A one-half cent increase in the local sales tax rate for the specific purpose of assisting with economic development will be presented to voters Saturday in a municipal election.

The law is specifically designed for municipalities under 500,000 population. The city council will appoint a five member board to control the funds according to the limitations imposed by the legislation.

Proceeds from the tax may be used for acquisition of land, buildings and equipment for industrial purposes; payment of interest and principal on debt; small business revolving loan program, business incubator programs, venture capital and creation of a reserve fund for infrastructure.

Eddie Warren, Wells Pharmacy and 'Doc' Kennedy honored

Eddie Warren, long-time civic leader and founder of The Post Dispatch, was recognized as Citizen of the Year at last Saturday evening's Post Chamber of Commerce Banquet, along with Wells Pharmacy as Business of the Year and the late B.W. (Doc) Kennedy, who was inducted into the Garza County Cowboy Hall of Fame.

Will McCrary, 1990 Citizen of the Year, presented the award to Warren, following introductory remarks about Warren and his service to the community. Charles Wallace, 1990 Business of the Year recipient, presented the Business

of the Year award to Wells Pharmacy owner Jim Wells. Ronnie Dunn introduced the 1990 Garza County Cowboy Hall of Fame inductee, and presented the recognition to Jack Kennedy on behalf of the Kennedy family.

Chamber of Commerce president Tommy Young opened the evening with a welcome, which included introduction of out of town guests. Dr James Bell delivered an eloquent prayer, emphasizing the concern about

the world situation, particularly the impending war in the Persian Gulf. Young expressed appreciation to Margie Pennell for the dinner music and to members of the Post High School National Honor Society for providing table

service and Jim Jackson for catering the steak dinner. Young also introduced Chamber of Commerce board of directors members Bryan Williams and Charles Hardin, serving out their terms.

He then introduced 1991 president Susan Pennell, whose remarks called for increased effort to improve our city. She introduced new directors S. Rafe Foreman, Joe Duran and Curtis Hudman. Other directors were also introduced, including Linda Waldrip, Joy Fluitt,

Christy Morris, Greg Pollard, Jim Wells, Barbara Hardin and Jerry Taylor. Nell Mathews provided a report on the activities of the Women's Division of the Chamber of Commerce, including the extensive fund raising efforts which have benefited a wide variety of projects in the community. Members of the Women's Division board of directors were also introduced: Barbara Hardin, Sue Cornell, Billie Cross, Joyce Strubhart, Iva Hudman, Sara Ault and Isabelle

A full range of popular country and western music entertainment rounded out the evening with Mark and Jenny Lynn Hodges of Plainview offering their musical talents.

Citizen of the Year

Eddie Warren was born in Poplar Bluff, Mo., January 21, 1903 and moved to Post from Snyder with his parents in 1918, he met Pauline Tyson in 1921 at a Harley Sadler Show in Post and they later married December 19, 1924 at the Methodist Church parsonage here.

Warren operated a newspaper in Southland from 1923-1926 and served as cash courier between Post and Southland for the two banks, which were owned

In June 1926 Warren, along with his widowed mother, established The Post Dispatch in its current location. With the exception of service during World War II, he served as editor and publisher until his retirement in 1957. Warren served as vice president of the Post Chamber of Commerce in 1940

and later became president of the organization. He was instrumental in organizing the Southwestern Championship Junior Rodeo Association in 1941, and is one of two surviving original directors, along with Charlie Bird of Missouri. The rodeo later evolved into today's American Junior Rodeo

During World War II from 1943 to 1945 Warren served as a photographer in the Pacific, providing aerial and cinema photography in the U.S. Navy.

In 1945 he returned to civic activities in Post, including the promotion of the rodeo and chamber of commerce projects. Warren helped develop the first "Shop at Home" campaign. He also worked with promoting the Cowboy Band and the Post Junior Cowboy Band, along with Bryan J. Williams and Tom

In 1950 Warren was one of the leaders working to establish a hospital, and helped Edgar Bergen on the famous entertainer's hospital fund raising visit to

After retiring from the newspaper business, Warren served as city manager for Post from 1961 to 1968 and was active in the promotion and development of the White River Lake project. He served on the White River Municipal Water District board of directors from 1969 to 1975.

Business of the Year

Wells Pharmacy, established in 1971, was recognized for participation in city-wide projects for improvement, and specifically owner Jim Wells was honored for his contributions to the Main Street Project, Garza County Junior Livestock Show and Sale, United Way, Borden County Junior Livestock Association, EMTs, Post Art Guild and for the overall appearance and customer relations of his business. In the presentation, Wallace pointed out that among his community activities is the weekly advertisement featuring health tips and special emphasis on senior citizen needs.

Garza County Cowboy

In his remarks, Dunn pointed out that B.W. (Doc) Kennedy was born February 16, 1879 in Collin County and that Kennedy was raised in Jones

"Doc went out on his own at the age of 14 and worked for his uncle hauling freight from Abilene to Anson," Dunn said. "Later he had his own freight wagon and hauled bales of cotton to Abilene."

Kennedy came to the west in 1900 at the age of 21, filing on a section of land 12 miles east of Post. He was single and lived on his homestead 18 months, (Continued on Page 6)

Commissioners review health insurance status, finalize rights-of-way for lake road

by Wes Burnett The Garza County Commissioners' Court, meeting in its first regular session for 1991, heard a report from Texas Association of Counties field representative

Lori Goulet concerning health insurance coverage. She informed the court that TAC's health insurance provider, Prudential, requires 75 percent of covered person not to maintain benefit coverage for their dependents. Currently only three employees have opted to continue covering

County Judge Giles Dalby requested Goulet to provide additional information to the court, including copies of the contract with TAC and written policy requirements. No decision was made on the issue. Representative of the Texas Highway Department reviewed the status of preparations for completing the roadway to Lake Alan Henry, as the court finalized documentation on rights-of-way for the property. City of Lubbock

representative Carl Bednarz told commissioners that formal ground breaking ceremonies for the dam site near Justiceburg will be held in March. Attorney S. Rafe Foreman reviewed his proposal, which he had presented to last year's commissioners court, for delinquent tax collection. Foreman explained that he is currently working with a family who owns interest in the Burnham property near Justiceburg and will probably file one of the largest law suits ever in district court here to clear up 80 years of title problems on the property. "It will be a big help to the owners, of which there may be as many as 1,500, plus put the property back on the tax roll," Foreman emphasized. "This

Dear Sir or Mrs my name is Paul Guzman Jr originally from Crosbyton, Texas. I'm an E-6 or Staff Sergeant in the United States Army. I'm with E-Co. 2nd and the 5th Cavalry, 1st Cavalry Division out of Fort Hood, Texas. Presently I'm deployed in Saudi Arabia and have been here as of 15 Sept.

The reason for this letter is your product "beef jerky." As a fellow person of the area, I frequently stopped in Post, Texas at your wholesale market, throught the side door of your establishment and purchased beef jerky as I would pass to or from Fort Hood.

Shortly after I was deployed to Saudi Arabia, I just had to have something different than the (MRE) or Meal Ready to Eat! You know! that good ole army chow just ain't what it used to be. Anyway, I wrote and asked my wife Yolanda, and asked her to stop in Post, while on her way to Crosbyton for the Thanksgiving holiday, and buy me some beef jerky. Well she did. She

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sent three pounds to me packaged in the vacuum pack plastic wrapper. When I received it in Saudi Arabia it was just as fresh and tasty 10 days later. Well I shared it with my whole

company, giving each solider a small portion. I ran out within three days, and received rave comments about how good it was and where did I get such large pieces and who

I gave them the who, what and where, but unfortunately we don't hold any cash, cause we can't spend it. But my squad leader E-5 Sgt James Cawman from Tahoka also relayed to his wife and parents to ship some jerky from your store. Apparently they too know about the tasty stuff and sent him two pounds. Once again he shared it with the whole company.

At the present we are both out of jerky, and both our wives reside in Fort Hood.

There are many fellow Texans in our unit of 85 personel, and as a fellow spokesman I would like to ask you and your company with all sincerity if any and at all possible for a little support for your fellow soliders in Saudi Arabia. A small contribution of beef jerky for 85 people would be greatly appreciated, and it would actually raise the moral of fellow soliders just knowing there's someone out there who cares.

Sleep Problems: One Out of Three Suffers

Roughly one-third of the population experiences some type of sleep problem. Statistics indicate that about half of all of those who have insomnia, the medical term for sleep disturbances, take some type of medicine for the problem at some point in their lives. According to a recent article in Pharmacy Times, physicians write more than 20 million prescriptions each year for hypnotics - sleep medicines.

Nonprescription sleep-aids may be helpful in relieving certain types of insomnia. The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) recently determined that three sleep-aid product ingredients are safe and effective for general use. These ingredients are doxylamine succinate, diphenhydramine hydrochloride, and diphenhydramine citrate. Alcoholic beverages should be avoided when taking prescription or nonprescription sleep-aids.

Before using a sleep-aid consider these suggestions:

· Avoid stimulants such as caffeine and nicotine.

· Avoid daytime naps and heavy meals just prior to bedtime.

· Relax prior to bedtime by reading or listening to easy music.







In 1903 he married Lela Luman, they were the first couple to be married in Garza County. They raised their family on the ranch and lived there for 60 years before moving to Post. He died at his home in Post in 1966.
