## Football Contest begins this week with \$175 in total prizes offered

## Founder's Day Celebration includes special art exhibits

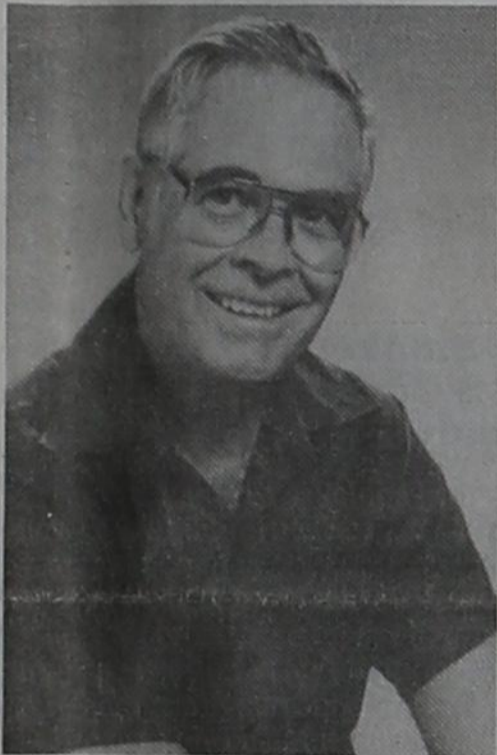

The exhibit will be open to the public October 12 and 13, from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m.

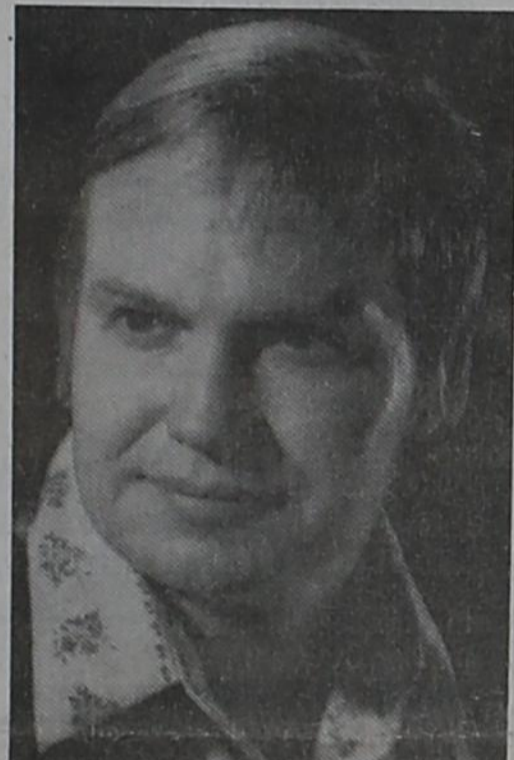

## Changing our way of life...

The following is the continuation of a series of articles provided by the Women's Division of the Post Chamber of Commerce as part of an awareness program on protecting our environment. The articles are designed to inform Garza County residents of the importance, necessity and benefits of recycling.

Each year an average American uses about 750 pounds of paper and paper products. An estimated 142,500,000 pounds of paper products will be used by people in Lubbock alone this year.

For every ton of paper which is recycled, 17 mature trees are saved from the paper mills.

It takes 78 mature trees to produce the oxygen needed by one human.

It takes 700 watt-hours of electricity (enough to burn a 100 watt bulb for seven hours) to create one 12 ounce aluminum can from raw materials. It takes only 35 watt-hours (or 5% of the energy) to make one from recycled aluminum.

Recycling creates new jobs in the community in the areas of handlers, transporters, bookkeeping and accounting and material processing.

The Environmental Protection Agency has mandated that all communities achieve a 25% recycling rate (from the municipal solid waste volume) by 1993. Texas currently recycles only 3% of all municipal solid waste.

Recycling benefits the community in the following ways:

- Jobs are created, thus expanding the tax base.
- Litter can be reduced by up to 62%.
- Energy consumption and raw materials are conserved for future use.
- Proceeds can be donated to charities or used for additional income.

# Jr Rodeo pioneers join fun of Founder's Day

## It all started in Post in 1948

One of the new events added to the 1990 Post Founder's Day Celebration will be a reunion of the Southwestern Championship Junior Rodeo (SCJR) participants and organizers, the first reunion ever held.

Forerunner to what is now the American Junior Rodeo Association (AJRA), the SCJR was started in Post September 18, 1948 and within a few years mushroomed to a national organization.

An article in the September 23, 1948 Post Dispatch reported "With a profit of approximately \$200, the first Southwestern Championship Junior Rodeo... was declared a success this week by the Post Stampede and Rodeo Association Chamber of Commerce."

"Proceeds from the rodeo will go into the building fund of the Garza County 4-H boys and girls, swelling their total funds to something in excess of \$500, according to Alvin Davis, 4-H boy who originated and managed the rodeo."

Total attendance at the first event was estimated at between 3,000 and 4,000 people.

Jimmy Bird defeated the state high school champion, Scooter Fries of Bandera, in the matched calf roping event.

A total of 128 boys and girls entered five open competitive events in that first show.

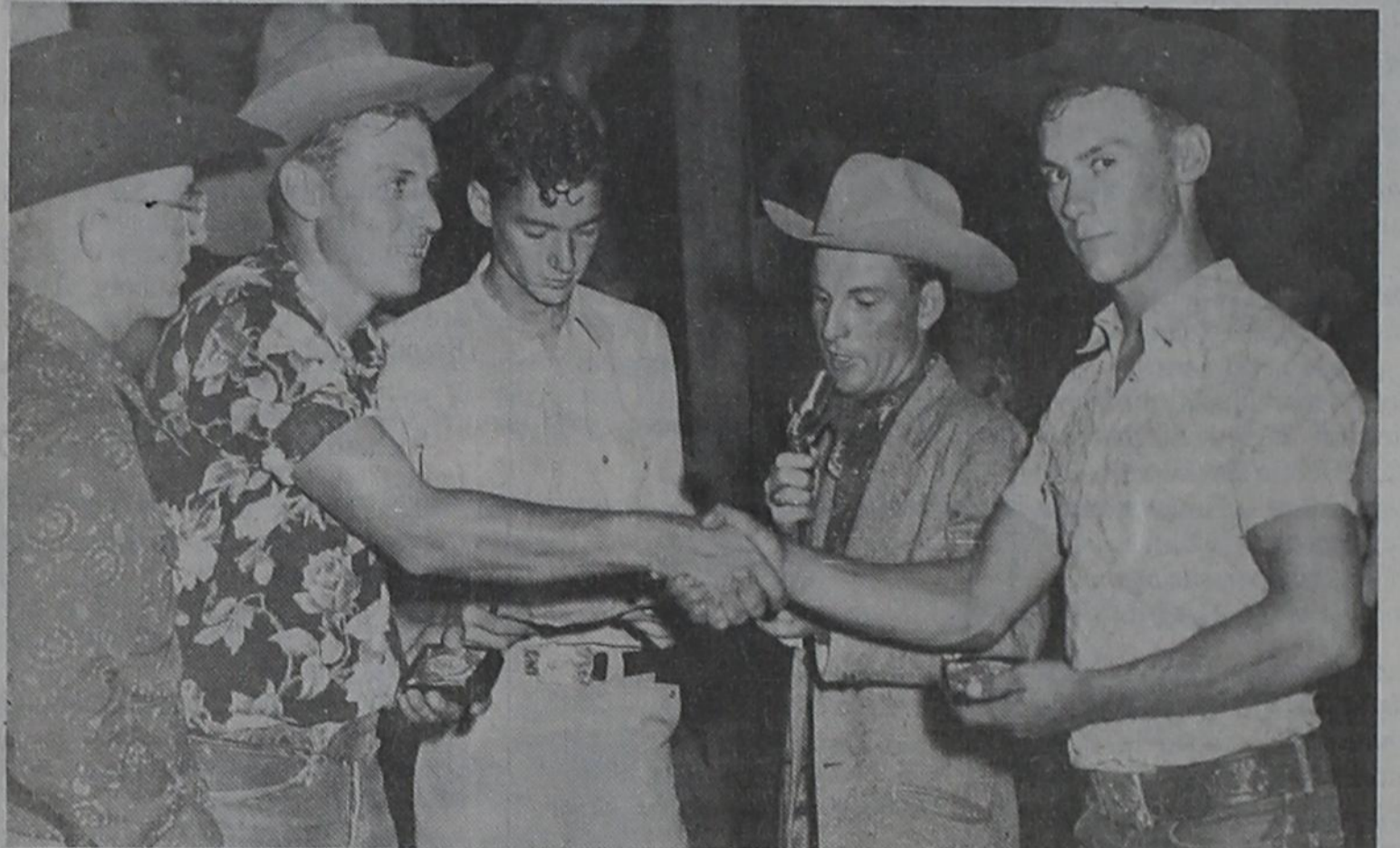
"Jimmy Moore set the pattern for the 11 sponsor contestants," the Dispatch report said.

A number of the early SCJR participants and organizers will be in Post Saturday, October 13, for the Reunion Breakfast at the rodeo grounds for the 8 a.m. event. Admission to the breakfast is \$3.

Jimmy Moore, who participated in the first rodeo, went on to win the 1950 All-Around Cowboy award and rode in rodeos for a number of years.

Early organizers in the first two years included Roy Josey, Alvin G. Davis, Leon Miller, Giles W. Dalby, F.M. Reep, Jimmy Bird, R.E. Josey, Carter White, Harold Childs, Jimmy Puckett, Billy Meeks, Jimmy Moore and Zoe Sims.

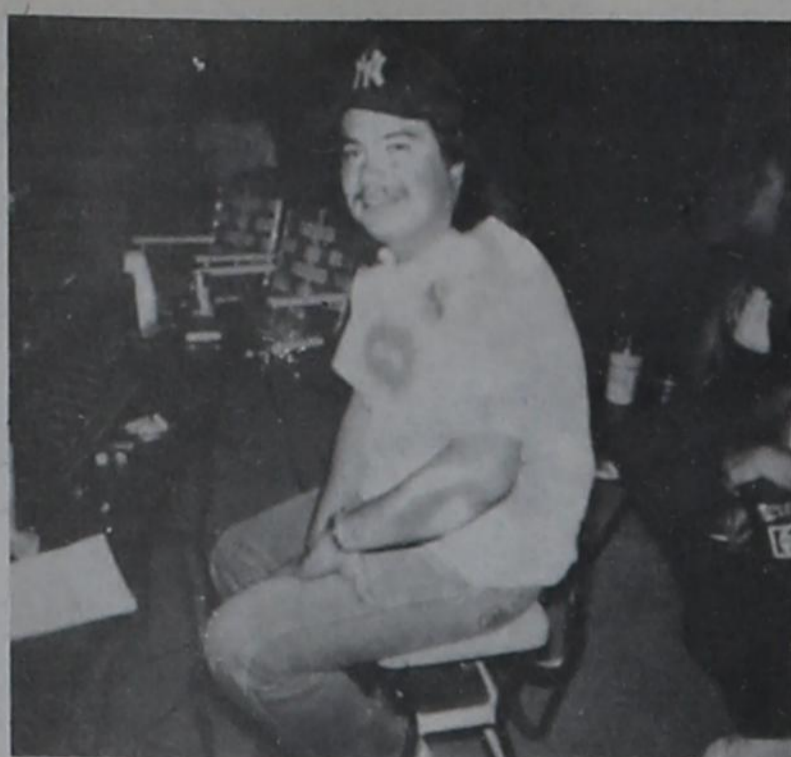

## Congressman Stenholm wins Commerce Award

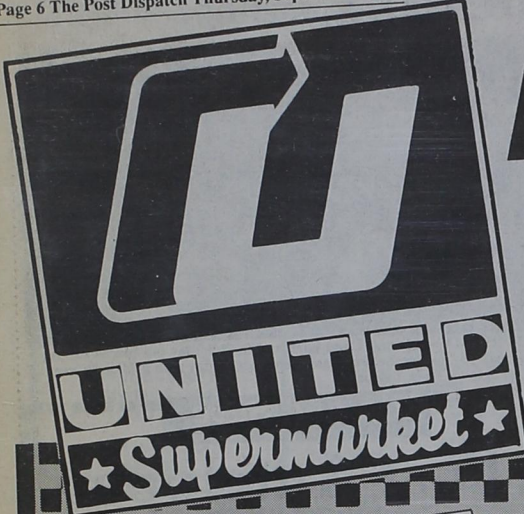

### Preliminary census count shows Post with 3,749

The 1990 Decennial Census preliminary housing unit and group quarters population count shows Post with a population of 3,749, compared to the 1980 census count of 3,961.

"These census counts are partial and preliminary in nature," the report to the City of Post states, "you should not use them for official purposes. These counts are likely to change upon completion of continuing field and processing activities."

A total of 1,542 housing units were identified, with 208 vacant. The report showed 63 in group quarters population, which would include nursing homes and apartments.

Those citizens who believe they were not included in the census count should contact the Regional Census Center in Lubbock at 742-8600.

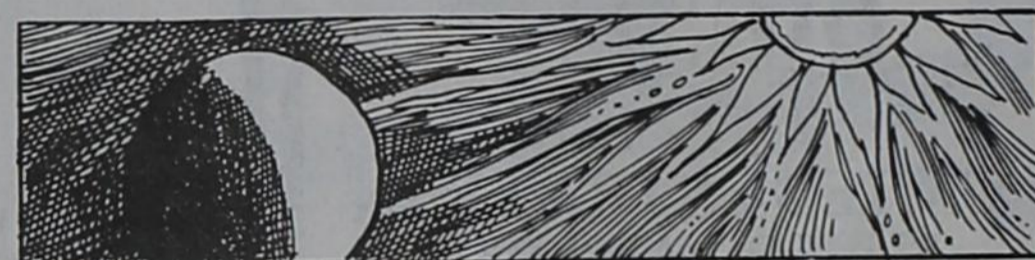
### Sales Tax Rebate check down from last year

The sales tax rebate check to the City of Post for the period ending June 30 was down 13.26 percent from the same period last year.

The check for \$19,222.43 compares to 1989's \$22,161.13. The total rebate this year through June is \$107,941.93, compared to \$110,004.42 or 1.87 percent less than the first six months of 1989.

Merchants collect the state and local sales taxes and send them to the Comptroller's office with their tax returns. The state keeps its share and sends cities and counties the local portion of the sales tax each month.

All local sales taxes must be approved by area voters and may be used for any legal city or county expense. Most areas put the money in their general fund and use it for operations such as fire fighting, maintaining roads and law enforcement.

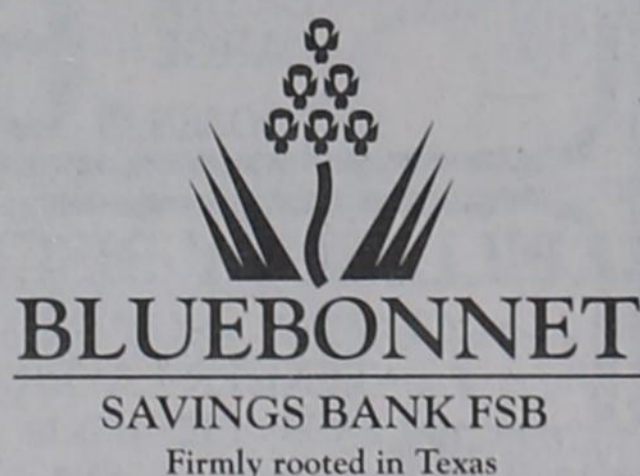

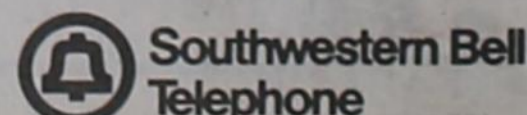

## Cactus could become popular dish for the 1990s...

Prickly Pear Produce: Cactus could become popular dish of '90s

Cactus fruit and leaves could become popular foods for the 1990's, the president of a major marketing firm for new and exotic produce believes. Karen Caplan of Los Angeles, California, said her firm buys cactus from growers in Mexico and California who produce it for specialty food markets. "I would welcome a South Texas cactus supply, but more research needs to be conducted on South Texas cactus varieties to determine which would best adapt to nationwide marketing," she said.

Caplan is president and chief executive officer of Frieda's Finest/Produce Specialists, a 28 year old firm that markets almost 300 food items from around the world to produce departments in the United States and Canada. She was keynote for the recent Cactus Conference at Texas A&I University, which attracted almost 200 growers, researchers and marketing specialists from Texas, California and Mexico.

Caplan's marketing firm was founded by her mother, Frieda Caplan, in 1962 and has annual sales of about \$20 million. "One of the first unique produce crops we targeted for marketing was kiwi fruit from New Zealand," she said. "It is the fruit of a Chinese gooseberry. We decided kiwi was a term consumers could relate to more readily than gooseberry, so it has been marketed as kiwi in the United States."

The Caplans — Karen, her sister, Jackie, and Frieda — have their own test kitchens and develop and test recipes that are included with the produce they market. They have grown from a Los Angeles based wholesale produce distributor to a marketing firm that searches globally for new food items for produce departments. Their produce carries a distinctive purple "Frieda of California" logo.

## 'Don't Bag It' Wins EPA Award

"Don't Bag It," a lawn care program that reduces yard waste going into landfills by recycling grass clippings instead of bagging them, has earned the Environmental Protection Agency's award of excellence for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in Dallas.

Dr. Bill Knoop, turf grass specialist with the Extension Service in Dallas, devised the program which was piloted by the Tarrant County Extension Office and the city of Fort Worth with volunteer demonstrators. It has now been adopted by more than 35 cities in Texas.

"The important thing about 'Don't Bag It' is that people who want to make a difference in preserving the environment can do something that works - and do it immediately without spending a lot of time or money," said Knoop. Landfill space is disappearing at an alarming rate throughout the country, he said. During summer months, grass clippings increase the volume of solid waste going into landfills by 20 to 25 percent.

Whitney's follow-up studies showed

"Cactus pears were in the top 15 fruits we marketed last year and could have placed higher with more attention and promotion," Karen said. "The fruit of cactus is small, oval-shaped, and comes in green, orange and red varieties. It is sweet and has a watermelon-like taste. She said taste is the buzzword for the '90s. In fact, this decade will be known as the decade of taste."

Caplan had this advice for potential cactus produce growers:

\* Be realistic about the business venture. No year-long supplies of cactus fruit exist; yours may not top the market.

\* Grow the cactus fruit and leaves for the fresh market. Ship only the highest quality produce.

\* Develop cactus varieties that have uniform and tasty leaves. Check to make sure the leaves are not bitter.

\* Strive for distinct colors in the fruit, and try to produce the largest, more attractive fruit possible.

\* Although the fruit will be marketed as a gourmet item, include simple, easy-to-follow recipes with the packaged fruit.

\* Let potential buyers sample the products. Give out samples in supermarkets and at state and regional fairs.

\* Medical doctors have documented that cactus fruit and leaves have medicinal value for diabetics.

\* For the fresh market, make certain your most attractive and appealing products are displayed prominently.

\* Package the produce very carefully, with a uniform size and weight for each box.

\* Be prepared to educate the consumer about the nutritional value of cactus. Include recipes that are easy to follow and colorful as well.

\* Do your own market research. Handle the cactus products with great care. Check on chilling requirements and on transportation and other special needs.

that participants spent 35 percent less time mowing, and the appearance of their lawns improved significantly.

Knoop and Whitney received the EPA award for solid waste management at a ceremony in Austin. "These efforts will help prevent us from burying ourselves in our own garbage," EPA Regional Administrator Robert E. Layton said.

The Tarrant County Extension Office and the city of Fort Worth also received the national Keep America Beautiful award for "Don't Bag It" in its initial year.

"We had no trouble convincing people not to bag their grass clippings," said County Extension Agent Bob Whitney, who directed the Fort Worth program. Fort Worth city officials estimate that "Don't Bag It" prevented approximately 25,000 bags of grass clippings from going into the landfill last year. "We have been gratified to see 'Don't Bag It' expand to so many cities in Texas, and in other states, and be adopted by professional lawn care associations and other state extension services," Knoop said.

The contract for aerial spraying in the 1990 High Plains Boll Weevil Control Program has been awarded to Perryton Aviation of Perryton, Texas.

Larry Schickedanz, owner of Perryton Aviation, Inc., submitted a two-tier bid at a bidders' meeting held at Lubbock Civic Center August 29. Schickedanz's low bid, of \$8.80 per gallon for the first 5,000 gallons applied and \$7.09 per gallon on subsequent applications, was chosen from eight bids presented at the meeting. Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. let the 1989 contract for \$5.93 per gallon. The 27-year-old program is conducted in cooperation with U. S. Department of Agriculture from PCG's field office in Spur, Texas.

Before making the contract award, Program Coordinator for PCG, Roger Haldenby commented to bidders that the 1990 weevil suppression program is expected to be much smaller than in recent years. An early freeze in October, 1989, and low temperatures in December helped to minimize the numbers of boll weevils that were able to survive the winter. The hot, dry conditions of May and June of this year have further reduced populations.

The contract calls for applying ultra low volume malathion, at the rate of 12 ounces per acre, to an estimated 50,000 to 150,000 acres of cotton. Four aircraft will be used. The control zone lies along and below the Caprock on the eastern edge of the High Plains from Silverton, Briscoe County, in the north to Vealmoor, Howard County, in the south.

Pheromone traps set out below and along the Caprock since May have caught 98 percent fewer boll weevils this year than during the same period in 1989, added Johnny Anderson, Program Manager. Anderson explained that the early indications are for this to be a light year but that treatment decisions are based on a field-by-field manual survey of boll weevil populations. This survey, using 32 two-person teams, will start September 5th.

The first spray application to infested fields will be made September 24. Treatments will then be re-

peated, as necessary, at ten-day intervals until the first area freeze.

Since its inception in 1963 the program has successfully prevented the spread of boll weevil into the cotton acreage above the Caprock and on into New Mexico.

The program is funded 70 percent by High Plains cotton producers and 30 percent USDA, with a small contribution from Texas Department of Agriculture. Producer funds for the program are collected as a part of the receiving charge at area compresses and are administered by PCG's Boll Weevil Steering Committee, chaired by Borden County farmer Jarrell Edwards of Route 1, O'Donnell.

## Original Bill of Rights to be exhibited Dallas and Houston in March 1991

of a 50-state tour which October, an original copy of Rights will be exhibited in Houston, Texas. The national Rights Tours, sponsored Morris Companies, Inc., Fair Park in Dallas on 5, 1991, and at the George Convention Center in on March 8 - 12, 1991.

Historic parchment and multi-media exhibit will travel for 16 months as part of the two-year bicentennial celebration of the ratification of the Bill of Rights. The Commonwealth of Virginia's copy of the Bill of Rights, which has been recently restored and is generously on loan from the Virginia State Library and Archives, will be featured in the exhibit. The exhibit will be open to the public free of charge.

"Never before has an exhibit like this travelled to all 50 states," said Guy L. Smith IV, vice president of

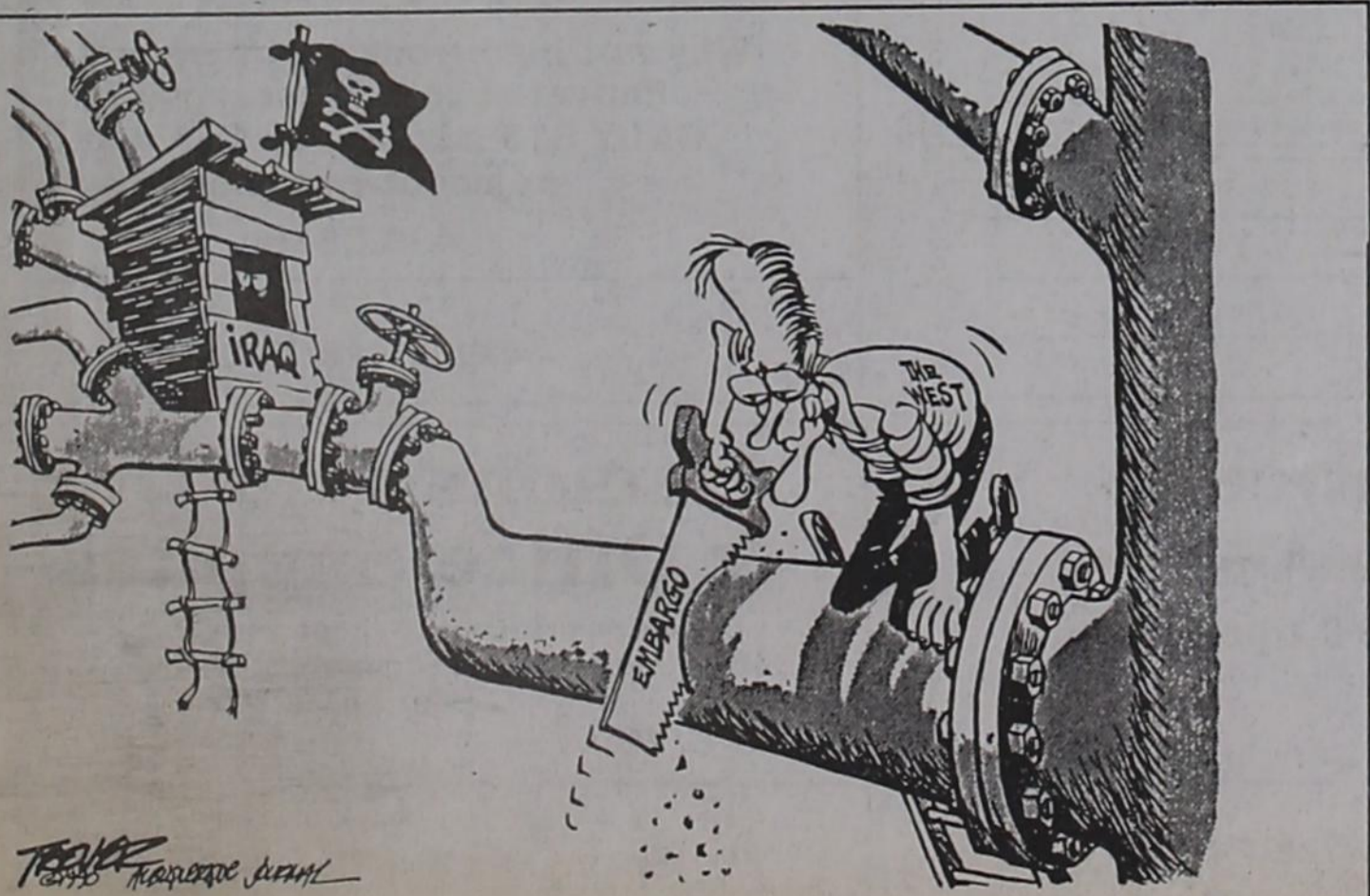


