Commissioners join in effort to eliminate constables, hide inspectors

A resolution supporting the constitutional amendment to abolish the offices of constable and hide inspector in several area counties was approved by the Garza County Commissioners' Court during the regular meeting Monday morning.

The resolution calls on State Senator John Montford to add Garza County to the list of counties petitioning for the change. Montford is introducing the constitutional amendment, which will be placed on a state wide ballot at an undetermined date.

County Judge Giles Dalby explained that the elimination of the office will save the county thousands of dollars.

Constable Lonnie Gene Peel expressed his concern about abolishing the office, saying that he felt he had served the people well and "it looks like I'll be punished for doing a good job."

Garza County's other constable, Mike Harper, has filed a law suit against the county, challenging the pay established by the court. The trial is expected to be held in district court here this month.

Commissioners also approved a resolution calling on the Texas Health Department to follow the same rules and guidelines as set by the federal government concerning waste disposal regulations. Dalby explained that the state inspectors were requiring more stringent controls on counties than required.

The Amarillo law firm of Northern and Daugherty was selected to provide the county its redistricting services, which are required every 10 years following the census. Official census data indicates precinct borders will have to be changed due to population shifts.

Donald Windham reported precinct populations:

The agreement with the law firm provides for a complete filing for redistricting to meet the requirements of the U.S. Justice Department.

Commissioners also approved a resolution concerning the Precinct 3 loan with the First National Bank of Post, allowing for an adjustment in interest payments. Judge Dalby, a director at the bank, abstained from the vote.

No action was taken on a request from Sheriff Freddy Cockrell for a cellular telephone to be installed in the sheriff's vehicle.

County agents Lee Howard and Ann Nobles presented reports to the commissioners, outlining a wide variety of programs scheduled by the extension office. Extension Homemakers Club members Inez Ritchie and Faye Maddox expressed appreciation to the court for its support of extension programs as part of the County Court Appreciation Week.

No action was taken on budget amendments explained by treasurer Ruth Ann Young. The extension office travel budget was reported to be approximately \$300 over the entire year's allocation. Judge Dalby suggested a review before taking action.

Attending the meeting were commissioners Sammy Ellis, Albert Stone, John Valdez and Herb Walls, Judge Dalby, clerk Sonny Gossett and treasurer Ruth Ann Young.

Child Abuse Prevention Month focuses on education

April is Child Abuse Prevention Month, and local efforts are focussing on preventing child abuse through education and identification of abuse, as well as seeking foster homes for abused children.

Aneada DeLeon, foster development program director for the Texas Department of Human Services, has issued an urgent call for volunteers to serve as foster parents. Foster homes in Garza County are needed to provide emergency short term care and basic long term care for abused children.

Those interested in offering their services for this program should call DeLeon at 806-673-2367.

In fiscal year 1990 there were 42 families investigated in Garza County for abuse or neglect of children.

Approximately 130 children were involved in these investigations.

There are currently three Garza County foster children in care, all in residential treatment facilities due to their emotional needs and behavior problems.

The primary source of reporting child abuse cases come from the schools, victims of abuse or neglect, neighbors, family members, parents, law enforcement or medical staff.

DWI, public intoxication arrests keep deputies busy

Garza County Sheriff's deputies were busy the past week with driving while intoxicated and public intoxication arrests.

March 29 one female was arrested for public intoxication and released after paying a fine. Texas Department of Public Safety officers arrested one man for driving while intoxicated. The man served 15 days in the county jail.

On March 31 deputies arrested a man for disorderly conduct. He served his sentence in jail.

An April 1 felony assault warrant from District Court put one man on a five year probation, a \$1,000 fine and \$500 restitution in medical expenses.

On April 2 one man was arrested for public intoxication and disorderly conduct and was ordered by the court to be admitted to the Big Spring State Hospital.

A woman was released on a \$1,500 bond April 5 following her arrest by DPS troopers for driving while intoxicated.

April 6 deputies arrested a man for public intoxication, who was released after paying a fine. One man is being held here following his arrest April 7, charged with a seco and a warrant from Winkler County. He was arrested following a disturbance at Southland.

The law requires the reporting of suspected child abuse and the reports are confidential.

Reporting suspected child abuse or child neglect may be made to any local or state law enforcement agency or to the Texas Department of Human Services.

Monday at 5 p.m. deadline for all news, advertising

"We try to accommodate everyone's needs," publisher Wesley W. Burnett emphasizes, "but with a firm Tuesday afternoon press time, we just have to enforce our Monday deadline."

The Post Dispatch established a Wednesday publication date in the fall of 1982, which required a Monday at 5 p.m. deadline so that production of the newspaper could be completed in time for an early Tuesday afternoon press run.

"For years we have broken our own rules on Tuesday mornings trying to accommodate last minute news items, but with our reduced staffing and the time limitations facing us, we just can't afford to set aside our schedule on Tuesdays any longer," Burnett adds.

Production on the Wednesday edition begins on Monday and continues through Monday evening and Tuesday morning. The newspaper is printed on Tuesday afternoon and prepared for mailing to the Post Office on Tuesday evenings.

"We appreciate everyone's cooperation with helping us meet our deadline," Burnett continues, "and please realize that on Tuesdays we just don't have enough time left to get those last minute items through the process."

The newspaper has a mail slot in the front door for the convenience of customers for dropping news items when the office is closed.

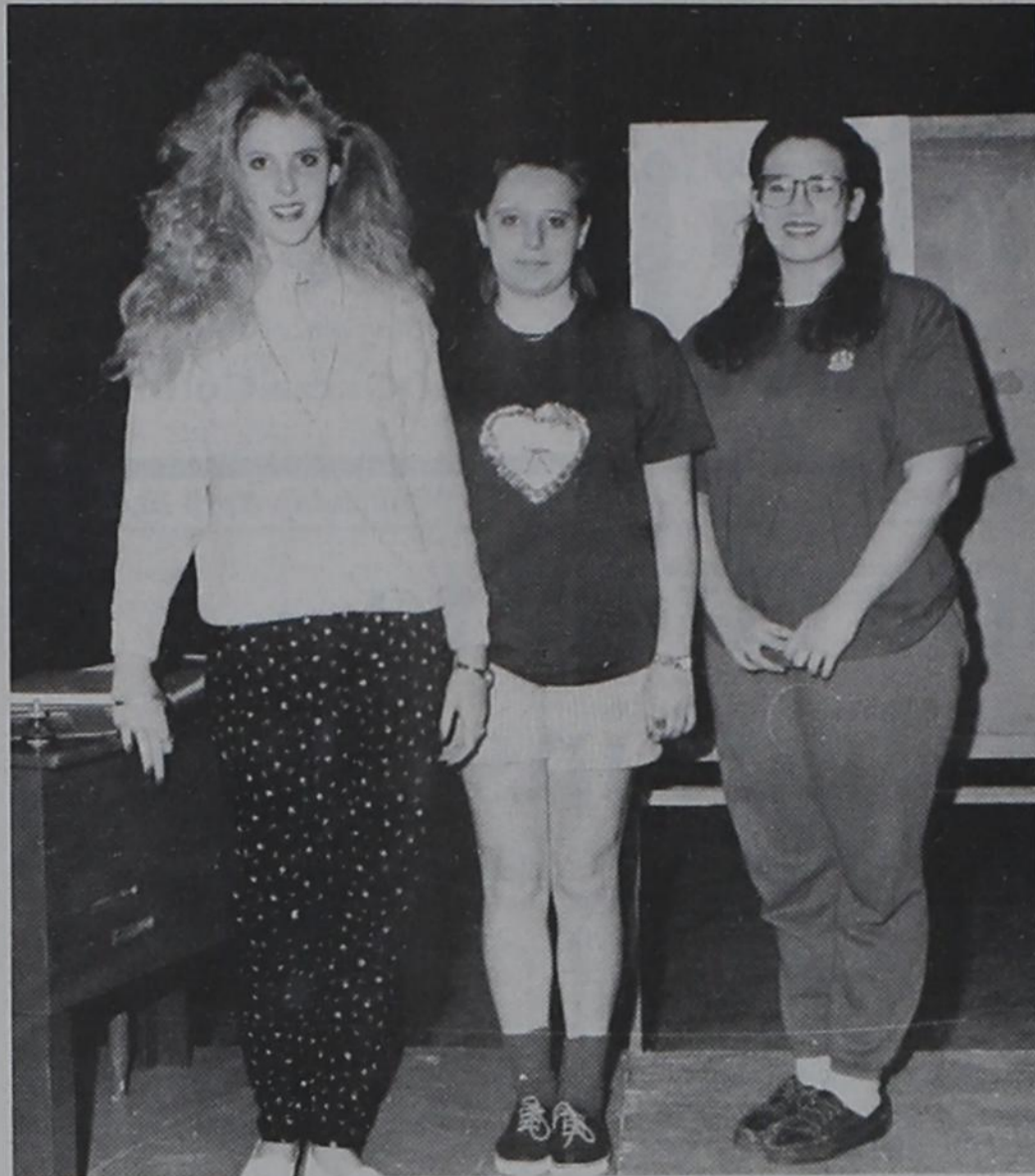

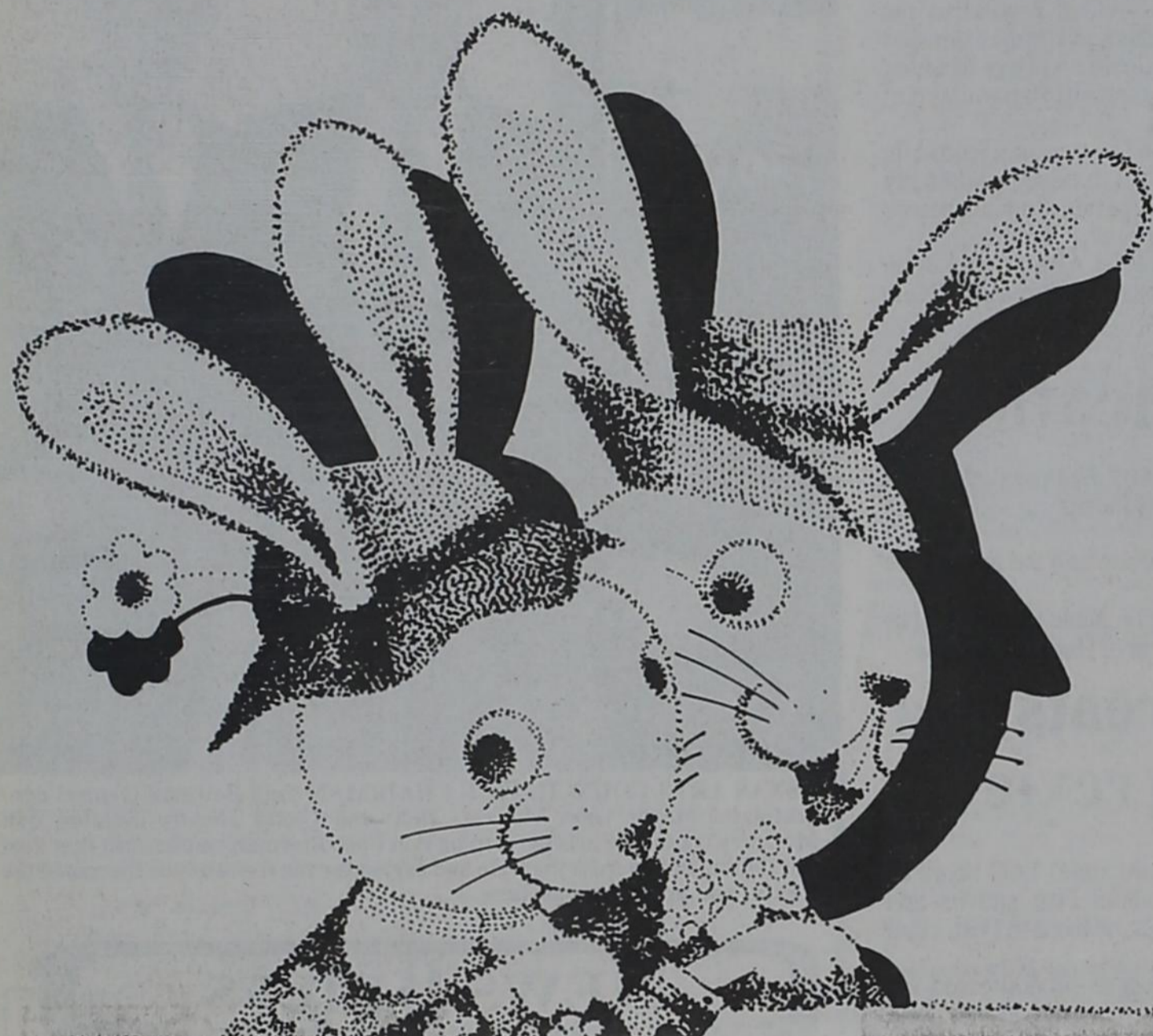

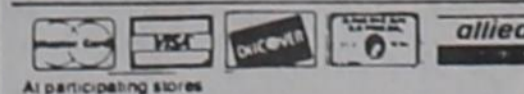

This ANN That

Easter marks the beginning of spring and often summer in West Texas. It's time to get out summer things, put away winter things, and do the usual spring cleaning chores. As you begin to clean, don't forget the kitchen.

The kitchen needs to be kept clean and food must be stored safely. Start by checking the refrigerator and freezer to make sure safe temperatures are maintained for storing perishable foods. An appliance thermometer can be used. The refrigerator temperature needs to be between 34 and 40 degrees Fahrenheit. The temperature will vary somewhat in different parts of the refrigerator so check for the coldest places to store most perishable foods like meats, dairy products and eggs. The freezer should register 0 degrees F. or lower. Keeping the refrigerator and freezer clean will help maintain safe temperatures. Clean and defrost insides, and clean lint and dust from the motor and refrigerating unit. Remove the grill at the bottom and vacuum under the unit. Check door gaskets for tightness.

Any spoiled foods or those which have expired "use-by" date should be discarded. Mold on any meats, soft or semi-soft cheese, fermented dairy products such as sour cream or yogurt signals the need to discard these products. If hard cheese has a small mold growth, substantial trimming of the mold from the cheese can save it. Heavy mold growth on a small portion of cheese may not be worth the risk. Throw it away. Also, clean up any spills in the refrigerator. These encourage bacteria growth.

Check freezer foods. While frozen food stays safe for extended periods, the texture and flavor will suffer. Rotate frozen foods and, in general, use within six months to a year. Date all

times so rotation will be easier. Packages with frost inside or with freezer burn will probably show loss of quality.

Check the cabinets and pantry. Ideally, foods should be stored in the coolest cabinets in the kitchen. Heat speeds up deterioration of foods.

Avoid storing foods near sources of heat such as the range, oven, dishwasher or hot water heater. Also, don't store foods under the kitchen sink where water and pipe connections encourage pest and rodent entry.

Check pantry items such as flour, spices, cereals and grains for signs of insect infestation. If you see little black bugs, throw the infested products away. Clean the storage area and sanitize by wiping surfaces with a solution of chlorine bleach and water. Store these dry products in air-tight containers. Moldy breads should also be discarded and not eaten.

Check cans and jars for rust, dents, cracks, leaks, or bulges. Don't taste any suspicious foods. Throw them away. Again check "use-by" dates. Set up a system of "first-in, first-out" to ensure the use of oldest foods first. Generally, it's best to use canned goods within one year, especially home-canned items. Check for signs of pests or rodents and take proper measures of control.

Check appliances for cleanliness and proper operation. Now may be the time to replace those appliance parts or repair those you have been putting off. Cleanliness for appliances such as can openers, processors, slicers, blenders, etc. is important to help prevent cross-contamination of foods with disease-causing bacteria. Be sure you have a good supply of clean dish rags and sponges. These items harbor bacteria very well.

Spring may be a good time to do a thorough kitchen search and cleaning, but habits established on a regular basis to keep foods and the kitchen safe are one good way to maintain food quality and safety, and get the most from the food dollar.

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company has filed two separate applications with the Public Utility Commission of Texas to introduce two new optional directory services. One service is Directory Assistance Call Completion (DACC) and the other service is Multiple List Directory Assistance (MLDA).

DACC is an optional service that provides customers the option of having their Directory Assistance call completed to the requested number (when they call Directory Assistance for a number) by either the Directory Assistance operator or a mechanized audio response system.

The proposed rates* for fully-automated DACC calls are: \$.30 if the call is sent paid or billed to a calling card, \$1.00 if the call is collect or billed to a third number and \$.25 from a coin telephone.

The proposed rates* for semi-automated (operator assisted) DACC calls are: \$.85 for calls that are sent paid or billed to a calling card, \$1.20 if the call is collect or billed to a third number and \$2.60 for a person-to-person call.

Multiple List Directory Assistance (MLDA) allows the customer to request more than two listing requests per call to Directory Assistance. Customers can either call on "demand" and receive up to 10 listings, or schedule an "appointment" and receive the assistance of a Directory Assistance operator for as long as required. The rates for "demand" MLDA are \$.30 per listing request (after applicable allowances), with a maximum of 10 listing requests per call. The rates for "appointment" MLDA are \$1.00 per minute, with a 15-minute minimum.

The optional services DACC and MLDA are intended for use by both residence and business customers. Those persons who qualify for exemption of Directory Assistance charges because of visual or physical handicaps will be able to use DACC and "demand" MLDA free of charge. If approved by the commission, DACC and MLDA will be available beginning May 13, 1991. First-year projected revenues for DACC are approximately \$9.6 million. First-year projected revenues for MLDA are approximately \$1.7 million.

Cotton farmers pose questions for seminar...

by Lee Howard - County Extension Agent - Ag Seminar at ginners' questions

Questions facing Texas cotton farmers in the '90's, -- and answers which can add up to better yields, quality and profit -- will be examined in a seminar April 11 during the annual trade show and convention of the Texas Cotton Ginners' Association.

The convention annually draws more than 6,000 ginners, producers, officials and others in the industry.

The seminar will be conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service from 1:20 to 4:45 p.m. in the banquet hall of the Memorial Civic Center, site of the convention. It will conclude the 34th annual meeting of the Plains Cotton Growers, being held in conjunction with the gin show.

Private, commercial and non-commercial pesticide applicators attending the seminar can obtain two of the continuing education units required by the Texas Department of Agriculture.

How the new federal farm bill will change the farmer's marketing strategy is one of the key questions the seminar will address. Dr Carl Anderson, extension economist and cotton marketing specialist from College Station, will discuss this.

Steps to prevent nematodes from robbing the farmer of yields and profits will be outlined by Dr Jim Starr, associate professor of nematology at Texas A&M University.

Seedling diseases and ways to control them will be the topic of Dr Harold Kaufman, Extension Service plant pathologist. Dr Jim Leser, Extension Service cotton

entomologist, will examine the latest control methods for thrips, aphids and bollworms.

The possible role of genetically engineered cotton plants in pest management will be examined by Dr Norma Trolinder, plant physiologist with the U.S. Department of Agriculture-Agricultural Research Service.

Beef, Produce Best Buys in April

Texas consumers will find some good fresh produce buys in supermarkets during April, and lower beef prices enjoyed through the winter are expected to continue well into the coming month. The expected rise in beef prices won't occur until the oversupply of cattle in feedlots clears the market during the next several weeks.

Some spring produce prices will be down as marketings increase, but others are up from last year because of inflation resulting from the Iraqi conflict and a drought-reduced California harvest. Consumers can expect ample supplies and lower prices on broccoli, cabbage, cucumbers, radishes, carrots, onions, green peas, eggplant and tomatoes in particular, since these are grown in many states other than California. But prices may be up and supplies tighter on strawberries, asparagus and artichokes coming from California. These products, affected by both the December freeze and drought, will arrive at supermarkets later than normal this season.

Except for spring crops, however, expectations are that other states will add more production acres to increase summer and fall food crops. The slack will be taken up by expansion elsewhere, as the severity of water shortages

becomes more evident in California.

Weather is always a factor when it comes to food production. Although southern California received some rain last week, droughts there for the past four years are requiring growers to reduce water usage by about 75 percent. Attempts are being made to find quick solutions.

Produce also making its 1991 debut in April will be sweet corn, watermelons, cantaloupes and honeydews. Produce going out of season during the month will be mustard and turnip greens, kale, grapefruit, oranges and the imported soft fruit from Chile. The cattle marketing delay will cause beef prices to remain flat for a longer time before starting the upward trend predicted earlier. Supplies of pork and chicken also are greater than they were this time last year, and these larger supplies are expected to stabilize pork and poultry prices. As the oversupply of beef clears the market, lower pork and poultry prices will force consumer beef prices to become more competitive with these meats. This will likely mean more advertised and discounted beef specials through supermarket promotions.

Beef specials in April will shift from winter cuts of roasts to spring cuts of steaks. Look for specials on round, sirloin and hamburger steaks. Pork products will have fewer specials on roasts and ham. Instead, look for specials on pork steaks, chops, ribs and smoked sausage. Demand for

specific poultry cuts tends not to shift seasonally, thus the continual discounting of whole birds, chicken breasts and leg-thigh combinations will be featured in April.

Many supermarkets will promote National Secretaries Week, April 22-26. This will set off a flurry of sales activities in floral sections, particularly for ivy and other non-blooming container plants that will be heavily discounted. Other items for spring that supermarkets will display and discount are charcoal, grills, gardening and cleaning supplies and automotive care products.

FmHA announces new interest assistance program

The Farmers Home Administration is launching a new program to help local farmers obtain credit from local lenders, according to Neal Sox Johnson, FmHA State Director for Texas. Known as the Interest Assistance Program, it provides strong incentives for commercial lenders to make loans to farmers who otherwise could not qualify.

Under the new program, FmHA will pay up to four percentage points of interest for farmers to help them qualify for FmHA guaranteed loans. "If a creditworthy farmer can't cash flow with a guaranteed bank loan at regular interest rates, we can pay part of that interest for him until he can," Johnson said.

The Percentage of interest FmHA will pay depends on the financial condition of the farmer. FmHA will pay only the number of points necessary to help the farmer cash flow with a small reserve.

An FmHA guaranteed loan is made by a bank, PCA, or other lender with an agreement from FmHA that if the loan goes bad, FmHA will compensate the lender for up to 90 percent of its loss. "That guarantee plus the new interest assistance," Johnson said, "should greatly increase availability of farm credit through the private sector."

"The program, made law in late 1990, was put on a fast track, so as to assist farmers in time for the 1991 planting season," Johnson added. According to Johnson, the level of interest assistance will be adjusted each year, based on a review of the borrower's need for continued assistance. In addition, a borrower must be able to project a positive cash flow, including a 10 percent debt-service reserve to qualify for assistance. This is the same rule for guaranteed farm loans not receiving interest assistance.

New surcharge begins April 15

"Actually, the adjusted rates will show a decrease for many of our area subscribers," Burnett explained, "under this new system, all zip codes beginning with 793 will be \$15 per year, with those outside of Garza County to see a \$1 to \$2 surcharge." Many of the current 793 subscribers outside of local counties have been paying \$26 per year.

Subscribers will be notified of the changes by letter upon renewal notification beginning April 15.
