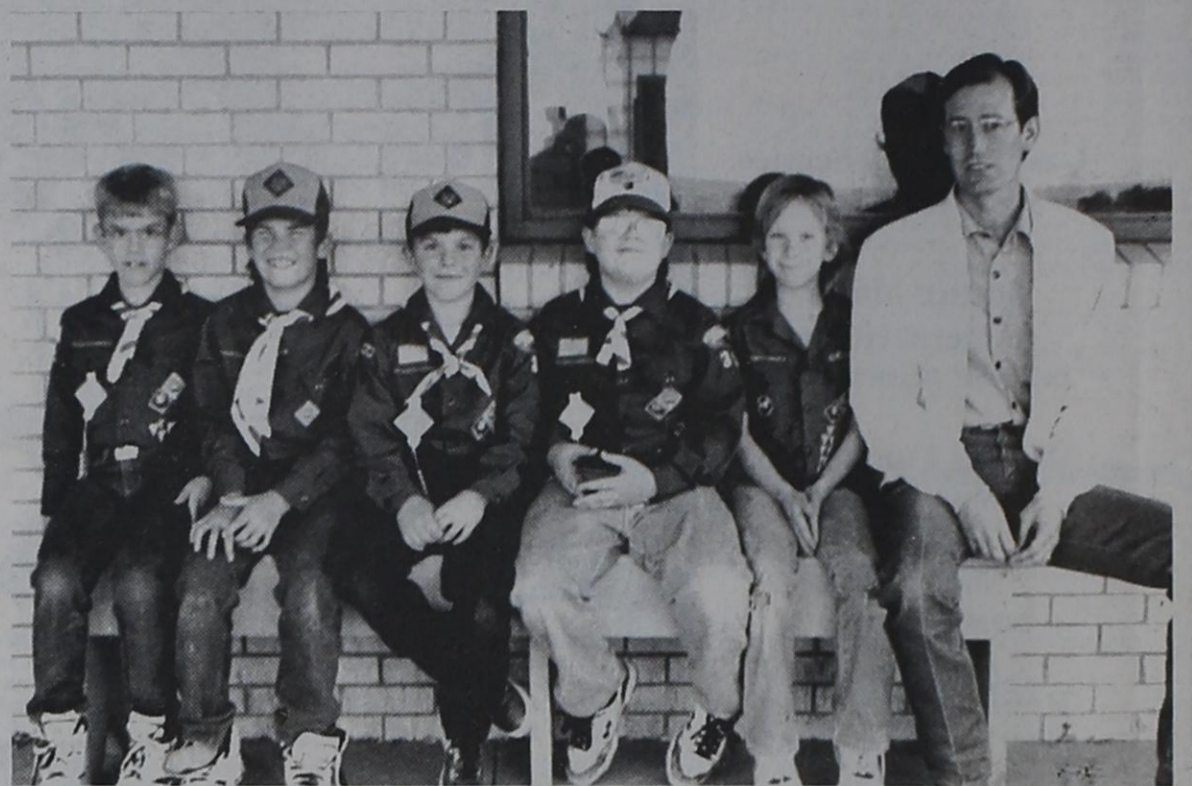
