

# Community observes Cinco de Mayo with 'Fiestas Rancheras' celebration Saturday

Festivities begin at noon Saturday at the city park for this year's "Fiestas Rancheras", a celebration timed to observe the 1862 defeat by Mexicans over the French to liberate Mexico from its European rulers.

"Fiestas Rancheras" committee chairman Lino DeLeon and members of the Caprock Cultural Association, have set forth a full day of activities at the park, with Diane Carrasco serving as mistress of ceremonies.

The popular "Emozions", Band of the 90s, La Orquesta, led by Ben Salazar with the 10 12 member string and bass group, will offer live musical entertainment beginning at noon and continue through the afternoon.

A fajita cook-off is also scheduled, with judging at 4 p.m. Judges for the fajita cook-off are State Representative David Counts, Mayor Giles McCrary and Garza County Judge Giles Dalby.

Lubbock radio station KXTQ will broadcast live from the park from 3 to 6 p.m.

Fajita cook-off participants will begin the cooking in the morning, with the food available for purchase later in the day. For more information, call 495-4148.

A children's dance contest will also be held, arranged by Reyes Pequeno, with prizes offered by local restaurants.

The "Fiestas Rancheras" will also include games and food booths.

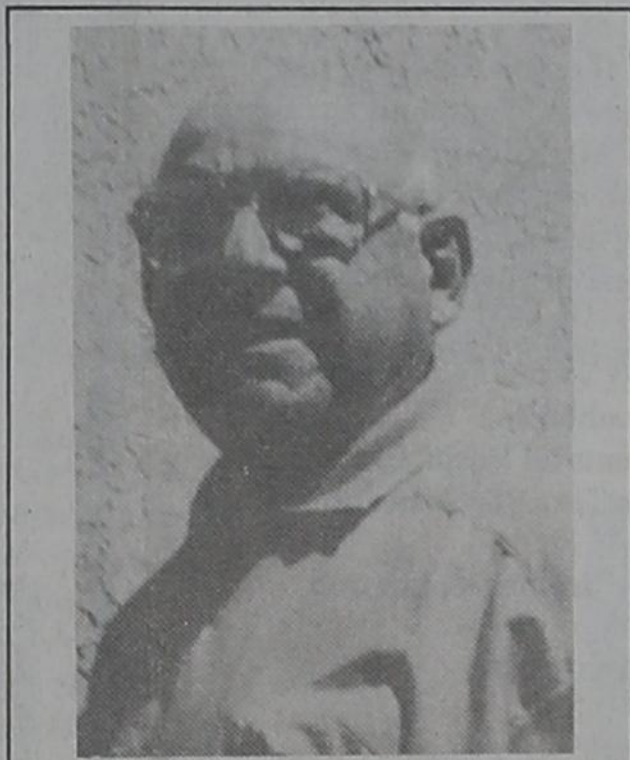
The 30th annual art show here will be held for the seventh year in the historic Algerita Art Center on East Main Street. It continues to be one of the largest juried shows in the West Texas area, with participating artists from as far away as Dallas, New Mexico, Midland and Amarillo.

Post Art Guild members began accepting entries Tuesday and will continue with the check-in process through today at noon. Judging will be completed by 1 p.m. Thursday and the patron's reception will be held at 7 p.m. Thursday.

The show opens to the public on Friday and Saturday from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. and Sunday from 1 to 3 p.m. The awards presentation will begin at 3 p.m. Sunday afternoon.

Dr. Caballero is a member of numerous professional societies, including honorary and life member of Fellow Royal Society of Art, Great Britain and life member of KAPPA PI, international Society of Art.

He and his wife of 50 years, Mary, are the parents of two children, Lou Ann Pruitt and Charles Thomas. They now make their home in the country near Amarillo, where they spend their days growing flowers and tending a small garden.

## Rotarians honor McCrary with Paul Harris Fellow award

Former Lubbock mayor Alan Henry, attending the Post Rotary Club luncheon last week, presented long time Rotarian Giles C. McCrary with the prestigious Rotary International Paul Harris Fellow award.

In recognition of his long standing contributions to Rotary International and civic projects, Henry praised McCrary's support in the areas of alleviating hunger, disease and "striving to make the world a better place for all mankind and a place of international peace."

"It is especially a pleasure for me to make this presentation," Henry said, "because we go back a long way."

"I don't suppose there's any community I know of that when you say the name of the town, you automatically think of the name of the mayor, but Post is one of those communities," Henry added.

"Mayor McCrary has been your mayor for the past 22 years and I guarantee you that when people say Post, they think of the progress and leadership that your city has made. What is it about Post that makes it so different from other towns in this area? It seems Post is always doing something unique and different," Henry continued, specifically pointing to the Garza Theatre and the EMT organization.

Henry thanked McCrary for his efforts on behalf of Rotary and his continued support of its programs.

In a discussion about Lake Alan Henry near Justiceburg, the former Lubbock mayor emphasized that a few people were "absolutely crucial in the success of completing the complicated negotiations, and in that handful of people was Giles McCrary."

"When problems and stumbling blocks were encountered," the lake's namesake continued, "it was so great for me to be able to pick up the phone and talk to Giles, asking, what do we do?"

"I guarantee you we would not be where we are or have made the progress we have without Giles McCrary," Henry emphasized. "I want to thank the people of Post for making him available to us."

Voting in the Post ISD, Garza Memorial Hospital and City of Post elections will be held at the Post Community Center. Voting in the Southland ISD election will be in the school library.

Candidates in the Post ISD election are Place 1 incumbents Dan Hodges, Place 2; Gary Workman, Barbara Hardin, Place 6 and Mark Kirkpatrick, Place 7 along with Place 3 Rex Cash and Place 6 challenger David Stelzer.

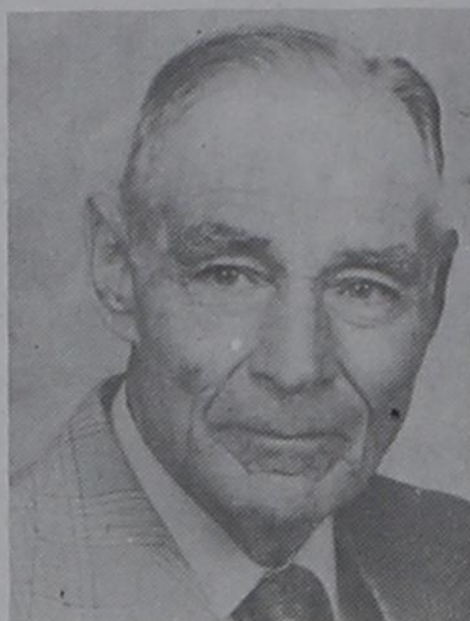

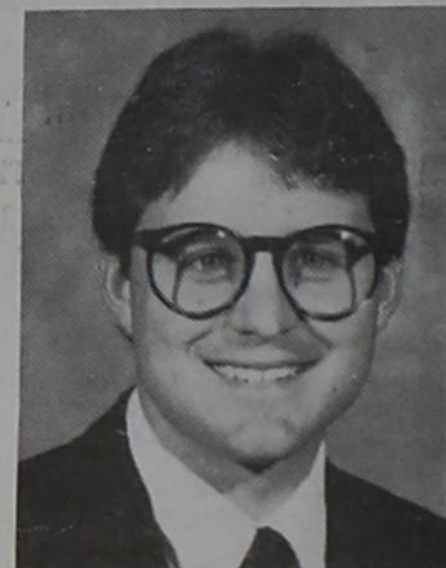

I am a candidate for Mayor of the City of Post, and submit to you my qualifications and beliefs in an effort to solicit your vote for me on May 4, 1991.

I have lived in Post for 33 years and know a little bit of what goes on here. I served on the city council for a period of ten years, I helped start the Emergency Medical Service, I personally started the Garza County Junior Livestock Association, and I have participated in many other worthy projects. All of those things are in the past and what is important as far as Post is concerned is the future. I am very proud of many of our institutions in Post. I support the Garza Theatre, the art center, the junior livestock association, and other activities that have some effect on the quality of life. I am a part of the business community of Post through the operation of my business, the Chaparral Steak House. Our present system of government (election of council members at-large) tends to discourage people from various economic strata from participating in city government. I first heard of the desire of the City of Post to change from electing council members at-large to single member districts ten years ago. It seems this issue comes up very prominently just before each mayoral election and then nothing is heard or done about it. Perhaps something will be done this time and we can convert our city council to a representative council.

If I am elected your mayor, I will use my best efforts to involve people from all economic strata and racial backgrounds and origins. I do not believe the city council should enact ordinances that affect the welfare of all the people, without first having exhaustive public hearings on the matter. To help the city council do what the people want done, I would advocate appointments of study committees on any issue that affects people's rights and their property. The city council recently called an election to place another 1% sales tax on purchases made in Post. The people of Post resoundingly defeated this proposal. I would never suggest the increase of a tax without giving the people a broad input into what is proposed. You can talk to me anywhere you see me, at home, at work, or at council meetings. I will advocate all decisions affecting the people of Post being made by the city council, and the mayor or some appointed official. All council meetings will be open and people will be encouraged to participate. If elected, I will propose to the city council that we set up broad-based committees, to which anything that comes before the council and needs study can be passed on to a particular committee for study and a report back to the council. The committee hearings would be open to the public and no decision would be made by the council until anyone who wanted to offer input was allowed to do so.

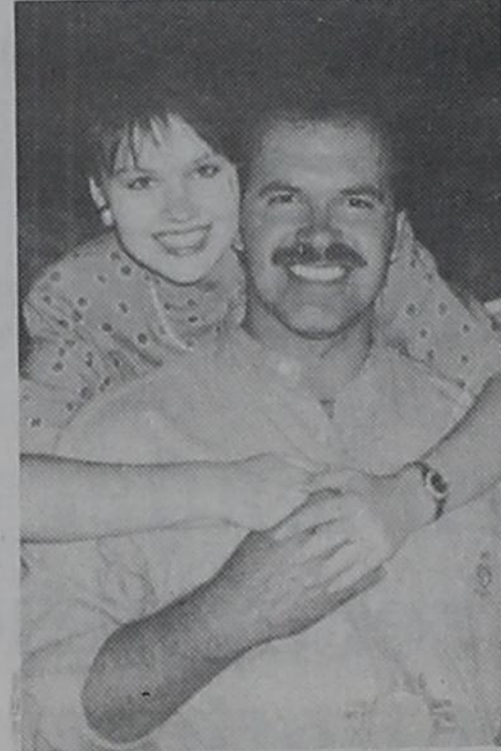

# PHS girls set new school records, send four to state track meet

The Post High School girls' track team set two new school records and qualified for the state track meet in four events following last Saturday's Region 1-AA Track and Field Meet at Abilene Christian University.

Scoring 78 points overall, the team placed second in the meet.

Advancing to state competition May 10-11 in Austin will be the 400 meter relay team of Ranetta Cruse, Sara Alexander, Wendy Clay and Crystal Clay; Wendy Clay in the 100 meter hurdles, Crystal Clay in the 200 meter dash and Alexander in the 400 meter dash.

Setting a blazing 48.29 time in the 400 meter relay, the foursome broke last year's 48.4 record setting time at Memorial Stadium by Dana Morris, Sara Alexander, Megan Bush and Crystal Clay.

Wendy Clay broke her own school record in the 100 meter hurdles with a 15.2 time. Her previous record time was 15.52 which she set at Sundown in the District 4-AA meet.

Crystal ran away from the pack in the 200 meter dash with a time of 25.23.

Placing second in the 400 meter dash, Alexander turned in a time of 59.46.

The 1600 meter relay team of Alexander, Lou Ann Ammons, Krisha Bush and Crystal Clay took third place with a time of 4:05.9.

The 800 meter relay team of Trudy Woods, Krisha Bush, Wendy Clay and Ranetta Cruse also placed third, with a time of 1:48.43.

Cruse finished fourth in the 100 meter dash at 13.17.

Alexander took fifth in the long jump with a leap of 16' 6 1/2".

Krisha Bush competed in the long jump with a 15' 9" leap, Jamie Hawkins finished out the high jump with a 5' 0" effort and Alissa Mitchell clocked a 14:00.56 run in the 3200 meter run.

"I want to commend these girls on their efforts at Abilene," coach Bill Gordon emphasizes, "every time I turned around I saw a young lady or group of young ladies from Post High School either setting school records or establishing seasonal best standards.

"One's best is all that can be given and these girls certainly did that," the coach continued.

"Our next stop is Austin, Texas May 10 and 11," Gordon said.

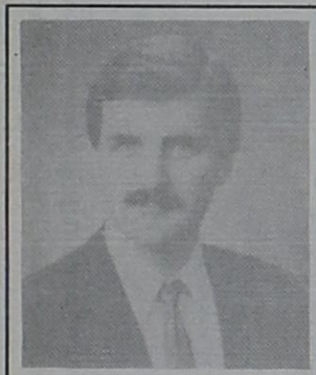

### This ANN That

Extension Home Economists have been asked by General Electric Corporation to help them inform consumers of a recall of coffeemakers manufactured by them under the Universal and G.E. names before April 28, 1984. These coffeemakers are potential fire hazards.

I have placed recall notices at Handy Hardware, Winn's, United, and the Courthouse foyer. If there is a possibility that you have one of these coffeemakers, please pick up one of the notices and call the toll free number for further instructions.

Consumers should beware of salesperson using free in-home tests to sell water treatment devices.

In-home test will show minerals in your drinking water, and perhaps the acidity/alkalinity level. Testing procedures use a chemical that combines with dissolved minerals, such as calcium and magnesium, and causes them to settle to the bottom of the bottle. Keep in mind that all water, except distilled water, contains some minerals.

Another demonstration is down with a face cloth that has been previously washed. The demonstrator puts the cloth and a water softening agent into a jar of tap

water and shakes it vigorously. Suds will appear in the water. This is normal because some detergent residue remains in all washed articles.

These free in-home "water quality tests" are merely sales ploys designed to sell you a water treatment system. Often the "test report" on your tap water is given in a way that implies that your water contains a lot of minerals that are not good for your family's health.

Harmful contaminants in water are more difficult to test for than the common minerals in tap water. For example lead is odorless, colorless, and tasteless. Tests for lead, bacteria, organic and inorganic solvents, and most other contaminants which are health concerns, require special equipment and complex procedures. Tests for most potentially harmful water contaminants cannot be done in your home. If you have a real concern about the quality of your home water, you can have it tested by contacting this office. We can give you instructions on sending a sample to be tested. However, all city water is tested and treated at the water treatment plant and should all be the same quality unless you have a problem in your home system.

Claims that a water treatment device can improve the taste of your water may be accurate. Also, softened water can save some energy in heating of the water and

will require less detergent for laundry and water heating costs because minerals removed are probably exaggerations.
