Weigh-in of 124 hogs and 75 lambs will be today from 4 until 7 p.m. at the show barn. Rabbits will be checked in Thursday between 3:30 and 5:30 p.m. with 4-H Pee-Wee Rabbit exhibitors bringing their rabbits at 10:00 a.m. Saturday morning.

Syd Conner will serve as announcer for the show this year with Rafe Foreman auctioneering at the sale Saturday afternoon at 1:30 p.m.

Stanley Young, Lubbock County Extension Agent, will judge the Swine Show set for 6:30 p.m. Thursday. Ronnie Dunn is serving as Superintendent and Wilma Smith, Assistant Superintendent of the Swine Division.

John Kearny, Sterling City Vo-Ag Instructor, will judge the Lamb Show at 6:30 p.m. Friday. Rusty Morris is the Sheep Division Superintendent with Donny Stelzer Assistant.

Dan Taylor of Wolfthorpe will judge the Heifer and Steer Shows Saturday morning at 9:00 a.m. Superintendent of the Cattle Division is Jay Pollard with Rafe Foreman assisting.

Post ISD approves extension of kindergarten to full day

Change aimed at improving student learning

With one member opposing the change, Post Independent School District board of trustee members approved the recommendation by superintendent Bill Shiver at the January 14 regular meeting to extend the kindergarten program to full day for all students.

Citing a need to expose the students to more learning time, Shiver expressed the opinions of the faculty concerning the need to spend more time with kindergarten students. "It looks like our first, second and third grade students are falling behind, as evidenced by the test scores," Shiver explained, "and one way to address this situation is to put our children on an even playing field."

Trustee Gary Workman expressed his opposition to the plan based on the belief that the state is already controlling too much of the family life. "This is just one more example of the state taking away from the family, what's next, taking the baby out of the crib at one year old?" Workman said his vote against the change was more of a philosophical one, "somewhere, sometime, we have to stand up and say enough is enough."

The extended time in school for kindergarten students will be implemented as soon as scheduling can be arranged.

In other action board members approved the refunding of a tax payment which was submitted in error of new state laws. The payment from LLB Inc., JK Inc. and Lott Mineral Trust was submitted to the Post ISD without including payment to the newly created County Education District. The law requires that tax payments made for schools must include payment to the CED.

The issue of the constitutionality of the CED is now in the hands of the Texas Supreme Court, which is expected to make a final ruling on the matter in the near future.

Board members were treated to a "hands-on" demonstration of the specialized computer instructional program by instructor Pat Cruse, followed by briefings on counseling and testing by counselors Pat Thompson and Lane Tannehill.

No action was taken on a discussion concerning the future of a trade school or advanced vocational training facility proposed by board member Rex Cash. Shiver suggested extending an invitation to state school board member Monte Hasie of Lubbock to brief the board on the possibilities.

Shiver told board members that a recent surprise inspection by the Texas Department of Health gave the cafeteria "high marks." "The inspector said we have one of the best and cleanest cafeterias he's seen," Shiver added.

The board approved the renewal of certificates of deposit of \$1,628,605; \$783,604; \$1,147,282 and \$899,071 at 3.17 to 3.73 percent for 30 to 32 days.

The certified values from the chief appraiser, retroactive to July 19, 1991,

were also approved along with the funding of \$2,000 for the Caprock Cultural Association which provides training for teachers.

Shiver recommended that board members begin study of the superintendent's appraisal. In reference to his plans for retirement, Shiver told the board, "For the welfare of the school district, a good working relationship between my replacement and the board is necessary."

Attending the meeting were trustees Dan Hodges, Barbara Hardin, Gary Workman, Pru Basquez, Rex Cash, Mark Kirkpatrick and Ronnie Gradine.

Post ISD superintendent Bill Shiver has been informed by the Texas Home Economics Association that Post High School teacher Sharla Wells has been selected as the Texas Home Economics Teacher of the Year.

"It is with great pride that the Texas Home Economics Association (THEA) recognizes her as an outstanding teacher," THEA vice president relations Darlene Hicks, C.H.E. announced.

The award will be presented at the First General Session of the annual meeting of the THEA in Fort Worth, Thursday, March 5 at 7 p.m.

The award places Mrs Wells in consideration for the American Home Economics Association's national home economics teacher of the year selection. She will be recognized in Denver at the annual meeting of the American Home Economics Association in June.

"We are happy with this special honor that has been bestowed upon Sharla," Post High School principal Joe Giddens says, "the interest that she has helped generate with our students in the Y.E.S. program is an extraordinary happening."

Mrs Wells is the vocational comprehensive technical instructor at Post High School and has been teaching there for the past six years.

Kids 'N' Art program gets \$1,629 grant from TCA

Post gets seven inch snowfall

One of the biggest snowfalls in the past several years put a crimp in travel plans here late Friday evening and into Saturday as a surprise snowfall left up to seven inches of the white stuff on the ground.

Post recorded one of the highest amounts of snow in the area from the brief winter system.

Roads and highways here were snow packed by late Friday evening and Texas Department of Transportation crews were busy Saturday with graders and front loaders.

Only one minor accident was reported as a result of the road conditions. Rain turned to snow Friday evening beginning at approximately 6:30 p.m. and by midnight the ground was covered. Snow continued falling steadily through the night and into early Saturday morning.

Snow began to melt with sunshine Sunday but not enough to stop the enthusiasm of snow ball fights and snow structures from being built. By Monday most of the white stuff was a memory, and washed away by Tuesday morning with warm rain showers.

"I'm very proud of the continued growth of Kids 'N' Art, the youth come in all colors and varied social backgrounds, more importantly, these young people are filled with self esteem," the director added.

White River pipeline springs leak

The main water pipeline between White River Lake and the City of Post sprung a leak in the McDonald Creek area again last Thursday evening, creating cloudy looking tap water here.

Repairs to the line were completed Friday morning, but the 26 mile long pipeline as of Tuesday had not reached its maximum level, therefore creating air pockets which cause the water to appear cloudy.

"Let the water set for a few seconds," city employee Yvonne Kennedy suggests, "and you'll notice that it clears up."

The water line break between White River and Post was a reminder to the citizens here that the fragility of the 26 mile line, which is more than 25 years old, could create serious water shortages because Post does not have a reservoir system.

Whatever is in the pipeline between the break and the city is what reaches customers here.

Normally White River Municipal Water District crews have the leaks repaired within a few hours.

On October 4, 1991, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company (Southwestern Bell) filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission) that proposes a new optional service called DigiLine™ Service. The application was assigned Docket No. 10655.

DigiLine Service uses a 144 Kbps facility, typically divided into two 64 Kbps B Channels and one 16 Kbps D Channel to provide access to and from the public switched telephone network for circuit-switched voice communications. DigiLine Service also provides transmission of circuit-switched data and packet-switched data within the customer's service office area only. This service allows the simultaneous transmission of voice and data over a single residence or business telephone line from a serving office equipped for DigiLine Service.

The monthly recurring charges for DigiLine Service consist of three major rate elements: Basic Interface Facility (\$19.00); Basic Interface Equipment (\$12.00); and, an Integrated Services Network Component for each B Channel (rate varies from \$1.90 to \$7.25 per B Channel depending on the customer's class of service and location.) Other charges may also be applicable depending on the options requested by the customer.

DigiLine Service operates only with compatibly-equipped FCC Part 68 registered equipment. The service will be offered initially in the following exchanges and within the following serving offices:

Austin	Fireside
San Antonio	Capitol, Medical Center
Houston	Clay, Medical Center

DigiLine Service may be furnished in other serving offices in any of the above exchanges in combination with foreign serving office charges. In addition, DigiLine Service may be available in other exchanges upon a customer's bona fide request. A bona fide request is a written request for service. Upon receipt of the bona fide request, Southwestern Bell will conduct an economic analysis to determine the financial viability of offering the requested service.

Southwestern Bell expects DigiLine Service to generate first-year revenues of approximately \$236,000.

Health frauds target the elderly

While most older adults are in good health, the incidence of chronic diseases does increase with age. Given the opportunity most ill people would reverse the undesirable consequences of these diseases and of aging in general.

Promoters who sell useless and unproven health products rely on the ill and older person's hopes to make their sale. A recent Congressional investigation showed that health charlatans bilk older people out of over \$10 billion a year. The total spent by all ages on health frauds is closer to \$28 billion.

All fraudulent schemes rob people in three ways: 1) their money - since the products have no effects; 2) their hope -- since there is no effect; and 3) their self-esteem -- when they realize they have been "taken."

However, older people may use denial to avoid both the loss of hope and the loss of self-esteem. Failing to recognize a fraudulent scheme can keep the elder at risk for further deception.

The American Council on Science and Health has identified common methods used in the promotion of health products. Older adults can avoid being "taken" by recognizing some of the misleading tactics used to sell fraudulent products:

*** Extraordinary promises --** Quacks promise cures for all diseases, regardless of the nature or extent of the disease. They appear as friends and healers who have "the only chance" for older persons to regain good health.

*** The term "alternative" --** Most frequently, promoters of questionable approaches describe themselves as "alternative" healers or therapists. There may be testimonials from individuals, but promoters are not willing to subject their approach to acceptable scientific protocol.

*** Something for everyone --** Ideally, quacks would like to convince even people who are well that they have health problems. If the problems are imaginary, then the nonexistent conditions will be easy to "cure." Charlatans encourage self-diagnosis, the use of phony diagnostic tests and compliance with regimens designed to prevent diseases as well as cure them.

*** Fantasy or science fiction --** Charlatans frequently claim the ability to perform magic, call on supernatural powers and grant wishes. Often the older adult's religious beliefs are exploited. Ex-

amples include water obtained from special sources possessing miraculous healing properties.

Promoters of fraudulent health products frequently exploit popular misconceptions about health in order to sell their products. Scientific data may be misused or misinformation may be presented in a "scientific manner" to gain the confidence of older adults. Many promoters call themselves "doctor" or claim nonexistent degrees to add credibility.

Older adults need to be particularly aware of the many products that are being directed toward them by charlatans. Not only can hard earned and saved dollars be lost but some "cures" may cause health problems. Older adults should check with a known physician when doubt exists about a scientific-sounding claim for a health product. 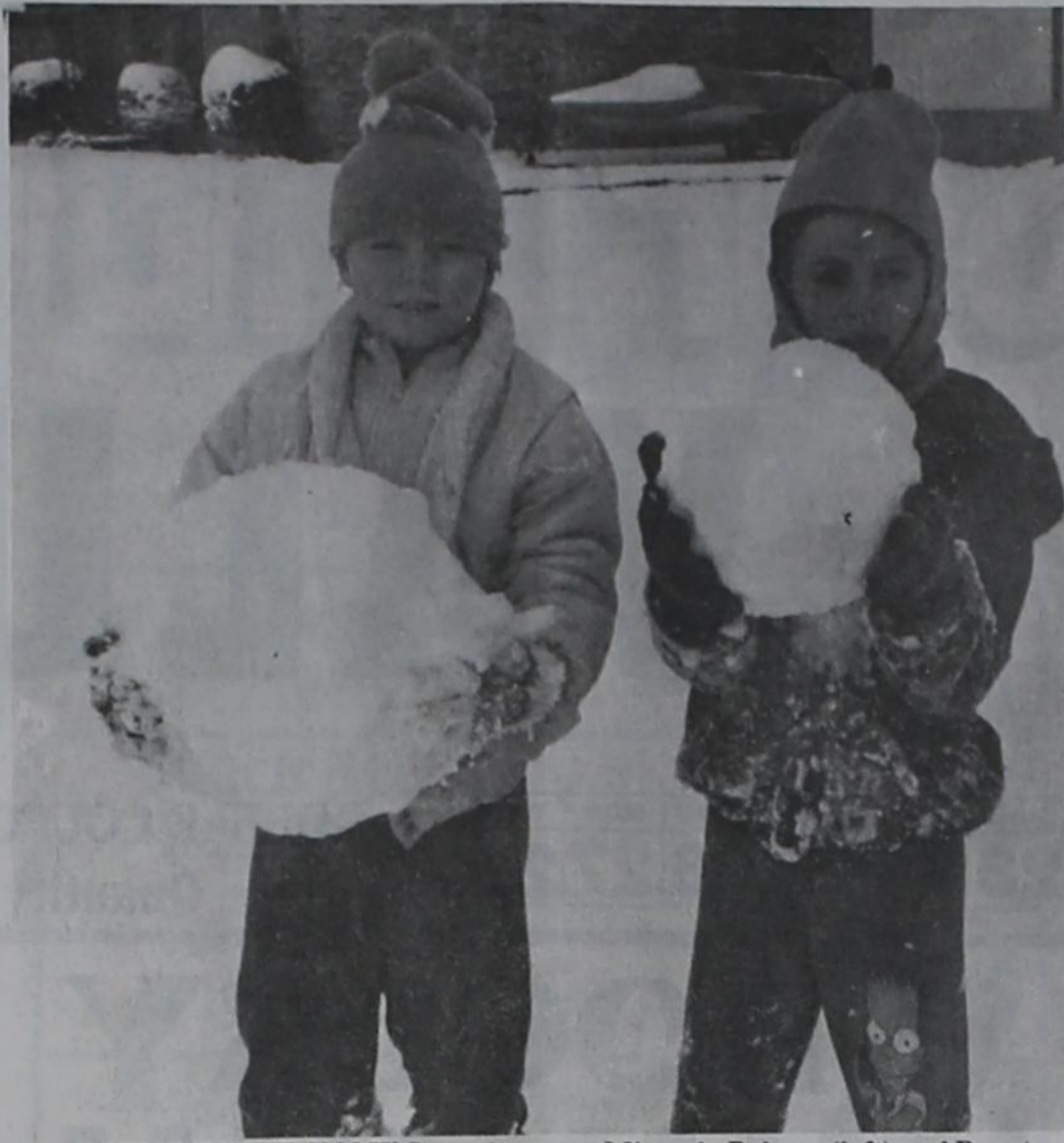
"I will strive for academic excellence with the infusion of vocational programs."

Rotary seeks applicants for international programs

The West Texas District of Rotary International seeks applicants for a study exchange program designed to promote international goodwill and understanding.

Area Rotary clubs will be sending a group of area business and professional men to visit with South Korea in the spring of 1992 under the Group Study Exchange program of the Rotary Foundation.

The Group Study Exchange will send a team of Americans to South Korea for approximately five weeks. Through the reciprocal program, West Texas Rotarians hosted a team from South Korea for a month-long tour in October.

During the exchange, team members learn about the culture, economy, education and language of the host country. The Rotary Foundation and participating Rotary clubs pay expenses for team members.

Eldon Davidson, GSE chairman, participated in a similar exchange program in Switzerland in 1986. Davidson said the program is valuable because it promotes international understanding.

"Through the program, you learn about value systems, and you learn how these value systems are reflected in government policy and international relations," Davidson said.

The GSE program strives to improve international understanding by enabling people to learn from each other. While abroad, team members will meet their professional counterparts, observe their hosts' way of life, and study the nation's economic, social and cultural characteristics through travel and discussions within the participating Rotary district.

Nearly 15,000 persons from some 100 countries have participated in the program since its inception in 1965, at a cost of more than \$24 million.

The Rotary Foundation pays for all trip expenses including international travel. While visiting in Korea, team members will stay in the homes of Korean Rotarians to learn about family customs and culture.

The Rotary Foundation is voluntarily supported by Rotarians and others in 164 countries and geographical regions in which some 24,000 Rotary clubs are located. The Foundation's objective is to further international understanding and friendly relations among peoples of different nations through projects of an educational or charitable nature.

The 1992 touring program is open to men between the ages of 25 and 35. Rotary members cannot apply for the exchange. Deadline for completed application forms is January 31, 1992.

Congressman Bill Sarpalius seeks re-election

Congressman Bill Sarpalius (D-Amarillo) announced today he is seeking reelection as a Democrat to the U.S. House of Representatives from the 13th Congressional District of Texas. Sarpalius will be seeking his third term.

"I will be asking the citizens of the 13th Congressional District to return me to the U.S. Congress to continue the program of work that was started when they elected me first in 1988," Sarpalius said. "I am proud of the things I have been able to accomplish for the 13th District during my first three years in Washington and I plan to carry that record of accomplishment to the voters in the hope that they will allow me to continue this important task."

"I have always believed that you can not effectively represent your constituents sitting behind a desk in Washington, D.C.," Sarpalius said. "I have conducted nearly 500 town hall meetings throughout this district in the past three years, seeking the advice and counsel of the citizens on what they wanted from their Congressman. I have operated a mobile office that visits the smaller towns in this widespread district in an effort to bring government services directly to the people."

Sarpalius noted that his predecessor in the 13th District seat, Beau Boulter, also of Amarillo, has announced he will be a candidate in the Republican Primary, opposing former U.S. Representative Bob Price of Pampa, who held the post from January 3, 1969 to January 3, 1975.

"I certainly look forward to getting a side-by-side comparison of my record and that of Mr Boulter's before the voters during this year," Sarpalius said. "I believe it will become readily apparent to all of those who fairly examine our records, which candidate was most effective in serving the 13th Congressional District."

"While I certainly do not defend many of the actions of the Congress today," Sarpalius said, "I was somewhat amused with Mr Boulter's assessment of the Congress when he served from January 3, 1985 until January 3, 1989.

"It may surprise most citizens to know that it was during this period that nearly \$1.5 trillion was added to the federal debt, caused by the most wanton deficit spending this country has ever experienced," Sarpalius added.

"I will also be anxious for the voters to examine my attendance record in the Congress for the past three years -- a record that has averaged 97.4 percent for all votes," Sarpalius said. "Mr Boulter was present for less than 75 percent of the votes during his four years in Congress."

"In 1988, Mr Boulter accepted 100 percent of his high Congressional salary, while he voted only 15 percent of the time," Sarpalius said. "You would think he could have cast more votes than 15 percent just in the time it took him to come to Washington, D.C. to pick up his paycheck -- and he did that with an embarrassing regularity."

Sarpalius took issue with Boulter's assertion that he (Sarpalius) has not accomplished anything in his three years in the U.S. Congress.

"This is the area I look most forward to debating with Mr Boulter. I am appalled that he would start out his campaign with such gross misrepresentations, particularly when he knows his statements are not true."

"During my three years in Washington, I have managed to get more federal dollars returned to the 13th Congressional District than any Congressman in the history of the district," Sarpalius said. "I am most proud of my record."

"When Mr Boulter gets around to looking at the record -- and he will be forced to examine it during the course of this campaign -- I think he will be forced to retract his statements about my record if he is as honorable as he purports to be," Sarpalius said.

Last year, Sarpalius was able to get the Lake Meredith Desalinization Project authorized in the U.S. House of Representatives and has been instrumental in getting more than \$836 million in funding for Shepherd Air Force Base in three years.
