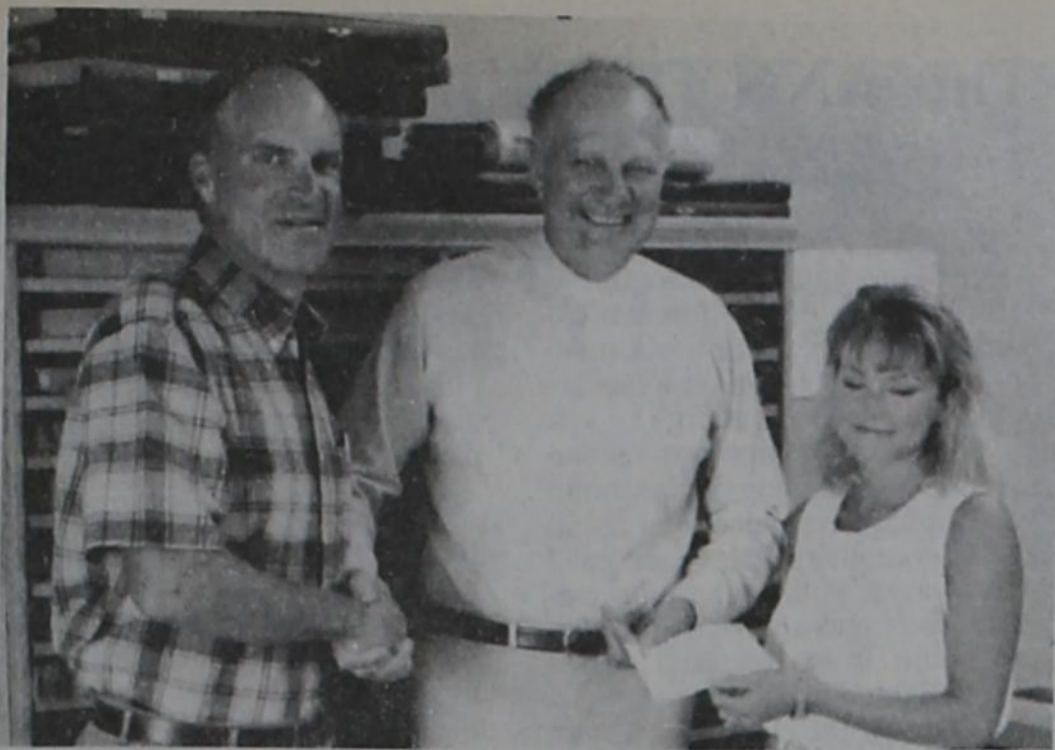

## Sight may be damaged by eclipse

A partial solar eclipse will be visible throughout the Southwestern United States on Thursday, July 11. In those states, the moon will cover about 60 percent of the sun. A full eclipse will be visible in Hawaii, making this the last total solar eclipse visible from the United States in the 20th century.

"Never look directly at the sun, not even for a second," warns Wayne E. Fung, MD, an ophthalmologist and spokesperson for the American Academy of Ophthalmology.

"Staring at the eclipse can burn the retina, the membrane at the back of the eye that senses light," Dr Fung said. "Though you won't feel any pain, you may be permanently damaging your sight."

Dr Fung likened the retina to film in a camera. Once the film is damaged, no pictures can be taken. "There is no treatment for the vision-impairing scarring and permanent blind spots that result from staring at the sun," he said.

# Bond sale approved by state, Cotton Unlimited gets set to begin production

## Governor gives final approval for \$2 million loan

Governor Ann Richards put her stamp of approval on the final piece of paperwork last week as the Texas Agricultural Finance Authority (TAFA) approved the sale of bonds for three industrial development loan projects, including \$2 million to the Post Economic Development Corp. (PEDC) to be administered for Cotton Unlimited here.

"It was an up and down week for us," Dalby said, "first, we went to Austin Monday expecting to meet with the TAFA board, only to find out that the meeting had to be cancelled due to a family illness of the board chairman."

"While we were in Austin, we visited Representative David Counts, who was instrumental in the speedy process of approval that came through Friday."

Dalby also expressed strong appreciation to State Senator John Montford and his staff for their personal interest and assistance, as well as PEDC board members Patty Kirkpatrick, A.C. Cash and Wanda Mitchell, who shared in the trips to Austin for hearings and long hours of detailed work preparing documentation for the loan.

## Cut the income tax talk and get on with cutting spending

Members of Governor Ann Richards' Task Force on Revenue recently put a hefty six percent personal income tax and a 6.5 percent corporate income tax on the legislative table to satisfy the Texas Legislature's never-ending

appetite for increased spending.

Make no mistake: The merits of an income tax will be a focal point of debate in this summer's special session on state spending and taxes. And while a few Texas business leaders have joined hands with the free-spending liberals in

support of such a tax, you can count me out.

A personal and corporate income tax couldn't come at a worse time for most Texans or Texas businesses. If instituted, an income tax will further erode the earnings of the average Texas family and

Texas business, and ultimately derail Texas' sputtering economic recovery.

As head of one of the nation's largest independent natural gas producers, I can testify that the pinch is still on. Texas is still picking itself up off the mat after the oil bust of the 1980s and the recent savings and loan debacle. The real estate, insurance, banking, oil and petrochemical industries remain depressed. The collapse in natural gas prices continues to impede the recovery of our state's energy industry. Small businesses, responsible for 92 percent of all jobs in Texas, have suffered greatly during this economic recession, and will suffer another blow if the income tax -- or any other business or personal tax -- is implemented.

Earlier this year, state lawmakers approved a reduction in state taxes collected from Texas' struggling horse racing industry to spur economic growth. Texans will no doubt have a hard time swallowing the notion that the reverse approach -- increased state taxes -- will have the same result.

The Texas Public Policy Foundation estimates that a personal income tax will further reduce personal income by as much as nine percent. From 1985 to 1988, the personal income of Texas families fell from 21st place to 33rd in a 50 state comparison, and an income tax will hammer us further down the list.

# Commissioners begin work on budget, attempt to hold line on taxes

## Landfill question creates uncertainty on expenses

The Garza County Commissioners' Court began its budget preparation work at the regular meeting Monday morning, walking through estimated expenses and revenues in an attempt to get a "ball park, rough idea of how next year's budget will look," Judge Giles Dalby said.

Preliminary estimates peg revenues and expenses fairly close, with no provision for salary increases, at \$1.4 million.

"We can't really move much further until we get the final word on the tax rate and appraisals," Dalby emphasized, "but at least we can begin to do some estimates and get some ideas of where we stand."

Among the expense items to be considered is the county's plan to provide sanitation landfill services, based on the predicted closing of the City of Post landfill in the next few months. The county has been assisting in financial support of the city landfill for the convenience of county residents.

Dalby suggested that the county could contract with a disposal service that would place large trailer size dumpsters at the five communities in the county. Commissioners were unable to determine how much to set aside, but agreed to share the cost among the precincts.

The current tax rate of 17.5 would yield an additional \$42,000 in revenue, according to preliminary figures provided by tax assessor Laura (Chita) Hataway. She also prepared a revenue estimate on the basis of 18.4 tax rate, which would provide approximately \$62,255 more than last year.

The court made no decisions on the budget.

Commissioners voted not to implement an optional \$5 charge for vehicle registration, which was allowed by the last legislature. The money would be used to pay for road guards at school crossings. Currently the services are provided by the school districts.

Election judges for the August 10 constitutional election were named by the court. Serving as election judges and the voting precincts are Susan Pennell and alternate Henrietta Cruse, one; Ruby Ellis and alternate Wilma Smith, two; Betty Striblin, three; John Boren, four; Cleo Sappington, five; Quannah Maxey, six; Ida Mae Wilks and alternate Iva Hudman, seven and Harold Lucas, eight. Ruby Jones will serve as absentee observer, counting the absentee ballots.

The court set five priorities for the redistricting committee to consider:

1. Bring the population in each commissioner's precinct in regard to one man, one vote to within constitutional tolerance.
2. Protect minority voting strength by paying careful attention to the minority community so as not to fragment segregated minority communities.

3. To apportion the precincts to provide the greatest convenience for the greatest number of people.

4. To create compact precincts.

5. To create precincts that have accessible and appropriate voting places.

Dalby informed commissioners that county attorney Preston Pool had removed himself from the case involving a suit by constable Michael Harper. Pool and Dalby have both been called as witnesses by Harper's attorneys. The court approved the selection of law firm Crenshaw, Dupree and Milam to represent the county in the case. The suit concerning the pay of constables is expected to be on the district court docket in December.

Dalby also told commissioners that Pool had sent a letter to Harper explaining that his request for a vehicle had been denied due to the fact that the budget did not include the expenditure.

The commissioners court recessed for lunch, then continued the agenda with a tour of the Lake Alan Henry dam site at Justiceburg and returned to the courthouse for more review of the budget.

Attending the meeting were commissioners Herb Walls, John Valdez, Albert Stone and Sammy Ellis, Judge Dalby, clerk Sonny Gossett, treasurer Ruth Ann Young and tax assessor Hataway.

### July 11 last day for voter registration

The last day to register to vote in the August 10 constitutional amendment election will be July 11. That will also be the last date to provide a change of address for voters who have moved from one voting precinct to another. The change must be done in person. According to the Texas Election Code, voters must be registered the 30th day before the election date. Texas voters will decide on a number of constitutional amendments in the August 10 election.

### Late vehicle registrations get 20% fee

An additional 20 percent delinquency penalty fee will automatically be added to all late vehicle registrations in Texas on the sixth day of the following month after the vehicle registration has expired. The collection of the penalty is mandated by law and is enforced by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

## This ANN That

**Make sure your home's in order before going on vacation**  
Before you leave for an extended vacation, there are a number of things you can do to secure your home and save energy.

The following tips are recommended before going on vacation:

- \* Unplug small electrical appliances, computers, televisions and microwaves. Pulling the plug prevents fires and short-circuits that can result from electrical surges during lightning storms.
- \* Turn off the electric hot water heater to save energy and electricity. Most gas water heaters have a "vacation" setting, so you don't have to turn them off. This saves having to relight the pilot.
- \* If possible, use timers on lamps so that lights come on periodically. Manual timers are inexpensive; electronic ones cost a little more.
- \* Raise the thermostat on air conditioner units to about 85 degrees. This keeps the refrigerator and freezer from overworking, keeps plants from dying, yet also saves energy.
- \* Take food items that may spoil out of the refrigerator; clean it out and defrost if necessary.
- \* Leave names and phone numbers of trusted repair firms -- plumbing, electrical and others -- with the person who will be checking your home and watering the plants.
- \* Set off bug bombs, if needed, before you leave.
- \* Check exterior security lights. If you have motion detectors, pass your hand in front of the lights or

walk by them to make sure the switch is on.

\* Put your mail on hold and pay all bills that may be due before you return home. Utility companies normally have you estimate an amount on the high side and credit the difference to the following month's bill. When paying bills this way, be sure to write the month on your check that the payment is for.

\* Cancel your newspaper during the days you will be gone or have a neighbor pick it up. However, make sure that the neighbor does not stack papers at the back door or inside the house piled up with the mail in plain view through a window.

\* Make sure that your yard is maintained -- have someone cut the grass regularly, and if you have a swimming pool, arrange care for equipment and other necessary maintenance.

\* Arrange to have pets boarded at a kennel or make arrangements for someone to care for them.

\* Hide valuables such as guns and jewelry or place with someone else if possible.

\* Inventory your personal belongings such as jewelry, china, art work, television and video and stereo equipment in advance in case of theft. This includes writing down brands, serial and model numbers, and taking pictures.

\* Allow enough time to secure all windows, sliding glass doors and other doors.

It's also a good idea to leave information on where you can be reached with neighbors and police, and let them know the dates you will be gone. And don't broadcast to everyone that you will be going on vacation. Tell them about it after you return.

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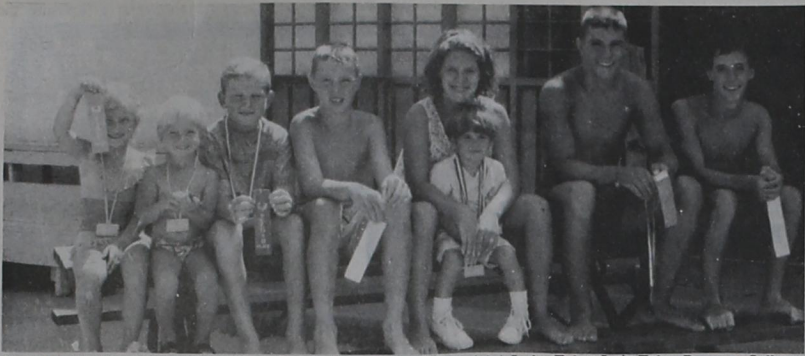

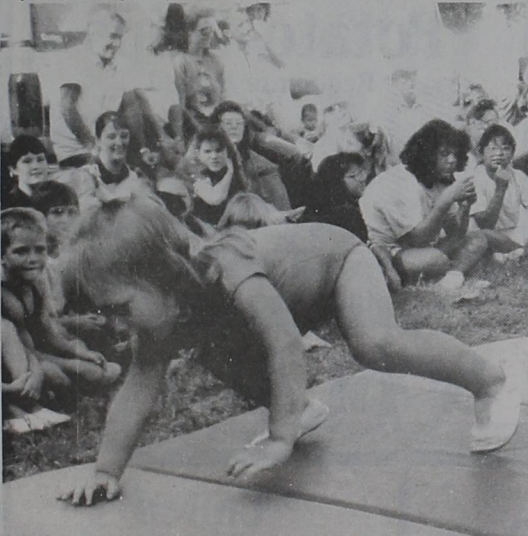

#### NO to income tax!

Those who have jumped on the income tax band wagon maintain abandoning Texas' long-standing contempt for such a tax is the "right thing to do for Texas." The right thing for whom?

Consider this:

\* Texans have suffered three major state tax increases since 1985.

\* Taxpayers have just been tagged with a school financing bill that will increase property taxes by an average of 34 percent over five years.

\* Nationally, Texas has the second-highest combined state and local sales tax burden.

\* From 1980-88, Texas ranked

first as the state with the most rapid rate of increase in property taxes.

\* State tax collections rose 98.6 percent from 1980 to 1988 while the cost of living increased only 43.5 percent in the same period.

Why an income tax now? The state comptroller has already identified \$1.6 billion in potential state spending cuts. On top of that, it is estimated that the state will end the current biennium August 31 with a \$300 million surplus. Without any changes in the state tax system, or imposition of the cut identified by the comptroller, there will be an additional \$2 billion available for the next biennium.

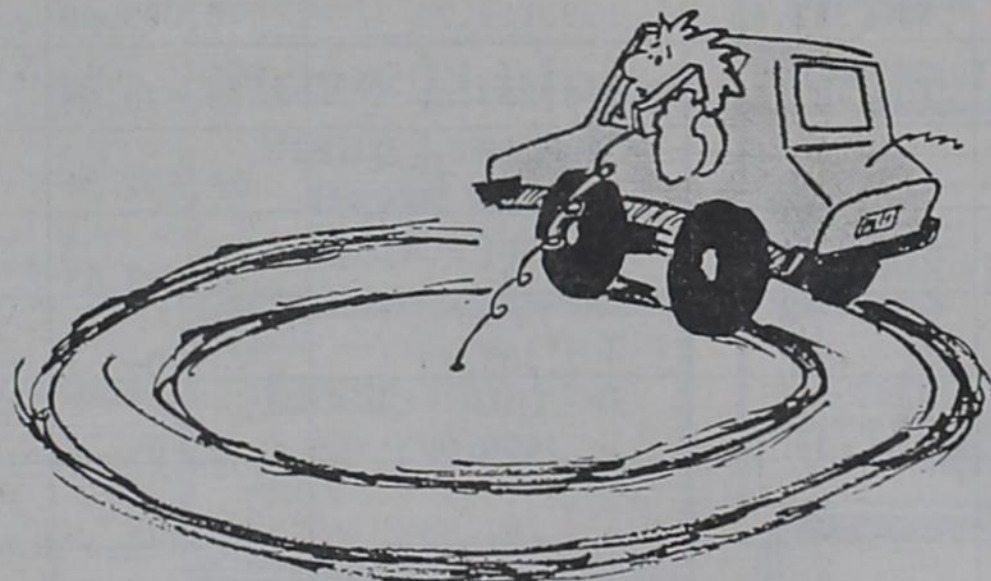

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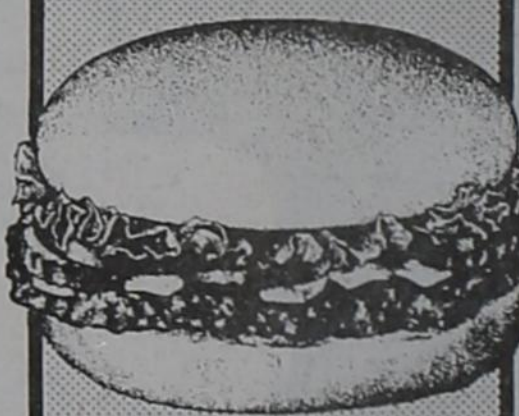
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
