TIME IS GROWING SHORT ...

Texas citizens of 21 to 59 years inclusive are being called upon this week to pay their poll tax if they have not already done so. Only four days remain before the midnight Jan. 31

Up to 11 a. m. Monday, 897 poll tax receipts had been issued at the Garza County tax assessor-collector's office. This is 552 less than the 1.449 poll taxes paid in 1952, the last previous presidential election year. If the 1952 total is equaled this year, clerks at the tax office will have to laste 92 poll tax receipts on each of the six remaining days. Since the tax office is staying open at noon for the convenience of poll tax payers, the clerks have 54 working hours in which to issue the 552 receipts required to equal the 1952 mark. That boils down to a little more than 10 poll tax receipts an hour,

Two important special elections are coming up in February, and there may be others before the July and August primary elections. At the general election in November, voters will ballot on offices from president down, in addition to casting votes on a number of proposed constitutional amendments. So it looks like a poll tax receipt this year will be well worth the \$1.75 paid for it.

Some observers have indicated that the slow rate of poll tax payments in this county may be due to the fact that some taxpayers think they will escape jury duty by not paying their poll tax. Those who think so have been misled. To be eligible for jury duty you are required to be a qualified voter in every way except the matter of paying a poll tax. Answering these questions affirmatively qualifies you for jury service: Are you a householder in the county, or a freeholder in the state? Are you a qualified voter in this state? These questions cover all points, relating to age, residence, citizenship, sanity, etc.--a list of 15 questions-but not as to payment of poll tax. Article 579 of the Code of Criminal Procedure reads: "Failure to pay poli taxes shall not disquality any person from jury service."


