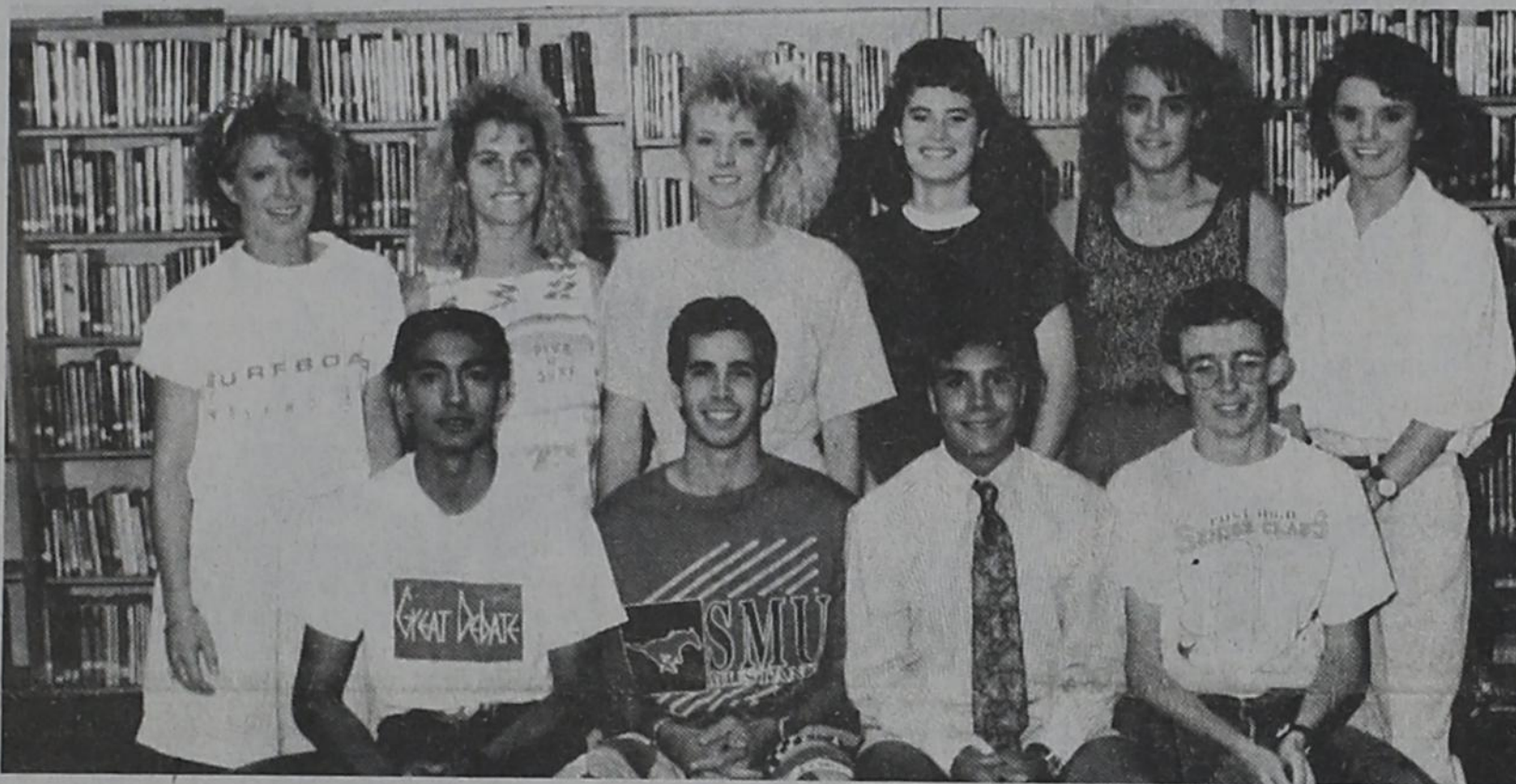

Counts votes for education bill, faces Clements' veto

On May 9, 1990, Representative David Counts voted to pass Senate Bill 1 in the Texas House of Representatives.

The Bill passed the House and was sent to a House/Senate Conference Committee.

Texas Against State Income Taxes fear this bill will force the Texas legislature to adopt a state income tax in the January, 1991 regular session of the legislature.

In a May 7th press release, Governor Bill Clements stated in regard to Senate Bill 1 that "That this is nothing short of an income tax bill masquerading as education reform. Despite some window-dressing, this bill would end up costing Texans \$8 billion to \$9 billion over the next five years. Tex-

ans would be handed a massive budget deficit that could only be filled by a state income tax."

"With our state sales tax already one of the highest in the nation, such a massive spending program is a liberal trick to force Texans to accept a state income tax," said an exasperated Richard Ford, Chairman of Texans Against State Income Tax.

Ford continued, "We think this is an anti-family vote. When Texas families are strapped, they don't just raise taxes, they adjust their budgets. We think the legislature should do the same by giving non-mandatory guidelines to future legislators to spend within available

Medicines Relieve Peptic Ulcers

There are a variety of medicines used to treat peptic ulcers (lesions which form in the stomach and the first segment of the small intestine):

Neutralizing Agents: Calcium carbonate and other antacid ingredients neutralize stomach acid and, in adequate doses, relieve pain and promote ulcer healing.

Special Antihistamines (H-2 Blockers): These prescription medicines, which include cimetidine, ranitidine, and nizatidine, reduce the amount of hydrochloric acid that is secreted into the stomach.

Coating Agents: Sucralfate is a nonabsorbable adhesive substance that binds to and protects damaged gastrointestinal tissues. Studies show that this substance provides protection equivalent to that provided by H-2 blockers.

New Ulcer Medicines: The Food and Drug Administration has recently approved two new peptic ulcer medicines. Misoprostol controls the amount of stomach acid secreted and also helps replace substances in stomach tissue that are removed by nonsteroidal antiinflammatory medicines. Omeprazole, a so-called "proton pump inhibitor," acts as a long lasting inhibitor of stomach acid secretion.

Hightower slams ICI refusal to test

Because of the refusal of its manufacturer to conduct more studies of its potential to pollute groundwater, Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower said today that he cannot act upon a request to grant special permission to use the herbicide Reflex on the Plains of West Texas.

At a Lubbock press conference with area cotton farmers on March 6, Hightower said, "If ICI Americas will agree to begin the testing necessary to answer Texas Department of Agriculture concerns about the potential for leaching and runoff of Reflex, residues remaining after application and laboratory methods for detecting Reflex, we will grant their application."

ICI Americas replied in a March 27 letter: "ICI, like the TDA, recognizes the serious situation facing the West Texas farmer who has woollyleaf bursage infested acreage, and is interested in obtaining an approved Reflex label for their use. However, it is with regret that ICI-A hereby advises TDA that due to resource constraints brought on by our commitment to comply with the EPA FIFRA-Lite requirements affecting fourteen of our federal product line registrations, we cannot commit any further resources to develop additional data for this specific use." The letter was

signed by ICI registration specialist Maruca Z. Lopez.

The Texas Water Commission, in a letter dated November 3, 1989, told TDA it would not support registration of Reflex without additional testing data from ICI Americas. In a May 7, 1990, letter, an EPA official said that preliminary tests on Reflex were indicative of groundwater pollution and that further testing is warranted.

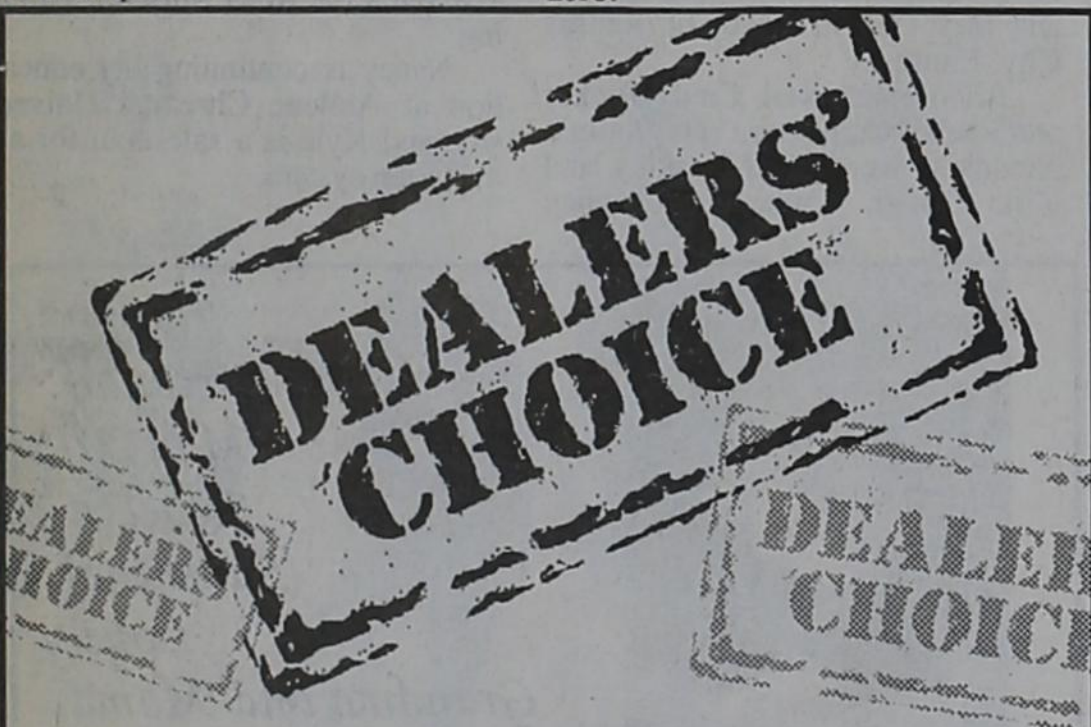
"The losers here are the farmers of the South Plains," Hightower said. "The Texas Water Commission, the Environmental Protection Agency and my own staff fear that this herbicide has a great potential to pollute groundwater. Without further testing, ICI Americas cannot prove that Reflex will not leach into the aquifer," Hightower said.

"I am holding ICI's application, hoping that the company will change its mind and agree to do the necessary testing. But until it does agree, there is no way that I can approve this application," Hightower said.

"Woollyleaf bursage is a weed that is laying waste to more than 300,000 acres of prime farmland on the Plains," Hightower said. "It doesn't just reduce yields or slow down production, it can devastate a crop. In many instances, yields are zero."

"ICI Americas has sought approval for several years for the use of Reflex on lakewood."

"We have had to say no in the past because ICI has not provided the data to satisfy TDA that Reflex can be used safely," Hightower said. "Our chief concern is the potential for groundwater contamination. We're very sensitive to the need to protect the precious Ogallala water supply on the Plains. We don't want to take chances that could endanger that precious resource," Hightower said.

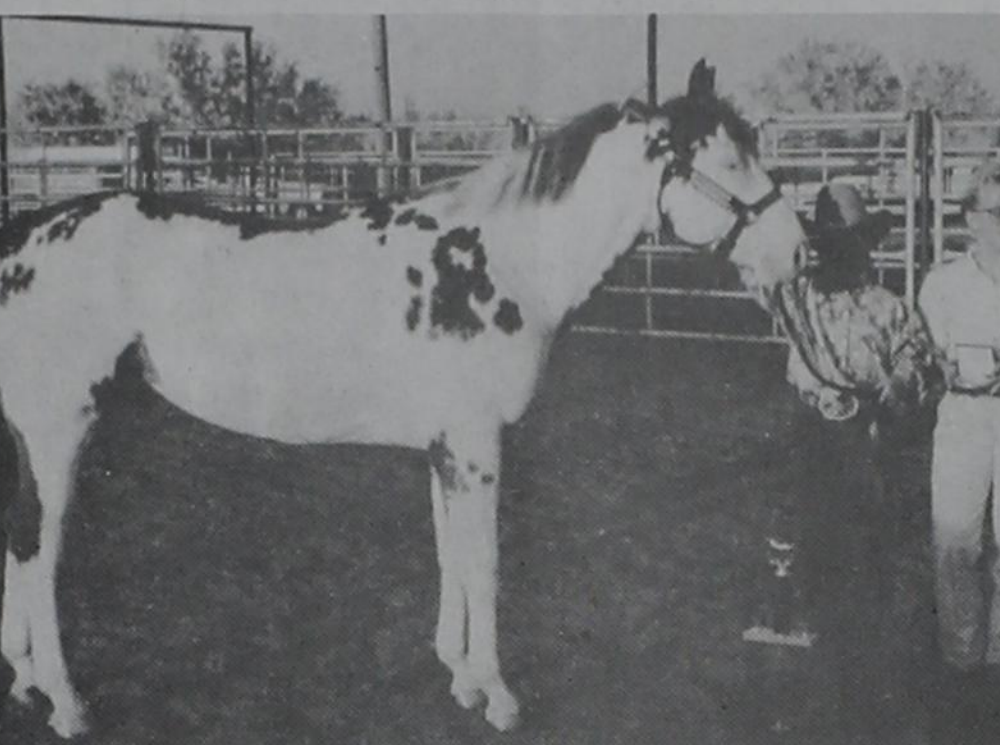

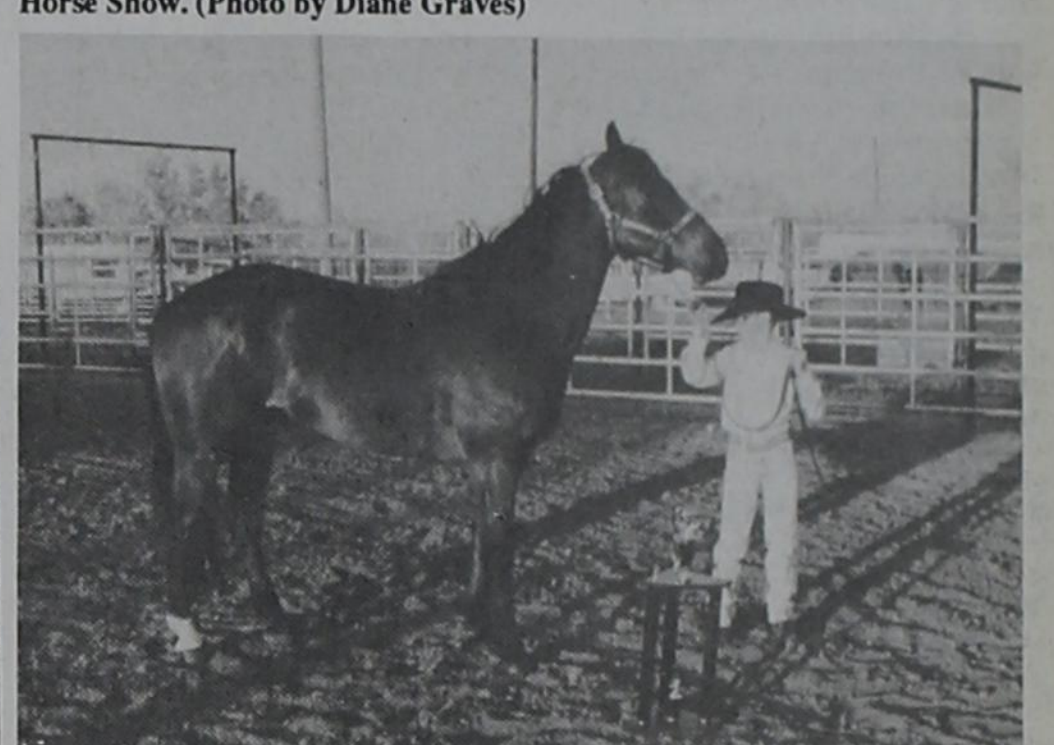

Buckle Up America!

May 21-28 is Buckle Up America! Week. As vacation season begins, the Texas Coalition for Safety Belts reminds motorists that buckling up is still the best way to arrive home safely -- even in cars equipped with air bags.

In fact, the theme for Buckle Up Week is "Belts and Bags - A Winning Combination."

"Many Americans believe that air bags will protect them in a crash, even if they don't buckle up," said George R. Gustafson, coalition spokesperson and president of Texas Safety Association. "They're dead wrong. The air bag and safety belt are made to work together."

Some facts about air bags, safety belts, and traffic in Texas:

-- Air bags deploy only in frontal crashes. They don't work in sideswipes or rollovers. Working alone, they are only 20% to 40% effective in preventing death and injury.

-- A lap/shoulder belt and air bag, used together, came as much as 55% effective.

-- If you don't have an air bag, don't worry. That lap/shoulder belt, manual or automatic, is still the best single restraint for adults. Used alone, its 45% to 50% effective against death and injury.

-- An approved child seat, properly secured, is about 70% effective for infants and toddlers.

-- Since the Texas safety belt law took effect in September 1985, belt use has quadrupled. Sixty-three percent of Texas drivers buckled up in January 1990. Teenage drivers (ages 15-19) are at 54% -- a record high for this age group.

-- Front-seat fatalities were 15% lower in 1989 than in 1984, the last year before the law was passed.

-- Our mileage death rate last year was an all-time record low: 2.1 deaths for every 100 million miles driven.

-- On June 13, 1989, Texas experienced its first day without a traffic death since January 5, 1977.

Funds Available In State Budget For School Reforms

 Our public education system provides the foundation of learning for millions of Texas youngsters. Our educators teach lessons that help shape our children's thinking, lessons that carry them through life. Certainly, every Texan wants our system of education to lead the nation in excellence. We all want schools that guarantee every youngster the opportunity to succeed to the best of their ability.

Reaching that goal is truly possible. Through a combination of increased spending and comprehensive reforms, our schools can distinguish themselves among America's finest. Let no one doubt, Texas must and will spend more on public education, especially our poorer school districts.

That's why I continue to endorse a bi-partisan plan whose goal is to increase funding to these districts by more than \$4 billion dollars over the next five years. This blueprint would not tie the hands of future legislatures by requiring them to come up with added funding. Instead, it would provide a framework for them to use.

Because of legislation I signed last summer, nearly a half billion dollars in additional funds has been set aside for our property poor schools. In fact, this money is already flowing. I have called on our Legislature to increase that amount by \$250 million for the upcoming school year.

To pay for this increase, I have identified surplus funds in non-essential areas of our state's current \$49 billion budget. Let me emphasize that these excess funds are sitting in the state treasury and can be readily targeted at public education. In all, my proposals would involve the transfer of less than one percent of funds in the budget -- a move that would not impact services in any matter whatsoever.

Still, some members of the Legislature have fought our recommendations. Instead, lawmakers have passed a bill that would increase our sales tax to an all-time high, making it the second highest in America behind Connecticut. The average Texas family already pays more than \$1,200 in state sales taxes annually, either directly or indirectly. If the Legislature had its way -- which it won't -- that amount would jump to \$1,300.

I cannot and will not accept that, not while other funding options exist and certainly not while the money we need is available in the state budget. When faced with a financial crisis, Texans adjust their household budgets. State govern-

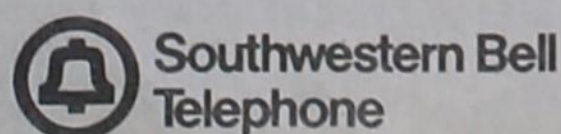

ment should do no less. Raising taxes is the easy way out, but it's not the only way and certainly, it's not the right way.

Futhermore, in its ruling in the education lawsuit known as Edgewood vs. Kirby, the Texas Supreme Court specifically noted that it was not ordering the Legislature to raise taxes. The court called for wholesale reform of our public school system, which should be at the heart of our actions.

For these reasons, I have vetoed the Legislature's tax bill and I am renewing my call for dramatic steps to improve public education in our state. Spending more on our schools is important, but every parent knows that money alone is not the answer. For years, our educators have been burdened by excessive government red tape and paperwork. It's time that was changed. I urge our Legislature to pass reforms that free our schools of the stran-

glehold of mandates imposed by state government in Austin. Let's return control to you -- parents, teachers and taxpayers -- at the local level.

Moreover, the Legislature's attempt at education "reform" would saddle our state with at least a \$6.1 billion deficit over the next four years. Even their proposed sales tax increase, which would raise only \$600 million a year, would fall far short of paying for their "reforms."

Our current Legislature must not be allowed to pass the buck -- either to the next Legislature or to local property taxpayers. Furthermore, to protect property taxpayers, I support legislation that is at the very cornerstone of local control -- and that is allowing voters to approve any increase in their local tax rates.
