

Commissioners set plans for fiscal 1990-91 budget

Budget requests under consideration

Department budget requests were accepted, but not approved, by the Garza County Commissioners' Court at the regular meeting Monday morning. The court will study the requests in preparing to present a fiscal year 1990-91 budget.

Chief appraiser Billie Windham reported to the court that total taxable values for the county are \$454,880,337 as she presented the certified tax roll.

No action was taken concerning the civil law suit filed last month. Commissioners were informed that the Texas Association of Counties has assigned an attorney to represent the county in the matter, who is expected to brief the commissioners in the near future.

In other action, the court approved the appointment of Billie Jean Cross as election judge for voting precinct and Ruby Jones was appointed to serve on the absentee voting board.

A division order with Amoco was approved, pending review by county attorney Preston Poole.

A representative of the Texas Highway Department presented a report concerning construction of the highway near Justiceburg to access Lake Alan Henry. Commissioners were informed that rights of way appraisals should be completed by October so that work could begin on the road in February or March. Bill Noble of Lubbock is conducting appraisal work for the county on the project.

The commissioners revised the on-site sewer policy.

Attending the meeting were Commissioners Herb Walls, John Valdez, Ted Aten, Sammy Ellis, Judge E. A. Howard and Clerk Sonny Gossett.

Dazzling costumes, sets and choreography bring Shakespeare to life here

A standing ovation Sunday afternoon set the tone for the first four performances of the Garza Theatre's Shakespeare Festival offering of "Romeo and Juliet".

Appreciative audiences are raving about the ambitious production, directed by Will McCrary, which features a cast of 26 and a live band.

The festival continues this week with performances Thursday, Friday and Saturday evenings at 7:45 p.m. and Sunday at 2 p.m.

The costuming and set design are some of the best that's been seen on stage here. Linda Ellis, in addition to her as always brilliant acting, was responsible for the costumes. She is standing in her portrayal of "Juliet's" mother, "Lady Capulet."

Jon Steele, as "Escalus, Prince of Verona," gives another outstanding performance as he demonstrates his superb acting talents.

Drama student Erik Blair shows his flair as "Count Paris," the appreciated husband of "Juliet." His dual scene in Act III has to be seen to be believed.

James Bell again graces the stage with his adept rendition of "Lord Montague," the father of "Romeo" and "enemy" to "Juliet's" family.

And on the stage as "Juliet's" father and head of the "Capulet" family, Charles Somerville gives the audience an excellent dose of "bad guy" as "Lord Capulet," who tries to marry off his young daughter to "Count Paris."

You'll have to really be picky to find fault with Trampas Thompson in his role as "Romeo." His delivery and interpretation of the young man fallen desperately in love is a must to see.

You come to expect the best and you'll not be disappointed with the performance Troy Timms gives in his role of "Mercutio, kinsman of the Prince."

Involved also as "kinsmen" are Rich Warren as "Benvolio, nephew to Lord Montague" and Doug White as "Tybalt, nephew to Lady Capulet." They are at the center of a rousing sword duel.

Of course, McCrary is ever so much the part in his role as "Friar Lawrence," the priest who marries, then tries to smooth out the secret held between "Juliet" and "Romeo."

Cole LeBlanc is a delight in his role as "Balthasar, servant to Romeo," as is Shannon Scott, "Sampson, servant to Capulet," Danny Leach as "Gregory, servant to Capulet," Tyler Duncan, "Peter, servant to nurse" and Mike Harper, "Abram, servant to Montague."

Theatre patrons are fortunate to see talents such as Emily Hataway on stage, this time as "Lady Montague."

Cheryl Thompson, who goes together with the Garza Theatre like C.W. Post and Post Toasties, is sheer lovely as "Juliet." She gives a touching and dramatic performance in the role of the naive young lover.

What fun it is to watch Anne Leake, especially as she dresses up the stage in this role of "Nurse to Juliet." Anne, who is also a Garza Theatre veteran, both on stage and back stage, is an audience favorite, and for good reason.

Musicians Ken DeMarquis and Chris Kollembach provide a soothing sound in the beautifully choreographed scene at the "Capulet" party.

We haven't seen enough of Randy Sutherland, as he returns to the Garza in a "first sergeant" kind of support role as "A Watchman" who helps the "Prince" discover the real story behind the death (Continued on Page 10)

Plans for the 50th Annual Post Stampede Rodeo, "Best Rodeo in the West", are in full swing for the August 9-11 event here. The August 9 big rodeo parade opens up the anniversary at 5:30 p.m. downtown. Trophies and cash prizes for floats will be awarded.

Rodeo shows begin at 8 p.m. sharp with the grand entry at 7:45 p.m., featuring "Hoss Fly Clown" Tommy Atchinson nightly.

The TCRA Approved rodeo will also feature three big dances on the covered slab, with music by Jody Nix.

Producer of the rodeo will be Terry Walls of Stephenville. Tickets for the rodeo are \$4 for adults and \$1 for children 12 years and younger.

Events will be held at the Stampede Arena, on the Lubbock Highway. Books open for the rodeo Monday, August 6 at 8 a.m. and books close Wednesday, August 8 at noon.

Events include bareback bronc, calf roping, saddle bronc, barrel race, team roping, bull riding, steer wrestling, girls break away roping and Jr flag 12 and under.

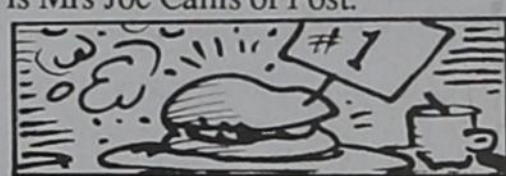

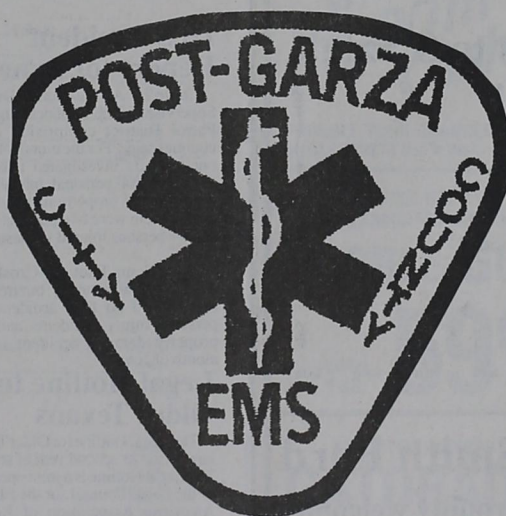

Cotton Talks

Official figures just received by Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc show the 25 PCG counties surrounding Lubbock in 1989 produced 1,608,200 480-pound net weight bales, less than one-half the 3.234 million grown the previous year and only 72 percent of the area's 10-year 2.226 million average.

Acreage and production totals for all counties in Texas are published each year by the Texas Agricultural Statistics Service (TASS), an agency of the National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS).

The figures in the past have been released in late May or early June, but according to a TASS official were delayed this year by a re-ordering of "due dates" for final reports on the various crops.

Last year's High Plains production still accounted for a normal 56 percent of all Texas Upland cotton, but only 13.2 percent of U.S. production, compared to the 20.6 percent of national production in 1988. Planted acres in the 25 counties in 1989 totaled 2.813 million, of which only 2.12 million remained for harvest, an

abandonment of 24.6 percent.

Areawide per-acre yield came to 364.1 pounds compared to a 10-year average of 353.4 pounds.

PCG's analysis of separate irrigated and non-irrigated figures in the TASS report indicates that about 402,000 of the 692,000 abandoned acres were classified as irrigated, primarily cotton lost to hailstorms. The remaining 290,000 abandoned acres, in the report's dryland section, for the most part failed for lack of rainfall.

An additional indication of drought conditions is the 237-pound per harvested acre yield from dryland versus the 497-pound irrigated yield. Also, dryland planted acreage made up a little less than 53 percent of the area's total in 1989, a surprising departure from the 60 percent of acreage planted on non-irrigated acres in both 1987 and 1988.

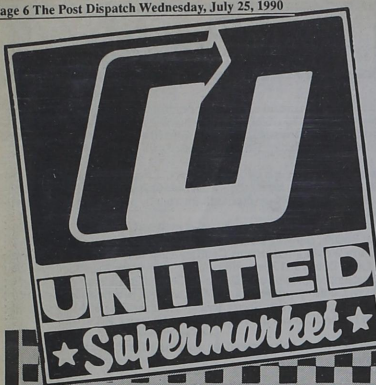

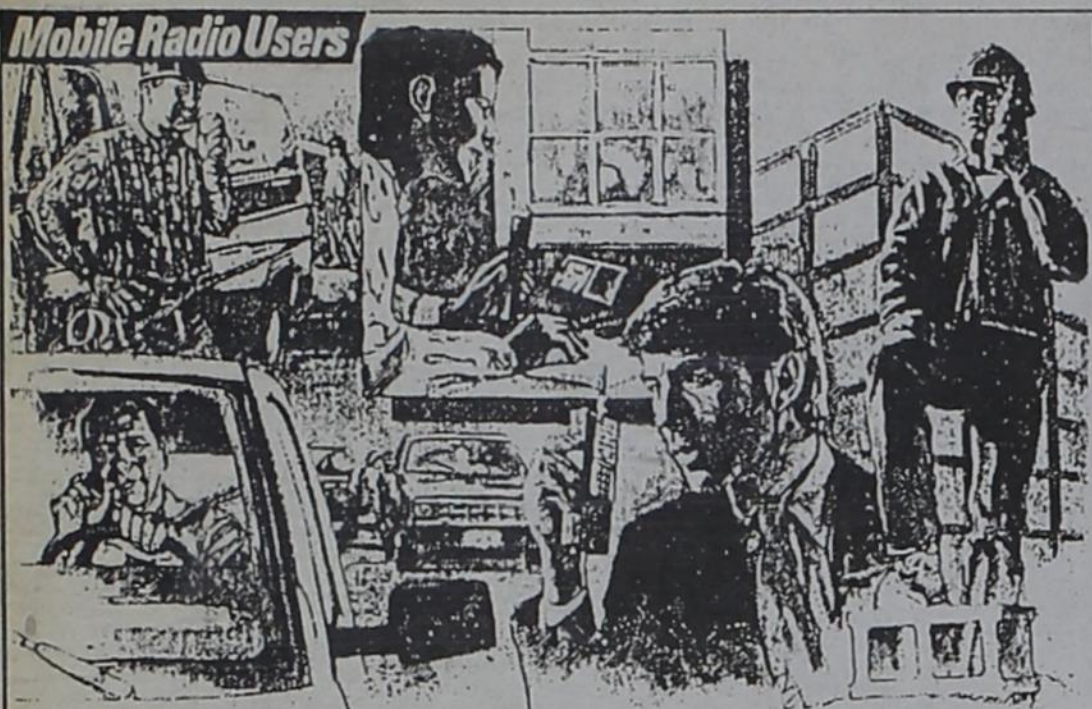

I don't normally plug television shows, but there's a special coming up on PBS, on our cable that's Channel 5, Wednesday, August 1, that is simply worth mentioning.

The 8 p.m. show, featuring Bill Moyers and Studs Terkel, marks the life of John Henry Faulk, the Texas humorist who became one of America's foremost champions of the First Amendment and the Bill of Rights.

We had the pleasure and fortune to hear Faulk's last public speech in February 1990 at the Texas Press Association convention in Dallas. Faulk died in April following years of battling cancer.

His speech to a packed auditorium of newspaper folks from across Texas, was the highlight of the convention. And when Faulk leaned over the podium and recited the First Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, it was as the sound of poetry. He was not reading the document, the words flowed and resounded through the hushed room in a way that is difficult to describe.

I looked at this frail little man and sighed a heavy release of spirit and wanted to shout out loud, "Wow, what a country! I want to live in such a place as that!" It was during that time last spring that defenders of the constitution were being hammered as traitors and worse...but Faulk had tasted that bitter pill much earlier in life as he was branded by "McCarthyism" as a communist for having the audacity to question the tactics of the anti-communist fever.

If you are interested in discovering what the U.S. Constitution means to an ordinary citizen and specifically how important and unique the First Amendment really is, then you will want to watch this program. I guarantee you will look at your freedom as an American a whole lot differently than you ever have before.

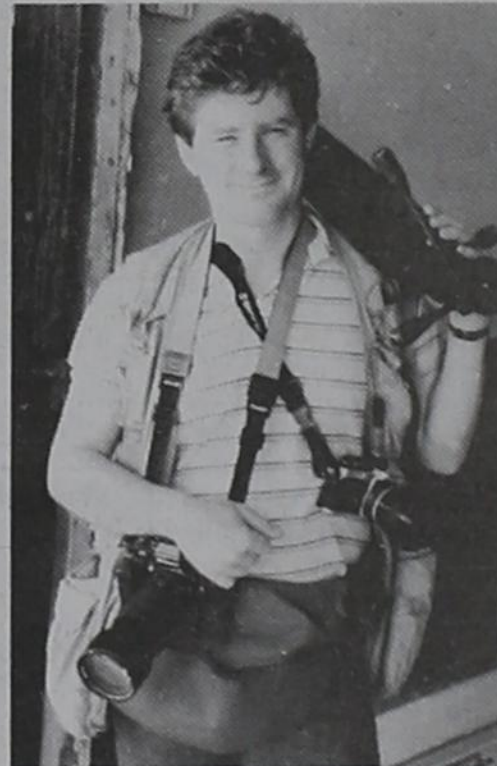

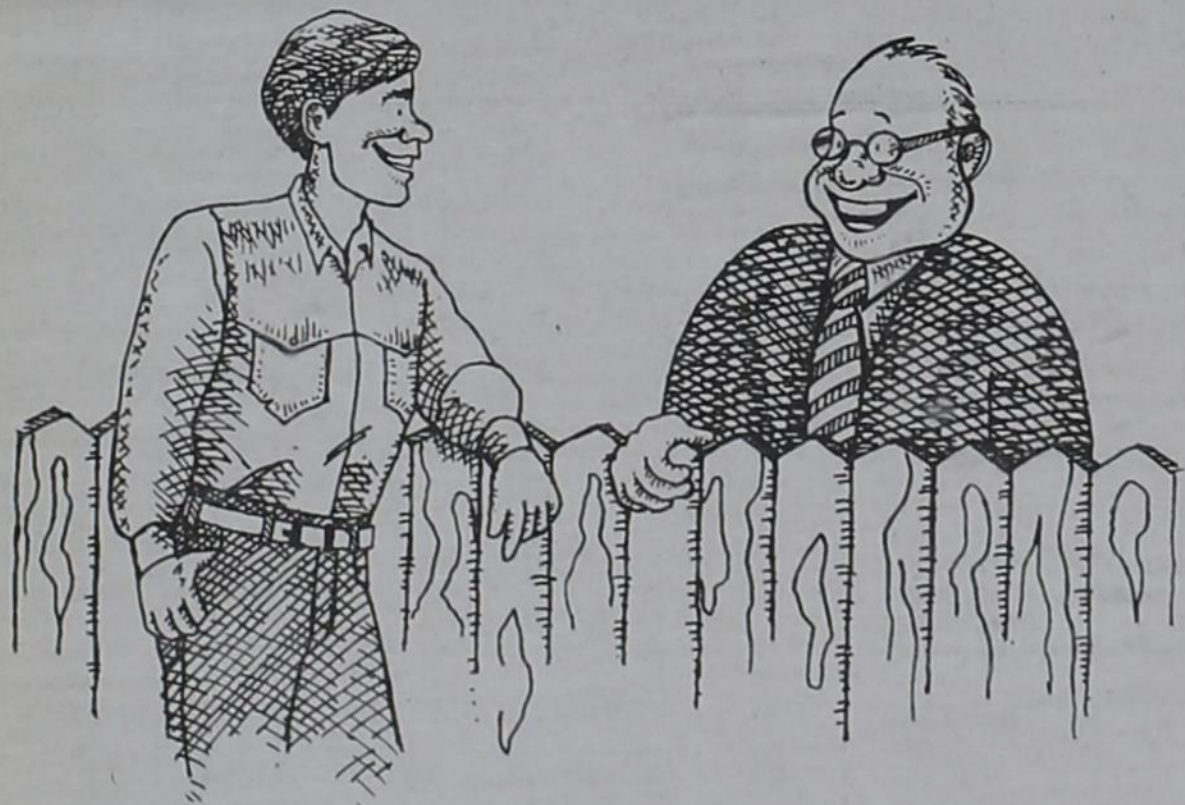
The true-to-life dramatic story portrays the power of one person caring for another.
