

### Taba'na Yuan'e set for Sunday, March 22

The traditional Taba'na Yuan'e ceremony will be held Sunday, March 22 at the City Park on the south side of the lake beginning with the preparations of the plains Indian rituals at 6 a.m.

Sponsored by the Post Chamber of Commerce, the Taba'na Yuan'e ceremony will again be under the supervision of "Chief" Frank Runkles, who has faithfully performed the ceremony true to its original form since 1973. He is a long-time student of Indian lore.

The Taba'na Yuan'e tradition dates back to earliest memories of the plains Indians, and it began here in 1906 when early pioneers in Garza County recalled the legend as told by the Indians.

Taba'na Yuan'e translates to "The Sunrise Wind."

Plains Indians used the dance to check the wind direction at the exact moment of sunrise, which would determine their success in the coming year.

According to the legend, the wind must be checked at sunrise on the day after the sun reaches the halfway point in its journey from the south to the north. Garza County farmers and ranchers have relied on the Taba'na Yuan'e for more than 80 years as an indicator as to their success in the coming year.

"Chief" Runkles begins the ceremony with the building of a small fire, using only natural materials. The fire is lighted by the friction of rubbing two sticks together.

Following the singing of a tribal prayer of thanks for the fire, the "Chief" performs a Four Winds dance where a pipe of peace is presented to the four directions, then to Mother Earth and to Wakantanka, the Great Spirit above, to seek their blessing.

A wad of grass is placed on the coals and as the smoke indicates the wind director at the moment of sunrise, the Smoke Dance is ended by kneeling and pointing a feather in the direction from which the wind comes. An east or northeast wind means a very good year, north or northwest an

average year, west or southwest a poor year and south or southeast a very bad

Last year the wind at sunrise was from the northwest, indicating an average Following the ceremony, the Chamber of Commerce will host a breakfast

proper exercise, excessive protein is often converted to fat and stored. Excessive protein intake may also strain kidney function.

\* Eat a lot of carbohydrates before each workout -- A highcarbohydrate diet is not necessary for a regular workout. If you are preparing for a long-distance event (lasting an hour or longer) such as a marathon or bicycle race, a highcarbohydrate diet may be needed -- starting several days before the event. For events lasting less than 90 minutes, a high-carbohydrate diet for one day can adequately fuel muscles.

\* Drinking sports drinks before and after exercise is essential for replacing lost body fluids -- During activity, perspiration causes loss of water and minerals such as sodium and potassium that are important for normal body function. Under usual circumstance, the average American diet contains more than enough sodium to make up for losses. Supplements are not needed unless circumstances are unusual, such as participation in a triathlon in intense heat.

\* Consuming foods or beverages high in sugar before exercising provides extra energy -- If you eat a food high in sugar 30 to 60 minutes before working out, it may actually have negative effect on your performance. The shortterm energy boost could lead temporarily to hypoglycemia, which limits the brain's ability to use its fuel (calories) to boost muscular function and mental drive. Symptoms of hypoglycemia include feeling light-headed, disoriented, shaky, sweaty, and fatigued or having blurred vision and heart palpitation.





### Living on the Edge of the Caprock

by John Senter Garza County Extension Agent -As the weather begins to warm, grass greens and the spring rains come, homeowners start to turn thoughts to home lawn care. Soil conditions may well be just a bit too cool for active lawn growth but there are some things home lawn enthusiasts can do now for

early preparation. Weed control is a major item of concern this time of year because many early season weeds have begun to infest lawns. Preemerge herbicides offer good control of these weeds but, keep in mind that a preemerge herbicide will offer no control after the weeds have germinated and started to grow. For weeds that have already emerged, a post-emerge chemical must be used. Keep in mind that all types of post-emerge chemicals cannot be used on all lawn grasses. To avoid damage to existing grass, make certain the chemical you are considering is

cleared for use on your particular

lawn grass. Perhaps one of the most overlooked and underestimated practices for a quality lawn is regular applications of a balanced fertilizer. A balanced fertilizer is any fertilizer with all three elements represented on the bag. Example, a 10-20-10 fertilizer has all three elements of nitrogen, phosphorous and potassium (potash) present. On the other hand, a fertilizer represented as 18-46-0 is not considered a complete fertilizer. If you are in doubt as to the type of fertilizer you need to apply, a soil test would certainly be in order to indicate exactly the type, amount and frequency of fertilizer your individual lawn requires. A standard rule of thumb is to apply 1.5 pounds of actual fertilizer per 1,000 square feet of lawn. This

8 fertilizer per 1,000 square feet. So far this year lack of water has not been a problem. However it is important to remember to always water in any type of granular fertilizer immediately after application.






