Vandals desecrate tombstones, break windows downtown

Cemetery, Algerita convenient targets

Last week, while most of us were sleeping, vandals raided the Terrace Cemetery, knocking over tombstones, memorials and destroying a bird watering bowl and during the same time period, second story windows at the Algerita Arts Center building were shattered.

"We're not sure exactly when these incidents took place," Post city manager Bob Turner explained, "but when our crews went to the cemetery Monday morning (July 23), they noticed fairly soon that someone with a fairly good sized vehicle had been cruising through and knocking down tombstones."

It is not known how the vandals entered the cemetery, which has a gate that is normally locked every evening by Garza County Sheriff's Department deputies.

It is also not known when the windows at the Algerita were broken.

No suspects in either incident have been arrested.

Tombstones have since been set upright, but are not secured to the bases. According to Turner, the repair work took three men approximately seven hours, using a back hoe to lift the heavy stones.

Gaines leads state in crude oil production

Gaines County led the state in daily crude oil production in May with 3,601,497 barrels, according to a report released this week by the Texas Railroad Commission.

The total state daily average of crude oil in May was 1,716,420, compared to preliminary estimates of 1,782,043 barrels daily in May 1989.

The total compares with preliminary April production of 1,721,123 barrels daily. Final production reports for April indicated average production at 1,739,547 barrels daily.

Garza County producers were reported at 580,427 barrels daily in the May estimated report.

Other top producing counties included Andrews at 3,251,802; Ector with 3,073,200; Yoakum's 2,801,019 and Hockley with 2,634,720 barrels.

The bird watering bowl, which was located near the Cornish plot, was stolen and the stand broken.

"I don't know how you put a dollar value on these things," Turner added, "it's just such a shame."

Families whose tombstones were knocked down are Puckett, Anthony, William R. Perry, Henry C. Callis, V.S. Blair, Joseph Randall, Mary Blanche Elkins and Bernette Beal Elkins.

Another suspected act of vandalism was noticed this past weekend across from city hall as the grassy area in the median had been run through, leaving the impression that a large vehicle had deliberately made a shortcut across the grass.

Strolling neighborhood can be dangerous... Stray dog now in custody for observation

A simple walk through the neighborhood turned into a near nightmare last Friday afternoon for Kay Lamb, following an attack and bite from a stray dog at near the corner of West Main and North Ave. S.

"I had seen that dog the day before and I walked by with no problem," she said, "but for some reason, he just came at me and there was nothing I could do."

The black, medium to large mixed breed dog was later picked up by the city dog catcher, and was impounded by the city.

Sometime during the night the dog was stolen from the city pound and Lamb got more bad news Saturday morning that she might have to undergo the rabies shots, if the dog couldn't be found.

During the day Saturday the dog, which had no collar or identification, was captured again, and has been at the Caprock Veterinary Clinic under observation by Dr. Larry Mills.

"If there was an owner, we have no idea who it is," city manager Bob Turner explained.

Lamb is okay, but she intends to take some extra precautions on her afternoon walks.

"I just wish there were some way we could enforce our leash laws," she commented, "people should be able to take a quiet walk in their neighborhood and not have to worry about getting bitten by a dog."

Pecos produces most natural gas in state for May

Pecos County gas wells produced 25,923,253 Mcf (thousand cubic feet) of natural gas in the month of May, as reported this week by the Texas Railroad Commission, leading the state in gas production.

State wide Texas oil and gas wells produced 463,331,658 Mcf of gas in May, compared to the April production of 433,881,253 Mcf. May production was down .4 percent compared to May 1989's production of 465,218,919 Mcf.

Garza County wells produced 151,357 Mcf of natural gas in May.

Other counties leading the state included Webb at 23,481,240 Mcf; Zapata at 22,589,661 Mcf; Panola with 20,046,832 Mcf; Hidalgo with 14,939,393 Mcf; Crane at 12,727,310 Mcf and Ector with 9,664,794 Mcf.

Crockett, Hemphill and Yoakum also were rated with high natural gas production for the month.

Garza County unemployment rate jumps to 6.4%

An increase in unemployment in Garza County to 6.4%, just one-tenth of a percent above the statewide average, was reported this week by the Texas Employment Commission.

Of a total of 2,029 available workers, Garza County reported 1,899 em-

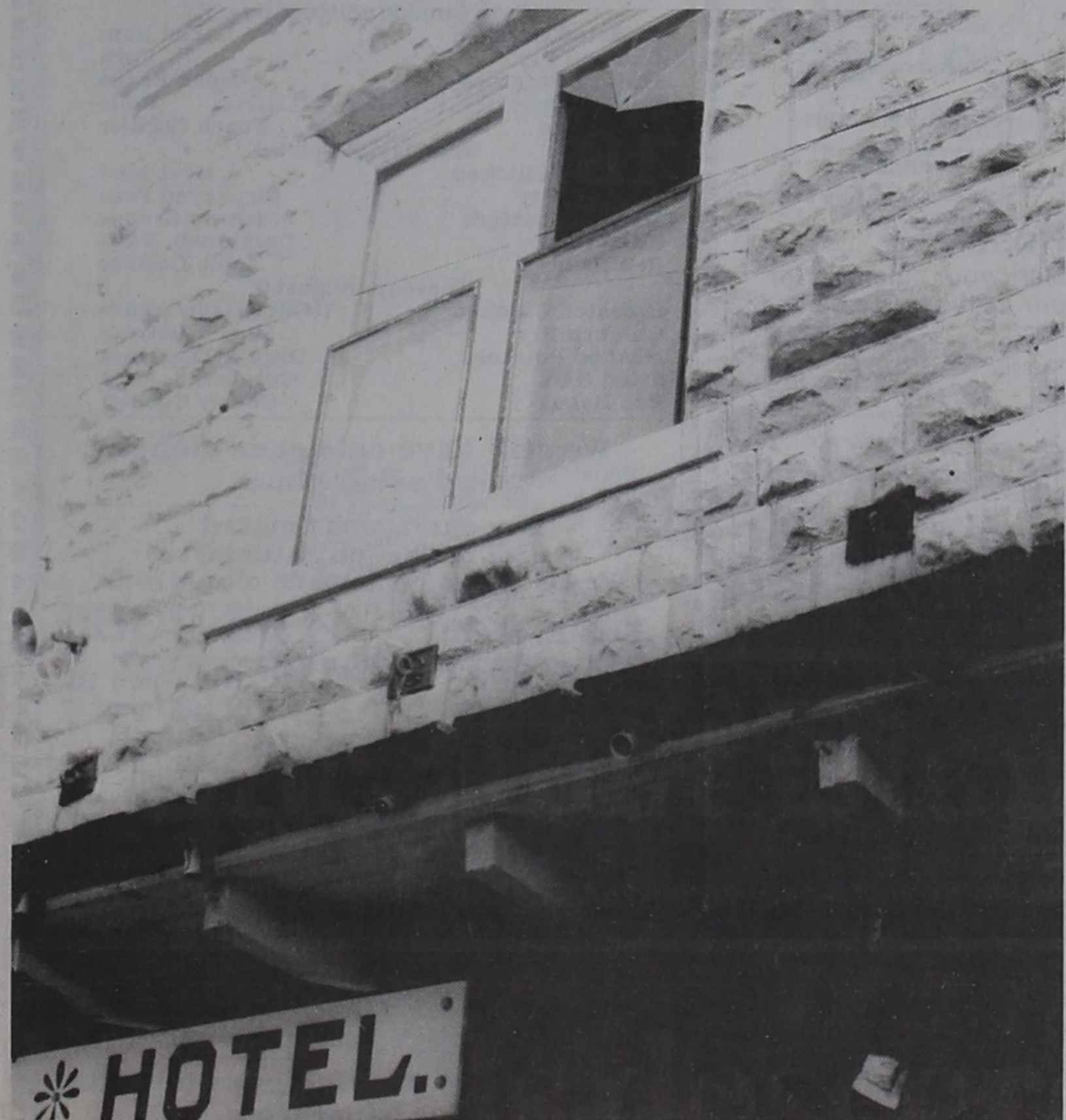

Post, Tahoka planners hold town meeting here

Approximately 60 people from Post and Tahoka met Tuesday morning, July 24 at the Algeria Arts Center with the Texas Health Promotion Planning Committee of the Center for Health Policy Development Inc. of San Antonio and the Kaiser Family Foundation of Menlo Park, California.

The purpose of the town meeting was to discuss the "Texas Social Reconnaissance Initiative" and to gain input from local citizens concerned with a variety of health and social needs of their community.

The Kaiser Family Foundation is a national foundation supporting health related activities, including health promotion, the improvement of health care outcomes and health professions education.

The Center for Health Policy Development Inc. (CHPD) is a private, non-profit organization whose goal is to generate change in the health care delivery systems to meet the needs of Mexican American communities in Texas.

Marie Neff, representing the Caprock Cultural Association, opened the meeting by introducing Dalia Rojas of CHPD. Rojas explained the

process and the long range goals of the Texas Social Reconnaissance Initiative. She then introduced Henry Montes, Kaiser Foundation project officer, who asked for input from the audience on the subjects of problems and issues, history, strengths and resources, barriers and challenges.

He ended the meeting with advice from the participants on the way the meeting was conducted and the data obtained.

Other participants in the program included Delores O. Dominguez, health information coordinator for CHPD and Tom Thompson, health program analyst for CHPD.

The Kaiser Family Foundation has adopted this approach to assure that the foundation is well informed about the perceived health needs and priorities within the state, as well as the perceived barriers and resources for change before proceeding with potential funding in the state.

The approach has also proven to be productive in bringing together key officials, advocates and health professionals within a state who have the potential to form effective coalitions and develop the resources to support community programs.

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Corns: A Common Foot Problem

Corns are raised accumulations of dry skin that occur between a bony prominence on the foot and the shoe. Corns most often result from wearing shoes that fit too tightly. Narrow-toed and high-heeled shoes should be avoided. Women also should avoid using hosiery that fits too tightly. Because the small toe experiences the most pressure, it is the site of many corns. Although corns are not the source of major health problems except in diabetics, they often produce a great deal of discomfort and can impair one's ability to walk or run.

There are several nonprescription drug products that, when applied directly to the skin, aid in the partial or complete removal of corns. Liquids, lotions, and creams are available. Small adhesive discs or pads are designed to be placed directly on the corn. Most of the corn "removal" products contain salicylic acid. This ingredient dissolves the dead skin of which the corn is composed. Using the pad on or around the corn eventually decreases shoe pressure and relieves the pain.

Persons who have diabetes or circulation problems should not attempt to remove corns with over-the-counter products. Damage to the skin could lead to tissue damage and severe infection.

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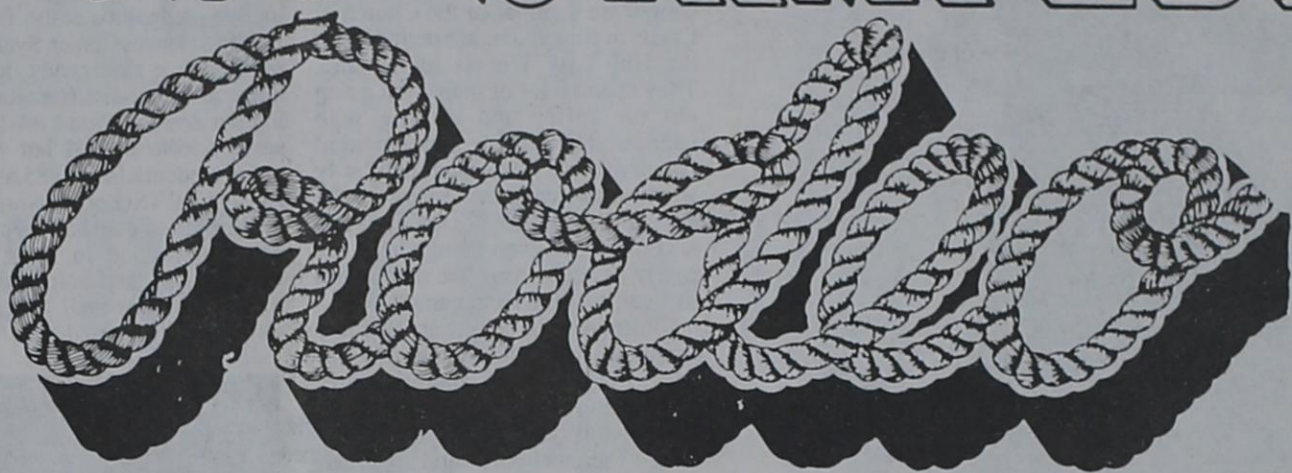
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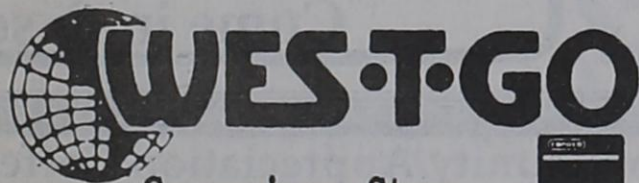

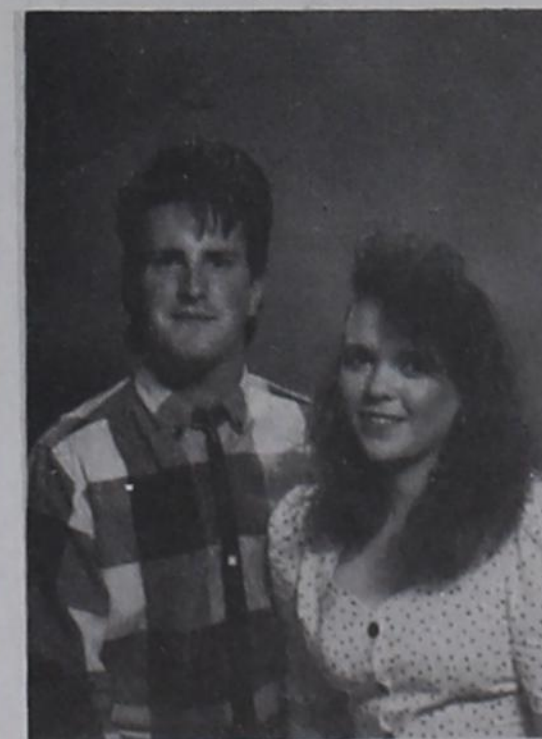

Cotton Talks

Hidden at the center of the largest cotton patch in the world is the finest crop of cotton researchers and research centers you will find anywhere. So says Myrl D. Mitchell, past president of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc of Lubbock, Texas, and chairman of PCG's Plains Cotton Improvement Committee (PCIC).

Singing the praises of Dr John Gannaway, cotton breeder at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, and his associate, Dr Jane Dever, Mitchell remarked "We are fortunate to have such good facilities right here in our own backyard and such outstanding people as these working for us in them." Dr Gannaway's work in developing cotton plants with high fiber qualities, increased yield potential and cold tolerance has been funded by PCIC through a dime-per-bale checkoff since 1983. Some of the

improved cottons that have come from this breeding program have been certified in recent months and others are in the advanced strain testing stage. Major improvements have been made in strength and length.

The research effort, that receives funding of \$125,000 per year from PCIC, was set up to be a long-term program that would give area producers a higher return from cotton that would better meet the high fiber quality demands of the textile industry.

As well as breeding research the Hub of the Plains is able to boast having the USDA's Ginning Laboratory and Texas Tech University's International Center for Textile Research and Development (ICTRD). Mitchell, a cotton producer and ginner in Martin County, uses stripper modifications developed by the ginning lab in his own farming operation and fine tunes his gin utilizing their recommendations.

An example of cooperation between all aspects of the industry is seen in a study being carried out by

ICTRD into the spinning qualities of barked cotton. This study, also being funded by PCIC, is geared to assessing the spinning performance of various levels of bark contamination and to develop a basis for reducing the severity of the current barkiness discounting system. ICTRD is able to simulate mill conditions of all aspects of textile production in a research environment and so can determine what results may be expected from the cotton being produced and developed on the Plains of Texas.

Within almost a stone's throw of Lubbock is so much that is beneficial to our industry, concludes Mitchell. As well as those already mentioned he points out that work is being done on insect research and plant pathology at both Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and Texas Agricultural Extension Service together with studies and practical demonstrations of irrigation, land-use practices, and marketing strategy.



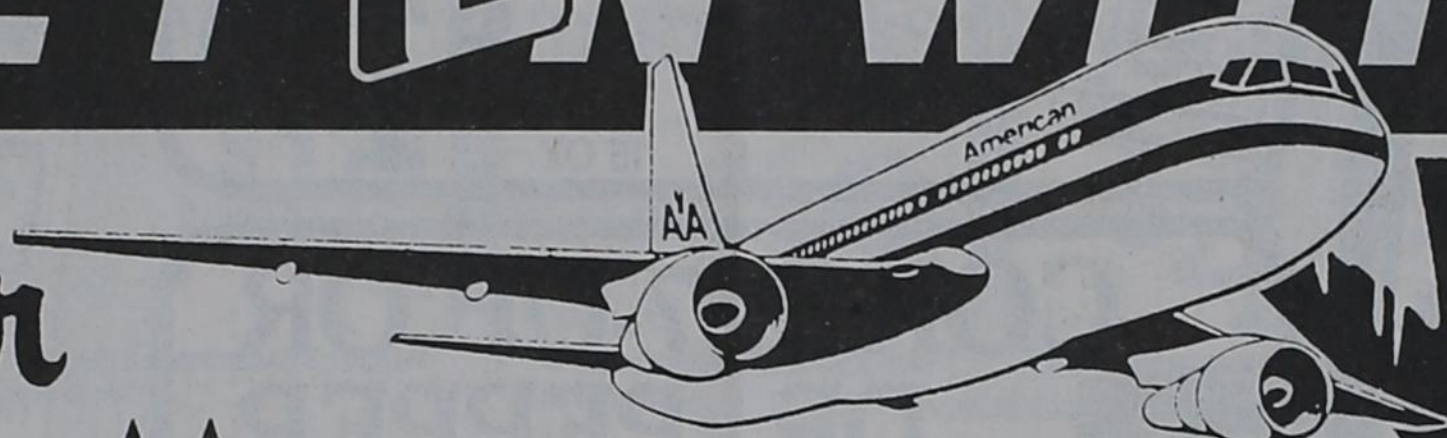

F.M. 2458 and F.M. 3519 NOTICE AFFORDING OPPORTUNITY FOR A PUBLIC HEARING

The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation is affording the public the opportunity to request a public hearing regarding the proposed widening and reconstruction of approximately 3.0 miles of the southerly section of the existing F.M. Highway 2458, and the proposed acceptance of approximately 3.40 miles of an existing Garza County road to the State Highway System for widening and reconstruction and designation as F.M. Highway 3519. The proposed projects would provide all-weather current design roadways connecting U.S. Highway 84 to the proposed Lake Alan Henry water reservoir and adjoining recreational area located in southeastern Garza County. The projects would be supervised by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation and funded from the 1991 District Discretionary Fund.

The proposed upgrading of F.M. 2458 would begin at the intersection of F.M. 2458 and U.S. 84 approximately fourteen

miles southeast of the city of Post and would follow the existing alignment of F.M. 2458 to the roadway's turn to the north and tie into the west-to-east alignment at this location of the proposed F.M. 3519. The construction of F.M. 3519 would begin at the easterly limit of project construction of F.M. 2458 and would approximate the west-to-east-to-north alignment of an existing county road to the northwest projection of the Lake Alan Henry recreational area. The combined projects are approximately 6.40 miles in length and are located on a mostly west-to-east alignment north and east of the Lake Alan Henry reservoir.

The existing F.M. 2458 is comprised of twenty feet of asphalt travelway on a shallow depth of base. The existing county road is dirt surfaced with an ill-defined crown sloping to unlined drainage ditches. The improvements proposed for the roadways are typically comprised of two twelve-foot travel lanes and three feet of fully surfaced shoulder widths. The construction of the water reservoir would inundate much of Gobbler Creek Canyon and would necessitate the construction of a bridge with thirty-four feet of travel width spanning the canyon above the reservoir's design high water elevation as a part of the F.M. 3519 project. The typical widths of the proposed travelways and the clear bridge width would accommodate specialized farming equipment commonly using area roadways and would also benefit anticipated recreational vehicle use of the roadways.

The usual existing right-of-way on F.M. 2458 is one hundred feet and the usual existing right-of-way on the country road is sixty feet. The proposed minimum right-of-way width is one hundred feet on both projects and the proposed maximum right-of-way width is two hundred forty feet at Gobbler Creek Canyon on F.M. 3519. The implementation of the proposed projects would require the acquisition of approximately forty-one acres of land to accommodate the proposed design of the roadways and bridge. Garza County in cooperation with the city of Lubbock and the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation will acquire the right-of-way on behalf of the State of Texas.

Although additional right-of-way will be required, no houses or businesses will be displaced. Information concerning benefits and services which may be available to affected property owners as well as information about the tentative property owners as well as information about the tentative schedules for right-of-way acquisition and construction can be obtained from the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation Office at 135 Slaton Highway in Lubbock.

Maps and drawings showing the proposed location and design, environmental studies, and other information about the proposed projects are on file and available for inspection and copying at the office of Mr. Frank Phillips, Resident Engineer, at 135 Slaton Highway in Lubbock. A copy of the Environmental Assessment with a schematic layout of the project has been placed on file with Garza County, office of the County Judge, at the Garza County Courthouse in Post, Texas.





ployed and 130 seeking unemployment assistance.

"The good news is that over eight millions Texans were working in June, and that's a record for the year," commissioner Mary Scott Nabers said in the report.

"The bad news is that the state's unemployment rate still increased," she added.

The June unemployment rate in Texas was 6.3 percent, compared to 6.2 percent in May.

Another perplexing fact is that there was also a record growth in the number of nonfarm salaried jobs.

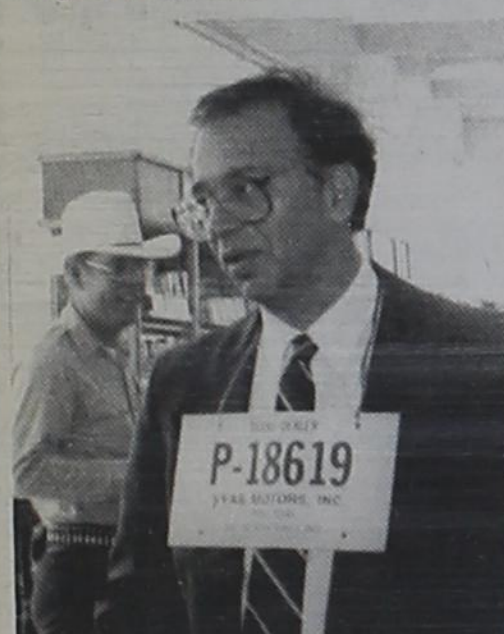
"That number increased by 28,000 during the month," Nabers said. She noted that although the number of people working is on the increase, the number of people seeking jobs in Texas is increasing faster, causing the rate to jump.

Job growth has been seen in trade, services and construction. Government related jobs declined as schools and colleges released workers for the summer.

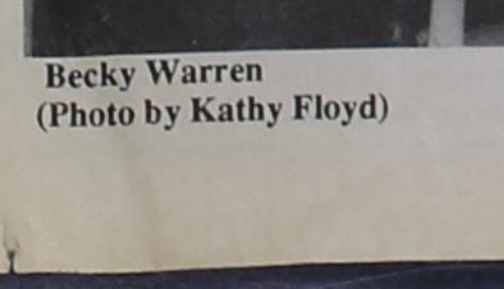

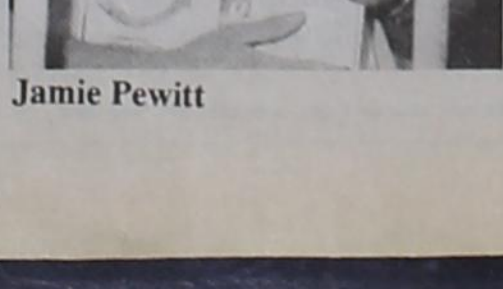

This Week In History

On July 30, 1619, the House of Burgesses, the first representative assembly in the New World, was elected at Jamestown, Va. ... August 5, 1858, the first Atlantic cable was completed by Cyrus W. Field ... August 1, 1903, the first automobile trip across the U.S., starting from San Francisco, ended in New York ... August 4, 1914, President Woodrow Wilson proclaimed U.S. neutrality in the European war ... August 4, 1916, the U.S. bought the Virgin Islands from Denmark ... August 1, 1951, tariff concessions by the U.S. to the Soviet Union, Communist China, and all communist-dominated lands were suspended ... August 4, 1964, the bodies of three civil-rights workers, who were reported missing in Mississippi June 22, were found buried. Twenty-one white men were arrested ... August 4, 1972, Arthur H. Bremer, 21, was sentenced to 63 years in prison for shooting Gov. George C. Wallace and three bystanders ... July 30, 1974, the third article of impeachment against President Richard Nixon was voted 27-17, accusing him of unconstitutional defiance of committee subpoenas ... August 5, 1974, Nixon's support began eroding when he released three tapes, admitting he originated plans to have the FBI stop its probe of the Watergate break-in for political as well as national security reasons ... August 4, 1977, President Jimmy Carter signed an act creating a new Cabinet-level Energy Department ... August 3, 1981, federal air traffic controllers began an illegal nationwide strike after their union rejected the government's final offer for a new contract ... August 5, 1981, most of the 13,000 striking air traffic controllers defied the back-to-work order, and were dismissed by President Reagan.

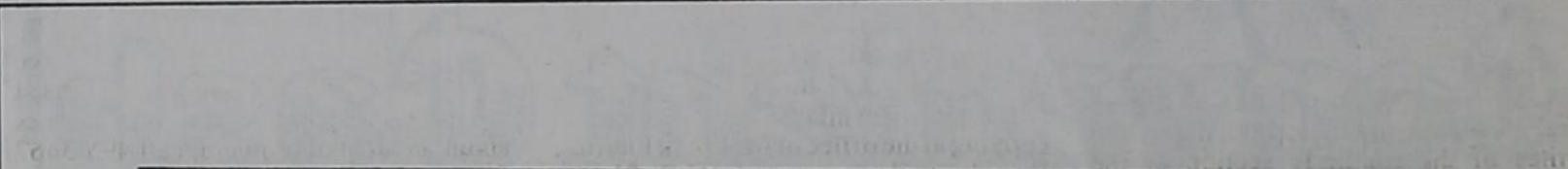
