

Civil law suit filed in 106th District Court

Civil rights violation suit filed against Sheriff and Deputies

Garza County Commissioners were informed at the regular meeting Monday morning of a law suit filed in the 106th District Court against Sheriff Freddy Cockrell and Deputies Maurice Herridge and Cliff Laws concerning alleged violations of civil rights and injuries to the plaintiff, Reyes Juanita Lopez and Julian Lopez.

The suit was filed June 28 and notices were served July 5. County attorney Preston Poole is expected to outline the particulars of the case at the July 23 meeting.

The suit, filed on behalf of the petitioners by Sweetwater attorney Zollie C. Steakley, claims that Mrs Lopez was arrested by Herridge and Laws in the spring of 1989 and that the deputies, "acting in the course and scope of their employment as Deputy Sheriffs...during this arrest process...used unnecessary and excessive force against Plaintiff Reyes Juanita Lopez."

The suit also claims that the deputies' actions battered and bruised her body and caused her pain and anxiety.

In other action, commissioners accepted the resignation of Extension Agent Katie Wolfe, who told the court that she is moving to Raton, N.M., where her husband Steve will teach school. The resignation takes effect July 31.

South Plains Community Action representative Bill Powell presented a proposed resolution to the court to support SPCA in its application to the Texas Department of Human Services to be named the system organization for child care management in the 15 county area. Commissioners approved the resolution.

The court approved election judges for the November general election: voting precinct (vp) 1, Betty Striblin; vp 2 Ruby Ellis, vp 3 Susan Pennell, vp 4 John Boren, vp 5 Cleo Sappington, vp 6 Quannah Maxey, vp 7 Ida Mae Wilks and vp 8, Harold Lucas.

Attending the meeting were commissioners Sammy Ellis, Ted Aten, John Valdez and Herbert Walls and county clerk Sonny Gossett.

Council bans skateboarding on business sidewalks

The Post City Council took action Monday night at the regular meeting to restrict skateboarding and other wheeled coasting vehicles from sidewalks in the commercial and historic districts.

The new ordinance specifically prohibits the use of roller skates, bicycles, skateboards "or wheeled coasting devices" within any historical or commercially zoned districts and provides for detention of a minor or sub-minor and for confiscation of the device "for a period of 30 days."

There is also a provision for penalties for offenses for adults.

A sub-minor is defined as anyone below the age of 17.

Violation of the ordinance provides for law enforcement officers to issue a warning citation, advising the offender to cease such activity, and then mail a copy of the citation to the parent of the minor or sub-minor.

Subsequent offenses will allow law enforcement officers to detain the offender until a parent can be notified and appear to secure the release and discharge. The coasting device or devices used in the offense "shall be confiscated for a period of 30 days."

Adult violations are subject to a fine of not less than \$20 and no more than \$500.

In other action, the council approved the public hearing July 19 at 6:30 p.m. at the Pleasant Home Baptist Church for a Community Development Block Grant for paving in the northeast portion of the city. Funding for the project was denied last year, but the city was invited to resubmit the application. Low tax

and water rates were primary reasons Post was not chosen for the grant in the past.

Two structures were scheduled for condemnation by the council following notification procedures to the owners.

The council authorized city manager Bob Turner to continue the negotiations with the Pearl Nance estate for a lot adjacent to the city barn.

A curfew ordinance was discussed, but specific plans for implementation were postponed.

Turner informed the council that a budget would be ready for review at the August 6 meeting. He also told council members that at the recent Texas Municipal League's city manager conference a report on employee drug testing, which emphasized that new federal rules will require cities to implement drug testing procedures in order to be qualified for federal grants or participation programs. No details of a drug testing program were discussed.

Mayor Giles McCrary told the council, "you all missed a great opportunity to learn a lot and benefit from the meeting that were held in Lubbock at the state TML conference." He explained to council members that the seminars on new sanitation disposal rules "were frightening."

"I don't think the people realize how drastic our lives are going to change when these new rules go into affect," the Mayor emphasized.

Attending the meeting were council members Jim Schooler, Larry Mills, Larry Waldrip and Dan Lamb, Mayor McCrary, Turner and city attorney Harvey Morton.

Veterans Land Board holds seminar July 18

Judge E.A. Howard is urging all Garza County veterans to attend an upcoming seminar in Lubbock to learn more about the special low-interest loan programs available to them through the Texas Veterans Land Board (VLB). The free seminar will be held at the Lubbock Civic Center on Wednesday, July 18 at 6 p.m.

Hosted by Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro, the seminar is open to the public. Texas veterans, real estate professionals and home repair contractors will be able to receive the most up-to-date information available on the state's three loan programs.

The VLB offers a \$57,500 total low-interest loan package that enables Texas veterans to buy land, a house or make home improvements. Statewide, the VLB has made more than 120,000 loans to Texas veterans totaling more than \$1.67 billion.

Texas veterans can receive up to \$20,000 at 8.75 percent interest to buy five or more acres of land and they can also borrow up to \$20,000 at 8.5 percent interest to use toward the purchase of a home.

In addition, Texas veterans can receive up to \$17,500 at 10.5 percent interest (plus FHA insurance) to make home improvements.

Eligible Texas veterans can use all three loan programs one time.

Cotton Talks

Most of the dryland cotton on the High Plains that wasn't included in the half-million or so acres estimated by Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. to be past redemption ten days ago appears to be holding its own, according to Dr James Supak, Area Extension Cotton Agronomist at the Texas A&M Research and Extension Center north of Lubbock.

Supak describes cotton in this "status quo" condition as having adjusted to prevailing conditions to the extent that it isn't growing but remains alive and continues to hold a few small squares. In terms of yield potential, he adds, it has the calendar working against it, plus the uncertainty of whether squares now present will abort when it finally rains.

If so, the crop-making process begins all over, and cotton physiologists say it will take plants at least two weeks after moisture is restored to move back into a normal growth mode. Normal growth at this time of year is described as adding leaves and putting on a new square every three days.

Assuming a good rain July 10, the earliest reasonable hope considering July 5 forecasts, dryland cotton would begin squaring again around July 24 and blooms would appear about mid-August. That, Supak says,

leaves precious little time for setting fruit with a chance to mature before the normal frost date in early November.

Cotton in dire straits generally lies west of highway 87, stretching down from Tulia through Plainview, Lubbock, Lamesa and on down across the northeast corner of Martin County. Cotton east of this line for the most part has had more rain and still has a fair chance of reasonable yields with favorable conditions the remainder of the growing season.

Acreage-wise, PCG estimates that about 1.2 million of the 1.9 million dryland acres thought to have been planted in the region lies in the western area. No doubt there are exceptions, but a large majority of this acreage falls in the status quo category described by Dr Supak.

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Many of the more seriously affected producers, who know the condition of their crops all too well, are filling form 574's (intent to abandon) at county ASCS offices, and those with federal crop insurance are asking adjusters to "zero out" their crops. And, in desperation, they're asking PCG and others about chances for disaster payments.

Possibilities of a disaster program, PCG says, aren't very encouraging. The only hope appears to be the bill introduced in late May by Senator

Lloyd Bentsen (D-TX). There was thought that it might be attached to the 1990 farm bill recently reported by the committee, but that didn't happen.

So the bill will have to be offered as an amendment on the Senate floor or be acted on as separate legislation. But PCG and other farm advocates reluctantly admit that existing budgetary restraints make prospects of success for either strategy somewhat less than rosy.

Caffeine: Most Commonly Used Drug

Caffeine is considered the most commonly used drug in the United States. The primary method of consumption is through the drinking of coffee, tea, and other beverages. According to recent statistics, about half of the American population regularly drink coffee, the most frequently used source of caffeine. The average amount consumed by Americans is two cups per day - providing about 100mg of caffeine in each cup.

According to the *Handbook of Nonprescription Drugs*, caffeine is considered safe when taken orally in doses of 200 mg or less every 3 to 4 hours. A large number of non-prescription medicines, such as pain relievers, stimulants, and cold/allergy products, contain caffeine. In most persons, caffeine in doses of 200 mg has been shown to increase alertness and decrease drowsiness and fatigue.

Excessive use of caffeine may cause anxiety, irritability, sleep disturbances, and headaches. Caffeine consumption should be avoided just prior to laboratory blood work or a urine analysis.

Recent studies have found no link between caffeine and cancer. Individuals with glaucoma, heart disease, gastric problems, and anxiety disorders should take caffeine with care or not at all.

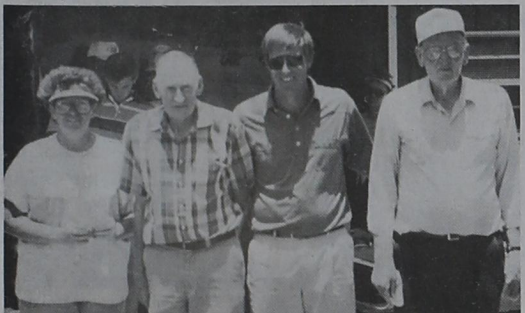

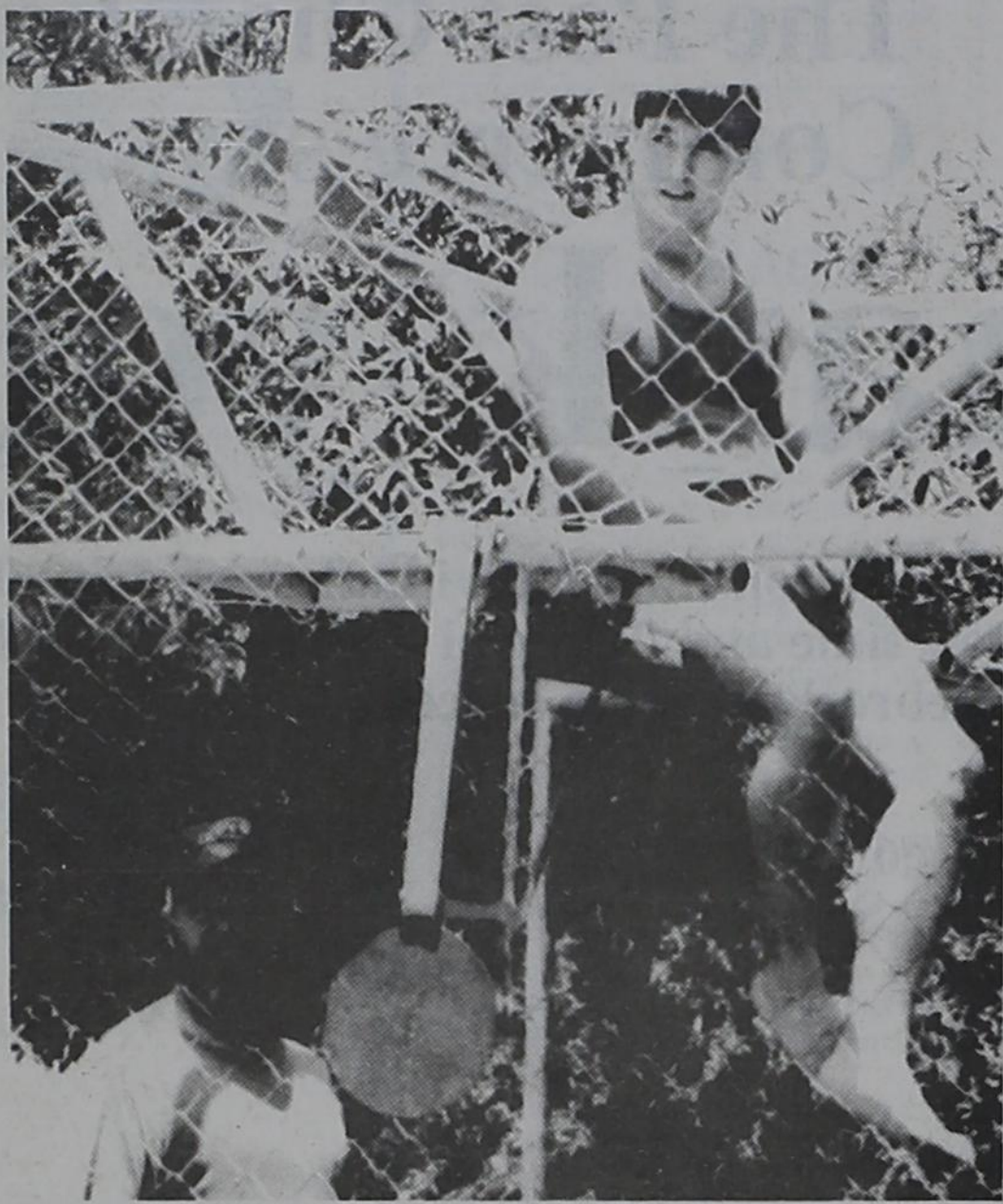

Handle Uncooked Eggs With Care

For healthy adults, the risk of contracting Salmonellosis from raw or uncooked eggs is extremely small, but others are vulnerable to this disease.

"The very young, the elderly, pregnant women and people with weak immune systems due to illness are more susceptible to food-borne illness," said Dr Mary Kinney Sweeten, nutritionist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Eggs are perishable and should be properly stored and cooked to prevent the growth of potentially harmful bacteria, such as Salmonella enteritidis, she said.

"Always keep eggs refrigerated before preparation," Sweeten said. "They should not be stored at room temperature or allowed to sit for more than two hours before or after cooking."

Sweeten said that people considered in the high-risk category for food-borne illness should take these special precautions:

- * Avoid eating raw eggs and foods containing raw eggs such as home-made ice cream, Caesar salad and Hollandaise sauce. Home-made eggnog and home-made mayonnaise also should be avoided, but commercial forms of these products are safe to serve since they are made with pasteurized eggs. Commercial pasteurization destroys Salmonella bacteria.

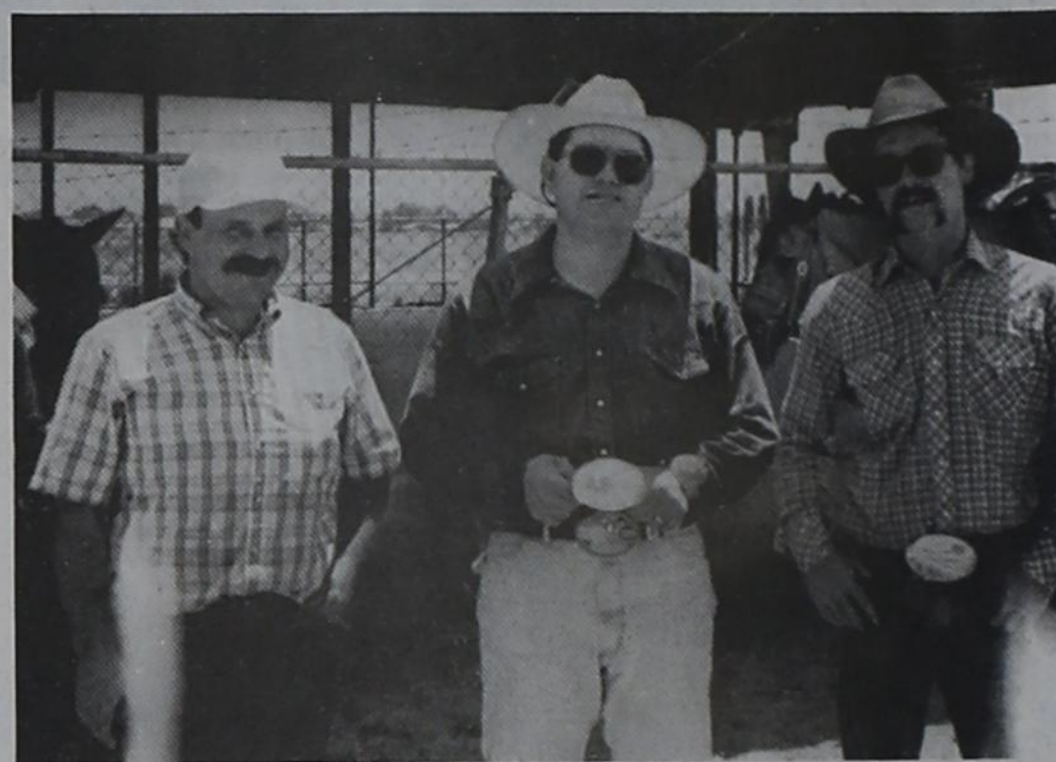
- * Cook eggs thoroughly until both the yolk and white are firm, not runny, to kill any bacteria that may be present. There may be some risk in eating eggs lightly cooked -- soft-cooked, soft-scrambled, or sunny-side-up.

- * Eating lightly cooked foods containing eggs such as soft custards, meringues and French toast also may be risky for people with weakened immune systems and other high-risk groups.

"Don't think you have to give up eating eggs, altogether," Sweeten said. "Eggs provide a wholesome source of high quality protein, vitamins and minerals and can be used safely in the diet if you follow precautions."

The US delegation consisted of nine mental health specialists possessing national and international credentials in the area of dissociative disorders. Dr Joann Ondrovik, who partners with Dr Hamilton in Paris, Texas, was also a delegate in this first US/Soviet exchange focused on dissociative disorders.

Dissociative disorders originate in childhood as the emotional coping strategy for overwhelming trauma. Sexual and physical abuse are the usual precursors to the development of a dissociative disorder, which in its extreme form may produce multiple personalities. Dr Hamilton and Dr Ondrovik have presented papers and lectures on this topic to the Texas Psychological Association, The

International Society for the Study of Multiple Personality and Dissociation, and The American College of Forensic Psychology. Their latest article on the forensic significance of multiple personality is to be published this fall.

The Soviets extended invitations to Moscow, Odessa, Kiev, and Leningrad where the US delegation visited hospitals and treatment facilities over a ten day period. The professionals exchanged information on alcoholism, post traumatic stress in combat veterans from Vietnam and Afghanistan, as well as the focus on dissociative states.

In a phone interview from Moscow, Dr Hamilton indicated that the Soviets were very guarded concerning the extent of child abuse, acknowledging a limited amount of rape and incest in very rare circumstances, usually alcohol related. According to Dr Hamilton similar positions were assumed in the US approximately twenty-five years ago.

Dr Ondrovik explained that the

socialized system of medicine in the USSR results in a higher rate of hospitalization for psychiatric patients.

Perestroika also allowed the delegation to examine social and political issues. Several Soviet citizens expressed frustration with the lack of economic progress, and according to Dr Hamilton this frustration is most acute in the area of consumer goods. "In the four cities we visited, basic consumer goods were in short supply or non-existent, and we observed many food lines," stated Dr Hamilton.

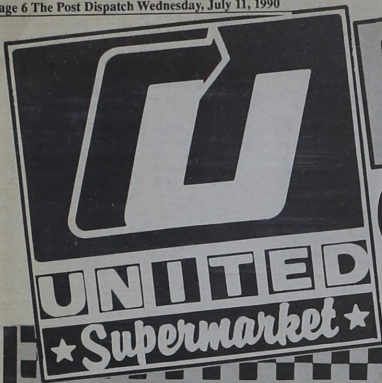

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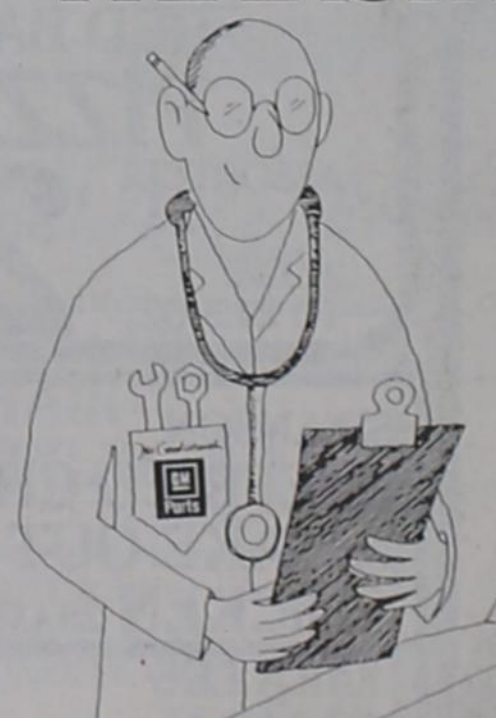

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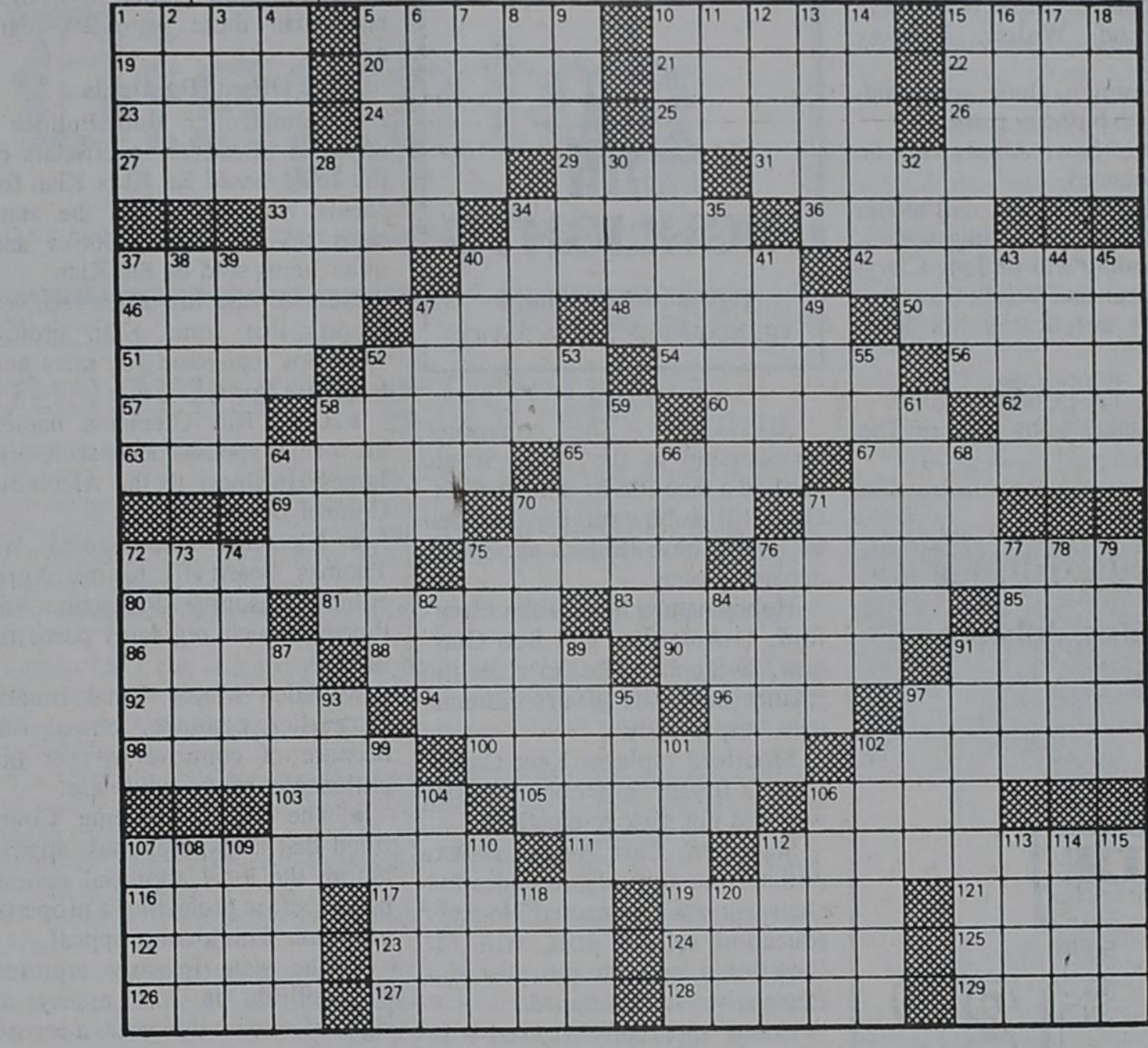

Geraldine Ferraro (N.Y.) as his running mate ... **July 11, 1985**, the U.S. Senate voted to impose economic sanctions on South Africa in protest against its policy of apartheid ... **July 13, 1985**, "Live Aid," a 17-hour rock concert, was broadcast on radio and TV from London and Philadelphia to 152 countries, raising \$70 million for the starving people of Africa.

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The cuisine of Asia seems to be gaining popularity on this side of the world. Chinese, Japanese and Indian food have long been enjoyed, but now a number of Thai restaurants are appearing in metropolitan areas. And several Vietnamese cookbooks have been published in the last 10 or so years. Only a few weeks ago, in the International Association of Culinary Professionals and Joseph E. Seagram and Sons, Inc. Food and Beverage Book Awards for 1989, "The Foods of Vietnam" by Nicole Routhier (Stewart, Tabori, & Chang, Inc., \$35) was the winner in the international category and topped that by being named "Best of the Year." This is quite a distinction since hundreds of books are submitted annually. Getting back to Thai foods, here is a fruity chicken salad just in time for a summer meal. It's deliciously flavored. Cubes of chicken, dried California figs and green onions are marinated for one hour in a spicy lime juice and soy sauce blend before it's mixed with papaya, green pepper and cucumber. It's topped with peanuts which are so widely used in Asian cuisine.



THAI CHICKEN SALAD
 2 cups bite-sized pieces of cooked chicken
 1 cup dried California figs, sliced crosswise
 2 green onions, thinly sliced
 6 tablespoons lime juice
 1/4 cup honey
 3 tablespoons soy sauce or fish sauce (Nam Pla)
 1/4 teaspoon red chile flakes
 2 teaspoons very finely minced ginger root
 1/4 cup chopped mint
 1 ripe Hawaiian papaya, cut in 1/2 cubes
 1 red bell pepper, cut in 1/2 inch cubes
 1/2 cucumber, peeled, seeded and cut in 1/2 inch cubes
 Red leaf lettuce
 1/4 cup coarsely chopped roasted peanuts
 Mint Sprig
 Place chicken in medium bowl. Add figs and green onions. In small bowl, combine lime juice, honey, soy sauce, chile flakes, ginger and mint. Pour over chicken and marinate in refrigerator one hour. When ready to serve, combine chicken with papaya, bell pepper and cucumber. Arrange lettuce on a chilled platter. Mound chicken salad attractively in center. Sprinkle with peanuts. Garnish with mint. Makes six servings.

AUSTIN - The committee membership in the Texas Senate has had a face-life by lameduck Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby, surgery designed to groom new leaders to replace departing ones.

Hobby named Sens. John Montford, D-Amarillo, and Bob Glasgow, D-Stephenville, to chair the finance and state affairs committees, respectively.

Montford replaces Kent Caperton, D-Bryan, a Hobby favorite who did not seek re-election.

State Sen. Carl Parker, D-Port Arthur, the formidable education chairman who sponsored Hobby's education reform plan, will fill Caperton's seat on the powerful Legislative Budget Board.

Hobby apparently checked with the Democrat who may be his successor, Comptroller Bob Bullock, before making the assignments.

However, if Republican Robert Mosbacher beats Bullock in the lieutenant governor's race, these and four more committees will have no incumbent chairmen.

Politics Risky

Running for office can be risky in several ways, as Nikki Van Hightower, a Democrat running for state treasurer, found out last week when a window blew out of her small plane.

She credited her pilot, Karen Winter, for the safe landing.

Meanwhile, Van Hightower, a former head of the Houston Area Women's Center, also was criticized for making the agency vulnerable for an IRS slap for back taxes.

Other Highlights

Comptroller Bob Bullock's office is investigating officials of the Texas-based Ku Klux Klan for cheats who don't pay the state sales tax on robes, books and other items sold by the Klan.

Bullock said his office received reports that some Klan groups were not registered for sales and franchise taxes.

Gov. Bill Clements named his former appointments secretary, James Huffines, to the Alcoholic Control Board.

Clements also named W. Thomas Beard III to the Agricultural Resources Protection Authority, which regulates pesticide use.

McAllen Mayor Othal Brand, an earlier nominee, bowed out because of controversy over his philosophy on pesticide use.

The Texas Supreme Court ruled that a taxpayer must appear before the local appraisal review board before protesting a property valuation with a court appeal.

The state treasury returned \$12 million in lost money to rightful owners this year, a record according to Treasurer Richards.

Texas exported \$34.58 billion worth of products and services in 1988, a feat ranked second to California and accounted for 11 percent of the nation's total exports.

California, however, spends 26 times the Texas level of state dollars spent promoting those exports.

Texas ranked 34th in the nation in promotion, spending \$398,503, according to the National Association of State Development Agencies.

Houston auditor John Braden, who helped certify the women's center as a charitable agency in 1970, said he told Van Hightower in 1983 he would not continue as auditor unless major bookkeeping changes were made.

Three years later, the IRS fined the women's center for failing to pay \$650,000 in taxes for 1984-86.

Van Hightower denied Braden's version and said Braden was terminated because he offered no record of how he charged expenses for his work. She said the tax liability was caused by an auditor who was fired for falsifying records.

Van Hightower's Republican

opponent is Kay Bailey Hutchison, a former state legislator from Dallas.

Foreclosure Precedent

In what may be a Texas precedent, two farmhands have obtained a lien and may seek foreclosure on a Panhandle farmer they claim owes them \$17,000.

The pair, Joe Garcia and Baldemar Garza, are represented by an attorney for Texas Rural Legal Aid, a federally funded service which defends migrant workers.

The attorney, Milo Mumgaard, cited 1937 law which allows hired hands to file a lien on an owner's property if they are not paid.

Census Count Challenged

Because of a 20 percent increase

in population this decade, Texas is expected to have at least three, and maybe four, new seats in Congress drawn during redistricting.

But Attorney General Jim Mattox and Land Commissioner Garry Mauro told federal officials the census effort is vastly undercounting Texas minorities, and the state stands to lose millions in future federal aid.

Mauro said he is disappointed that the counting procedure was so unfair to minorities and is omitting thousands of homeless and poorly educated persons from the rolls.
